**Fiscal Impact Summary**

This bill would have no expenditure impact on the General Fund, Federal Funds, or Other Funds. This bill revises and broadens minimum standards for compounding pharmacy practices. The Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation, the agency that enforces pharmacy standards, reports that this bill does not add any additional duties that would cause the Board of Pharmacy to incur additional expenditures.

**Explanation of Fiscal Impact**

**Introduced March 7, 2017**

**State Expenditure**

This bill amends the S.C. Pharmacy Practice Act to add definitions, provide specific guidelines, health and safety standards, and procedures for compounding pharmacies and pharmacists regarding the preparation of compounded medications. The bill lists the current good pharmacy practices for the preparation and dispensing of compounded products, workplace safety, equipment maintenance, record-keeping, and consumer protection. The bill also provides public health standards for the compounding area environment, preparation, labeling, storing, dispensing, and distribution of sterile preparations.

**Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation.** The department reports that this bill would have no expenditure impact on the General Fund, Federal Funds, or Other Funds. The bill revises compounding pharmacy standards but places no additional regulatory duties on the Board of Pharmacy which already regulates compounding pharmacies.

**Department of Health and Environmental Control.** The department indicates that this bill would have no expenditure impact on the General Fund, Federal Funds, or Other Funds as the department does not operate any compounding pharmacies.
