OPERATION OF STATE GOVERNMENT

SECTION 1 - H630 - DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

1.1. (SDE: Appropriation Transfer Prohibition) The amounts appropriated herein for aid to subdivisions, allocations to school districts, or special line items shall not be transferred and must be expended in accordance with the intent of the appropriation, except that the department may transfer funds that are deducted and retained from a school district's transportation allocation to reimburse the department for the cost of unauthorized mileage. This transfer must be agreed upon by both the school district and the department. Those funds may be transferred into the department's school bus transportation operating account.

1.2. (SDE: DHEC - Comprehensive Health Assessment) All school districts shall participate, to the fullest extent possible, in the Medicaid program by seeking appropriate reimbursement for services and administration of health and social services. Reimbursements to the school districts shall not be used to supplant funds currently being spent on health and social services.

1.3. (SDE: ~~EFA Formula/Base Student Cost Inflation Factor~~ *State Aid to Classrooms*) To the extent possible within available funds, it is the intent of the General Assembly to provide for one hundred percent of full implementation of the Education Finance Act to ~~include an inflation factor projected by the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office to match inflation wages of public school employees in the Southeast via an allocation from the State Aid to Classrooms appropriation.~~ *The base student cost for the current fiscal year has been determined to be \$2,485. The funds appropriated for State Aid to Classrooms shall be allocated as follows: 65.41 percent must be allocated based on the Education Finance Act formula and the differentiated student weightings in this Act; 28.88 percent must be allocated based on the manner of distribution of EFA employer contributions in the prior fiscal year; and 5.72 percent must be allocated to fully implement the State Minimum Teacher Salary Schedule with a minimum starting teacher salary of \$35,000.* For the current fiscal year, the total pupil count is projected to be ~~727,513~~ *720,316*. *These funds represent an average per pupil of \$3,846 in State Aid to Classrooms.* The average per pupil funding is projected to be ~~\$6,198~~ *\$6,506* state, ~~\$1,281~~ *\$1,315* federal, and ~~\$5,982~~ *\$6,406* local. This is an average total funding level of ~~\$13,461~~ *\$14,227* excluding revenues of local bond issues. *It is the intent of the General Assembly that the consolidation of the Education Finance Act and Education Finance Act - Employer Contributions appropriations, and the subsequent allocation of the State Aid to Classrooms appropriation back to these categories, should not significantly alter the application of funding formulas or maintenance of effort requirements referencing the Education Finance Act and Education Finance Act - Employer Contributions.*

The funds allocated from State Aid to Classrooms for implementing the revised State Minimum Teacher Salary Schedule shall be distributed to school districts using the EIA Teacher Salary Supplement methodology. The resulting estimated teacher salary schedule is as follows:

13 As further used in this act, references to the Education Finance Act or EFA funds shall be interpreted to mean the 65.41 percent
 14 of funds appropriated for State Aid to Classrooms and allocated for the Education Finance Act and, where appropriate, the 28.88
 15 percent of State Aid to Classrooms allocated for Education Finance Act Employer Contributions.

16 For the purpose of maintaining consistency when calculating maintenance of effort, references to the base student cost shall be
 17 interpreted as the base student cost resulting from the 65.41 percent of funds appropriated for State Aid to Classrooms and allocated
 18 for the Education Finance Act and, where appropriate, the 28.88 percent of State Aid to Classrooms allocated for Education Finance
 19 Act Employer Contributions, and other any other items normally included in the base student cost calculation.

20 For the current fiscal year the South Carolina Public Charter School District and any institution of higher education sponsoring a
 21 public charter school shall receive and distribute state EFA funds to the charter school as determined by one hundred percent of the
 22 current year's base student cost, as funded by the General Assembly multiplied by the weighted pupils enrolled in the charter school,
 23 which must be subject to adjustment for student attendance.

24 The Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office, must post in a prominent place on their website for each school district projections,
 25 including the per pupil state, federal and local revenues, excluding revenues of local bond issues, for the current fiscal year. Also,
 26 as soon as practicable, upon determining the exact numbers regarding pupil count and funding, the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office,
 27 shall also post on their website the one hundred thirty-five day average daily membership for each school district and per pupil state,
 28 federal and local revenues, excluding revenues of local bond issues, based on the most recent audited financial statement as reported
 29 annually pursuant to Section 59-17-100. The Department of Education and the Education Oversight Committee shall provide in a
 30 prominent place on their internet websites a link to the information posted by the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office, including the
 31 projected numbers and the exact numbers.

32 For the current fiscal year, the pupil classification weightings are as follows:

33 (1) K-12 pupils or base students including homebound students 1.00

34 Students served in licensed residential treatment facilities (RTFs) for children and adolescents as defined under Section
 35 44-7-130 of the 1976 Code shall receive a weighting of 2.10.

9 No local match is required for the additional weightings for personalized instruction in the current school year. Charter school per
 10 pupil calculations for locally sponsored charters will continue to be calculated according to Section 59-40-140 of the 1976 Code.
 11 Students may receive multiple weights for personalized instruction; however, within each weight, students should only be counted
 12 once. These weights are defined below:

13 Students in poverty are students who qualify for Medicaid, SNAP, TANF, or are homeless, transient, or in foster care.

14 Gifted and talented students are students who are classified as academically or artistically gifted and talented or who are enrolled in
 15 Advanced Placement (AP), ~~and~~ International Baccalaureate (IB), *and Cambridge International* courses in high school. Districts
 16 shall set-aside twelve percent of the funds for serving artistically gifted and talented students in grades three through twelve.

17 Students in need of academic assistance are students who do not meet state standards in mathematics, English language arts, or
 18 both on state approved assessments in grades three through eight and high school assessments for grades nine through twelve. The
 19 additional weight generates funds needed to provide additional instructional services to these students.

20 Students with limited English proficiency are students who require intensive English language instruction programs and whose
 21 families require specialized parental involvement intervention.

22 Funds received by a school district pursuant to the dual credit weighting must be used to defray all possible costs of dual credit
 23 courses for students. Students identified for dual credit enrollment must be identified in PowerSchool as taking a course that will
 24 lead to both high school credit and post-secondary credit. Districts must utilize these funds to offset the cost of tuition, fees,
 25 instructors, and instructional materials for qualifying courses with the local technical college or other institution of higher education.
 26 Each school district shall report to the department the number of students participating in dual credit courses and specify the cost
 27 borne by each entity. School districts must assist students in accessing Lottery Tuition Assistance when applicable.

28 Further, the Department of Education may use school district student counts for personalized instruction as collected in the same
 29 manner as the prior fiscal year, PowerSchool or other available existing data sources as determined by the department to calculate
 30 the school district add on weightings for the personalized instruction classifications and the determination of the school districts
 31 monetary entitlement. End of year adjustments shall be based on the one hundred thirty-five day student average daily membership
 32 for all classifications. During the current fiscal year the department will update PowerSchool calculations, reports, screen
 33 development, documentation, and training to incorporate the new pupil classification weightings and to make final district allocation
 34 adjustments by June 30. The department must provide districts with technical assistance with regard to student count changes in
 35 PowerSchool.

1 **1.4.** (SDE: EFA - Formula) The amount appropriated in Part IA, Section 1 for “Education Finance Act” shall be the maximum
2 paid under the provisions of Act 163 of 1977 (the South Carolina Education Finance Act of 1977) to the aggregate of all recipients.
3 The South Carolina Education Department shall develop formulas to determine the state and required local funding as stipulated in
4 the South Carolina Education Finance Act of 1977. Such formulas shall require the approval of the State Board of Education and
5 the State Fiscal Accountability Authority. After computing the EFA allocations for all districts, the department shall determine
6 whether any districts’ minimum required local revenue exceeds the districts’ total EFA Foundation Program. When such instance is
7 found, the department shall adjust the index of taxpaying ability to reflect a local effort equal to the cost of the districts’ EFA
8 Foundation Program. The districts’ weighted pupil units are to be included in determination of the funds needed for implementation
9 of the Education Finance Act statewide.

10 In the event that the formulas as devised by the Department of Education and approved by the State Board of Education and the
11 State Fiscal Accountability Authority should provide for distribution to the various school districts totaling more than the amount
12 appropriated for such purposes, subject to the provisions of this proviso, the Department of Education shall reduce each school district
13 entitlement by an equal amount per weighted pupil so as to bring the total disbursements into conformity with the total funds
14 appropriated for this purpose. If a reduction is required in the state’s contribution, the required local funding shall be reduced by the
15 proportionate share of local funds per weighted pupil unit. The Department of Education shall continually monitor the distribution
16 of funds under the provisions of the Education Finance Act and shall make periodic adjustments to disbursements to ensure the
17 aggregate of such disbursements do not exceed the appropriated funds.

18 Local districts shall not be mandated or required to inflate the base number in their respective salary schedules by any percentage
19 greater than the percentage by which the appropriated base student cost exceeds the appropriated base student cost of the prior fiscal
20 year.

21 **1.5.** (SDE: Employer Contributions/Allocations) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the appropriation contained herein
22 for “Public School Employee Benefits” shall not be utilized to provide employer contributions for any portion of a school district
23 employee’s salary that is federally funded.

24 State funds allocated for school district employer contributions must be allocated by the formula and must be used first by each
25 district to cover the cost of fringe benefits for personnel required by the Defined Program, food service personnel and other personnel
26 required by law. Once a district has expended all state allocated funds for fringe benefits, the district may utilize food service
27 revenues to fund a proportionate share of fringe benefits costs for food service personnel.

28 The Department of Juvenile Justice and the Department of Corrections’ school districts must be allocated funds under the fringe
29 benefits program in accordance with criteria established for all school districts.

30 **1.6.** (SDE: Employer Contributions/Obligations) In order to finalize each school district’s allocations of Employer Contributions
31 funds for retiree insurance from the prior fiscal year, the Department of Education is authorized to adjust a school district’s allocation
32 in the current fiscal year accordingly to reflect actual payroll and payments to the Retirement System from the prior fiscal year. In
33 the event the Department of Education is notified that an educational subdivision has failed to remit proper payments to cover
34 Employee Fringe Benefit obligations, the Department of Education is directed to withhold the educational subdivision’s state funds
35 until such obligations are met.

1 1.7. (SDE: Governor's School for Science & Math) Any unexpended balance on June thirtieth of the prior fiscal year of funds
2 appropriated to or generated by the Governor's School for Science and Mathematics may be carried forward and expended in the
3 current fiscal year pursuant to the direction of the board of trustees of the school.

4 1.8. (SDE: Educational Responsibility/Foster Care) The responsibility for providing a free and appropriate public education
5 program for all children including disabled students is vested in the public school district wherein a child of lawful school age resides
6 in a foster home, group home, orphanage, or a state operated health care facility including a facility for treatment of mental illness
7 or chemical dependence and habilitation centers for persons with intellectual disabilities or persons with related conditions located
8 within the jurisdiction of the school district or alternative residences. The districts concerned may agree upon acceptable local cost
9 reimbursement. If no agreement is reached, districts providing education shall receive from the district where the child last resided
10 before placement in a facility an additional amount equivalent to the statewide average of the local base student cost multiplied by
11 the appropriate pupil weighting as set forth in Section 59-20-40 of the Education Finance Act. If a child from out of state is residing
12 in a facility owned and/or operated by a for profit entity, the district providing educational services shall be reimbursed by the for
13 profit entity the local district's local support per weighted pupil above the statewide average base student cost multiplied by the
14 appropriate pupil weighting as set forth in Section 59-20-40 of the Education Finance Act. This also applies to John de la Howe
15 School who also has the authority to seek reimbursement in any situation that the school district has participation in the placement
16 of the student. John de la Howe School shall be reimbursed the local district's local support per weighted pupil above the statewide
17 average base student cost multiplied by the appropriate pupil weighting as set forth in Section 59-20-40 of the Education Finance
18 Act. Participation will be evidenced by a written agreement from the IEP team or 504 team, written referral, or the school district
19 initiating the placement process. School districts providing the education shall notify the nonresident district in writing within
20 forty-five calendar days that a student from the nonresident district is receiving education services pursuant to the provisions of the
21 proviso. The notice shall also contain the student's name, date of birth, and disabling condition if available. If appropriate financial
22 arrangements cannot be effected between institutions of the state, including independent school districts under the authority of the
23 Department of Disabilities and Special Needs, and school districts, institutions receiving educational appropriations shall pay the
24 local base student cost multiplied by the appropriate pupil weighting. Children residing in institutions of state agencies shall be
25 educated with nondisabled children in the public school districts if appropriate to their educational needs. Such institutions shall
26 determine, on an individual basis, which children residing in the institution might be eligible to receive appropriate educational
27 services in a public school setting. Once these children are identified, the institution shall convene an IEP meeting with officials of
28 the public school district in which the institution is located. If it is determined by the committee that the least restrictive environment
29 in which to implement the child's IEP is a public school setting, then the school district in which the institution is located must
30 provide the educational services. However, that school district may enter into contractual agreements with any other school district
31 having schools located within a forty-five mile radius of the institution. The cost for educating such children shall be allocated in
32 the following manner: the school district where the child last resided before being placed in an institution shall pay to the school
33 district providing the educational services an amount equivalent to the statewide average of the local base student cost multiplied by
34 the appropriate pupil weighting as set forth in Section 59-20-40 of the Education Finance Act; the school district providing the
35 educational services shall be able to count the child for all funding sources, both state and federal. The institution and school district,
36 through contractual agreements, will address the special education and related services to be provided to students. Should the school

1 district wherein the institution is located determine that the child cannot be appropriately served in a public school setting, then the
2 institution may request a due process hearing pursuant to the procedures provided for in the Individuals with Disabilities Education
3 Act.

4 The agreed upon acceptable local cost reimbursement or the additional amount equivalent to the statewide average of the local
5 base student cost multiplied by the appropriate pupil weighting set forth in Section 59-20-40, for instructional services provided to
6 out-of-district students, shall be paid within sixty days of billing, provided the billing district has provided a copy of the invoice to
7 both the Superintendent and the finance office of the district being invoiced. Should the district not pay within sixty days, the billing
8 district can seek relief from the Department of Education. The department shall withhold EFA funding equal to the billing from the
9 district refusing to pay and submit the funding (equal to the invoice) to the billing school district.

10 The agency placing a child in any situation that requires changing school districts, must work with the schools to assure that all
11 required school records, including confidential records, are transferred from the sending to the receiving school within three working
12 days. School records to be transferred should include grade transcripts, state birth certificate, certificate of immunization, social
13 security card, attendance records, discipline records, IEP's, psychological reports (or notation in the school records that a
14 psychological report on the child is available at the school district office) and any other records necessary for the appropriate
15 placement of the child in the new school. School districts must release all records upon presentation of a court order or appropriate
16 permission for confidential release. If evaluation or placement is pending, the receiving school district is responsible to secure
17 information and to complete the placement. The receiving school will maintain appropriate confidentiality of all records received
18 on a child. Upon discharge or release from the treatment facility, the agency placing the child in the receiving school must work
19 with the school district where the student will reside after treatment to assure continuity of the student's education.

20 **1.9.** (SDE: Instruction in Juvenile Detention Centers) It shall be the responsibility of the school district where a local juvenile
21 detention center is located to provide adequate teaching staff and to ensure compliance with the educational requirements of this
22 State. Students housed in local juvenile detention centers are to be included in the average daily membership count of students for
23 that district and reimbursement by the Department of Education made accordingly.

24 **1.10.** (SDE: Revenue Authorization) The State Department of Education is hereby authorized to collect, expend, and carry
25 forward revenues in the following areas to offset the cost of providing such services: the sale of publications, manuals and forms,
26 the sale of Apple Tags, royalties, contributions, donations, foundation funds, special grants and contracts, brochures, photo copies,
27 listings and labels, Directory of South Carolina Schools, student health record cards, items to be recycled, and high school diplomas
28 and certificates; the collection of out-of-state and in-state investigation fees, registration fees for non-SDE employees, recurring
29 facility inspection fees, teacher certification fees; the handling of audio-visual film; the provision of contract computer services to
30 school districts and other state agencies, joint broadcast service to school districts, and education-related statistics through agreement
31 with the National Center for Education Statistics; the lease or sale of programs of television, audio or microcomputer software; the
32 lease or sale of virtual courses to other states; the collection of damage fees for instructional materials and the sale of unusable
33 instructional materials; sale of fuel; use and repair of transportation equipment; fees for Medicaid reimbursable transportation; the
34 receipt of insurance and warranty payments on Department of Education equipment and the sale of used school buses and support
35 equipment. The Department of Education is authorized to collect revenue for deposit into the State General Fund for testing material
36 purchases and test rescoring fees. The Department of Education is authorized to expend revenue collected for lost and damaged

1 instructional materials and the sale of unusable instructional materials for the purpose of contracting for the purchase and maintenance
2 of a statewide textbook inventory management system, provided that schools' newly-adopted instructional materials needs are met
3 first.

4 **1.11.** (SDE: School District Bank Accounts) Each school district in this State, upon the approval of the district's governing
5 body, may maintain its own bank account for the purpose of making disbursement of school district funds as necessary to conduct
6 school district business and each county treasurer is hereby authorized to transfer such amount as needed, upon receipt of a written
7 order certified by the district governing body or their designee. Such order shall contain a statement that such amount is for immediate
8 disbursement for the payment of correct and legal obligation of the school district.

9 **1.12.** (SDE: Travel/Outside of Continental U.S.) School District allocations from General Funds, lottery, and EIA funds shall
10 not be used for travel outside of the continental United States. The International Baccalaureate Program shall be exempt from this
11 restriction.

12 **1.13.** (SDE: Year End Closeout) The State Department of Education is authorized to expend federal and earmarked funds (not
13 including state or EIA funds) in the current fiscal year for expenditures incurred in the prior year; however, state funds appropriated
14 in Part IA, Section 1, X, Aid to School Districts, for the Children's Case Resolution System or private placements for services
15 provided to children with disabilities may be used for those expenditures in prior fiscal years. The department is also authorized to
16 use appropriated funds to pay for textbooks shipped in the fourth quarter of the prior fiscal year.

17 **1.14.** (SDE: Transportation Collaboration) The Department of Education School Bus Maintenance Shops shall be permitted, on
18 a cost reimbursable-plus basis, to deliver transportation maintenance and services to vehicles owned or operated by public agencies
19 in South Carolina.

20 School buses operated by school districts, other governmental agencies or head start agencies for the purpose of transporting
21 students for school or school related activities shall not be subject to state motor fuel taxes. Further, that school districts, other
22 governmental agencies or head start agencies may purchase this fuel, on a cost reimbursable-plus basis, from the Department of
23 Education School Bus Maintenance Shops.

24 **1.15.** (SDE: School Bus Insurance) The Department of Education shall maintain comprehensive and collision insurance or
25 self-insure state-owned buses. In no event shall the department charge local school districts for damages to the buses which are
26 commonly covered by insurance.

27 **1.16.** (SDE: Teacher Data Collection) Of the non-program funds appropriated to the Department of Education, it and the
28 Commission on Higher Education shall share data about the teaching profession in South Carolina. The data sharing should ensure
29 (1) a systematic report on teacher supply and demand information and (2) data to determine classes being taught by public school
30 teachers out of field of their preparation. The data collection should include but not be limited to: classes/subjects taught, number
31 of students taught, percentage of teacher education graduates from South Carolina colleges/universities who go into teaching,
32 percentage of teacher education graduates who teach in public schools in South Carolina, percentage of new teachers who leave the
33 South Carolina teaching profession in the first three years of public school teaching due to unsuccessful evaluations, percentage of
34 new teachers who leave the profession in the first three years of public school teaching in South Carolina who have successful
35 evaluations, turnover rate of teachers and certification areas with highest vacancies. All database items should be set up so that it
36 can be disaggregated by ethnicity, gender, geographic location, etc.

1 **1.17.** (SDE: School Bus Driver CDL) From funds provided in Part IA, Section 1, VII.B., local school districts shall request a
2 criminal record history from the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division for past conviction of any crime before the initial
3 employment of a school bus driver or school bus aide. The Department of Education and the school districts shall be treated as a
4 charitable organization for purposes of the fee charged for the criminal records search.

5 **1.18.** (SDE: School Bus Purchase) Any procurement of school buses with funds appropriated in this act or any other
6 appropriation bill must meet specifications developed by the School Bus Specification Committee as established by the State
7 Superintendent of Education. The School Bus Specifications Committee shall allow for input from all school bus chassis and body
8 manufacturers. However, if it is safe, more economical, and in the public interest, the department may use the school bus
9 specifications of another state in the procurement of school buses. If the department uses the specifications of another state, the
10 department must submit a report to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means
11 Committee detailing the methodology by which the alternative specifications were determined to be safe, more economical, and in
12 the public interest, when compared to the specifications set forth by the School Bus Specifications Committee.

13 **1.19.** (SDE: Buses, Parts, and/or Fuel) Funds appropriated for other operating in program VII.B. - Bus Shops and funds
14 appropriated in VII.C. - Buses may be used to purchase buses, fuel, parts, or other school bus related items. All funds appropriated
15 for bus fuel, parts/supplies, maintenance, and bus purchases may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year and expended in the
16 current fiscal year to support bus transportation services.

17 **1.20.** (SDE: Mitford Transportation Costs) Transportation costs for the transporting of students from the Mitford area of Fairfield
18 County to schools in the Great Falls area of Chester County is not the responsibility of and shall not be borne by the Chester County
19 School District. These transportation costs shall continue to be the responsibility of the State Department of Education.

20 **1.21.** (SDE: Status Offenders/John de la Howe) The funds appropriated for the Status Offender Program shall be distributed to
21 John de la Howe School to expand residential programs to include court ordered status offenders. Components of such a program
22 shall include collaboration between the home school district and the residential school and treatment or related services to the families
23 of students in placement.

24 **1.22.** (SDE: Governor's School Leave Policy) The South Carolina Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities and the South
25 Carolina Governor's School for Science and Mathematics are authorized to promulgate administrative policy governing annual and
26 sick leave relative to faculty and staff with the approval of their respective board of directors. This policy shall address their
27 respective school calendars in order to comply with the instructional needs of students attending both special schools.

28 **1.23.** (SDE: School Board Meetings) Of the funds appropriated through the Department of Education for technology related
29 expenses, school districts that have a website shall place a notice of a regularly scheduled school board meeting twenty-four hours
30 in advance of such meeting. The notice shall include the date, time, and agenda for the board meeting. The school district shall
31 place the minutes of the board meeting on their website within ten days of the next regularly scheduled board meeting.

32 **1.24.** (SDE: Proviso Allocations) In the event an official General Fund revenue shortfall is declared by the Board of Economic
33 Advisors, the Department of Education may reduce any allocation in Section 1 specifically designated by proviso in accordance with
34 the lower Board of Economic Advisors revenue estimate as directed by the Executive Budget Office, except the additional EFA
35 allocation to the South Carolina Public Charter School District. The reduction may not be greater than the total percentage of

1 reduction of the Section 1 appropriation. Should the department hold back funds in excess of the total percentage reduction those
2 funds must be allocated per the proviso. No allocation for teacher salaries shall be reduced as a result of this proviso.

3 **1.25.** (SDE: School Districts and Special Schools Flexibility) All school districts and special schools of this State may transfer
4 and expend funds among appropriated state general fund revenues, Education Improvement Act funds, and Education Lottery Act
5 funds, and funds received from the Children's Education Endowment Fund for school facilities and fixed equipment assistance, to
6 ensure the delivery of academic and arts instruction to students. However, a school district may not transfer funds allocated
7 specifically for state level maintenance of effort requirements under IDEA, funds allocated specifically for state level maintenance
8 of effort requirement for federal program, funds provided for the Education and Economic Development Act, funds provided for
9 Career and Technology Education, nor funds required for debt service or bonded indebtedness. All school districts and special
10 schools of this State may suspend professional staffing ratios and expenditure regulations and guidelines at the sub-function and
11 service area level, except for four-year old programs and programs serving students with disabilities who have Individualized
12 Education Programs.

13 In order for a school district to take advantage of the flexibility provisions, at least seventy-five percent of the school district's per
14 pupil expenditures must be utilized within the In\$ite categories of instruction, instructional support, and only transportation, food
15 service, and safety within non-instruction pupil services. No portion of the seventy-five percent may be used for facilities, business
16 services, debt service, capital outlay, program management, and leadership services, as defined by In\$ite. The school district shall
17 report to the Department of Education the actual percentage of its per pupil expenditures used for classroom instruction, instructional
18 support, and transportation, food service, and safety within non-instruction pupil services for the current school year ending June
19 thirtieth. Salaries of on-site principals must be included in the calculation of the district's per pupil expenditures.

20 "In\$ite" means the financial analysis model for education programs utilized by the Department of Education.

21 School districts are encouraged to reduce expenditures by means, including, but not limited to, limiting the number of low
22 enrollment courses, reducing travel for the staff and the school district's board, reducing and limiting activities requiring dues and
23 memberships, reducing transportation costs for extracurricular and academic competitions, restructuring administrative staffing, and
24 expanding virtual instruction.

25 School districts and special schools may carry forward unexpended funds from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year.

26 Prior to implementing the flexibility authorized herein, school districts must provide to Public Charter Schools the per pupil
27 allocation due to them for each categorical program.

28 Quarterly throughout the current fiscal year, the chairman of each school district's board and the superintendent of each school
29 district must certify where non-instructional or nonessential programs have been suspended and the specific flexibility actions taken.
30 The certification must be in writing, signed by the chairman and the superintendent, delivered electronically to the State
31 Superintendent of Education, and an electronic copy forwarded to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of
32 the Senate Education Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and the Chairman of the House Education
33 and Public Works Committee. Additionally, the certification must be presented publicly at a regularly called school board meeting,
34 and the certification must be conspicuously posted on the internet website maintained by the school district.

1 For the current fiscal year, Section 59-21-1030 is suspended. The foreign language program assessment, and the physical
2 education assessment must be suspended. School districts and the Department of Education are granted permission to purchase the
3 most economical type of bus fuel.

4 For the current fiscal year, savings generated from the suspension of the assessments enumerated above must be allocated to school
5 districts based on weighted pupil units.

6 School districts must maintain a transaction register that includes a complete record of all funds expended over one hundred dollars,
7 from whatever source, for whatever purpose. The register must be prominently posted on the district's internet website and made
8 available for public viewing and downloading. The register must include for each expenditure:

9 (i) the transaction amount;

10 (ii) the name of the payee; and

11 (iii) a statement providing a detailed description of the expenditure.

12 The register must not include an entry for salary, wages, or other compensation paid to individual employees. The register must
13 not include any information that can be used to identify an individual employee. The register must be accompanied by a complete
14 explanation of any codes or acronyms used to identify a payee or an expenditure. The register must be searchable and updated at
15 least once a month.

16 Each school district must also maintain on its internet website a copy of each monthly statement for all of the credit cards
17 maintained by the entity, including credit cards issued to its officers or employees for official use. The credit card number on each
18 statement must be redacted prior to posting on the internet website. Each credit card statement must be posted not later than the
19 thirtieth day after the first date that any portion of the balance due as shown on the statement is paid.

20 The Comptroller General must establish and maintain a website to contain the information required by this section from a school
21 district that does not maintain its own internet website. The internet website must be organized so that the public can differentiate
22 between the school districts and search for the information they are seeking.

23 The provisions contained herein do not amend, suspend, supersede, replace, revoke, restrict, or otherwise affect Chapter 4, Title
24 30, of the South Carolina Freedom of Information Act. Nothing in this proviso shall be interpreted as prohibiting the State Board of
25 Education to exercise its authority to grant waivers under Regulation 43-261.

26 **1.26.** (SDE: Medical Examination and Security Reimbursement/Expenditures) From funds authorized in Part IA, Section 1,
27 VII.B. Other Operating Expenses, the Department of Education may directly pay, or reimburse employees, for the cost of a medical
28 examination as required in Part 391, Subpart E of the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations, for employees that are required to
29 operate a state vehicle transporting hazardous materials and that are required to undergo a national security background check because
30 of the required Hazmat endorsement to their CDL.

31 **1.27.** (SDE: Budget Reduction) In compensating for any reduction in funding or an operating deficit publically recognized by
32 the School Board of Trustees, local districts must give priority to preserving classroom teachers and operations. Funding reductions
33 should first be applied to administrative and non-classroom expenses before classroom expenses are affected.

34 **1.28.** (SDE: Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities Carry Forward) Any unexpended balance on June thirtieth of the
35 prior fiscal year of funds appropriated to or generated by the Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities may be carried forward
36 and expended in the current fiscal year pursuant to the discretion of the Board of Trustees of the School.

1 **1.29.** (SDE: Governor's Schools' Fees) The South Carolina Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities and the South
2 Carolina Governor's School for Science and Mathematics are authorized to charge, collect, expend, and carry forward student fees
3 as approved by their respective Board of Directors. The purpose and amount of any such fees will be to maintain program quality in
4 both academics and residential support. No student will be denied admittance or participation due to financial inability to pay. The
5 respective Board of Directors shall promulgate administrative policy governing the collection of all student fees. Both schools shall
6 conspicuously publish a fee schedule on their respective websites.

7 **1.30.** (SDE: School District Furlough) Should there be a midyear reduction in state funding to the districts, school districts may
8 institute employee furlough programs for district-level and school-level professional staff. Before any of these employees may be
9 furloughed, the chairman of the governing body of the school district must certify that all fund flexibility provided by the General
10 Assembly has been utilized by the district and that the furlough is necessary to avoid a year-end deficit and a reduction in force. The
11 certification must include a detailed report by the superintendent of the specific action taken by the district to avoid a year-end deficit.
12 The certification and report must be in writing and delivered to the State Superintendent of Education and a copy must be forwarded
13 to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

14 The local school district board of trustees may implement a furlough of personnel once certification to the State Superintendent
15 documents all funding flexibility has been exhausted and continued year-end deficits exist. Local school boards of trustees shall
16 have the authority to authorize furloughs of these employees in the manner in which it sees fit. However, instructional personnel
17 may be furloughed for up to five non-instructional days if not prohibited by an applicable employment contract with the district and
18 provided district administrators are furloughed for twice the number of days. District administrators may only be furloughed on
19 non-instructional days and may not be furloughed for a period exceeding ten days. District administrators shall be defined by the
20 Department of Education using the Professional Certified Staff (PCS) System. For individuals not coded in PCS, the determination
21 shall be made based upon whether the individual performs the functions outlined in position codes identified by the department as
22 administration. Educators who would have received a year's experience credit had a furlough not been implemented, shall not have
23 their experience credit negatively impacted because of a furlough implementation.

24 During any furlough, affected employees shall be entitled to participate in the same benefits as otherwise available to them except
25 for receiving their salaries. As to those benefits that require employer and employee contributions, including, but not limited to,
26 contributions to the South Carolina Retirement System or the optional retirement program, the district will be responsible for making
27 both employer and employee contributions if coverage would otherwise be interrupted; and as to those benefits which require only
28 employee contributions, the employee remains solely responsible for making those contributions. Placement of an employee on
29 furlough under this provision does not constitute a grievance or appeal under any employee grievance procedure. The district may
30 allocate the employee's reduction in pay over the balance of the fiscal year for payroll purposes regardless of the pay period within
31 which the furlough occurs.

32 Each local school district must prominently post on the district's internet website and make available for public viewing and
33 downloading the most recent version of the school district's policy manual and administrative rule manual.

34 This proviso shall not abrogate the terms of any contract between any school district and its employees.

35 **1.31.** (SDE: School Lunch/Attendance Supervisors) For those counties in which an entity other than the school district
36 administers the school lunch supervisor and/or attendance supervisor programs, the school districts in that county shall transfer to

1 the entity the amount available in the previous fiscal year for administration of the school lunch supervisor and/or attendance
2 supervisor programs. Each district shall transfer a pro rata share of the total cost based upon the percentage of state EFA funds
3 distributed to the districts within the county.

4 **1.32.** (SDE: SCGSAH Certified Teacher Designation) Because of the unique nature of the South Carolina Governor's School
5 for the Arts and Humanities, the Charleston School of the Arts, and the Greenville County Fine Arts Center, the schools are authorized
6 to employ at its discretion noncertified classroom teachers teaching in the literary, visual and performing arts subject areas who are
7 otherwise considered to be appropriately qualified in a ratio of up to one hundred percent of the entire teacher staff.

8 **1.33.** (SDE: No Discrimination Requirement) State funds must not be appropriated to a school that discriminates against or
9 participates with or is a member of an association with policies that discriminate or afford different treatment of students based on
10 race or national origin.

11 **1.34.** (SDE: Medicaid Cash Match Accounting) The department is granted authority to transfer funds between budget lines and
12 object codes to identify, reconcile, reimburse, and remit funds required for Medicaid cash match to the Department of Health and
13 Human Services.

14 **1.35.** (SDE: Student Report Card-GPA) For each high school student, school districts shall be required to print the student's
15 individual cumulative grade point average for grades nine through twelve on the student's report card.

16 **1.36.** (SDE: Lost & Damaged Instructional Materials Fees) Fees for lost and damaged instructional materials for the prior school
17 year are due no later than December first of the current school year when invoiced by the Department of Education. The department
18 may withhold instructional materials funding from schools that have not paid their fees by the payment deadline.

19 **1.37.** (SDE: Education Finance Act Reserve Fund) There is created in the State Treasury a fund separate and distinct from the
20 General Fund of the State and all other funds entitled the Education Finance Act Reserve Fund. All unexpended general funds
21 appropriated to the Department of Education for the Education Finance Act in the current fiscal year shall be transferred to the
22 Education Finance Act Reserve Fund. In the event that the amount appropriated for the Education Finance Act is insufficient to fully
23 fund the base student cost as established by this act, revenues from the Education Finance Act Reserve Fund may be used to
24 supplement the funds appropriated. By June 30th of the current fiscal year, if the department determines that the funds are not needed
25 to supplement the Education Finance Act, the department may utilize the funds for bus purchase. The General Assembly may make
26 direct appropriations to this fund. All unexpended funds in the Education Finance Act Reserve Fund and any interest accrued by the
27 fund must remain in the fund and may be carried forward into the current fiscal year.

28 **1.38.** (SDE: Prohibit Advertising on School Buses) The Department of Education and local school districts are prohibited from
29 selling space for or the placement of advertisements on the outside or inside of state-owned school buses.

30 **1.39.** (SDE: Residential Treatment Facilities Student Enrollment and Funding) Each South Carolina resident of lawful school
31 age residing in licensed residential treatment facilities (RTFs) for children and adolescents identified on the State Qualified Providers
32 list and meets the requirements of Section 44-7-130 of the 1976 Code, (students) shall be entitled to receive educational services
33 from the school district in which the RTF is located (facility school district). The responsibility for providing appropriate educational
34 programs and services for these students, both with and without disabilities, who are referred, authorized, or placed by the State is
35 vested in the facility school districts. For purposes of this proviso, an authorization must be pursuant to a physician's determination
36 of medical necessity. If clinically appropriate, the facility school district, the RTF, and the parent or guardian of a student referred

1 or placed in a RTF may consider the appropriateness of providing the student's education program virtually through enrollment in
2 either the facility district's virtual program, the South Carolina virtual school program provided through the Department of Education
3 (Virtual SC), or a virtual charter school authorized by the South Carolina Public Charter School District, or a virtual charter school
4 authorized by an approved institute of higher education. This decision should be made jointly with the best interest of the student
5 and what is clinically indicated being considered.

6 A facility school district must provide the necessary educational programs and services directly to the student at the RTF's facility,
7 provided that the RTF facility provides and maintains comparable adequate space for the educational programs and services
8 consistent with all federal and state least restrictive environment requirements. Adequate space shall include appropriate electrical
9 support and Internet accessibility. Unless the parent or legal guardian of the student seeks to continue the student's enrollment in
10 the resident school district under a medical homebound instruction program and the district approves, if appropriate, then, under
11 these circumstances, the facility school district shall enroll the student and assume full legal and financial responsibility for the
12 educational services including enrolling the student, approving the student's entry into a medical homebound instructional program,
13 if appropriate, and receiving and expending funds, unless the resident school district undertakes to carry out its educational
14 responsibilities for the student directly. Alternatively, a facility school district may choose to provide the necessary educational
15 programs and services by contracting with the RTF provided that the RTF agrees to provide educational services to the student at the
16 RTF's facility. Under these circumstances, the facility school district must enroll the student and pay the RTF for the educational
17 services provided. If the facility school district determines the educational program being offered by the RTF does not meet the
18 educational standards outlines in the contract, the facility district shall be justified in terminating the contract.

19 The facility school districts are entitled to receive the base student cost multiplied by the Education Finance Act pupil weighting
20 for Homebound pupils of 2.10, as set forth in Section 59-20-40 of the 1976 Code and any eligible categorical and federal funds.
21 These funds may be retained by the facility school districts for the purpose of providing the educational programs and services
22 directly to students referred or placed by the State or the facility school districts may use these funds to reimburse RTFs for the
23 educational programs and services provided directly by the RTFs. A facility school district is entitled to reimbursement from a
24 resident school district for the difference between (1) the reasonable costs expended for the educational services provided directly
25 by the facility school district or the amount paid to the RTF and (2) the aggregate amount of federal and state funding received by
26 the facility school district for that student. However, the reimbursement rate may not exceed \$45 per student per day. Facility school
27 districts providing the educational services shall notify the resident district in writing within forty-five calendar days that a student
28 from the resident district is receiving educational services pursuant to the provisions of the proviso. Reimbursements shall be paid
29 within sixty days of billing, provided the facility district has provided a copy of the invoice to both the District Superintendent and
30 the finance office of the resident district being invoiced. Should the facility school district be unable to reach agreement with the
31 resident school district regarding reasonable costs differences, the facility school district shall notify the Department of Education's
32 Office of General Counsel. The Department of Education shall facilitate a resolution of the dispute between the facility school
33 district and the resident school district within forty-five days of the notice of dispute. If the issue of reasonable cost differences
34 should remain unresolved, a facility school district shall have the right to file a complaint in a Circuit Court. Should a resident school
35 district fail to distribute the entitled funding to the facility school district by the one hundred thirty-five day count, the Department
36 of Education is authorized to withhold the equivalent amount of EFA funds and transfer those funds to the facility school district.

1 RTF facilities on the State Qualified Provider List not located within the boundaries of the state shall be reimbursed at a rate that
2 may not exceed \$45 per student per day for education services and school districts shall be eligible to receive a base student cost
3 weighted funding of 2.10 provided that the student remains enrolled in the school district. Facilities providing the educational
4 services shall notify the resident district in writing within forty-five calendar days that a student from the resident district is receiving
5 educational services pursuant to the provisions of the proviso. Reimbursements shall be paid within sixty days of billing, provided
6 the qualified facility has provided a copy of the invoice to both the District Superintendent and the finance office of the resident
7 district being invoiced. Should the facility be unable to reach agreement with the resident school district regarding reasonable costs
8 differences, the provider shall notify the Department of Education's Office of General Counsel. The Department of Education shall
9 facilitate a resolution of the dispute between the facility and the resident school district within forty-five days of the notice of dispute.
10 If the issue of reasonable cost differences should remain unresolved, a facility shall have the right to file a complaint in a Circuit
11 Court. Additionally, qualified RTF providers' general education curriculum must be aligned to the South Carolina academic
12 standards in the core content areas. All students with disabilities who are eligible for special education and related services under
13 the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), as amended, and the State Board of Education (SBE) regulations, as
14 amended, shall receive special education and related services in the least restrictive environment by appropriately certified personnel.
15 Students in a qualified RTF will at all times be eligible to receive the educational credits (e.g., Carnegie Units) earned through their
16 educational efforts. The resident school district and the RTF should develop a memorandum of understanding to outline the
17 responsibilities of the RTF in providing the educational services and responsibilities, if any, of the resident school district while the
18 student is housed in the RTF.

19 If a child from out of state is placed in a RTF by an out-of-state school district or agency, the child's home state remains responsible
20 for the educational services. The facility school district may choose to provide the educational program to the child and, upon
21 choosing to do so, shall contract with the appropriate entity for payment of educational services provided to the child. Out-of-state
22 students provided educational services by a facility school district shall not be eligible for funding through the Education Finance
23 Act.

24 If a child is placed in a RTF by the child's parent or guardian and is not referred, authorized, or placed by the State, the facility
25 school district may choose to provide the educational program to the child, and upon doing so, must negotiate with the resident
26 school district for services through medical homebound procedures. A facility school district is responsible for compliance with all
27 child find requirements under Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and Individuals with Disabilities Act of 2004 (IDEA).

28 All students enrolled in the facility school districts shall have access to the facility school districts' general education curriculum,
29 which will be tied to the South Carolina academic standards in the core content areas. All students with disabilities who are eligible
30 for special education and related services under the Individuals with IDEA, as amended, and the State Board of Education (SBE)
31 regulations, as amended, shall receive special education and related services in the least restrictive environment by appropriately
32 certified personnel. Students in an RTF will at all times be eligible to receive the educational credits (e.g., Carnegie Units) earned
33 through their educational efforts.

34 With respect to students enrolled in the facility school districts, for accountability purposes, the assessment and accountability
35 measures for students residing in RTFs shall be attributed to a specific school only if the child physically attends the school. The
36 performance of students residing in a RTF who receive their educational program on site at the RTF must be reflected on a separate

1 line on the facility school district's report card and must not be included in the overall performance ratings of the facility school
2 district. The Department of Education shall examine the feasibility of issuing report cards for RTFs. For the current fiscal year, a
3 facility school district shall not have the district's state accreditation rating negatively impacted by deficiencies related to the delivery
4 of an educational program at a RTF.

5 RTFs shall notify the facility school district as soon as practical, and before admission to the RTF if practical, of a student's
6 admission to the RTF. RTFs, the facility school districts and the Department of Education shall use their best efforts to secure and/or
7 exchange information, including documents and records necessary to provide appropriate educational services and/or related services
8 as necessary to assist the facility school district in determining the resident school district. The Department of Education, in
9 collaboration with state placing agencies, RTFs, facility school districts, and resident school districts, shall implement a system to
10 follow the release of students from a RTF and re-enrollment in public, private, or special schools to ensure these students, when
11 appropriate, are not recorded as dropouts.

12 **1.40.** (SDE: Special Schools Flexibility) For the current fiscal year, the special schools are authorized to transfer funds among
13 funding categories, including capital funds.

14 **1.41.** (SDE: High School Driver Education) For the current fiscal year, the requirement for high schools to provide a course in
15 driver education is suspended however, high schools may continue to offer driver education courses if they choose to do so.

16 **1.42.** (SDE: Carry Forward Authorization) For the current fiscal year, the Department of Education is authorized to carry forward
17 and expend any General Fund balances for school bus transportation.

18 **1.43.** (SDE: Administrative Costs Report Posting) School districts must report the amount of funds spent on administrative
19 costs, as defined by InSight in the prior fiscal year and post the report on the districts website. School districts shall provide an
20 electronic copy of this report to the Department of Education in conjunction with the financial audit report required by Section
21 59-17-100, of the 1976 Code. If a district fails to meet these requirements they must be notified in writing by the department that
22 the district has sixty days to comply with the reporting requirement. If the district does not report within sixty days, the department
23 is authorized to reduce the district's base student cost by one percent until such time as the requirement is met. Once in compliance,
24 any funds withheld will be returned to the district.

25 **1.44.** (SDE: Governor's Schools Residency Requirement) Of the funds appropriated, the Governor's School for the Arts and the
26 Humanities and the Governor's School for Science and Mathematics are to ensure that a parent(s) or guardian(s) of a student attending
27 either the Governor's School for the Arts and the Humanities or the Governor's School for Science and Mathematics must prove that
28 they are a legal resident of the state of South Carolina at the time of application and must remain so throughout time of attendance.
29 The Governor's School for the Arts and the Humanities and Governor's School for Science and Mathematics may not admit students
30 whose parent(s) or guardian(s) are not legal residents of South Carolina.

31 **1.45.** (SDE: Holocaust Funds) Funds appropriated to the Department of Education for the SC Council on Holocaust shall not be
32 used for any other purpose nor transferred to any other program. In addition, in the event the department is required to implement a
33 budget reduction, SC Council on Holocaust funds may not be reduced.

34 **1.46.** (SDE: Student Health and Fitness) Funds appropriated for Student Health and Fitness shall be allocated to school districts
35 to increase the number of physical education teachers to the extent possible and to provide licensed nurses for elementary public
36 schools. Twenty-one percent of the funds shall be allocated to the districts based on average daily membership of grades K-5 from

1 the preceding year for physical education teachers. The remaining funds will be made available for school nurses and shall be
2 distributed to the school districts on a per school basis. Schools that provide instruction in grades K-5 are eligible to apply for the
3 school nurse funds.

4 **1.47.** (SDE: Impute Index Value) For the current fiscal year and for the purposes of calculating the index of taxpaying ability
5 the Department of Revenue shall impute an index value for owner-occupied residential property qualifying for the special four
6 percent assessment ratio by adding the second preceding taxable year total school district reimbursements for Tier 1, 2, and Tier 3(A)
7 and not to include the supplement distribution. The Department of Revenue shall not include sales ratio data in its calculation of the
8 index of taxpaying ability. The methodology for the calculations for the remaining classes of property shall remain as required
9 pursuant to the EFA and other applicable provisions of law.

10 **1.48.** (SDE: EFA State Share) A school district that does not recognize a State share of the EFA financial requirement shall be
11 supplemented with an amount equal to seventy percent of the school district with the least State financial requirement.

12 **1.49.** (SDE: Health Education) (1) Each school district is required to ensure that all comprehensive health education,
13 reproductive health education, and family life education conducted within the district, whether by school district employees or a
14 private entity, must utilize curriculum that complies with the provisions contained in Chapter 32, Title 59 and aligns to all standards
15 and regulations adopted by the South Carolina State Board of Education. Each district shall publish on its website the title and
16 publisher of all health education materials it has approved, adopted, and used in the classroom. If the department determines that a
17 district is non-compliant with mandated health education upon review of the district's annual CHE Compliance Survey or if the
18 district fails to publish the title and publisher of materials on its website, then the Department of Education shall withhold one percent
19 of the district's funds allocated in Part IA, Section 1, X - Student Health and Fitness Act until the department determines the district
20 is in compliance.

21 (2) Any person may complain in a signed, notarized writing to the chairman of the governing board of a school district that matter
22 not in compliance with the requirements of Chapter 32, Title 59 is being taught in the district. Upon receiving a notarized complaint,
23 the chairman of the governing board must ensure that the complaint is immediately investigated and, if the complaint is determined
24 to be founded, that immediate action is taken to correct the violation. If corrective action is not taken within 60 days of such a
25 determination, or if no investigation is made within 60 days of the chairman's receipt of the notarized statement, then the complainant
26 may within 60 calendar days, give written notice to the department. The notice must include the original notarized complaint. If,
27 upon investigation, the department determines that the district has not taken appropriate immediate action to correct a violation, then
28 the Department of Education shall withhold one percent of the district's funds allocated in Part IA, Section 1, X - Student Health and
29 Fitness Act until the department determines the district is in compliance.

30 **1.50.** (SDE: Bus Lease/Purchase) The Department of Education is permitted to purchase or lease school buses in order to
31 continue replacement of the state's school bus fleet.

32 **1.51.** (SDE: Lee County Bus Shop) ~~From the funds appropriated in program VII.B. Bus Shops, in the current fiscal year, the~~
33 ~~department must fund the Lee County School District Bus Shop and the Kershaw County School District Bus Shop at the same level~~
34 ~~as they were funded in the previous fiscal year.~~

35 **1.52.** (SDE: School Enrollment Policy) For the current fiscal year, any school district with an open enrollment policy for all
36 schools or certain schools which had previously accepted certain students residing outside of the district to an academic magnet

1 school in the district must continue to accept these students and their siblings for enrollment at the academic magnet school under
2 the same terms and conditions these students were previously permitted to attend the school.

3 **1.53.** (SDE: District Funding Flexibility) For the current fiscal year, districts must utilize funding flexibility provided herein to
4 ensure that district approved safety precautions are in place at every school.

5 **1.54.** (SDE: Transportation Maintenance Facilities) For the current fiscal year, a school district wishing to include school bus
6 maintenance in a contract with a private vendor may enter into an agreement with the Department of Education whereby the
7 department releases the school district to include school bus maintenance in the private vendor contract.

8 **1.55.** (SDE: School District Activity Bus Advertisements) School Districts may sell commercial advertising space on the outside
9 or inside of district owned activity buses. However, as defined and determined by the local school board, a school district may not
10 sell such commercial advertising if the advertisement promotes a political candidate, ideology, or cause, a product that could be
11 harmful to children, or a product that appeals to the prurient interest. Revenue generated from the sale of commercial advertising
12 space shall be retained by the school district.

13 **1.56.** (SDE: School District Property) The requirements of Section 59-19-250 of the 1976 Code, as amended, which requires
14 the consent of a governing board of a county in order for school trustees to sell or lease school property whenever they deem it
15 expedient to do so are suspended for the current fiscal year.

16 **1.57.** (SDE: Full-Day 4K) Eligible students residing in a school district that met the poverty level for participation in the prior
17 school year are eligible to participate in the South Carolina Early Reading Development and Education Program in the current school
18 year. Public and private providers shall be funded for instructional costs at a rate of ~~\$4,510~~ \$4,600 per student enrolled. Eligible
19 students enrolling during the school year or withdrawing during the school year shall be funded on a pro rata basis determined by
20 the length of their enrollment. Private providers transporting eligible children to and from school shall also be eligible for a
21 reimbursement of \$574 per eligible child transported. All providers who are reimbursed are required to retain records as required by
22 their fiscal agent. New providers participating for the first time in the current fiscal year and enrolling between one and six eligible
23 children shall be eligible to receive up to \$1,000 per child in materials and equipment funding, with providers enrolling seven or
24 more such children eligible for funding not to exceed \$10,000. Providers receiving equipment funding are expected to participate in
25 the program and provide high-quality, center-based programs as defined herein for a minimum of three years. Failure to participate
26 for three years will require the provider to return a portion of the equipment allocation at a level determined by the Department of
27 Education and the Office of First Steps to School Readiness. Funding to providers is contingent upon receipt of data as requested
28 by the Department of Education and the Office of First Steps. The Department of Education shall only provide funding for public
29 school students whose complete records have been entered into PowerSchool based on the one hundred and thirty-five day student
30 average daily membership.

31 Annually, the Department of Education is directed to audit the annual allocations to public providers to ensure that allocations are
32 accurate and aligned to the appropriate pro rata per student allocation, materials, and equipment funding. In the event the department,
33 during the audit process determines that the annual allocations of the prior fiscal year are not accurate, the department must adjust
34 the allocations for the current fiscal year to account for the audit findings. The department must provide the results of the annual
35 audit findings to the General Assembly no later than December first. Likewise, in the event the Office of First Steps determines that

1 the annual allocations of the prior fiscal year to private providers are not accurate, the Office of First Steps must adjust the allocations
2 for the current fiscal year to account for the findings.

3 Of the funds appropriated, \$300,000 shall be allocated to the Education Oversight Committee to conduct an annual evaluation of
4 the South Carolina Child Development Education Pilot Program and to issue findings in a report to the General Assembly by January
5 fifteenth of each year. To aid in this evaluation, the Education Oversight Committee shall determine the data necessary and both
6 public and private providers are required to submit the necessary data as a condition of continued participation in and funding of the
7 program. This data shall include developmentally appropriate measures of student progress. Additionally, the Department of
8 Education shall issue a unique student identifier for each child receiving services from a private provider. The Department of
9 Education shall be responsible for the collection and maintenance of data on the public state funded full day and half-day
10 four-year-old kindergarten programs. The Office of First Steps to School Readiness shall be responsible for the collection and
11 maintenance of data on the state funded programs provided through private providers. The Education Oversight Committee shall
12 use this data and all other collected and maintained data necessary to conduct a research based review of the program's
13 implementation and assessment of student success in the early elementary grades.

14 **1.58.** (SDE: Summer Reading Camps) For the current fiscal year, funds appropriated for summer reading camps must be
15 allocated as follows: (1) up to twenty percent to the Department of Education to provide bus transportation for students attending
16 the camps; (2) \$700,000 allocated to the department to provide grants to support community partnerships whereby community
17 organizations shall partner with local school districts to provide enrichment activities as part of after school programs or summer
18 reading camps that utilize volunteers, mentors or tutors to provide instructional support to struggling readers in elementary schools
19 that have a poverty index of forty percent or greater ~~based on the poverty index utilized the prior fiscal year that was student eligibility~~
20 ~~for the free or reduced price lunch program and Medicaid.~~ All mentors and tutors that are a part of these after school programs or
21 summer reading camps must have passed a SLED criminal background check. Participant to volunteer or teacher ratio must conform
22 to that of the school district in which the program is located; and (3) the remainder on a per pupil allocation to each school district
23 based on the number of students who substantially failed to demonstrate third-grade reading proficiency as indicated on the prior
24 year's state assessment as defined by Section 59-155-120 (10) of the 1976 Code. Summer reading camps must be at least six weeks
25 in duration with a minimum of four days of instruction per week and four hours of instruction per day, or the equivalent minimum
26 hours of instruction in the summer. School transportation shall be provided. The camps must be taught by compensated teachers
27 who have at least an add-on literacy endorsement or who have documented and demonstrated substantial success in helping students
28 comprehend grade-level texts. The Department of Education shall assist districts that cannot find qualified teachers to work in the
29 summer camps. Districts may also choose to contract for the services of qualified instructors or collaborate with one or more districts
30 to provide a summer reading camp. Schools and school districts are encouraged to partner with county or school libraries, institutions
31 of higher learning, community organizations, faith-based institutions, businesses, pediatric and family practice medical personnel,
32 and other groups to provide volunteers, mentors, tutors, space, or other support to assist with the provision of the summer reading
33 camps. In the current school year, any student in third grade who substantially fails to demonstrate third-grade reading proficiency
34 by the end of the school year must be offered the opportunity to attend a summer reading camp at no cost to the parent or guardian.
35 The purpose of the reading camp is to provide students who are significantly below third-grade reading proficiency with the
36 opportunity to receive quality, intensive instructional services and support. A district may also include in the summer reading camps

1 students who are not exhibiting reading proficiency at any grade and may charge fees for these students to attend the summer reading
2 camps based on a sliding scale pursuant to Section 59-19-90, except where a child is found to be reading below grade level in the
3 first, second or third grade. A parent or guardian of a student who does not substantially demonstrate proficiency in comprehending
4 texts appropriate for his grade level must make the final decision regarding the student's participation in the summer reading camp.

5 **1.59.** (SDE: Interscholastic Athletic Association Dues) (A) A public school district supported by state funds shall not use any
6 funds or permit any school within the district to use any funds to join, affiliate with, pay dues or fees to, or in any way financially
7 support any interscholastic athletic association, body, or entity unless the constitution, rules, or policies of the association, body, or
8 entity contain the following:

9 (1) a range of sanctions that may be applied to a student, coach, team, or program and that takes into account factors such
10 as the seriousness, frequency, and other relevant factors when there is a violation of the constitution, bylaws, rules, or other governing
11 provisions of the association, body, or entity;

12 (2) (a) guarantees that private or charter schools are afforded the same rights and privileges that are enjoyed by all other
13 members of the association, body, or entity. A private or charter school may not be expelled from or have its membership
14 unreasonably withheld by the association, body, or entity or restricted in its ability to participate in interscholastic athletics including,
15 but not limited to, state playoffs or championships based solely on its status as a private school or charter school. The association,
16 body, or entity shall set reasonable standards for private or charter school admission. A private or charter school denied membership
17 must be provided, in writing within five business days, the reason or reasons for rejection of its application for membership;

18 (b) guarantees that a South Carolina home school athletic team that is a member of a home school athletic association
19 may not be denied access to preseason and regular season interscholastic athletics including, but not limited to, jamborees and
20 invitational tournaments, based solely on its status as a home school athletic team; other rules or policies of the association, body, or
21 entity would apply;

22 (3) (a) an appeals process in which appeals of the association, body, or entity are made to a disinterested third-body appellate
23 panel which consists of seven members who serve four year terms, with one person appointed by the delegation of each congressional
24 district;

25 (b) a member of the panel serves until his successor is appointed and qualifies. A vacancy on the panel is filled in the
26 manner of the original appointment;

27 (c) members of the appellate panel do not concurrently serve as officers of the association, body, or entity and may not
28 have served as a member of the executive committee within the last three years. Principals and superintendents are able to appeal a
29 ruling of the association, body, or entity to the panel. The appellate panel also must provide the final ruling in any appeal brought
30 against a decision of the association, body, or entity;

31 (4) a procedure in place for emergency appeals to be held and decided upon in an expedited manner if the normal appellate
32 process would prohibit the participation of a student, team, program, or school in an athletic event, to include practices; and

33 (5) provisions, implemented within one year after the effective date of this section, that require the composition of the
34 executive committee of the association, body, or entity be geographically representative of this State.

1 (B) In the event an association, body, or entity fails to include one of the items listed in this proviso, public school districts and
2 schools must end their affiliation with the association, body, or entity prior to the beginning of the upcoming school year and are
3 prohibited from paying dues or fees to the association, body, or entity.

4 **1.60.** (SDE: Governor's Schools Informational Access to Students) For the current fiscal year, school districts must permit both
5 the Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities and the Governor's School for Science and Mathematics to collaborate with
6 individual schools and their staff to share information with students and families about the educational opportunities offered at the
7 respective Governor's Schools, through avenues including school visits, informational presentations, and posters. By June thirtieth,
8 of the current fiscal year, the Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities and the Governor's School for Science and Mathematics
9 must report to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee the
10 results of these Informational Access efforts. Further, the two Governor's Schools will work with districts, the Department of
11 Education and School Report Card administrators, to ensure that SAT scores of current Governor's Schools' students are included
12 in the School Report Card of those students' resident schools and districts.

13 **1.61.** (SDE: Reading/Literacy Coaches) (A) Funds appropriated for Reading/Literacy Coaches must be allocated to school
14 districts by the Department of Education as follows: for each primary and elementary school, the school district shall be eligible to
15 receive up to \$62,730 or the actual cost of salary and benefits for a full-time reading/literacy coach.

16 (B) By accepting these funds, a school district warrants that they will not be used to supplant existing school district expenditures,
17 except for districts that either are currently, or in the prior fiscal year, were paying for reading/literacy coaches with local funds. A
18 district may only utilize these funds to employ reading/literacy coaches that may serve in a primary, elementary, or middle school or
19 a combination of these schools depending on the area of highest need in the district *except in the event that the district can request*
20 *and receive a waiver from the Department of Education to expend the funds on interventionists who spend more than fifty percent of*
21 *their time providing direct support to struggling readers in grades kindergarten through grade five.* The school district must align
22 the placement of coaches to the district reading plan that is approved by the department.

23 (C) Funds appropriated for reading/literacy Coaches are intended to be used to provide primary, elementary, and/or middle
24 schools with reading/literacy coaches who shall serve according to the provisions in Chapter 155 of Title 59.

25 (D) Schools and districts accepting funding to support a coaching position agree that the reading/literacy coach must not serve as
26 an administrator. If the department finds that school districts are using these funds for administrative costs as defined in statute they
27 must withhold that districts remaining balance of funds allocated pursuant to this proviso.

28 (E) The Department of Education must publish guidelines that define the minimum qualifications for a reading/literacy coach.
29 These guidelines must deem any licensed/certified teacher qualified if, at a minimum, he or she:

- 30 (1) holds a bachelor's degree or higher and an add-on endorsement for literacy coach or literacy specialist; or
- 31 (2) holds a bachelor's degree or higher and is actively pursuing the literacy coach or literacy specialist endorsement; or
- 32 (3) holds a master's degree or higher in reading or a closely-related field.

33 Within these guidelines, the Department of Education must assist districts in identifying a reading/literacy coach in the event that
34 the school is not successful in identifying and directly employing a qualified candidate. The provisions of subsection (A), including
35 the local support requirements, shall also apply to any allocations made pursuant to this paragraph.

1 (F) The Department of Education must develop procedures for monitoring the use of funds appropriated for reading/literacy
2 coaches to ensure they are applied to their intended uses and are not redirected for other purposes. The Department of Education
3 may receive up to \$100,000 of the funds appropriated for reading/literacy coaches in order to implement this program, provided that
4 this allocation does not exceed the department's actual costs.

5 (G) Prior to the close of the current fiscal year, any unspent or unallocated funds for reading/literacy coaches shall be used to fund
6 Summer Reading Camps.

7 (H) The Department of Education shall require:

8 (1) any school district receiving funding under subsection (A) to identify the name and qualifications of the supported
9 reading/literacy coach; as well as the school in which the coach is assigned; and

10 (2) any school district receiving funding under subsection (G) to account for the specific amounts and uses of such funds.

11 (I) With the data reported by the school districts, the department shall report by January fifteenth of the current fiscal year on the
12 hiring of and assignment of reading/literacy coaches by school. The department shall also report the amount of funds that will be
13 used for Summer Reading Camps.

14 (J) Funds appropriated for reading/literacy coaches shall be retained and carried forward to be used for the same purpose but
15 may not be flexed.

16 **1.62.** (SDE: Sports Participation) Any school receiving state funds shall be required to allow a military dependent student who
17 has transferred from their resident school district to another school district to participate in a sport that was not offered in the resident
18 school district. Should a school fail to comply with this provision, the Department of Education shall withhold one percent of their
19 total state allocation.

20 **1.63.** (SDE: Graduation Rates) For the current fiscal year, if a high school has a graduation rate below sixty percent, using
21 appropriated funds a local school district board of trustees must provide a report detailing a plan to increase the graduation rate in
22 accordance with the provisions of the Education Accountability Act to the State Board of Education.

23 **1.64.** (SDE: South Carolina Community Block Grants for Education Pilot Program) There is created the South Carolina
24 Community Block Grants for Education Pilot Program. The purpose of this matching grants program is to encourage and sustain
25 partnerships between a community and its local public school district or school for the implementation of innovative, state-of-the-art
26 education initiatives and models to improve student learning. The initiatives and models funded by the grant must be well designed,
27 based on strong evidence of effectiveness, and have a history of improved student performance.

28 The General Assembly finds that the success offered by these initiatives and programs is assured best when vigorous community
29 support is integral to their development and implementation. It is the intent of this proviso to encourage public school and district
30 communities and their entrepreneurial public educators to undertake state-of-the-art initiatives to improve student learning and to
31 share the results of these efforts with the state's public education community.

32 As used in this proviso:

33 (1) "Community" is defined as a group of parents, educators, and individuals from business, faith groups, elected officials,
34 nonprofit organizations and others who support the public school district or school in its efforts to provide an outstanding education
35 for each child. As applied to the schools impacted within a district or an individual school, "community" includes the school faculty
36 and the School Improvement Council as established in Section 59-20-60 of the 1976 Code;

1 (2) "Poverty" is defined as the percent of students eligible in the prior year for the free and reduced price lunch program and
2 or Medicaid; and

3 (3) "Achievement" is as established by the Education Oversight Committee for the report card ratings developed pursuant to
4 Section 59-18-900 of the 1976 Code.

5 The Executive Director of the Education Oversight Committee is directed to appoint an independent grants committee to develop
6 the process for awarding the grants including the application procedure, selection process, and matching grant formula. The grants
7 committee will be comprised of seven members, three members selected from the education community and four members from the
8 business community. The chairman of the committee will be selected by the committee members at the first meeting of the grants
9 committee. The grants committee will review and select the recipients of the Community Block Grants for Education.

10 The criteria for awarding the grants must include, but are not limited to:

11 (1) the establishment and continuation of a robust community advisory committee to leverage funding, expertise, and other
12 resources to assist the district or school throughout the implementation of the initiatives funded through the Block Grant Program;

13 (2) a demonstrated ability to meet the match throughout the granting period;

14 (3) a demonstrated ability to implement the initiative or model as set forth in the application; and

15 (4) an explanation of the manner in which the initiative supports the district's or school's strategic plan required by Section
16 59-18-1310 of the 1976 Code.

17 In addition, the district or school, with input from the community advisory committee, must include:

18 (1) a comprehensive plan to examine delivery implementation and measure impact of the model;

19 (2) a report on implementation problems and successes and impact of the innovation or model; and

20 (3) evidence of support for the project from the school district administration when an individual school applies for a grant.

21 The match required from a grant recipient is based on the poverty of the district or school. No matching amount will exceed more
22 than seventy percent of the grant request or be less than ten percent of the request. The required match may be met by funds or by
23 in-kind donations, such as technology, to be further defined by the grants committee. Public school districts and schools that have
24 high poverty and low achievement will receive priority for grants when their applications are judged to meet the criteria established
25 for the grant program.

26 However, no grant may exceed \$250,000 annually unless the grants committee finds that exceptional circumstances warrant
27 exceeding this amount.

28 The Education Oversight Committee will review the grantee reports and examine the implementation of the initiatives and models
29 to understand the delivery of services and any contextual factors. The Oversight Committee will then highlight the accomplishments
30 and common challenges of the initiatives and models funded by the Community Block Grant for Education Pilot Program to share
31 the lessons learned with the state's public education community.

32 For the current fiscal year, funds allocated to the Community Block Grant for Education Pilot Program must be used to provide or
33 expand high-quality early childhood programs for a targeted population of at-risk four-year-olds. High-quality is defined as meeting
34 the minimum program requirements of the Child Early Reading Development and Education Program and providing measurable
35 high-quality child-teacher interactions, curricula and instruction. Priority will be given to applications that involve public-private
36 partnerships between school districts, schools, Head Start, and private child care providers who collaborate to: (1) provide

1 high-quality programs to four-year-olds to maximize the return on investment; (2) assist in making the transition to kindergarten; (3)
2 improve the early literacy, social and emotional, and numeracy readiness of children; and (4) engage families in improving their
3 children's readiness.

4 **1.65.** (SDE: Proceeds from Sale of Bus Shop & Boat) For the current fiscal year the Department of Education is authorized to
5 retain any funds received from the sale of any bus shop and the sale of the state-owned boat and expend those funds for transportation
6 purposes.

7 **1.66.** (SDE: First Steps 4K Technology) During the current fiscal year, South Carolina Office of First Steps to School Readiness
8 is authorized to expend up to \$75,000 from the four-year-old kindergarten carry forward funds to purchase electronic devices for the
9 administration of required school readiness assessments to children enrolled in the full-day 4K program in private centers in the
10 current fiscal year. The State Office of First Steps may purchase one device, which would be the property of the Office of First
11 Steps, for every ten centers serving children in the program. The regional coordinators who provide support to the centers shall
12 coordinate the usage of the devices among the centers. First Steps shall provide a report documenting its technology and materials
13 expenditures to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee no later
14 than January 15, ~~2019~~ *of the current fiscal year*.

15 **1.67.** (SDE: Teacher Certification Exemption) For the current fiscal year, a teacher certified at the secondary level may teach
16 such courses in grades seven through twelve without having the add on certification for middle-level education. A teacher certified
17 in elementary education may teach first grade without having the add on certification in early childhood education. Districts must
18 report to the Department of Education and the Center for Educator Recruitment Retention and Advancement on the teachers and
19 courses that utilize this exemption.

20 **1.68.** (SDE: Digital Instructional Materials) The Department of Education shall continue to create an instructional materials list
21 composed of those items (print and/or digital) that have received State Board of Education approval through the normal adoption
22 process. The department shall continue to work with the publishers of instructional materials to ensure that districts have options for
23 print/digital student materials to include class sets of print student editions, if needed. Funds appropriated for the purchase of
24 instructional materials (print/digital) may be used for reimbursing school districts to offset the costs of refurbishing science kits on
25 the state-adopted instructional materials inventory, purchasing new kits or those adopted as supplemental from the central textbook
26 depository, or a combination of refurbishment and purchase. The refurbishing cost of kits may not exceed the cost of the
27 state-adopted refurbishing kits plus a reasonable amount for shipping and handling. Costs for staff development, personnel costs,
28 equipment, or other costs associated with refurbishing kits on state inventory are not allowable costs. Funds provided for Instructional
29 Materials may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year to be expended for the same purposes by the
30 department, school districts, and special schools. These funds are not subject to flexibility.

31 **1.69.** (SDE: CDEPP Unexpended Funds) For Fiscal Year 2018-19, the Office of First Steps to School Readiness is permitted to
32 retain the first \$1,000,000 of any unexpended CDEPP funds of the prior fiscal year and expend these funds to enhance the quality of
33 the full-day 4K program in private centers and provide professional development opportunities. By August first, the Office of First
34 Steps is directed to allocate any additional unexpended CDEPP funds from the prior fiscal year and any CDEPP funds carried forward
35 from prior fiscal years that were transferred to the restricted account for the following purpose: Education Oversight
36 Committee - \$1,000,000 for the South Carolina Community Block Grants for Education Pilot Program.

1 If carry forward funds are less than the amounts appropriated, funding for the items listed herein shall be reduced on a pro rata
2 basis.

3 If by August first, the Department of Education or the Office of First Steps determines there will be funds available, funds shall
4 be allocated on a per pupil basis for districts eligible for participation first, who have a documented waiting list, and funded an
5 extended program per this proviso in the prior school year, then to districts to increase the length of the program to a maximum of
6 eight and a half hours per day or two hundred and twenty days per year or to fund summer programs. By August 1, the Department
7 of Education and the Office of First Steps must collect the documented waiting lists and determine a process to notify parents of
8 eligible students of available slots in all approved providers. If a district chooses to fund summer enrollment the program funding
9 shall conform to the funding in this act for full year programs, however shall be reduced on a pro rata basis to conform with the
10 length of the program. A summer program shall be no more than eight and a half hours per day and shall be not more than ten weeks
11 in length. The per pupil allocation and classroom grant must conform with the appropriated amount contained in this Act and end
12 of year adjustments shall be based on the one hundred and thirty five day student average daily membership or later student average
13 daily membership for districts choosing to extend the program past one hundred and eighty days. Funds may also be used to provide
14 professional development and quality evaluations of programs.

15 No later than April first, the Department of Education and the Office of First Steps must report to the Chairman of the Senate
16 Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee on the expenditure of these funds to include the
17 following information: the amount of money used and specific steps and measures taken to enhance the quality of the 4K program
18 and the amount of money used for professional development as well as the types of professional development offered and the number
19 of participants.

20 **1.70.** (SDE: Technology Technical Assistance) Of the funds appropriated for the K-12 Technology Initiative, the department is
21 authorized to withhold up to \$350,000 in order to provide technology technical assistance to school districts.

22 **1.71.** (SDE: Technology Technical Assistance) Funds appropriated to the Department of Education for Technology Technical
23 Assistance must first be used to ~~increase the capacity of districts who are or were the original trial and plaintiff school districts in the~~
24 ~~Abbeville law suit~~ develop a statewide technology plan for schools and districts. The plan must address, at a minimum, infrastructure
25 and connectivity needs, online testing requirements, equipment, educational technology, digital literacy and a statewide learning
26 management system to connect teachers and students. The plan must take into account the need for some districts to utilize a regional
27 approach to services that may include, but is not limited to, purchasing, training and support services. This plan, including cost
28 projections, shall be presented to the Governor, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and the Chairman of the
29 Senate Finance Committee by February 1, 2020. Remaining funds shall be used by the department to assist school districts in
30 procuring appropriate technology to include devices and infrastructure in accordance with the recommendations made by the
31 technology review team to begin to build capacity to offer online testing and increased access. For the current fiscal year districts
32 and individual public charter schools may request a waiver from the State Board of Education from the requirement that all
33 assessments be administered online.

34 **1.72.** (SDE: Assistance Funding) For the current fiscal year, any funds appropriated to the Department of Education to assist
35 districts that are or were Plaintiffs in the Abbeville law suit and funding appropriated to the department to provide technical assistance

1 to underperforming districts may not be transferred to any other program, are not subject to flexibility, and may be carried forward
2 and expended for the same purposes.

3 **1.73.** (SDE: Reporting and Procurement) Any state agency or school for which the department acts as the fiscal agent must
4 comply with any state and federal reporting requirements using agency procedures and shall follow all state procurement laws.

5 **1.74.** (SDE: Computer Science Curriculum) Of the funds appropriated to the department for computer science, the department
6 shall develop grade appropriate computer science standards that include computational thinking and computer coding for grades
7 9-12. Experts and officials from higher education, business and industry must be included in the development of the standards. The
8 department shall support K-12 academic and computer science teachers in designing interdisciplinary units and instructional practices
9 that engage students in applying literacy, math, and computational thinking skills to solve problems.

10 **1.75.** (SDE: Military Child Care Centers) During the current fiscal year, South Carolina First Steps to School Readiness may
11 extend four-year-old kindergarten provider eligibility to military child care settings regulated by the United States Department of
12 Defense. State funds appropriated for use in military child care facilities must be used to expand service to CERDEP eligible children
13 residing in school districts approved for participation during the prior fiscal year and may not be used to supplant any existing federal
14 child care investment.

15 **1.76.** (SDE: First Steps 4K Underserved Communities) Using funds appropriated for the Child Early Reading and Development
16 Education Program, South Carolina First Steps shall develop a pilot program to expand four-year-old kindergarten enrollment within
17 underserved communities eligible for participation during the most recent fiscal year. Newly created and/or newly approved private
18 providers proposing to expand service to ten or more CERDEP eligible children in communities enrolling less than 80% of eligible
19 students in a public, private, or Head Start setting during the prior fiscal year, may apply for up to \$30,000 in one-time supplemental,
20 needs-based incentives designed to address building renovations, documented as necessary to bring proposed classrooms into
21 compliance with licensing regulations, materials and staffing costs, and/or other obstacles currently preventing their participation in
22 the First Steps 4K program. The First Steps Board of Trustees shall develop and approve an application process that incorporates
23 formal review and fiscal safeguards designed to ensure grant funds are used solely to address documented barriers to program
24 participation. Providers receiving this one-time supplement are expected to participate in the program and provide high-quality,
25 center-based programs as defined herein for a minimum of three years. Failure to participate for three years will require the provider
26 to return a portion of the supplemental allocation at a level determined by the Office of First Steps to School Readiness. First Steps
27 shall submit a report detailing its process, expenditures and expanded enrollment to the Chairman of the House Ways and Means
28 Committee and the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee by March 15, ~~2019~~ 2020.

29 **1.77.** (SDE: School Leadership) Of the funds appropriated to and retained by the department for Professional Development,
30 \$400,000 shall be used to ~~contract with a non-profit leadership development provider. The provider must specialize~~ allocated to
31 South Carolina Foundation for Educational Leadership for Center of Executive Education Leadership (CEEL) which shall provide
32 professional development that specializes in multiple assessments, executive coaching, and leadership development that provides the
33 skills necessary for a progressive career path in school leadership.

34 **1.78.** (SDE: School Bus Drivers) For the current fiscal year, a driver candidate must possess a valid driver's license that meets
35 the requirements in State and Federal law to operate commercial and non-commercial school bus type vehicles with no restrictions
36 other than vision correction to qualify for issuance. Driver candidates must complete all Department of Education classroom and

1 behind-the-wheel training requirements, including a medical examination and drug/alcohol testing, for initial certification as well as
2 all Department of Education required in-service training annually to qualify for continued certification.

3 **1.79.** (SDE: Special Education Minutes Requirement) For the current fiscal year the required two-hundred fifty minutes of
4 specialized instruction a student is required to receive in order to qualify for the special education weighting in the EFA is waived.
5 A special education weighting may be applied for any public school child with an Individualized Education Program in effect,
6 regardless of the number of minutes of instruction.

7 **1.80.** (SDE: Retired Educators Employment) For the current fiscal year school districts may notify retired educators of
8 employment in writing on or before May 1. School districts employing retired educators pursuant to Section 9-1-1795 of the 1976
9 Code shall provide documentation of compliance with the earnings limitation exemptions to the department. The department shall
10 verify the compliance and send the verification to the Public Employee Benefit Authority.

11 **1.81.** (SDE: Education Rate Program) For purposes of the federal Educational Rate Program, a child attending a state-funded
12 four-year-old kindergarten program must be considered an elementary school student.

13 **1.82.** (SDE: Safe Schools Initiative) (A) For the current fiscal year, the Department of Education and the State Law Enforcement
14 Division ~~must develop, within existing staff, a Crisis Intervention Team~~ *shall continue to support, through the state level Threat*
15 *Assessment Team, school threat assessment teams and training in school districts. By August 15, 2019, each school in the state must*
16 *have identified key staff to serve on a threat assessment team. The department shall work with stakeholders to provide professional*
17 *development to staff who will serve on the team. The state level Threat Assessment Team shall continue* to coordinate, collect and
18 compile ~~Crisis Intervention Threat Assessment~~ *Threat Assessment* & School Safety Plans from each school district with their input. ~~The report shall~~
19 ~~include recommendations for the General Assembly to consider which may include, but are not limited to, physical building security,~~
20 ~~bullet proof and access controlled doors, RFID chip in student identification cards, mental health services, school resource officers,~~
21 ~~and other school safety measures. Total costs associated with each recommendation shall be included in the report. If additional~~
22 ~~funding is required to implement the recommendations, the Department of Education and the State Law Enforcement Division are~~
23 ~~directed to include the recommended funds in their Fiscal Year 2019-20 agency budget plan. The report shall be submitted to the~~
24 ~~Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee and the Governor by December~~
25 ~~31, 2018. These plans shall be exempt from the provisions of Section 30-4-10, et seq. of the 1976 Code~~ *The Department of Education*
26 *and the State Law Enforcement Division shall continue to provide the Governor and the General Assembly with recommendations*
27 *regarding school safety which shall include any projected costs or necessary statute changes.*

28 (B) Of the lottery funds appropriated to the Department of Education for School Safety - Facility and Infrastructure Safety
29 Upgrades, the department shall allocate the funds to school districts for the purpose of funding life safety infrastructure for school
30 facilities projects. Eligible school facility projects shall include, but not necessarily be limited to items such as: (a) door locks, (b)
31 security cameras, (c) metal detectors, (d) lifesaving medical equipment and (e) equipment related to school resource officers,
32 excluding vehicles. For purposes of this provision, school facilities shall not include unimproved real property, centralized district
33 administration facilities, or other facilities, including those normally identified with interscholastic sports activities.

34 The department shall develop and maintain an application process for school districts to request funding for qualified school
35 projects and establish policies, procedures, and priorities for the making of grants pursuant to this provision. In establishing these
36 procedures, the department shall utilize the school facilities report among other sources. At least twice a year and upon receipt of

1 applications pursuant to the application process adopted by the department, the department shall prioritize the eligible projects with
2 the greatest need and shall submit a list of recommended grant awards to the State Board of Education. Grants shall be awarded
3 upon an affirmative vote of the State Board.

4 The financial assistance provided to school districts pursuant to this provision must be used for the eligible school facility project.
5 The department is responsible for establishing policies and procedures to ensure that funds are expended in a manner consistent with
6 this provision.

7 Following the close of the fiscal year, the department shall submit an annual report of its activities for the preceding year to the
8 Governor, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

9 **1.83.** (SDE: Alternative Certification Programs) For the current fiscal year, the department, through the State Board of
10 Education, is authorized to award a conditional teaching certificate to a person who is enrolled in an approved alternative certification
11 program provided the person has earned a bachelor's degree from a regionally accredited college or university with a major, or major
12 equivalence, as defined by the State Board of Education in guidelines developed by the department in a certification area for which
13 the board has determined there exists a critical shortage of teachers, and the person has passed the appropriate teaching examination.

14 **1.84.** (SDE: Student Meals) For the current fiscal year, all school districts shall identify students in poverty according to the
15 provisions in Proviso 1.3 of this Act and increase access to free school meals for these students. School districts shall use the criteria
16 to directly certify pupils eligible for free and reduced-price school meals to the extent permitted under federal law. The local board
17 of trustees of a district in which all schools are eligible to receive the free federal reimbursement rate for all reimbursable school
18 breakfasts and lunches served, pursuant to the Community Eligibility Provision in Section 1759(a) of Title 42 of the United States
19 Code, shall adopt a resolution indicating participation. If a district is unable to participate, the local board of trustees shall adopt a
20 resolution stating that it is unable to participate in CEP and demonstrate the reasons why. The resolution shall be published on a
21 public meeting agenda concurrently with the proposed district budget as an action item and shall be approved by a majority of the
22 board. School districts shall ensure that the parents or guardians of students eligible for free and reduced lunch receive the necessary
23 applications and instructions and upon request are provided with assistance in completing the paperwork. Schools shall not publically
24 identify a student who is unable to pay for a meal for any reason. Communications from the district regarding any meal debt owed
25 must only be directed to the parent or guardian and may be sent home through the student.

26 **1.85.** (SDE: Consolidate Administrative Functions) For the current fiscal, any school district that has an average daily
27 membership of less than 1,500 students, has been designated in Fiscal Watch, Caution or Emergency status, has a risk assessment of
28 medium or high, has a school or is a district with an accreditation status of probation or denied, or has a school or schools that have
29 been in improvement status for three years may be directed by the State Superintendent of Education to consolidate administrative
30 and professional services with one or more school districts. Administrative and professional services may include, but are not limited
31 to: finance, human resources, procurement, administrative functions, transportation and collaboration on increasing instructional
32 offerings. The Superintendent shall notify a district in writing that they meet one or more of the criteria. The district then has thirty
33 business days from receipt of the notification to deliver a plan to the Superintendent for her approval. The Superintendent must
34 either approve or amend the plan within fifteen days. Plans must be implemented within sixty days of approval. If a district fails to
35 submit a plan, the Superintendent shall direct the consolidation of services with another school district and if the district fails to

1 comply, the department shall withhold one percent of the district's EFA allocation until the district does comply. At that time, the
2 EFA payments shall resume and any EFA funds withheld shall be allocated to the district.

3 **1.86.** (SDE: School Safety Program) Funds appropriated for the School Safety Program *and School Resource Officers* shall be
4 utilized by the department for the purpose of hiring certified law enforcement officers to serve as a school resource officer for school
5 districts that otherwise would lack the adequate resources to hire their own school resource officers. In making determinations of
6 eligibility the department shall use the most recent index of taxpaying ability as the district's indicator of ability to pay, with districts
7 of the lowest index of taxpaying ability receiving priority consideration. Districts must apply for funding through the department
8 and no districts shall receive an award of more than four certified school resource officer positions. In making awards the department
9 shall provide funding directly to the local law enforcement agency to pay for the cost of the law enforcement officer that will serve
10 as a full-time school resource officer.

11 **1.87.** (SDE: Exceptional Needs Sports Participation) A student who meets the definition of 'Exceptional needs child' in Section
12 12-6-3790 (A)(2) and the definition of 'Qualifying Student' in Section 12-6-3790 (A)(5) of the 1976 Code shall be eligible to
13 participate in any sport offered at the public school for which the child is zoned to attend.

14 **1.88.** (SDE: School Districts Capital Improvement) The funds appropriated for school district capital improvements in Proviso
15 112.1, shall be allocated by the Department of Education to eligible school districts for the purpose of funding school facility
16 upgrades. Eligible school districts include any school district that has a poverty index of seventy percent or higher or an index of
17 taxpayer ability less than .009. For the purpose of this provision, "school facility" means only facilities necessary for instructional
18 and related supporting purposes including, but not limited to, classrooms, libraries, media centers, laboratories, cafeterias, physical
19 education spaces, related interior and exterior facilities, and the conduit, wiring, and powering of hardware installations for
20 classroom computers or for area network systems. Eligible school facility projects shall include: (a) health and safety upgrades;
21 (b) technology upgrades inside school facilities; (c) upgrades associated with career and technology education programs; and (d)
22 deferred maintenance needs as described in the district's capital improvement plan. For purposes of this provision, school facilities
23 shall not include unimproved real property, centralized district administration facilities, or other facilities, including those normally
24 identified with interscholastic sports activities.

25 The department shall develop and maintain an application process for school districts to request funding for qualified school
26 projects and establish policies, procedures, and priorities for the making of grants pursuant to this provision. At least twice a year
27 and upon receipt of applications pursuant to the application process adopted by the department, the department shall prioritize the
28 eligible projects with the greatest need and shall submit a list of recommended grant awards to the State Board of Education. Grants
29 shall be awarded upon an affirmative vote of the State Board.

30 The financial assistance provided to school districts pursuant to this provision must be used for the eligible school facility project.
31 The department is responsible for establishing policies and procedures to ensure that funds are expended in a manner consistent
32 with this provision.

33 Following the close of the fiscal year, the department shall submit an annual report of the capital improvement plan activities for
34 the preceding year to the Governor, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means
35 Committee, the Chairman of the Senate Education Committee, and the Chairman of the House Education and Public Works
36 Committee.

1 1.89. (SDE: Teacher Salaries/SE Average) The projected Southeastern average teacher salary shall be the average of the
2 average teachers' salaries of the southeastern states as projected by the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office. For the current school
3 year the Southeastern average teacher salary is projected to be \$52,830. The General Assembly remains desirous of raising the
4 average teacher salary in South Carolina through incremental increases over the next few years so as to make such equivalent to
5 the national average teacher salary.

6 Additionally, for the current fiscal year, a local school district board of trustees must increase the salary compensation for all
7 eligible certified teachers employed by the district by no less than one year of experience credit using the district salary schedule
8 utilized the prior fiscal year as the basis for providing the step. Application of this provision must be applied uniformly for all
9 eligible certified teachers. For Fiscal Year 2019-20, the requirement that school districts maintain local salary supplements per
10 teacher no less than their prior fiscal year level is suspended if additional State funds fill the gap.

11 Funds allocated by Proviso 1.3 for implementing a revised state minimum salary schedule for Teacher Salaries must be used to
12 increase salaries of those teachers eligible pursuant to Section 59-20-50(4)(b), to include classroom teachers, librarians, guidance
13 counselors, psychologists, social workers, occupational and physical therapists, school nurses, orientation/mobility instructors, and
14 audiologists in the school districts of the state.

15 For purposes of this provision teachers shall be defined by the Department of Education using the Professional Certified Staff
16 (PCS) System.

17 1.90. (SDE: School District Hold Harmless) Any district that uses reserve funds to pay for teacher pay raises, to include step
18 increases, shall be held harmless from the local school district's reserve fund requirement provisions in the Fiscal Accountability
19 Act.

20 1.91. (SDE: Cultural Sensitivity) From the funds appropriated to the Department of Education in the current fiscal year as part
21 of the required instruction in black history as required by law, the instruction in grades 3 through 12 must include a cultural
22 sensitivity component educating students about how they should interact with and be respectful of the beliefs and practices of people
23 of a different race or creed.

24 SECTION 1A - H630 - DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION-EIA

25
26
27 **1A.1.** (SDE-EIA: Prohibition on Appropriation Transfers) The amounts appropriated herein for aid to subdivisions or allocations
28 to school districts shall not be transferred or reduced and must be expended in accordance with the intent of the appropriation.
29 However, transfers are authorized from allocations to school districts or special line items with projected year-end excess
30 appropriations above requirements, to allocations to school districts or special line items with projected deficits in appropriations.

31 **1A.2.** (SDE-EIA: African-American History) Funds provided for the development of the African-American History curricula
32 may be carried forward into the current fiscal year. Funds that are currently a salary line item will be reallocated for the development
33 of instructional materials and programs and the implementation of professional learning opportunities that promote African American
34 history and culture. For the current fiscal year, not less than seventy percent of the funds carried forwarded must be expended for
35 the development of additional instructional materials by nonprofit organizations, school districts, or institutions of higher education
36 selected through a grant process by the Department of Education.

1 **1A.3.** (SDE-EIA: Teacher Evaluations, Implementation/Education Oversight) The Department of Education is directed to
2 oversee the evaluation of teachers at the School for the Deaf and the Blind, the John de la Howe School and the Department of
3 Juvenile Justice under the ADEPT model.

4 **1A.4.** (SDE-EIA: Teacher Salaries/State Agencies) Each state agency which does not contain a school district but has
5 instructional personnel shall receive an appropriation as recommended by the Education Oversight Committee and funded by the
6 General Assembly for teacher salaries based on the following formula: Each state agency shall receive such funds as are necessary
7 to adjust the pay of all instructional personnel to the appropriate salary provided by the salary schedules of the school district in
8 which the agency is located. Instructional personnel may include all positions which would be eligible for EIA supplements in a
9 public school district, and may at the discretion of the state agency, be defined to cover curriculum development specialists,
10 educational testing psychologists, psychological and guidance counselors, and principals. The twelve-month agricultural teachers
11 located at Clemson University are to be included in this allocation of funds for base salary increases. The South Carolina Governor's
12 School for the Arts and Humanities and the South Carolina Governor's School for Science and Mathematics are authorized to increase
13 the salaries of instructional personnel by an amount equal to the percentage increase given by the School District in which they are
14 both located.

15 Teacher salary increases recommended by the Education Oversight Committee and funded in this Act shall be incorporated into
16 each agency's EIA appropriation contained in Section 1, VIII.F.

17 **1A.5.** (SDE-EIA: Work-Based Learning) Of the funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.A.1. for the Work-Based Learning
18 Program, \$75,000 shall be used by the State Department of Education to provide for regional professional development in contextual
19 methodology techniques and integration of curriculum, and professional development in career guidance for teachers and guidance
20 counselors and training mentors. Pilot-site delivery of contextual methodology training in mathematics will be supported by
21 technology and hands-on lab activities. In addition, \$500,000 shall be allocated for Regional Career Specialists. Each Regional
22 Career Specialist shall (1) be housed within the regional centers/WIA geographic areas, (2) provide career development activities
23 throughout all schools within the region, (3) be under the program supervision of the Office of Career and Technology Education,
24 State Department of Education, and (4) adhere to an accountability and evaluation plan created by the Office of Career and
25 Technology Education, State Department of Education. The Office of Career and Technology Education, State Department of
26 Education, shall provide a report, in February of the current fiscal year to the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and
27 Means Committee on accomplishments of the Career Counseling Specialists. Of the funds appropriated in the prior fiscal year,
28 unexpended funds may be carried forward to the current fiscal year and expended for the same purposes.

29 **1A.6.** (SDE-EIA: CHE/Teacher Recruitment) Of the funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.F. for the Teacher
30 Recruitment Program, the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education shall distribute a total of ninety-two percent to the Center
31 for Educator Recruitment, Retention, and Advancement (CERRA-South Carolina) for a state teacher recruitment program, of which
32 at least seventy-eight percent must be used for the Teaching Fellows Program specifically to provide scholarships for future teachers,
33 and of which twenty-two percent must be used for other aspects of the state teacher recruitment program, including the Teacher
34 Cadet Program and \$166,302 which must be used for specific programs to recruit minority teachers: and shall distribute eight percent
35 to South Carolina State University to be used only for the operation of a minority teacher recruitment program and therefore shall
36 not be used for the operation of their established general education programs. Working with districts with an absolute rating of

1 At-Risk or Below Average, CERRA will provide shared initiatives to recruit and retain teachers to schools in these districts. CERRA
2 will report annually by October first to the Education Oversight Committee and the Department of Education on the success of the
3 recruitment and retention efforts in these schools. The South Carolina Commission on Higher Education shall ensure that all funds
4 are used to promote teacher recruitment on a statewide basis, shall ensure the continued coordination of efforts among the three
5 teacher recruitment projects, shall review the use of funds and shall have prior program and budget approval. The South Carolina
6 State University program, in consultation with the Commission on Higher Education, shall extend beyond the geographic area it
7 currently serves. Annually, the Commission on Higher Education shall evaluate the effectiveness of each of the teacher recruitment
8 projects and shall report its findings and its program and budget recommendations to the House and Senate Education Committees,
9 the State Board of Education and the Education Oversight Committee by October first annually, in a format agreed upon by the
10 Education Oversight Committee and the Department of Education.

11 With the funds appropriated CERRA shall also appoint and maintain the South Carolina Teacher Loan Advisory Committee. The
12 Committee shall be composed of one member representing each of the following: (1) Commission on Higher Education; (2) State
13 Board of Education; (3) Education Oversight Committee; (4) Center for Educator Recruitment, Retention, and Advancement; (5)
14 South Carolina Student Loan Corporation; (6) South Carolina Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators; (7) a local school
15 district human resources officer; (8) a public higher education institution with an approved teacher education program; and (9) a
16 private higher education institution with an approved teacher education program. The members of the committee representing the
17 public and private higher education institutions shall rotate among those institutions and shall serve a two-year term on the committee.
18 The committee must be staffed by CERRA, and shall meet at least twice annually. The committee's responsibilities are limited to:
19 (1) establishing goals for the Teacher Loan Program; (2) facilitating communication among the cooperating agencies; (3) advocating
20 for program participants; and (4) recommending policies and procedures necessary to promote and maintain the program.

21 **1A.7.** (SDE-EIA: Disbursements/Other Entities) Notwithstanding the provisions of Sections 2-7-66 and 11-3-50, South
22 Carolina Code of Laws, it is the intent of the General Assembly that funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.F. Other State
23 Agencies and Entities shall be disbursed on a quarterly basis by the Department of Revenue directly to the state agencies and entities
24 referenced except for the Teacher Loan Program, Centers of Excellence, the Education Oversight Committee and School Technology,
25 which shall receive their full appropriation at the start of the fiscal year from available revenue. The Comptroller General's Office
26 is authorized to make necessary appropriation reductions in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.F. to prevent duplicate appropriations. If the
27 Education Improvement Act appropriations in the agency and entity respective sections of the General Appropriations Act at the start
28 of the fiscal year do not agree with the appropriations in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.F. Other State Agencies and Entities, the "other
29 funds" appropriations in the respective agency and entity sections of the General Appropriations Act will be adjusted by the
30 Comptroller General's Office to conform to the appropriations in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.F. Other State Agencies and Entities.
31 Further, the Department of Revenue is directed to provide the full appropriation of the funding appropriated in Part IA, Section 1,
32 VIII.C.2. Teacher Supplies to the Department of Education at the start of the fiscal year from available revenue. The Department of
33 Revenue is also directed to provide the first quarter appropriation of the funding appropriated in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.H. Charter
34 School District to the Department of Education at the start of the fiscal year from available revenue.

35 **1A.8.** (SDE-EIA: Arts in Education) Funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.A.1. Arts Curricula shall be used to support
36 innovative practices in arts education curriculum, instruction, and assessment in the visual and performing arts including dance,

1 music, theatre, and visual arts which incorporates strengths from the Arts in Education sites. They shall also be used to support the
2 advancement of the implementation of the visual and performing arts academic standards. These funds shall be distributed to schools
3 and school districts under a competitive grants program; however, up to thirty-three percent of the total amount of the grant fund
4 shall be made available as "Aid to Other Agencies" to facilitate the funding of professional development arts institutes that have been
5 approved by the State Department of Education for South Carolina arts teachers, appropriate classroom teachers, and administrators.
6 Arts Curricular Grants funds may be retained and carried forward into the current fiscal year to be expended in accordance with the
7 proposed award.

8 **1A.9.** (SDE-EIA: Teacher Supplies) All certified and non-certified public school teachers identified in PCS, certified special
9 school classroom teachers, certified media specialists, certified guidance counselors, and career specialists who are employed by a
10 school district, a charter school, or lead teachers employed in a publically funded full day 4K classroom approved by the South
11 Carolina First Steps to School Readiness, as of November thirtieth of the current fiscal year, based on the public decision of the
12 school board may receive reimbursement of two hundred seventy-five dollars each school year to offset expenses incurred by them
13 for teaching supplies and materials. Funds shall be disbursed by the department to School districts by July fifteenth based on the last
14 reconciled Professional Certified Staff (PCS) listing from the previous year. With remaining funds for this program, any deviation
15 in the PCS and actual teacher count will be reconciled by December thirty-first or as soon as practicable thereafter. Based on the
16 public decision of the school district and no later than May fifteenth annually, the district shall notify all individuals entitled to receive
17 these funds the manner in which the funds will be dispersed. Funds may be disbursed to each teacher via check in a manner separate
18 and distinct from their payroll check on the first day teachers, by contract, are required to be in attendance at school for the current
19 contract year, or the funds may be disbursed to each teacher via direct deposit as long as the funds are handled in a manner to be
20 separate and distinct from their payroll check. This reimbursement shall not be considered by the state as taxable income. Special
21 schools include the Governor's School for Science and Math, the Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities, Wil Lou Gray
22 Opportunity School, John de la Howe School, School for the Deaf and the Blind, Felton Lab, Department of Juvenile Justice, and
23 Palmetto Unified School District. Funds distributed to school districts or allocated to schools must not supplant existing supply
24 money paid to teachers from other sources. If a school district requires receipts for tax purposes the receipts may not be required
25 before December thirty-first. Districts that do not wish to require receipts may have teachers retain the receipts and certify for the
26 district they have received the allocation for purchase of teaching supplies and/or materials and that they have purchased or will
27 purchase supplies and/or materials during the fiscal year for the amount of the allocation. Districts shall not have an audit exception
28 related to non-retention of receipts in any instances where a similar instrument is utilized. Any district requiring receipts must notify
29 any teacher from whom receipts have not been submitted between November twenty-fifth and December sixth that receipts must be
30 submitted to the district. Districts may not add any additional requirement not listed herein related to this reimbursement.

31 Any classroom teacher, including a classroom teacher at a South Carolina private school, that is not eligible for the reimbursement
32 allowed by this provision, may claim a refundable income tax credit on the teacher's ~~2018~~ 2019 tax return, provided that the return
33 or any amended return claiming the credit is filed prior to the end of the fiscal year. The credit is equal to two hundred seventy-five
34 dollars, or the amount the teacher expends on teacher supplies and materials, whichever is less. If any expenditures eligible for a
35 credit are made after December thirty-first, the teacher may include the expenditures on his initial return or may file an amended
36 ~~2018~~ 2019 return claiming the credit, so long as the return or amended return is filed in this fiscal year. The Department of Revenue

1 may require whatever proof it deems necessary to implement the credit provided by this part of this provision. Any person receiving
2 the reimbursement provided by this proviso is ineligible to take the income tax credit allowed by this proviso.

3 **1A.10.** (SDE-EIA: Teacher of the Year Awards) Of the funds provided herein for Teacher of the Year Awards, each district
4 Teacher of the Year shall receive an award of \$1,000. In addition, the State Teacher of the Year shall receive an award of \$25,000,
5 and each of the four Honor Roll Teachers of the Year will receive an award of \$10,000. To be eligible, districts must participate in
6 the State Teacher of the Year Program sponsored by the State Department of Education. These awards shall not be subject to South
7 Carolina income taxes.

8 **1A.11.** (SDE-EIA: EOC) The Education Oversight Committee may collect, retain and expend revenue from conference
9 registration and fees; charges for materials supplied to local school districts or other entities not otherwise mandated to be provided
10 by state law; and from other activities or functions sponsored by the committee including public awareness campaign activities. Any
11 unexpended revenue from these sources may be carried forward into the current fiscal year and expended for the same purposes.

12 **1A.12.** (SDE-EIA: Technical Assistance) In order to best meet the needs of underperforming schools, funds appropriated for
13 technical assistance must be used to provide intensive support to schools and districts with an absolute rating of below average or
14 at-risk on the most recent annual school report card or with the lowest percentages of students meeting state standards on state
15 assessments on the most recent state assessments or with the lowest high school graduation rates. The department will create a
16 system of tiers of technical assistance for low-performing schools and districts that will receive technical assistance. The tiers will
17 be determined by factors that include, but are not limited to, length of time performance of the school or district has been at-risk/below
18 average, annual achievement ratings, annual growth ratings, school or district accreditation, and/or financial risk status. The tiers of
19 technical assistance may include a per student allocation, placement of a principal mentor, transformation coach, instructional leader,
20 replacement of the principal, reconstitution of a school, and declaration of a state of emergency. Low-performing schools and districts
21 shall be placed within the tiered technical assistance framework not later than December fifteenth.

22 Low-performing schools shall receive a diagnostic review through the department. In addition, newly identified low-performing
23 schools and districts must be reviewed by an External Review Team in the year of designation, and every third year thereafter. These
24 reports shall be made available on the Department of Education's website; any information pertaining to personnel matters or
25 containing personally identifiable information shall be exempted. Based upon the recommendations in the review(s), low-performing
26 schools and districts must develop and submit to the Department of Education an updated school renewal or district strategic plan
27 outlining goals for improvements. The amended plans must address specific strategies designed to increase student achievement and
28 must include measures to evaluate the success of implementation of the plan.

29 With the funds appropriated to the Department of Education, and any experts placed in the school or district for technical assistance
30 services, the department will assist low-performing schools and districts in designing and implementing the strategies and
31 measurement identified in the amended plans and in brokering for technical assistance personnel as stipulated in the plan. In addition,
32 the department must monitor student academic achievement and progress on implementation and report their findings to the
33 Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, the Chairman of the Senate
34 Education Committee, the Chairman of the House Education and Public Works Committee, the local legislative delegation, and the
35 Governor in the fall following the school or district designation as low-performing. If the school or school district does not provide
36 the evaluation information necessary to determine effective use, the principal of the school or the district superintendent may be

1 subject to receiving a public reprimand by the State Board of Education if it is determined that those individuals are responsible for
2 the failure to provide the required information.

3 Funds must be used by the department for implementation and delivery of technical assistance services. Using previous report
4 card data and monitoring reports on the status of implementation of the school renewal plan, the department shall identify priority
5 schools. Funds appropriated for technical assistance shall be used by the department to work with those schools identified as
6 low-performing and to support priority schools under the tiered system. These funds shall not be transferred to any other funding
7 category by the school district without prior approval of the State Superintendent of Education and funds are not subject to agency
8 flexibility provisions.

9 Reconstitution means the redesign or reorganization of the school, which may include the declaration that all positions in the
10 school are considered vacant. Certified staff currently employed in priority schools must undergo an evaluation in the spring
11 following the school's identification as a priority school and must meet determined goals to be rehired and continue their employment
12 at that school. Educators who were employed at a school that is being reconstituted prior to July 2009, and to whom the employment
13 and dismissal laws apply will not lose their rights in the reconstitution. If they are not rehired or are not assigned to another school
14 in the school district they have the opportunity for a hearing. However, employment and dismissal laws shall not apply to educators
15 who are employed in the district and assigned to the priority schools July 1, 2009, in the event of a reconstitution of the school in
16 which the educator is employed. Those rights are only suspended in the event of a reconstitution of the entire school staff.
17 Additionally, the rights and requirements of the employment and dismissal laws do not apply to educators who on July 1, 2009, were
18 on an induction or annual contract, that subsequently were offered continuing contract status after the effective date of this proviso,
19 and are employed at a school that is subject to reconstitution under this proviso.

20 The reconstitution of a school could take place if the school has been identified as a priority school that has failed to improve
21 satisfactorily. The decision to reconstitute a school shall be made by the State Superintendent of Education in consultation with the
22 principal the school board of trustees, and the district superintendent. The decision to reconstitute a school shall be made by April
23 first, at which time notice shall be given to all employees of the school. The department, in consultation with the district
24 superintendent, shall develop a staffing plan and a budget for each reconstituted school.

25 The State Superintendent of Education may declare a state of emergency in a district if the accreditation status is probation or
26 denied, if a majority of the schools fail to show improvement, if the district is classified as being in "high risk" status financially, or
27 for financial mismanagement resulting in a deficit. The State Superintendent of Education may declare a state of emergency in a
28 school if the accreditation status is probation or denied, or if the school fails to show improvement. Upon declaration of a state of
29 emergency, the Superintendent may take over management of the school or district. Management of the school or district may
30 include direct management, consolidation with another district, charter management, public/private management, or contracting with
31 an educational management organization or another school district.

32 **1A.13.** (SDE-EIA: Proviso Allocations) In the event an official EIA revenue shortfall is declared by the Board of Economic
33 Advisors, the Department of Education may reduce any allocation in Section 1A specifically designated by proviso in accordance
34 with the lower Board of Economic Advisors revenue estimate as directed by the Executive Budget Office. No allocation for teacher
35 salaries shall be reduced as a result of this proviso.

1 **1A.14.** (SDE-EIA: School Districts and Special Schools Flexibility) All school districts and special schools of this State may
2 transfer and expend funds among appropriated state general fund revenues, Education Improvement Act funds, and Education Lottery
3 Act funds, and funds received from the Children’s Education Endowment Fund for school facilities and fixed equipment assistance,
4 to ensure the delivery of academic and arts instruction to students. However, a school district may not transfer funds allocated
5 specifically for state level maintenance of effort requirements under IDEA, funds allocated specifically for state level maintenance
6 of effort requirement for federal program, funds provided for the Education and Economic Development Act, funds provided for
7 Career and Technology Education, nor funds required for debt service or bonded indebtedness. All school districts and special
8 schools of this State may suspend professional staffing ratios and expenditure regulations and guidelines at the sub-function and
9 service area level, except for four-year old programs and programs serving students with disabilities who have Individualized
10 Education Programs.

11 In order for a school district to take advantage of the flexibility provisions, at least seventy-five percent of the school district’s per
12 pupil expenditures must be utilized within the In\$ite categories of instruction, instructional support, and only transportation, food
13 service, and safety within non-instruction pupil services. No portion of the seventy-five percent may be used for facilities, business
14 services, debt service, capital outlay, program management, and leadership services, as defined by In\$ite. The school district shall
15 report to the Department of Education the actual percentage of its per pupil expenditures used for classroom instruction, instructional
16 support, and transportation, food service, and safety within non-instruction pupil services for the current school year ending June
17 thirtieth. Salaries of on-site principals must be included in the calculation of the district’s per pupil expenditures.

18 “In\$ite” means the financial analysis model for education programs utilized by the Department of Education.

19 School districts are encouraged to reduce expenditures by means, including, but not limited to, limiting the number of low
20 enrollment courses, reducing travel for the staff and the school district’s board, reducing and limiting activities requiring dues and
21 memberships, reducing transportation costs for extracurricular and academic competitions, restructuring administrative staffing, and
22 expanding virtual instruction.

23 School districts and special schools may carry forward unexpended funds from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year.

24 Prior to implementing the flexibility authorized herein, school districts must provide to Public Charter Schools the per pupil
25 allocation due to them for each categorical program.

26 Quarterly throughout the current fiscal year, the chairman of each school district’s board and the superintendent of each school
27 district must certify where non-instructional or nonessential programs have been suspended and the specific flexibility actions taken.
28 The certification must be in writing, signed by the chairman and the superintendent, delivered electronically to the State
29 Superintendent of Education, and an electronic copy forwarded to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of
30 the Senate Education Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and the Chairman of the House Education
31 and Public Works Committee. Additionally, the certification must be presented publicly at a regularly called school board meeting,
32 and the certification must be conspicuously posted on the internet website maintained by the school district.

33 For the current fiscal year, Section 59-21-1030 is suspended. The foreign language program assessment, and the physical
34 education assessment must be suspended. School districts and the Department of Education are granted permission to purchase the
35 most economical type of bus fuel.

1 For the current fiscal year, savings generated from the suspension of the assessments enumerated above must be allocated to school
2 districts based on weighted pupil units.

3 School districts must maintain a transaction register that includes a complete record of all funds expended over one hundred dollars,
4 from whatever source, for whatever purpose. The register must be prominently posted on the district's internet website and made
5 available for public viewing and downloading. The register must include for each expenditure:

- 6 (i) the transaction amount;
- 7 (ii) the name of the payee; and
- 8 (iii) a statement providing a detailed description of the expenditure.

9 The register must not include an entry for salary, wages, or other compensation paid to individual employees. The register must
10 not include any information that can be used to identify an individual employee. The register must be accompanied by a complete
11 explanation of any codes or acronyms used to identify a payee or an expenditure. The register must be searchable and updated at
12 least once a month.

13 Each school district must also maintain on its internet website a copy of each monthly statement for all of the credit cards
14 maintained by the entity, including credit cards issued to its officers or employees for official use. The credit card number on each
15 statement must be redacted prior to posting on the internet website. Each credit card statement must be posted not later than the
16 thirtieth day after the first date that any portion of the balance due as shown on the statement is paid.

17 The Comptroller General must establish and maintain a website to contain the information required by this section from a school
18 district that does not maintain its own internet website. The internet website must be organized so that the public can differentiate
19 between the school districts and search for the information they are seeking.

20 The provisions contained herein do not amend, suspend, supersede, replace, revoke, restrict, or otherwise affect Chapter 4, Title
21 30, of the South Carolina Freedom of Information Act. Nothing in this proviso shall be interpreted as prohibiting the State Board of
22 Education to exercise its authority to grant waivers under Regulation 43-261.

23 **1A.15.** (SDE-EIA: Teacher Salary Supplement) The department is directed to carry forward prior year unobligated teacher salary
24 supplement and related employer contribution funds into the current fiscal year to be used for the same purpose. Any unexpended
25 funds in teacher salary supplement may be used to fund shortfalls in the associated employer contribution funding in the current
26 fiscal year.

27 **1A.16.** (SDE-EIA: Dropout Prevention and High Schools That Work Programs) The Department of Education must report
28 annually by December first, to the Governor, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways and
29 Means Committee, the Chairman of the Senate Education Committee, and the Chairman of the House Education and Public Works
30 Committee on the effectiveness of dropout prevention programs funded by the Education and Economic Development Act and on
31 the High Schools that Work Programs' progress and effectiveness in providing a better prepared workforce and student success in
32 post-secondary education. The department, school districts, and special schools may carry forward unexpended funds from the prior
33 fiscal year into the current fiscal that were allocated for High Schools That Work.

34 **1A.17.** (SDE-EIA: Assessment) The department is authorized to carry forward into the current fiscal year, prior year state
35 assessment funds for the same purpose. Reimbursements shall resume in the current fiscal year for PSAT, pre-ACT or 10th grade
36 Aspire.

1 **1A.18.** (SDE-EIA: Report Card Information) The percentage each school district expended on classroom instruction as defined
2 by the Department of Education’s InSite classification for “Instruction” must be printed on the Annual School and District Report
3 Card.

4 **1A.19.** (SDE-EIA: Core Curriculum Materials) The funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.A.3 for instructional materials
5 for core curriculum shall be expended consistent with the requirements of Section 59-31-600 of the 1976 Code requiring the
6 development of higher order thinking skills and critical thinking which should be integrated throughout the core curriculum
7 instructional materials. Furthermore, the evaluation criteria used to select instructional materials with funds appropriated in Part IA,
8 Section 1, VIII.A.3 shall include a weight of up to ten percent of the overall criteria to the development of higher order thinking skills
9 and critical thinking.

10 **1A.20.** (SDE-EIA: Certified Staff Technology Proficiency) To ensure the effective and efficient use of the funding provided by
11 the General Assembly in Part IA, Section 1 VIII.D. for school technology in the classroom and internet access, the State Department
12 of Education shall approve district technology plans that specifically address and incorporate certified staff technology competency
13 standards and local school districts must require certified staff to demonstrate proficiency in these standards as part of each certified
14 staff’s Professional Development plan. District adopted technology proficiency standards and plans should be, at minimum, aligned
15 to the International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE) teacher standards. Evidence that districts are meeting the
16 requirement is a prerequisite to expenditure of a district’s technology funds.

17 **1A.21.** (SDE-EIA: Accountability Program Implementation) To support implementation of the accountability program, the
18 Education Oversight Committee may carry forward unexpended Education Accountability Act funds authorized specifically for the
19 administration of the Education Oversight Committee. For the current fiscal year the Education Oversight Committee may carry forward
20 prior year EIA South Carolina Community Block Grants for Education Pilot Program funds not awarded by the grant committee. These
21 funds must be used for an independent common evaluation of each awarded grant to ensure high quality programs that maximize a
22 return on the state’s investment.

23 **1A.22.** (SDE-EIA: 4K Targeting) EIA funds allocated for the provision of four-year-old kindergarten shall be utilized for the
24 provision of services to age-eligible children ~~qualifying for free or reduced-price lunch or Medicaid~~ in poverty, as defined in Proviso
25 1.3 of this Act. Children with developmental delays documented through state approved screening assessments or children with
26 medically documented disabilities who do not already qualify for special need services should also be considered for enrollment. In
27 the event that more students seek to enroll than available space permits, districts shall prioritize students (at the time of acceptance)
28 on the basis of family income expressed as a percentage of the federal poverty guidelines, with the lowest family incomes given the
29 highest enrollment priority.

30 **1A.23.** (SDE-EIA: Reading) The funds allocated to the Department of Education for reading shall be used to provide districts
31 with research-based strategies and professional development and to work directly with schools and districts to assist with
32 implementation of research-based strategies. When providing professional development the department and school districts must
33 use the most cost effective method and when able utilize ETV to provide such services throughout the state. The department shall
34 establish measurements for monitoring impact on student achievement.

35 **1A.24.** (SDE-EIA: Students at Risk of School Failure) For the current fiscal year, EIA funds appropriated for students at academic
36 risk of school failure, must be allocated to school districts based upon two factors: (1) poverty as determined for the poverty add on

1 weight in Proviso 1.3; and (2) the number of weighted pupil units identified in the prior fiscal year as in need of academic assistance.
2 At least eighty-five percent of the funds must be spent on instruction and instructional support for students at academic risk.
3 Instructional support may include family literacy and parenting programs to students at-risk for school failure and their families.
4 Students at academic risk are defined as students who are not meeting grade level standards in English language arts/reading and
5 mathematics as evidenced by summative state assessments in grades three through eight or students who are not on track to meeting
6 or exceeding English language arts/reading or mathematics standards by the end of third grade. Public charter schools, the Palmetto
7 Unified School District, and the Department of Juvenile Justice must also receive a proportionate per pupil allocation based on the
8 number of students at academic risk of school failure served.

9 **1A.25.** (SDE-EIA: Professional Development) Of the funds appropriated for professional development, up to \$500,000 may be
10 expended for gifted and talented teacher endorsement and certification activities. The Department of Education must provide
11 professional development on assessing student mastery of the content standards through classroom, formative and end-of-year
12 assessments. The Department of Education also must post on the agency's website the South Carolina Professional Development
13 Standards and provide training through telecommunication methods to school leadership on the professional development standards.
14 The department is authorized to carry forward and expend professional development funds for the same purpose.

15 **1A.26.** (SDE-EIA: Assessments-Gifted & Talented, Advanced Placement, & International Baccalaureate Exams) Funds
16 appropriated and/or authorized for assessment shall be used for assessments to determine eligibility of students for gifted and talented
17 programs and for the cost of Advanced Placement, ~~and~~ International Baccalaureate, *and Cambridge International* exams.

18 **1A.27.** (SDE-EIA: Adult Education) A minimum of thirty percent of the funds appropriated for adult education must be allocated
19 to school districts to serve adult education students between the ages of seventeen and twenty-one who are enrolled in programs
20 leading to a state high school diploma, state high school equivalency diploma (GED), or career readiness certificate. The remaining
21 funds will be allocated to districts based on a formula which includes factors such as target populations without a high school
22 credential, program enrollment the previous school year, number of students making an educational gain the previous school year,
23 and performance factors such as number of high school credentials and career readiness certificates awarded the previous school
24 year. Overall levels of state funding must meet the federal requirement of state maintenance of effort. Each school district must
25 collect information from both the student and the school including why the student has enrolled in Adult Education and whether or
26 not the student is pursuing a GED or Diploma. The school district must then provide a quarterly report to the Department of Education
27 and must include the unique student identifier. The department, in turn, will provide summary information to the House Ways and
28 Means Committee, the House Education and Public Works Committee, the Senate Finance Committee and the Senate Education
29 Committee on the information. Up to a maximum of \$300,000, of funds may be used to establish an initiative by which qualifying
30 adult education students may qualify for a free high school equivalency test. The Department of Education shall establish guidelines
31 for the free high school equivalency testing initiative.

32 **1A.28.** (SDE-EIA: Clemson Agriculture Education Teachers) The funds appropriated in Part IA, Section VIII.F. for Clemson
33 Agriculture Education Teachers must be transferred to Clemson University PSA to fund summer employment of agriculture teachers
34 and to cover state-mandated salary increases on that portion of the agriculture teachers' salaries attributable to summer employment.
35 If sufficient funds remain, Clemson University PSA may utilize such funds for a Regional Coordinator.

1 **1A.29.** (SDE-EIA: Full-Day 4K) Eligible students residing in a school district that met the poverty level for participation in the
2 prior school year are eligible to participate in the South Carolina Early Reading Development and Education Program in the current
3 school year. Public and private providers shall be funded for instructional costs at a rate of ~~\$4,510~~ \$4,600 per student enrolled.
4 Eligible students enrolling during the school year or withdrawing during the school year shall be funded on a pro rata basis determined
5 by the length of their enrollment. Private providers transporting eligible children to and from school shall also be eligible for a
6 reimbursement of \$574 per eligible child transported. All providers who are reimbursed are required to retain records as required by
7 their fiscal agent. New providers participating for the first time in the current fiscal year and enrolling between one and six eligible
8 children shall be eligible to receive up to \$1,000 per child in materials and equipment funding, with providers enrolling seven or
9 more such children eligible for funding not to exceed \$10,000. Providers receiving equipment funding are expected to participate in
10 the program and provide high-quality, center-based programs as defined herein for a minimum of three years. Failure to participate
11 for three years will require the provider to return a portion of the equipment allocation at a level determined by the Department of
12 Education and the Office of First Steps to School Readiness. Funding to providers is contingent upon receipt of data as requested
13 by the Department of Education and the Office of First Steps. The Department of Education shall only provide funding for public
14 school students whose complete records have been entered into PowerSchool based on the one hundred and thirty-five day student
15 average daily membership.

16 Annually, the Department of Education is directed to audit the annual allocations to public providers to ensure that allocations are
17 accurate and aligned to the appropriate pro rata per student allocation, materials, and equipment funding. In the event the department,
18 during the audit process determines that the annual allocations of the prior fiscal year are not accurate, the department must adjust
19 the allocations for the current fiscal year to account for the audit findings. The department must provide the results of the annual
20 audit findings to the General Assembly no later than December first. Likewise, in the event the Office of First Steps determines that
21 the annual allocations of the prior fiscal year to private providers are not accurate, the Office of First Steps must adjust the allocations
22 for the current fiscal year to account for the findings.

23 Of the funds appropriated, \$300,000 shall be allocated to the Education Oversight Committee to conduct an annual evaluation of
24 the South Carolina Child Development Education Pilot Program and to issue findings in a report to the General Assembly by January
25 fifteenth of each year. To aid in this evaluation, the Education Oversight Committee shall determine the data necessary and both
26 public and private providers are required to submit the necessary data as a condition of continued participation in and funding of the
27 program. This data shall include developmentally appropriate measures of student progress. Additionally, the Department of
28 Education shall issue a unique student identifier for each child receiving services from a private provider. The Department of
29 Education shall be responsible for the collection and maintenance of data on the public state funded full day and half-day
30 four-year-old kindergarten programs. The Office of First Steps to School Readiness shall be responsible for the collection and
31 maintenance of data on the state funded programs provided through private providers. The Education Oversight Committee shall
32 use this data and all other collected and maintained data necessary to conduct a research based review of the program's
33 implementation and assessment of student success in the early elementary grades.

34 **1A.30.** (SDE-EIA: Aid to Districts) Funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.A.1. Aid to Districts shall be dispersed monthly
35 to school districts. For the current fiscal year, the remaining funds shall be allocated to districts based on the number of weighted
36 pupil units.

1 **1A.31.** (SDE-EIA: Centers of Excellence) Of the funds appropriated for Centers of Excellence, \$350,000 must be allocated to the
2 Francis Marion University Center of Excellence to Prepare Teachers of Children of Poverty to expand statewide training for
3 individuals who teach children of poverty through weekend college, nontraditional or alternative learning opportunities.

4 **1A.32.** (SDE-EIA: IDEA Maintenance of Effort) Prior to the dispersal of funds appropriated in Section VIII.A.1. Aid to Districts
5 according to Proviso 1A.30 for the current fiscal year, in the event that there is a reduction in state funds or there are changes in the
6 Education Finance Act/Base Student Cost formula that would reduce support for children with disabilities, the Department of
7 Education is authorized to utilize funds appropriated in Section VIII.A.1. Aid to Districts to ensure maintenance of state financial
8 support for the IDEA. The department shall distribute these funds using the current fiscal year one hundred thirty-five day Average
9 Daily Membership or as directed by the United States Department of Education. Funds provided for these purposes may not be
10 transferred to any other purpose and therefore are not subject to flexibility. For continued compliance with the federal maintenance
11 of state financial support requirements of the IDEA, funding for children with disabilities must, to the extent practicable, be held
12 harmless to budget cuts or reductions to the extent those funds are required to meet federal maintenance of state financial support
13 requirements under the IDEA. In the event cuts to funds that are needed to maintain fiscal effort are necessary, when administering
14 such cuts, the department must not reduce funding to support children with disabilities who qualify for services under the IDEA in a
15 manner that is disproportionate to the level of overall reduction to state programs in general. By December first, the department
16 must submit an estimate of the IDEA maintenance of state financial support requirement to the General Assembly and the Governor.
17 For the current fiscal year, the department may carry forward IDEA Maintenance of Effort funds from the prior fiscal year and
18 expend them in the same manner.

19 **1A.33.** (SDE-EIA: Career Cluster Industry Partnerships) From the funds appropriated to the Department of Education, \$800,000
20 must be provided as direct grants to the private sector statewide trade association or educational foundation providing nationally
21 certified programs in career and technology education representing the automotive, construction, engineering, healthcare, mechanical
22 contracting/construction, and hospitality tourism career clusters. Organizations applying for a grant must do so by July thirty-first
23 and the Department of Education must award a minimum of one grant of at least \$150,000 in at least four of these specified career
24 clusters to be used exclusively for career and technology education. The recipient industry organization must conduct end-of-course
25 exams graded by a national industry organization and must include in their grant request how the money will be spent in direct
26 support of students to further industry-specific career technology education; a description and history of their program nationally and
27 within South Carolina; estimates of future employment growth in their industry; and the national scope of their program. By August
28 first of the following year, the organization must submit to the department a report detailing how the grant increased
29 industry/employer awareness; the number of increased schools using the industry-based curriculum and partnered with the industry
30 organization; the increased number of students in the program; and an overview and analysis of the organization's statewide student
31 competition. The grant must be used for career awareness programs for that industry cluster; statewide student competitions leading
32 to national competitions; teacher development and training; post-secondary scholarships in industry-specific degree programs;
33 student recruitment into that career cluster programs; programs to educate middle and high school Career or Guidance Counselors
34 about the industry; service to disadvantaged youth; and administering business/employer awareness and partnerships which help lead
35 to experience-based, career-oriented experiences including internships, apprenticeships, mentoring, co-op education and service
36 learning. The Office of Career and Technology Education of the department will develop goals with each career cluster on the

1 number of new schools using the industry-based curriculum and partnered with that career cluster organization. These funds may
2 not be used to supplant or replace, in whole or in part, other existing resources/assets sourced outside the present grant being used to
3 provide the same services or programs. Organizations may carry-over grants for up to three years when a large project is identified
4 in the grant application to be used at a future date; otherwise excess funds must be returned to the state. Organizations awarded must
5 submit a semi-annual programmatic and financial report on the last day of December in addition to the final report due August first
6 that has been audited by a third party accounting firm.

7 **1A.34.** (SDE-EIA: Partnerships/Other Agencies & Entities) For the current fiscal year, agencies and other entities receiving funds
8 appropriated in Part IA, Section 1, VIII. F. will continue to report annually to the Education Oversight Committee (EOC). Any entity
9 receiving funds that must flow through a state agency will receive those funds through the EOC, unless requested in writing by the
10 entity to match federal or other funds. The EOC will make funding recommendations to the Governor and General Assembly as part
11 of the agency's annual budget request.

12 **1A.35.** (SDE-EIA: ETV Teacher Training/Support) Of the funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.F. South Carolina
13 Educational Television must provide training and technical support on the educational resources available to teachers and school
14 districts.

15 **1A.36.** (SDE-EIA: Teacher Salaries/SE Average) The projected Southeastern average teacher salary shall be the average of the
16 average teachers' salaries of the southeastern states as projected by the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office. For the current school
17 year the Southeastern average teacher salary is projected to be ~~\$52,152~~ \$52,830. The General Assembly remains desirous of raising
18 the average teacher salary in South Carolina through incremental increases over the next few years so as to make such equivalent to
19 the national average teacher salary.

20 ~~The statewide minimum teacher salary schedule used in Fiscal Year 2017-18 will continue to be used in Fiscal Year 2018-19 and~~
21 ~~the starting salary shall be increased to \$32,000 with the remaining salary schedule increased by one percent.~~

22 Additionally, for the current fiscal year, a local school district board of trustees must increase the salary compensation for all
23 eligible certified teachers employed by the district by no less than one year of experience credit using the district salary schedule
24 utilized the prior fiscal year as the basis for providing the step. Application of this provision must be applied uniformly for all eligible
25 certified teachers. For Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, the requirement that school districts maintain local salary supplements per
26 teacher no less than their prior fiscal year level is suspended if additional State funds fill the gap.

27 Funds allocated by Proviso 1.3 for implementing a revised state minimum salary schedule ~~appropriated in Part IA, Section 1,~~
28 ~~VIII.C.2.~~ for Teacher Salaries must be used to increase salaries of those teachers eligible pursuant to Section 59-20-50(4)(b), to
29 include classroom teachers, librarians, guidance counselors, psychologists, social workers, occupational and physical therapists,
30 school nurses, orientation/mobility instructors, and audiologists in the school districts of the state.

31 For purposes of this provision teachers shall be defined by the Department of Education using the Professional Certified Staff
32 (PCS) System.

33 **1A.37.** (SDE-EIA: PowerSchool Dropout Recovery Data) With the funds appropriated to the Department of Education for
34 PowerSchool and data collection, the department will begin in the current fiscal year to collect data from schools and school districts
35 on the number of students who had previously dropped out of school and who reenrolled in a public school or adult education to
36 pursue a high school diploma. The Education Oversight Committee working with the Department of Education will determine how

1 to calculate a dropout recovery rate that will be reflected on the annual school and district report cards. *The department may carry*
2 *forward and expend the funds for the same purpose.*

3 **1A.38.** (SDE-EIA: Assisting, Developing and Evaluating Professional Teaching -ADEPT) With funds appropriated in the current
4 fiscal year, the Department of Education, school districts, the Department of Juvenile Justice and special schools of the state may
5 continue implementation of the ADEPT program. Governing boards of public institutions of higher education may provide by policy
6 or regulation for a tuition waiver for the tuition for one three-hour course at that institution for those public school teachers who serve
7 as supervisors for full-time students completing education degree requirements. Unexpended funds appropriated for this purpose
8 may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and expended for the same purposes.

9 **1A.39.** (SDE-EIA: Educational Partnerships) The funds provided to the Center for Educational Partnerships at the College of
10 Education at the University of South Carolina will be used to create a consortium of educational initiatives and services to schools
11 and communities. These initiatives will include, but are not limited to, professional development in writing, geography and other
12 content areas; training; research; advocacy; and practical consultancy. The Center will establish collaborative educational enterprises
13 with schools, school districts, parents, communities, and businesses while fulfilling the responsibilities of the School Improvement
14 Council Assistance. The Center will focus on connecting the educational needs and goals of communities to improve efficiency and
15 effectiveness.

16 **1A.40.** (SDE-EIA: STEM Centers SC) All EIA-funded entities that provide professional development and science programming
17 to teachers and students should be included in the state's science, technology, engineering and mathematics education strategic plan.

18 **1A.41.** (SDE-EIA: EOC Partnerships for Innovation) Of the funds appropriated or carried forward from the prior fiscal year, the
19 Education Oversight Committee is directed to participate in public-private partnerships to promote innovative ways to transform the
20 assessment of public education in South Carolina that support increased student achievement in reading and college and career
21 readiness. The Education Oversight Committee may provide financial support to districts and to public-private partnerships for
22 planning and support to implement, sustain and evaluate the innovation and to develop a matrix and measurements of student
23 academic success based on evidence-based models. These funds may also be used to support the innovative delivery of science,
24 technology, and genetic education and exposure to career opportunities in science, including mobile science laboratory programs, to
25 students enrolled in the Abbeville equity school districts and students in high poverty schools. These funds may also focus on
26 creating public-private literacy partnerships utilizing a 2:1 matching funds provision when the initiative employs research-based
27 methods, has demonstrated success in increasing reading proficiency of struggling readers, and works directly with high poverty
28 schools and districts. The committee will work to expand the engagement of stakeholders including state agencies and boards like
29 the Educational Television Commission, businesses, and higher education institutions. The committee shall annually report to the
30 General Assembly on the measurement results.

31 **1A.42.** (SDE-EIA: Aid to Districts Draw Down) For the current fiscal year, in order to draw down funds appropriated in Part IA,
32 Section 1, VIII.A.1, Aid to Districts, school districts, Palmetto Unified District and the Department of Juvenile Justice must work
33 with local law enforcement agencies, and when necessary, state law enforcement agencies in order to ensure that the district has an
34 updated school safety plan in place. The safety plan must include safety directives in the classroom, a safe student and staff exit
35 strategy and necessary safety staff. Notice of completion of the updated plan must be submitted to the Department of Education no
36 later than September first, of the current fiscal year. In the current fiscal year, school districts may continue to negotiate with local

1 law enforcement for the provision of School Resource Officers. The department must report to the Chairman of the House Ways
2 and Means Committee, the Chairman of the House Education and Public Works Committee, the Chairman of the Senate Finance
3 Committee and the Chairman of the Senate Education Committee by September thirtieth, of the current fiscal year, on any districts
4 that failed to submit an updated plan.

5 **1A.43.** (SDE-EIA: Education and Economic Development Act Carry Forward) Funds provided for the Education and Economic
6 Development Act may be carried forward into the current fiscal year to be expended for the same purposes by the department, school
7 districts, and special schools.

8 **1A.44.** (SDE-EIA: EEDA Regional Education Centers) Funds appropriated from the EEDA for Regional Education Centers must
9 not be less than \$108,500.

10 **1A.45.** (SDE-EIA: Teach for America SC) Because Teach For America SC receives EIA funds in the current fiscal year, school
11 districts that partner with Teach For America SC are required to provide to Teach For America SC by September first annually,
12 information on the prior year's academic achievement of students who were directly taught by Teach For America corps members.
13 The information must be in a format that protects the identity of individual students and must include state assessment data as
14 appropriate.

15 **1A.46.** (SDE-EIA: EOC-South Carolina Autism Society) Of the funds appropriated in Section 1A, VIII.F. Partnerships, Education
16 Oversight Committee (A85), \$500,000 must be transferred in quarterly installments from the Education Oversight Committee to the
17 South Carolina Autism Society for the Autism Parent-School Partnership Program. Beginning October 10, 2015, the South Carolina
18 Autism Society shall provide a quarterly accounting report to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the
19 House Ways and Means Committee and the Education Oversight Committee.

20 **1A.47.** (SDE-EIA: CHE/CERRA) The Center for Educator Recruitment, Retention and Advancement (CERRA) must complete
21 periodic evaluations of the institutions currently hosting a Teaching Fellows (TF) program and ensure that the TF programs at the
22 current host institutions continue to meet the requirements for a TF program as set forth by the CERRA Board of Directors. Further,
23 CERRA will continue implementing a long-range plan for approving additional TF programs at other public, four-year institutions
24 who wish to be considered to host a TF program, provided the proposed programs meet the requirements set forth by the CERRA
25 Board of Directors. CERRA will publish TF program criteria and requirements prominently on its website. Any institution who
26 applies but is not selected to host a TF program will be informed in writing of the basis for the selection decision and be offered
27 technical support if the institution elects to reapply. Any institution that applies but is not selected to host a TF program may appeal
28 to the Commission on Higher Education.

35 **1A.49.** (SDE-EIA: Public Charter Pupil Counts) With funds appropriated to charter schools sponsored by either the South Carolina
36 Public Charter School District or a registered Institution of Higher Education, the sponsor must require each charter school to submit

1 a student attendance report for the 5th, 45th, 90th and 135th days. Reporting requirements shall include both Average Daily Membership
2 and Weighted Pupil Unit membership. The South Carolina Public Charter School District or a registered Institution of Higher
3 Education shall then provide the data for each charter school to the Department of Education. Quarterly, the department will submit
4 the information to the House Ways and Means Committee, the House Education and Public Works Committee, the Senate Finance

5 participant's teaching practice, or individuals seeking an alternative pathway to certification as a teacher.

6 (3) Support for the establishment and maintenance of a teaching mentorship program, including salary supplements for
7 teaching mentors not to exceed \$2,500 per year.

8 (4) Other technical support and recruiting incentives as developed by CERRA in conjunction with the Department of
9 Education and the Education Oversight Committee consistent with the objectives of this section.

10 (D) In addition to eligibility and application requirements, CERRA shall develop a process for recovering an amount equal to the
11 incentives given to individual participants who fail to comply with the obligations associated with a relevant incentive in which they
12 participate including, but not limited to, failure to complete a prescribed course of study, failure to obtain a relevant certification or
13 licensure upon completion of a course of study, or failure to provide instructional services in an eligible district for a prescribed
14 period of time.

15 (E) CERRA shall report by July thirty-first of the current fiscal year to the Governor, President pro Tempore of the Senate, and
16 Speaker of the House on the incentives developed pursuant to item (C) of this section and make recommendations for attracting and
17 retaining high quality teachers in rural and underserved districts. The report shall contain at a minimum eligibility requirements and
18 application processes for districts and individuals, descriptions of and proposed budgets for each incentive program and an analysis
19 of the number and demographics of individuals potentially eligible for each.

20 (F) Funds appropriated or transferred for use in the Rural Teacher Recruiting Incentive may be carried forward from prior fiscal
21 years and used for the same purpose.

22 **1A.55.** (SDE-EIA: Project Read) Of the funds appropriated in Section 1A. VIII.A.3. for Reading, \$500,000 must be used for
23 teacher in-service training and professional development related to Project Read. The department may set accountability guidelines
24 to ensure that funds are spent in accordance with the proviso.

25 **1A.56.** (SDE-EIA: Reading/Literacy Coaches) (A) Funds appropriated for Reading/Literacy Coaches must be allocated to school
26 districts by the Department of Education as follows: for each primary and elementary school, the school district shall be eligible to
27 receive up to \$62,730 or the actual cost of salary and benefits for a full-time reading/literacy coach.

28 (B) By accepting these funds, a school district warrants that they will not be used to supplant existing school district expenditures,
29 except for districts that either are currently, or in the prior fiscal year, were paying for reading/literacy coaches with local funds. A
30 district may only utilize these funds to employ reading/literacy coaches that may serve in a primary, elementary, or middle school or
31 a combination of these schools depending on the area of highest need in the district *except in the event that the district can request*
32 *and receive a waiver from the Department of Education to expend the funds on interventionists who spend more than fifty percent of*
33 *their time providing direct support to struggling readers in grades kindergarten through grade five.* The school district must align
34 the placement of coaches to the district reading plan that is approved by the department.

35 (C) Funds appropriated for reading/literacy Coaches are intended to be used to provide primary, elementary, and/or middle
36 schools with reading/literacy coaches who shall serve according to the provisions in Chapter 155 of Title 59.

1 (D) Schools and districts accepting funding to support a coaching position agree that the reading/literacy coach must not serve as
2 an administrator. If the department finds that school districts are using these funds for administrative costs as defined in statute they
3 must withhold that districts remaining balance of funds allocated pursuant to this proviso.

4 (E) The Department of Education must publish guidelines that define the minimum qualifications for a reading/literacy coach.
5 These guidelines must deem any licensed/certified teacher qualified if, at a minimum, he or she:

6 (1) holds a bachelor's degree or higher and an add-on endorsement for literacy coach or literacy specialist; or

7 (2) holds a bachelor's degree or higher and is actively pursuing the literacy coach or literacy specialist endorsement; or

8 (3) holds a master's degree or higher in reading or a closely-related field.

9 Within these guidelines, the Department of Education must assist districts in identifying a reading/literacy coach in the event that
10 the school is not successful in identifying and directly employing a qualified candidate. The provisions of subsection (A), including
11 the local support requirements, shall also apply to any allocations made pursuant to this paragraph.

12 (F) The Department of Education must develop procedures for monitoring the use of funds appropriated for reading/literacy
13 coaches to ensure they are applied to their intended uses and are not redirected for other purposes. The Department of Education
14 may receive up to \$100,000 of the funds appropriated for reading/literacy coaches in order to implement this program, provided that
15 this allocation does not exceed the department's actual costs.

16 (G) Prior to the close of the current fiscal year, any unspent or unallocated funds for reading/literacy coaches shall be used to fund
17 Summer Reading Camps.

18 (H) The Department of Education shall require:

19 (1) any school district receiving funding under subsection (A) to identify the name and qualifications of the supported
20 reading/literacy coach; as well as the school in which the coach is assigned; and

21 (2) any school district receiving funding under subsection (G) to account for the specific amounts and uses of such funds.

22 (I) With the data reported by the school districts, the department shall report by January fifteenth of the current fiscal year on the
23 hiring of and assignment of reading/literacy coaches by school. The department shall also report the amount of funds that will be
24 used for Summer Reading Camps.

25 (J) Funds appropriated for reading/literacy coaches shall be retained and carried forward to be used for the same purpose but
26 may not be flexed.

27 **1A.57.** (SDE-EIA: Digital Instructional Materials) The Department of Education shall continue to create an instructional materials
28 list composed of those items (print and/or digital) that have received State Board of Education approval through the normal adoption
29 process. The department shall continue to work with the publishers of instructional materials to ensure that districts have options for
30 print/digital student materials to include class sets of print student editions, if needed. Funds appropriated for the purchase of
31 instructional materials (print/digital) may be used for reimbursing school districts to offset the costs of refurbishing science kits on
32 the state-adopted instructional materials inventory, purchasing new kits or those adopted as supplemental from the central textbook
33 depository, or a combination of refurbishment and purchase. The refurbishing cost of kits may not exceed the cost of the
34 state-adopted refurbishing kits plus a reasonable amount for shipping and handling. Costs for staff development, personnel costs,
35 equipment, or other costs associated with refurbishing kits on state inventory are not allowable costs. Funds provided for Instructional

1 Materials may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year to be expended for the same purposes by the
2 department, school districts, and special schools. These funds are not subject to flexibility.

3 **1A.58.** (SDE-EIA: 4K Early Literacy Competencies Assessments) Of the funds carried forward from the full-day 4K program
4 from the previous fiscal year, the Department of Education is authorized to expend up to \$800,000 on assessments and professional
5 development to analyze the early literacy competencies of children in publicly funded prekindergarten. If these funds are not
6 available, funds appropriated and/or authorized for assessment shall be used to administer the prekindergarten assessments. The
7 department shall manage the administration of assessments that analyze the early literacy and language development of children in
8 publicly funded prekindergarten as done in the prior fiscal year. Each school district and private provider participating in a publicly
9 funded prekindergarten program will administer one of the formative assessments selected by the department to each child eligible
10 for and enrolled in a publicly funded prekindergarten program during the first forty-five days of the school year and during the last
11 forty-five days of the school year. Accommodations that do not invalidate the results of these assessments must be provided in the
12 manner set forth by the student's Individualized Education Program or 504 Accommodations Plan and for students who are Limited
13 English Proficient according to their LEP Plan. The department will provide the assessment data to the Education Oversight
14 Committee. The results of the assessment and the developmental intervention strategies recommended or services needed to address
15 the child's identified needs must also be provided, in writing, to the parent or guardian. The assessment may not be used to deny a
16 student to admission to prekindergarten.

17 Furthermore, up to \$2,000,000 of the funds appropriated for half-day programs for four-year-olds and funds carried forward from
18 assessment must be expended by the Department of Education to administer the Kindergarten Readiness Assessment (KRA) to each
19 child entering kindergarten in the public schools. The assessment of kindergarten students must be administered at a minimum of
20 once during the first forty-five days of the school year with the results collected by the department. The results of the assessments
21 and the developmental intervention strategies recommended or services needed to address each child's identified needs must also be
22 provided, in writing, to the parent or guardian. The assessment may not be used to deny a student admission to kindergarten.
23 Accommodations that do not invalidate the results of these assessments must be provided in the manner set forth by the student's
24 Individualized Education Program, 504 Accommodations Plan, or LEP Plan. Districts are given the option of designating up to two
25 days of the one hundred eighty day school calendar to administer the assessment to kindergarten students. The department will also
26 provide the results of the assessment of kindergarten students to the Education Oversight Committee. With available funds, the
27 department will also provide or secure training for appropriate educators in how to administer the assessment.

28 For all students assessed with the Kindergarten Readiness Assessment (KRA), the Department of Education is required to collect
29 data from schools and school districts on the prior early learning experience of each student. The data would include whether the
30 kindergartener had attended in the prior school year a Head Start program, a South Carolina Early Reading Development and
31 Education Program in a public school or a private center, a half-day 4K program in a public school, a full-day 4K program in a public
32 school, a child care center (registered faith-based, registered family home, group home, or exempt provider) or informal child care.

33 **1A.59.** (SDE-EIA: CDEPP Unexpended Funds) For Fiscal Year 2018-19, the Office of First Steps to School Readiness is
34 permitted to retain the first \$1,000,000 of any unexpended CDEPP funds of the prior fiscal year and expend these funds to enhance
35 the quality of the full-day 4K program in private centers and provide professional development opportunities.

1 By August first, the Office of First Steps is directed to allocate any additional unexpended CDEPP funds from the prior fiscal year
2 and any CDEPP funds carried forward from prior fiscal years that were transferred to the restricted account for the following purpose:
3 Education Oversight Committee - \$1,000,000 for the South Carolina Community Block Grants for Education Pilot Program.

4 If carry forward funds are less than the amounts appropriated, funding for the items listed herein shall be reduced on a pro rata

6 If by August first, the Department of Education or the Office of First Steps determines there will be funds available, funds shall
7 be allocated on a per pupil basis for districts eligible for participation first, who have a documented waiting list, and funded an
8 extended program per this proviso in the prior school year, then to districts to increase the length of the program to a maximum of
9 eight and a half hours per day or two hundred and twenty days per year or to fund summer programs. By August 1, the Department
10 of Education and the Office of First Steps must collect the documented waiting lists and determine a process to notify parents of
11 eligible students of available slots in all approved providers. If a district chooses to fund summer enrollment the program funding

23 **1A.60.** (SDE-EIA: Industry Certifications/Credentials) Of the funds appropriated for Industry Certifications/Credentials,
24 \$3,000,000 must be allocated to school districts based upon the number of national industry exams administered in the prior school
25 year with each district receiving a base amount of \$10,000. The department will identify the national industry exams that will be
26 funded based upon the job availability in the state. School districts may carry forward funds from the prior fiscal year into the current
27 fiscal year and expend the funds for the cost of national industry exams. The department shall work with the Department of
28 Commerce, the Department of Employment and Workforce, state and local chambers of commerce and economic development

35 technology education courses, with no district or multi-district career center receiving less than \$50,000. Funds may be expended
36 for the purchase of career and technical equipment, the up fitting of facilities and the purchase of consumables, regional career

1 specialists, and such evidence-based initiatives like High Schools that Work and Project Lead the Way. Each district must include
2 in the district plan submitted to the Office of Career and Technology Education information on other career and technical equipment
3 available. The district must include, at a minimum, equipment located at the career center and at the technical college, information

11 Innovation, \$1,425,000 must be authorized for schools or school districts that have poverty indices of eighty percent or greater based
12 on the poverty index utilized the prior fiscal year that was student eligibility for the free or reduced price lunch program and Medicaid,
13 or are a trial or plaintiff district in the Abbeville equity lawsuit. In these districts, the EOC will pilot a program that provides school
14 districts with digital learning tools, digital resources, the curriculum foundry, technical support, and professional development.~~

15 ~~1A.63. (SDE-EIA: Family Connection South Carolina) Funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 1, VIII.F, Partnerships, for Family
16 Connection South Carolina (H63), shall be transferred in quarterly installments from the Department of Education to Family
17 Connection South Carolina. Funds shall be used to provide support to families of children with disabilities. Support shall include,
18 home visits, transition assistance, education assistance, parent support and parent training. The department shall establish guidelines
19 through which Family Connection South Carolina shall provide planning documents to the department not later than July fifteenth
20 of the current fiscal year, and quarterly reporting of expenditures thereafter; and a performance report submitted annually.~~

21 ~~1A.64. (SDE-EIA: Low Achieving Schools) Of the funds appropriated to the Education Oversight Committee for Partnerships
22 for Innovation, \$306,750 shall be allocated to parent support initiatives and afterschool programs in historically underachieving
23 communities.~~

24 ~~1A.65. (SDE-EIA: EOC Military-Connected Children) Of the funds allocated for Partnerships for Innovation, the Education
25 Oversight Committee is directed to expend \$225,000 to initiate in at least two school districts with high military density, a pilot
26 program that will provide training, services, resources and research to teachers, counselors, mental health professionals, school
27 nurses, service providers and military parents. The objective of the pilot is to increase the level of educational quality and support
28 for military connected children. The training and services must be provided by a non profit entity that is an NBCC Approved

1A.68. (SDE-EIA: National Board Certification Incentive) Public school classroom teachers, to include teachers employed at the special schools or classroom teachers who work with classroom teachers, to include teachers employed at the special schools who are certified by the State Board of Education and who have been certified by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards or completed the application process prior to July 1, 2010 shall be paid a \$7,500 salary supplement beginning July first in the year following the year of achieving certification, beginning with 2009 applicants. National board certified teachers who have been certified by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards or completed the application process prior to July 1, 2010 moving to this State who hold a valid standard certificate from their sending state are exempted from initial certification requirements and are eligible for a professional teaching certificate and continuing contract status. Their recertification cycle will be consistent with national board certification.

- 30 (4) a demonstrated ability to be both replicable and scalable with priority given to those projects that focus on applied learning
31 opportunities and experiences, especially in the STEM or STEAM fields;
- 32 (5) blended and personalized learning focused on content mastery and experiential learning; and
- 33 (6) innovative strategies to close student achievement gaps, with a focus on below average and unsatisfactory schools.

34 The match required from a grant recipient shall be based on the poverty of the district or school. No matching amount will exceed
35 more than seventy percent of the grant request or be less than ten percent of the request. The required match may be met by funds
36 or by in-kind donations, such as technology, to be further defined by the grants committee. Public school districts and schools that

1 have high poverty and low achievement will receive priority for grants when their applications are judged to meet the criteria
2 established for the grant program. The committee shall submit its process to the Governor, the Chairman of House Ways and Means
3 and the Chairman of Senate Finance by December 31, 2018.

4 Grantees and service providers will be required to participate in an external evaluation that is the financial responsibility of the
5 Education Oversight Committee. The evaluation must document the results of the grants and examine the implementation of the

7 accomplishments and common challenges of the initiatives and models funded to share the lessons learned with the state's public

11 per year and the aggregate maximum loan amount is \$27,500.

12 1A.83. (SDE-EIA: Digital Learning Plan) The Education Oversight Committee is responsible for implementing the second year
13 of a pilot program for alternative methods of instruction for make-up days. The five school districts that participated in the initial
14 pilot program in the prior fiscal year shall have the option of continuing to participate during the current fiscal year. As a condition

33 for school districts that otherwise would lack the adequate resources to hire their own school resource officers. In making
34 determinations of eligibility the department shall use the most recent index of taxpaying ability as the district's indicator of ability
35 to pay, with districts of the lowest index of taxpaying ability receiving priority consideration. Districts must apply for funding
36 through the department and no districts shall receive an award of more than four certified school resource officer positions. In

33 For institutions of higher learning, adopted procedures to monitor expenditures of lottery funds shall be reported to the Commission
34 on Higher Education and the Executive Budget Office by October, 1, ~~2018~~ 2019, and these expenditures are subject to annual
35 verification and audit by the Commission on Higher Education on a rotational schedule not to exceed three years. The annual

1 verification and audit shall be funded from the funds appropriated to or authorized for the Commission on Higher Education and the
 2 commission shall not assess a fee or charge institutions of higher learning for performing this function. In addition, the Commission
 3 on Higher Education shall provide a report to the Executive Budget Office, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and the
 4 Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee by October first each year summarizing, by institution, how lottery funds were
 5 expended in the prior fiscal year, issues and concerns as well as institution responses to those issues and concerns discovered as a
 6 result of the commission's verification and/or audit activity during the prior fiscal year, if any.

7 For the Department of Education, adopted procedures to monitor expenditures of lottery funds that are allocated to the South
 8 Carolina school districts and other recipient institutions according to law and Department of Education guidelines shall be reported
 9 to the Executive Budget Office by October 1, ~~2018~~ 2019. In addition, the Department of Education shall provide a report to the
 10 Executive Budget Office, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means
 11 Committee on the amount of lottery funds the department distributed to each entity in the prior fiscal year.

12 All other state agencies must submit their adopted procedures to monitor expenditures of lottery funds to the Executive Budget

14 The Executive Budget Office shall ensure that state agencies receiving lottery funds have procedures in place to monitor
 15 expenditures of lottery funds and that the monitoring procedures are operating effectively.

17 **3.3.** (LEA: Student Unique Identifiers) For the current fiscal year, in order to provide longitudinal data, institutions of higher

11 **5.2.** (WLG: GED Test) Students attending school at the Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School that are sixteen years of age and are
12 unable to remain enrolled due to the necessity of immediate employment or enrollment in post-secondary education may be eligible
13 to take the General Education Development (GED) Test.

14 **5.3.** (WLG: Deferred Salaries Carry Forward) Wil Lou Gray is authorized to carry forward into the current fiscal year the amount
15 of the deferred salaries and employer contributions earned in the prior fiscal year for non-twelve month employees. These deferred
16 funds are not to be included or part of any other authorized carry forward amount.

17 **5.4.** (WLG: Educational Program Initiatives) Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School is authorized to utilize funds received from the
18 Department of Education for vocational equipment on educational program initiatives.

19 **5.5.** (WLG: Lease Revenue) Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School is authorized to retain revenues derived from the lease of school
20 properties titled to or utilized by the school and may use revenues retained for general school operations, including, but not limited
21 to, maintenance of such properties. Unexpended funds may be carried forward into the current fiscal year and used for the same
22 purposes.

23 **5.6.** (WLG: USDA Federal Grants) All revenues generated from USDA federal grants may be retained and expended by the
24 school in accordance with Federal regulations for the purpose of covering actual expenses in the cafeteria/food service operations of
25 the school.

26 **5.7.** (WLG: By-Products Revenue Carry Forward) The Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School is authorized to sell goods that are
27 by-products of the school's programs and operations, charge user fees and fees for services to the general public, individuals,
28 organizations, agencies and school districts, and such revenue may be retained and carried forward into the current fiscal year and
29 expended for the purpose of covering expenses of the school's programs and operations.

31 **SECTION 6 - H750 - SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF AND THE BLIND**

33 **6.1.** (SDB: Student Activity Fee) ~~The School for the Deaf and the Blind is authorized to charge to the parents of students at the~~
34 ~~school a student activity fee, differentiated according to the income of the family. The required student activity fee shall not exceed~~
35 ~~\$40.00. Such revenue may be retained and carried forward into the current fiscal year and expended for the purpose of covering~~
36 ~~expenses for student activities.~~

1 **6.2.** (SDB: Weighted Student Cost) The School for the Deaf and the Blind shall receive through the Education Finance Act the
2 average State share of the required weighted cost for each student enrolled in the School.

3 ~~**6.3.** (SDB: Admissions) Deaf, blind, multi-disabled and other disabled students identified by the Board of Commissioners as
4 target groups for admission to the South Carolina School for the Deaf and the Blind may be admitted by the School either through
5 direct application by parents or on referral from the local school district. The Board of Commissioners shall define the appropriate
6 admissions criteria including mental capacity, degree of disability, functioning level, age, and other factors deemed necessary by the
7 board. All placement hearings for admission to the South Carolina School for the Deaf and the Blind shall be organized by the
8 School. The South Carolina School for the Deaf and the Blind shall obtain information from the local school district concerning the
9 needs of the student and shall prepare an Individualized Education Plan for each student admitted. All parents applying for admission
10 of their children must sign a statement certifying that they feel the South Carolina School for the Deaf and the Blind is the most
11 appropriate placement which constitutes the least restrictive environment for the individual student, based upon needs identified in
12 the placement meeting and the Individualized Education Plan. The decision concerning placement and least restrictive environment
13 shall be reviewed annually at the IEP Conference.~~

14 ~~**6.4.** (SDB: Mobility Instructor Service Fee) The School for the Deaf and the Blind is authorized to charge a fee for the services
15 of a mobility instructor to provide service on a contractual basis to various school districts in the state, and such revenue shall be
16 retained and carried forward into the current fiscal year and expended by the School for the purpose of covering expenses in the
17 Blind School.~~

18 **6.5.** (SDB: Cafeteria Revenues) All revenues generated from cafeteria operations may be retained and expended by the institution
19 for the purpose of covering actual expenses in cafeteria operations.

20 **6.6.** (SDB: School Buses) The school buses of the South Carolina School for the Deaf and the Blind are authorized to travel at
21 the posted speed limit.

22 ~~**6.7.** (SDB: USDA Federal Grants) All revenues generated from USDA federal grants may be retained and expended by the
23 SCSSDB in accordance with Federal regulations for the purpose of covering actual expenses in the cafeteria/food service operations
24 of the school.~~

25 **6.8.** (SDB: By-Products Revenue Carry Forward) The School for the Deaf and the Blind is authorized to sell goods that are
26 by-products of the school's programs and operations, charge user fees and fees for services to the general public: individuals,
27 organizations, agencies and school districts, and such revenue may be retained and carried forward into the current fiscal year and
28 expended for the purpose of covering expenses of the school's programs and operations.

29 **6.9.** (SDB: Deferred Salaries Carry Forward) South Carolina School for the Deaf and the Blind is authorized to carry forward in
30 the current fiscal year the amount of the deferred salaries and employer contributions earned in the prior fiscal year for non-twelve
31 month employees. These deferred funds are not to be included or part of any other authorized carry forward amount.

32 **6.10.** (SDB: Sale of Property) After receiving approval from the Department of Administration or State Fiscal Accountability
33 Authority for the sale of property, the school may retain revenues associated with the sale of property titled to or utilized by the
34 school. These funds shall be expended on capital improvements approved by the Joint Bond Review Committee and the State Fiscal
35 Accountability Authority. For the current fiscal year, the school is authorized to use the retained revenue from the sale of donated
36 property for educational and other operating purposes.

1 **6.11.** (SDB: USC-Upstate Visual Impairment Master of Education Program) Of the funds appropriated to the South Carolina
2 School for the Deaf and the Blind, \$50,000 shall be used to fund the Master of Education Program In Visual Impairment at the
3 University of South Carolina - Upstate.

4 **6.12.** (SDB: Educational Program Initiatives) The School for the Deaf and Blind is authorized to utilize funds received from the
5 Department of Education for vocational equipment on educational program initiatives.

6 **6.13.** (SDB: School Leave Policy) The School for the Deaf and Blind is authorized to promulgate administrative policy
7 governing annual and sick leave relative to faculty and staff with the approval of the School’s board of directors. This policy shall
8 address the school calendar in order to comply with the instructional needs of students attending the school.

9 **6.14.** (SDB: Buildings) ~~For the current fiscal year, the South Carolina School for the Deaf and Blind will be subject to the same~~
10 ~~requirements as a local education agency for the purposes of building renovation and construction.~~

11 **6.15.** (SDB: Early Childhood Center) The School for the Deaf and the Blind shall be authorized to redirect and transfer the
12 \$500,000 appropriated for the Thackston Hall Roof Replacement in Act 91 of 2015 by Proviso 118.14(B)(5)(a) to the Early
13 Childhood Center Construction project.

14
15 **SECTION 7 - L120 - JOHN DE LA HOWE SCHOOL**

16
17 **7.1.** (JDLHS: Status Offender Carry Forward) Unexpended status offender funds distributed to John de la Howe School from the
18 Department of Education may be carried forward and used for the same purpose.

19 **7.2.** (JDLHS: Campus Private Residence Leases) John de la Howe School is authorized to lease, to its employees, private
20 residences on the agency’s campus. Funds generated may be retained and used for general operating purposes including, but not
21 limited to, maintenance of the residences.

22 **7.3.** (JDLHS: Deferred Salaries Carried Forward) John de la Howe School is authorized to carry forward into the current fiscal
23 year the amount of deferred salaries and employer contributions earned in the prior fiscal year for non-twelve month employees.
24 These deferred funds are not to be included or part of any other authorized carry forward amount.

25 **7.4.** (JDLHS: Reduction in Force Carry Forward) John de la Howe School is authorized to carry forward into the current fiscal
26 year unexpended personal service funds resulting from the reduction in force implemented in August 2018. These funds shall be
27 used for deferred maintenance and renovation of agency assets.

28
29 **SECTION 8 - H670 - EDUCATIONAL TELEVISION COMMISSION**

30
31 **8.1.** (ETV: Grants/Contributions Carry Forward) The Educational Television Commission shall be permitted to carry forward
32 any funds derived from grant awards or designated contributions and any state funds necessary to match such funds, provided that
33 these funds be expended for the programs which they were originally designated.

34 **8.2.** (ETV: Spectrum Auction) The Educational Television Commission shall be authorized to receive and retain up to
35 \$35,000,000 of the proceeds from the Federal Communication Commission TV Auction and place them in a segregated, restricted
36 account. These proceeds shall be used to fund capital needs, including broadcast industry standards changes, existing equipment

1 repair, maintenance and replacement needs, and operational costs. Unexpended funds shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal
2 year into the current fiscal year and used for the same purpose. No later than June thirtieth of the current fiscal year, ETV must
3 report to the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee and the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee the amount of
4 money expended from the fund and the balance of the fund.

5 **8.3.** (ETV: Antenna and Tower Placement) All leases for antenna and tower operations within institutions of higher learning
6 campuses must conform to master plans for such property, as determined solely by the institution of higher learning.

7 **8.4.** (ETV: Wireless Communications Tower) The Educational Television Commission is directed to coordinate tower and
8 antenna operations within South Carolina state government. The commission shall (1) approve all leases regarding antenna placement
9 on state-owned towers and buildings, (2) coordinate all new tower construction on state-owned property, (3) promote and market
10 excess capacity on the State's wireless communications infrastructure, (4) generate revenue by leasing, licensing, or selling excess
11 capacity on the State's wireless communications infrastructure, and (5) construct new communications assets on appropriate
12 state-owned property for the purpose of generating revenue pursuant to this proviso. The commission shall retain and expend such
13 funds for agency operations. The commission shall be authorized to carry forward unexpended funds from the prior fiscal year into
14 the current fiscal year. The commission shall annually report to the Chairmen of the Senate Finance and House Ways and Means
15 Committees by October first of each year all revenue collected and disbursed.

16 **8.5.** (ETV: Delineate Agency Funding) ~~In order to foster increased transparency and accountability, with the funds appropriated~~
17 ~~to the Educational Television Commission, the commission is directed to work with the Executive Budget Office to delineate the~~
18 ~~agency's funding by line items in the General Appropriations Bill beginning with the Governor's budget submission in the fall of~~
19 ~~the current fiscal year. The commission and the Executive Budget office are also directed to identify any provisos that would need~~
20 ~~to be adjusted and request changes to the Governor, Chairman of House Ways and Means Committee and Chairman of the Senate~~
21 ~~Finance Committee by November 30 of the current fiscal year.~~

22 SECTION 11 - H030 - COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION

23
24
25 **11.1.** (CHE: Contract for Services Program Fees) The amounts appropriated in this section for "Southern Regional Education
26 Board Contract Programs" and "Southern Regional Education Board Dues" are to be used by the commission to pay to the Southern
27 Regional Education Board the required contract fees for South Carolina students enrolled under the Contract for Services program
28 of the Southern Regional Education Board, in specific degree programs in specified institutions and the Southern Regional Education
29 Board membership dues. The funds appropriated may not be reduced to cover any budget reductions or be transferred for other
30 purposes.

31 **11.2.** (CHE: African-American Loan Program) Of the funds appropriated to the Commission on Higher Education for the
32 African-American Loan Program, 73.7 percent shall be distributed to South Carolina State University and 26.3 percent shall be
33 distributed to Benedict College, and must be used for a loan program with the major focus of attracting African-American males to
34 the teaching profession. The Commission of Higher Education shall act as the monitoring and reporting agency for the
35 African-American Loan Program. Of the funds allocated according to this proviso, no more than ten percent shall be used for
36 administrative purposes.

1 **11.3.** (CHE: GEAR-UP) Funds appropriated for GEAR-UP shall be used for state grants programs to reach disadvantaged
2 middle school students to improve their preparation for college. Eligible South Carolina public schools and public institutions of
3 higher education shall cooperate with the Commission on Higher Education in the provision of services under the Gaining Early
4 Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR-UP) grant.

5 **11.4.** (CHE: EPSCoR Committee Representation) With the intent that the four-year teaching institutions receive a portion of
6 EPSCoR funding, the State EPSCoR Committee shall have an executive committee consisting of one representative from each of the
7 research institutions and one representative from the four-year teaching university sector.

8 **11.5.** (CHE: SREB Funds Exempt From Budget Cut) In the calculation of any across the board cut mandated by the Executive
9 Budget Office or General Assembly, the amount which the Commission on Higher Education is appropriated for Southern Regional
10 Education Board (SREB) Professional Scholarship Programs and Fees, Dues and Assessments shall be excluded from the
11 Commission on Higher Education's base budget. Funds appropriated for SREB programs may be carried forward into the current
12 fiscal year and expended for the same purpose by the Commission on Higher Education.

13 **11.6.** (CHE: Performance Improvement Pool Allocation) Of the funds appropriated to the Commission on Higher Education
14 under Section II. Other Agencies & Entities: Special Items: Performance Funding, eighty percent will be allocated to the EPSCoR
15 program under the Commission on Higher Education to improve South Carolina's research capabilities and twenty percent will be
16 allocated to support the management education programs of the School of Business at South Carolina State University.

17 **11.7.** (CHE: Troop-to-Teachers) Members of the Armed Forces either active-duty, retired, or separated who are admitted to and
18 enrolled in the South Carolina Troop-to-Teachers Alternative Route to Certification program are entitled to pay in-state rates at
19 participating state institutions for requisite program work.

20 **11.8.** (CHE: Need-Based Grants for Foster Youth) For the current academic year, youth in the custody of the Department of
21 Social Services and attending a higher education institution in South Carolina are eligible for additional need-based grants funding
22 of up to \$2,000 above the \$2,500 maximum. Foster youth must apply for these funds no later than May first, of the preceding year.
23 All other grants, both state and federal, for which these foster youth are eligible must be applied first to the cost of attendance prior
24 to using the additional need-based grant funding. If the cost of attendance for a foster youth is met with other grants and scholarships,
25 then no additional need-based grant may be used. The Department of Social Services, in cooperation with the Commission on Higher
26 Education will track the numbers of recipients of this additional need-based grant to determine its effectiveness in encouraging more
27 foster youth to pursue a secondary education. No more than \$100,000 may be expended from currently appropriated need-based
28 grants funding for this additional assistance.

29 **11.9.** (CHE: Tuition Age) For the current fiscal year, the age limitation for those children of certain war veterans who may be
30 admitted to any state-supported college, university, or post high school technical education institution free of tuition is suspended for
31 eligible children that successfully appeal the Division of Veterans Affairs on the grounds of a serious extenuating health condition.

32 **11.10.** (CHE: LIFE and Palmetto Fellows Enhancement Stipends) In the current fiscal year before fall awards are made, to
33 continue eligibility for LIFE and Palmetto Fellows Enhancement Stipends, students shall certify and the institutions shall verify that
34 the student is meeting all requirements as stipulated by the policies established by the institution and the academic department to be
35 enrolled as a declared major in an eligible program and is making academic progress toward completion of the student's declared

1 eligible major. These determinations are subject to the verification and audit of the Commission on Higher Education. Institutions
2 shall return funds determined to have been awarded to ineligible students.

3 **11.11.** (CHE: SmartState) The Commission on Higher Education is prohibited from expending any source of funds on the
4 marketing of the SmartState Program.

5 **11.12.** (CHE: College Transition Need-Based Grants) Of the currently appropriated need-based grants funding, no more than
6 \$350,000 shall be used to provide need-based grants to South Carolina resident students enrolled at a public institution of higher
7 education in an established college transition program that serves students with intellectual disabilities. The Commission on Higher
8 Education shall allocate the available funds to eligible institutions on the basis of student need and enrollment in the established
9 college transition programs. All other grants and gift aid for which these students are eligible must be applied first to the cost of
10 attendance prior to using the need-based grant funding. If the cost of attendance for an eligible student is met with all other grants
11 and gift aid, the need-based grant shall not be used. The participating institutions, in cooperation with the Commission on Higher
12 Education, shall track the number of grant recipients and other information determined necessary to evaluate the effectiveness of
13 these grants in assisting students with intellectual disabilities in college transition programs.

14 **11.13.** (CHE: Scholarship Awards) A student may receive a Palmetto Fellows or LIFE scholarship award during the summer, in
15 addition to fall and spring semesters of an academic year, provided continued eligibility requirements are met as of the end of the
16 spring semester. Students must enroll full-time, which for purposes of the summer award will require enrollment in at least twelve
17 hours over the course of the summer. The summer is defined as the period between the end of the spring term and prior to the
18 opening of the fall term. The total summer award per student may not exceed half of the allowable academic year award up to the
19 cost of attendance and must be reimbursed if less than twelve hours for academic credit are not attempted by the student during
20 summer sessions. If awarded in the summer, a student's total award during his or her enrollment may not exceed the amount that
21 would otherwise be provided under current semester limits applied for the scholarship awards. The Commission on Higher Education
22 may provide additional guidelines necessary to ensure uniform implementation.

23 **11.14.** (CHE: Other Funded FTE Revenue) When institutions of higher learning request additional other funded full-time
24 equivalent positions, the Executive Budget Office shall inform the Commission on Higher Education of its decision regarding the
25 request and whether or not sufficient revenues exist to fund the salary and fringe benefits for the positions.

26 **11.15.** (CHE: Abatements) By November first of each year, state supported institutions of higher learning must submit to the
27 Commission on Higher Education the total number of out-of-state undergraduate students during the prior fiscal year that received
28 abatement of rates pursuant to Section 59-112-70 of the 1976 Code as well as the total dollar amount of the abatements received.
29 The report must include the geo-origin of the student, class of the student, comprehensive listing of all financial awards received by
30 the student, number of semesters the student has received the abated rate, as well as the athletic status of the student. The report
31 must also include the calculation method used to determine the abatement amount awarded to students as well as the number of
32 students that received educational fee waivers pursuant to Section 59-101-620. The Commission on Higher Education is directed to
33 compile the information received from the state-supported institutions of higher learning into a comprehensive report and submit
34 such report to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee by
35 January fifth each year.

1 **11.16.** (CHE: Outstanding Institutional Debt) By November first, institutions of higher learning must submit to the Chairman of
2 the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and the Commission on Higher Education,
3 or its successor entity, data on all outstanding institutional debt for their respective institution. Data shall include, but not be limited
4 to, the amount of the initial debt, year in which the debt was incurred, the year in which the debt will be satisfied, the repayment
5 schedule, and the purpose for which the debt was incurred.

6 **11.17.** (CHE: Longitudinal Data Reports) By December first each year, the Commission on Higher Education is directed to
7 provide a report to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee on
8 tuition and required fee trends submitted to the commission by the state's public colleges and universities. The baseline of the report
9 must be the most recent fall semester compared to the previous five fall semesters. The commission shall also provide comparable
10 data and trends for and among SREB states for the same period of time. For the same time periods noted above, the commission
11 shall also calculate in the report the level of recurring base state operating funding received by each college and university as
12 measured on an in-state student basis as well as the average of such funding provided in each SREB state. In addition, for the same
13 time periods noted above, the commission shall also provide in the report a calculation of the level of recurring and/or non-recurring
14 funding provided by the state to each college and university for capital related needs, including facilities and/or equipment related
15 capital funding, as measured on an in-state student basis as well as the average of such funding provided in each SREB state.

16 **11.18.** (CHE: Suspend Governor's Professor of the Year Award) The requirements of Section 59-104-220 of the 1976 Code
17 pertaining to the Governor's Professor of the Year Award shall be suspended for Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20.

18 **11.19.** (CHE: Prohibition of Discriminatory Practices) (A) In the current fiscal year and from the funds appropriated to the
19 Commission on Higher Education, the commission shall print and distribute to all South Carolina public colleges and universities
20 the definition of anti-Semitism.

21 (B) For purposes of this proviso, the term "definition of anti-Semitism" includes:

22 (1) a certain perception of Jews, which may be expressed as hatred toward Jews. Rhetorical and physical manifestations of
23 anti-Semitism are directed toward Jewish or non-Jewish individuals and/or their property, toward Jewish community institutions and
24 religious facilities;

25 (2) calling for, aiding, or justifying the killing or harming of Jews;

26 (3) making mendacious, dehumanizing, demonizing, or stereotypical allegations about Jews as such or the power of Jews
27 as a collective;

28 (4) accusing Jews as a people of being responsible for real or imagined wrongdoing committed by a single Jewish person or
29 group, the state of Israel, or even for acts committed by non-Jews;

30 (5) accusing the Jews as a people, or Israel as a state, of inventing or exaggerating the Holocaust;

31 (6) accusing Jewish citizens of being more loyal to Israel, or to the alleged priorities of Jews worldwide, than to the interest
32 of their own nations;

33 (7) using the symbols and images associated with classic anti-Semitism to characterize Israel or Israelis;

34 (8) drawing comparisons of contemporary Israeli policy to that of the Nazis;

35 (9) blaming Israel for all inter-religious or political tensions;

36 (10) applying double standards by requiring of it a behavior not expected or demanded of any other democratic nation;

- 1 (11) multilateral organizations focusing on Israel only for peace or human rights investigations; and
2 (12) denying the Jewish people their right to self-determination, and denying Israel the right to exist, provided, however, that
3 criticism of Israel similar to that leveled against any other country cannot be regarded as anti-Semitic.
4 (C) South Carolina public colleges and universities shall take into consideration the definition of anti-Semitism for purposes of
5 determining whether the alleged practice was motivated by anti-Semitic intent when reviewing, investigating, or deciding whether
6 there has been a violation of a college or university policy prohibiting discriminatory practices on the basis of religion.
7 (D) Nothing in this proviso may be construed to diminish or infringe upon any right protected under the First Amendment to the
8 Constitution of the United States or Section 2, Article I of the South Carolina Constitution, 1895.

23 SECTION 20 - H450 - UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH CAROLINA
24

25 **20.1.** (USC: Palmetto Poison Center) Of the funds appropriated or authorized herein, the University of South Carolina shall
26 expend at least \$150,000 on the Palmetto Poison Center.

27 **20.2.** (USC: School Improvement Council) Of the funds appropriated to the University of South Carolina Columbia Campus,
28 \$100,000 shall be used for the School Improvement Council.

29 **20.3.** (USC: ~~Child Abuse~~ *South Carolina Children's Advocacy Medical Response Program System*) Of the funds appropriated
30 to the University of South Carolina School of Medicine, not less than ~~\$2,075,000~~ *\$3,200,000* shall be expended for the ~~Child Abuse~~
31 ~~and Neglect~~ *South Carolina Children's Advocacy Medical Response Program System*. In addition, when instructed by the Executive
32 Budget Office or the General Assembly to reduce funds by a certain percentage, the university may not reduce the funds for the ~~Child~~

6 Area Health Education Consortium physician recruitment office. The costs associated with administering this program are to be paid
7 from the funds appropriated to the Rural Dentist Program and shall not exceed four percent of the appropriation. The Medical
8 University of South Carolina is responsible for the fiscal management of funds to ensure that state policies and guidelines are adhered
9 to. MUSC shall be permitted to carry forward unspent general funds appropriated to the Rural Dentist program provided that these
10 funds be expended for the program for which they were originally designated. A board is created to manage and allocate these funds
11 to insure the location of licensed dentists in rural areas of South Carolina and on the faculty of the College of Dental Medicine at
12 MUSC. The board will be composed of the following: the Dean, or his designee, of the MUSC College of Dental Medicine; three
13 members from the South Carolina Dental Education Foundation Board who represent rural areas; and the President, or his designee,
14 of the South Carolina Dental Association. The Director of DHEC's Office of Primary Care; the Director or his designee of the
15 Department of Health and Human Services; and the Executive Director of the South Carolina Dental Association shall serve as ex
16 officio members without vote. This board shall serve without compensation.

17 **23.2.** (MUSC: Rural Access Plan) The MUSC Hospital Authority, in conjunction with the Department of Health and Human
18 Services, shall study how to partner with existing rural hospitals *and other entities* to ensure that these regions maintain access to
19 medical care.

20 **23.3.** (MUSC: Bulk Purchasing) The Medical University of South Carolina is authorized to partner with the Medical University
21 Hospital Authority to joint purchase on contracts in order to achieve cost savings. The procurement authorization shall not include
22 telecommunications and telecommunications equipment and service which are subject to the provisions of Section 1-11-430 of the
23 1976 Code, and to applicable provisions of the consolidated procurement code. Additionally, the Medical University of South
24 Carolina and the Medical University Hospital Authority may not construct, own, or operate a network that carries commercial
25 traffic, commercial internet traffic, or K-12 traffic originated in South Carolina. The Medical University of South Carolina must
26 issue a detailed report on any cost savings to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways
27 and Means Committee by June 30, 2020.
28

29 **SECTION 25 - H590 - STATE BOARD FOR TECHNICAL AND COMPREHENSIVE EDUCATION**
30

31 **25.1.** (TEC: Training of New & Expanding Industry) (A) Notwithstanding the amounts appropriated in this section for readySC
32 it is the intent of the General Assembly that the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education expend the funds necessary
33 to provide direct training for new and expanding business or industry.

34 (B) In the event projected expenditures are above the appropriation, the appropriation in this section for readySC may be
35 appropriately adjusted, if and only if, the Executive Budget Office determines that the projected expenditures are directly related to:

1 (1) an existing technology training program where the demand for the program exceeds the program's capacity and the
2 additional funds are to be utilized to meet the demand; or

3 (2) a new program is necessary to provide direct training for new or expanding business or industry.

4 (C) The adjustment may occur only upon approval by the Executive Budget Office. Upon the Executive Budget Office's approval
5 of the adjustment, the Director of the Executive Budget Office must certify, in writing, that the adjustment is directly related to either
6 subsection (B)(1) or (B)(2). The Director must immediately provide a copy of the written certification, including the amount of the
7 adjustment, to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Chairman of the Senate
8 Finance Committee, and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

9 (D) Upon the Director's written certification approving an adjustment, the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive
10 Education must submit a statement to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the
11 Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee containing a detailed
12 itemization of the manner in which funds initially appropriated for technology training were utilized, the specific purpose for the
13 adjustment, and the ultimate recipient of the adjusted amount.

14 (E) The aggregate amount of all adjustments made pursuant to this section may not exceed ten million dollars.

15 (F) In the event that projected expenditures for readySC exceed the amounts appropriated and the amount of any adjustments
16 authorized, the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education may request a supplemental appropriation from the General
17 Assembly.

18 **25.2.** (TEC: Training of New & Expanding Industry Carry Forward) In addition to the funds appropriated in this section, any of
19 the funds appropriated under this section for the prior fiscal year which are not expended during that fiscal year may be carried
20 forward and expended for direct training of new and expanding industry in the current fiscal year.

21 **25.3.** (TEC: Training of New & Expanding Industry - Payments of Prior Year Expenditures) The State Board for Technical and
22 Comprehensive Education may reimburse business and industry for prior year training costs billed to the agency after fiscal year
23 closing with the concurrence of the Comptroller General.

24 **25.4** (TEC: Critical Statewide Workforce Needs) Of the funds appropriated in this act to the State Board for Technical and
25 Comprehensive Education for E&G STEM Programs: Critical Needs Workforce Development Initiative, the State Board must
26 allocate the funds between the colleges based on a methodology designed to best meet the state's workforce needs and demands.
27 This methodology should be created by the State Board in consultation with the Department of Commerce and the Department of
28 Employment and Workforce and should identify the areas with the most critical need. For this purpose, critical need shall be defined
29 as unmet employment demand in areas or fields of Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics, and Manufacturing. Funds must
30 be used by the college for STEM programs.

31 **25.5.** (TEC: Aeronautics Training Center) Funds appropriated for the S.C. Aeronautics Training Center may be carried forward
32 from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and utilized for the same purpose.

33 **25.6.** (TEC: Workforce Pathways Funding Distribution) ~~Of the funds appropriated to the State Board for Technical and~~
34 ~~Comprehensive Education (board) for the Workforce Pathways Program, the board must first distribute \$740,000 to Tri-County~~
35 ~~Technical College and \$602,000 to Central Carolina Technical College in order for each school to maintain operations of the existing~~
36 ~~Workforce Pathways programs established pursuant to Act 286 of 2014. Of the remaining funds after accounting for the allocations~~

1 noted above, the board shall separately distribute \$350,000 to Orangeburg Calhoun Technical College for expansion of its
2 professional truck driving certificate program for the express purpose of increasing the number of professional truck drivers in the
3 State.

4 Any remaining funds shall be set aside in a separate and distinct account until a formula for distribution is developed by the State
5 Board. The formula shall specify criteria for the Workforce Pathways program that each technical school must adhere to in order to
6 receive their respective share of the set aside funding. At a minimum, each Workforce Pathways program must expand current best
7 practices in technical career pathways for youth and unemployed or underemployed adults leading to immediate employment in high
8 skill, high demand jobs with emphasis in STEM fields. The program shall utilize all credit and non credit delivery systems within
9 the technical college, include cohort training options for adults, provide dual credit for youth via college courses taught by college
10 faculty, provide opportunities for prior learning credit for adults, include structured work based learning or other apprenticeship
11 training approaches, and result in industry recognized work certifications as well as stackable postsecondary credentials. Workforce
12 Pathways programs shall establish or build on existing collaborative design and coordination efforts with area school districts and
13 career centers and with area employers. All technical colleges receiving funding through the Workforce Pathways must provide
14 comprehensive evaluation and reporting mechanisms that include long range tracking of individual and economic impacts as well as
15 return on investment analyses.

16 The State Board shall report the formula for distribution and required criteria to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee
17 and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee by August 31, 2018.

18 **25.7.** (TEC: York Tech Fund Repurpose) The \$900,000 appropriated in Act No. 284 of 2016, by Proviso 118.16, Item (23)(bb)
19 to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education for the York Technical College Health and Human Service Building
20 and the \$5,600,000 appropriated in Act 25 of 2016, Section 1, Item (37) to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive
21 Education for the York Technical College Health and Human Service Building shall be redirected to be used for Campus Loop Road
22 Completion and K Building Renovations. Unexpended funds may be carried forward into the current fiscal year to be expended for
23 Campus Loop Road Completion and K Building Renovations.

24 **25.8.** (TEC: Florence Darlington Fund Repurpose) Funds remaining of the \$1,000,000 appropriated in Act No. 91 of 2015, by
25 proviso 118.14, Item (B)(19)(f) to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education for the Florence-Darlington
26 Technical College - Academic and Workforce Development Building, the \$3,500,000 appropriated in Act No. 284 of 2016, by proviso
27 118.16, Item (B)(23)(j) to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education for the Florence-Darlington Technical
28 College - Academic Building, and the \$2,000,000 appropriated in Act No. 285 of 2016, Section 1, Item (24) to the State Board for
29 Technical and Comprehensive Education for the Florence-Darlington Technical College Academic Building shall be redirected to
30 be used for campus renovations and improvements. Unexpended funds may be carried forward to be expended for the same purpose.

31 **25.9.** (TEC: Denmark Technical Flight Training School Study) Of the funds appropriated to the State Board for Technical and
32 Comprehensive Education in Fiscal Year 2019-20, the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education in conjunction with
33 the Commission on Higher Education shall study the feasibility of creating a flight training school curriculum at Denmark Technical
34 College. Included in the study shall be the potential economic impact on the community, the number of students the program may
35 serve, and other relevant findings. The committee shall submit their findings in a report to the Chairman of the House Ways and
36 Means Committee and the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee by November 1, 2019.

1 25.10. (TEC: Health Science Capital Project) Funds remaining of the \$3,500,000 appropriated in Act No. 285 of 2016, Section
2 1, Item (31) to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education for the Technical College of the Lowcountry - New River
3 Workforce Development Center shall be redirected to be used for the Health Science capital project at the Technical College of the
4 Lowcountry - Beaufort campus. Unexpended funds may be carried forward to be expended for the Health Science capital project.

5 25.11. (TEC: Tech Awareness and Education) Of the funds appropriated to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive
6 Education, \$500,000 shall be used to enhance the perception of technical education and the opportunities it can afford South
7 Carolinians across the state. Prior to utilizing these funds for this purpose, the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive
8 Education shall be required to obtain a 2:1 private entity match. The funds shall be used to develop and implement a comprehensive
9 awareness and education campaign. The State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education shall submit a report by June
10 30th of the current fiscal year to the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee. This report shall include
11 information on the proposed expenditure of funds and outcome measures.

12 25.12. (TEC: Northeastern Tech Repurpose) The \$3,500,000 appropriated in Act No. 284 of 2016, by Proviso 118.16, Item
13 (B)(23)(n) to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education for the Northeastern Technical College - Instructional
14 Building shall be redirected to be used to construct and renovate space for critical industry training. Unexpended funds may be
15 carried forward and expended for the same purpose.

16 SECTION 26 - H790 - DEPARTMENT OF ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

17
18
19 **26.1.** (AH: Use of Proceeds) The proceeds of facilities rentals, gift shop operations, training sessions, sales of publications,
20 reproductions of documents, repair of documents, research fees, handling charges, and the proceeds of sales of National Register of
21 Historic Places certificates and plaques by the Archives Department shall be deposited in a special account in the State Treasury, and
22 may be used by this department to cover the cost of facility operations and maintenance, gift shop inventory, additional training
23 sessions, publication, reproduction expenses, repair expenses, and National Register of Historic Places certificates and plaques, and
24 selected Historic Preservation Grants.

25 **26.2.** (AH: Disposal of Materials) For the current fiscal year, the Department of Archives and History, upon prior approval of the
26 commission, may sell from its collections certain record and non-record materials, which are not eligible for public auction, in a
27 manner most advantageous to the department.

28 SECTION 27 - H870 - STATE LIBRARY

29
30
31 **27.1.** (LIB: Aid to Counties Libraries Allotment) The amount appropriated in this section for "Aid to County Libraries" shall be
32 allotted to each county on a per capita basis according to the official United States Census For 2010, as aid to the County Library. No
33 county shall be allocated less than ~~\$75,000~~ *\$100,000* under this provision. To receive this aid, local library support shall not be less
34 than the amount actually expended for library operations from local sources in the second preceding year.

35 **27.2.** (LIB: Information Service Fees) The State Library may charge a fee for costs associated with information delivery and
36 retain such funds to offset the costs of maintaining, promoting and improving information delivery services.

1 **27.3.** (LIB: Continuing Education Fees) The State Library may charge a fee for costs associated with continuing education and
2 retain such funds to offset the costs of providing continuing education opportunities.

3 **27.4.** (LIB: Books and Materials Disposal) The State Library may sell or otherwise dispose of books and other library materials
4 that are deemed by the State Library as no longer of value to the State of South Carolina and the State Library's collection. Funds
5 received from the sale of books and materials shall be retained and expended to purchase new materials for the collection.
6 Unexpended funds may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and be used for the same purpose.

7 **27.5.** (LIB: SCLENDS) The State Library may accept money for the South Carolina Library Evergreen Network Delivery
8 System (SCLENDS), a consortium providing patrons access to more library materials. The consortium shall allow South Carolina
9 libraries the ability to share resources and provide a forum for sharing expertise in technical areas such as systems administration
10 and cataloging. Funds received by the State Library for SCLENDS shall be placed in a special account and shall only be utilized to
11 pay for items related to SCLENDS. Unexpended funds may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year
12 and be used for the same purpose.

13 **27.6.** (LIB: Donations) The State Library may accept donation funds to be used for administration, operation, and programs
14 from any donor source. Unexpended funds shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year.

15 **27.7.** (LIB: Sale of Promotional Items) The State Library shall be allowed to sell promotional items with the South Carolina
16 State Library brand and logo for the purpose of generating funds for the State Library. Unexpended funds shall be carried forward
17 from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year.

18 **27.8.** (LIB: Consortium Purchasing) The State Library shall be authorized to accept funds to be used for consortium purchasing
19 between libraries (public, academic, special) that serve South Carolina residents. Funds received by the State Library for consortium
20 purchasing agreements shall be placed in a designated account and shall only be used to pay for items related to specific consortium
21 purchasing agreements. These funds may be retained, expended, and carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal
22 year and used for the same purpose.

23 **27.9.** (LIB: Aid to City Libraries) Counties which have both county and city libraries are directed to distribute a proportional
24 share of their Aid to County Libraries funds to any city library located within their county. The amount of funds to be distributed shall
25 be determined based on the population of the city on a per capita basis according to the official United States Census for 2010.

26 SECTION 28 - H910 - ARTS COMMISSION

27
28
29 **28.1.** (ARTS: Professional Artists Contract) Where practicable, all professional artists employed by the Arts Commission in the
30 fields of music, theater, dance, literature, musical arts, craft, media arts and environmental arts shall be hired on a contractual basis
31 as independent contractors. Where such a contractual arrangement is not feasible employees in these fields may be unclassified,
32 however, the approval of their salaries shall be in accord with the provisions of Section 8-11-35 of the 1976 Code.

33 **28.2.** (ARTS: Special Revolving Account) Any income derived from Arts Commission sponsored arts events or by gift,
34 contributions, or bequest now in possession of the Arts Commission including any federal or other funds balance remaining at the
35 end of the prior fiscal year, shall be retained by the commission and placed in a special revolving account for the commission to use

1 solely for the purpose of supporting the programs provided herein. Any such funds shall be subject to the review procedures as set
2 forth in Act 651 of 1978.

3 **28.3.** (ARTS: Partial Indirect Cost Waiver) The commission is allowed to apply a fifteen percent indirect cost rate for continuing
4 federal grants for which they must compete. The commission shall apply the full approved negotiated rate to the Basic State Grant
5 and any new grants received by the commission.

6 **28.4.** (ARTS: Grants) The Arts Commission must expend seventy percent of appropriated state funds on grants to support the
7 statewide improvement of learning and enrichment opportunities for children and communities through educational and cultural
8 programs with proven research based strategies.

9 **28.5.** (ARTS: Distribution to Subdivisions) No later than December first of the current fiscal year, the Arts Commission must
10 report to the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee and the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee the amount of
11 aid/allocations distributed to subdivisions during the most recently completed fiscal year, detailed by specific subdivisions.
12

13 **SECTION 29 - H950 - STATE MUSEUM COMMISSION**

14
15 **29.1.** (MUSM: Removal From Collections) The commission may remove accessioned objects from its museum collections by
16 gift to another public or nonprofit institution, by trade with another public or nonprofit institution, by public sale, by transfer to the
17 commission's education, exhibit, or study collections or to its operating property inventory; or as a last resort, by intentional
18 destruction on the condition that the objects so removed meet with one or more of the following criteria: (1) they fall outside the
19 scope of the South Carolina Museum Commission's collections as defined in the Collection Policy; (2) they are unsuitable for
20 exhibition or research; (3) they are inferior duplicates of other objects in the collection; or (4) they are forgeries or were acquired on
21 the basis of false information; funds from the sale of such objects will be placed in a special revolving account for the commission
22 to use solely for the purpose of purchasing objects for the collections of the State Museum.

23 **29.2.** (MUSM: Museum Store) The Museum Commission shall establish and administer a museum store in the State Museum.
24 This store may produce, acquire, and sell merchandise relating to historical, scientific, and cultural sources. All profits received from
25 the sale of such merchandise shall be retained by the Museum Commission in a restricted fund to be carried forward into the following
26 fiscal year. These funds may be used for store operations, publications, acquisitions, educational programs, exhibit production and
27 general operating expenses provided that the expenditures for such expenses are approved by the General Assembly in the annual
28 Appropriation Act.

29 **29.3.** (MUSM: Retention of Revenue) The Museum Commission may retain revenue received from admissions, program fees,
30 facility rentals, professional services, donations, food service, exhibits and exhibit components, and other miscellaneous operating
31 income generated by or for the museum and may expend such revenue for general operating expenses provided that such expenditures
32 are approved by the General Assembly in the annual Appropriation Act. Any unexpended revenue from these sources may be carried
33 forward into the current fiscal year to be expended for the same purposes.

34 **29.4.** (MUSM: School Tour Fee Prohibition) The commission may not charge admission fees to groups of children from South
35 Carolina who have made reservations that are touring the museum as part of a school function.

1 **29.5.** (MUSM: Dining Area Rent) Of the space currently vacant in the Columbia Mills Building, space large enough for the
2 museum to have dining space for school-aged children shall be provided to the State Museum at no cost.

3 **29.6.** (MUSM: Remittance to General Services) The State Museum is directed to remit not less than \$1,800,000 to the
4 Department of Administration as compensation for expenses associated with the premises it leases in the Columbia Mills Building.
5 In the event the General Assembly or the Executive Budget Office implements a mid-year across-the-board budget reduction, the
6 rent that the State Museum remits to the Department of Administration shall be reduced by the same percentage as the assessed
7 budget reduction.

8
9 **SECTION 30 - H960 - CONFEDERATE RELIC ROOM AND MILITARY MUSEUM COMMISSION**

10
11 **30.1.** (CRR: Southern Maritime Collection) The Confederate Relic Room and Military Museum Commission, on behalf of the
12 Hunley Commission is authorized to expend funds appropriated for such purpose to pay the outstanding note entered into to finance
13 the purchase of the Southern Maritime Collection and the Hunley Commission will assume custody and management of the
14 Collection for the State. The commission is authorized to use up to \$500,000 of the funds transferred for implementation of this
15 proviso. The balance of the funds transferred may be used by the commission for costs associated with other Museum operations.
16 The General Assembly will provide for funds in future fiscal years to cover the costs of the financing of the Southern Maritime
17 Collection.

18
19 **SECTION 32 - H730 - DEPARTMENT OF VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION**

20
21 **32.1.** (VR: Production Contracts Revenue) All revenues derived from production contracts earned by people with disabilities
22 receiving job readiness training at the agency's Work Training Centers may be retained by the State Agency of Vocational
23 Rehabilitation and used in the facilities for Client Wages and any other production costs; and further, any excess funds derived from
24 these production contracts may be used for other operating expenses and/or permanent improvements of these facilities.

25 **32.2.** (VR: Reallotment Funds) To maximize utilization of federal funding and prevent the loss of such funding to other states
26 in the Basic Service Program, the State Agency of Vocational Rehabilitation be allowed to budget reallotment and other funds
27 received in excess of original projections in following State fiscal years.

28 **32.3.** (VR: User/Service Fees) Any revenues generated from user fees or service fees charged to the general public or other
29 parties ineligible for the department's services may be retained to offset costs associated with the related activities so as to not affect
30 the level of service for regular agency clients.

31 **32.4.** (VR: Meal Ticket Revenue) All revenues generated from sale of meal tickets may be retained by the agency and expended
32 for supplies to operate the agency's food service programs or cafeteria.

33 **32.5.** (VR: Basic Services Program - Educational Scholarships) ~~For those persons with disabilities who are eligible for and are~~
34 ~~receiving services under an approved plan of the South Carolina Vocational Rehabilitation Department (consistent with the 1973~~
35 ~~Rehabilitation Act, as amended) tuition costs at state supported institutions (four year, technical, or trade schools) will not increase~~
36 ~~beyond the 1998 tuition rate, will be provided, or will be waived by the respective institution after the utilization of any other federal~~

1 ~~or state student aid for which the student is eligible. Persons eligible for this tuition reduction or sponsorship must meet all academic~~
2 ~~requirements of the particular institution and be eligible for State need-based scholarships as defined in Chapter 142, Title 59, Code~~
3 ~~of Laws of South Carolina, 1976.~~

4 **32.6.** (VR: Deferred Maintenance, Capital Projects, Ordinary Repair and Maintenance) The Department of Vocational
5 Rehabilitation is authorized to establish an interest bearing fund with the State Treasurer to deposit funds appropriated for deferred
6 maintenance and other one-time funds from any source. After receiving any required approvals, the department is authorized to
7 expend these funds for the purpose of deferred maintenance, capital projects, and ordinary repair and maintenance. These funds may
8 be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year to be used for the same purpose.

9 **32.7.** RESERVED

10
11 **SECTION 33 - J020 - DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES**

12
13 **33.1.** (DHHS: Recoupment/Restricted Fund) The Department of Health and Human Services shall recoup all refunds and
14 identified program overpayments and all such overpayments shall be recouped in accordance with established collection policy.
15 Further, the Department of Health and Human Services is authorized to maintain a restricted fund, on deposit with the State Treasurer,
16 to be used to pay for liabilities and improvements related to enhancing accountability for future audits. The restricted fund will
17 derive from prior year program refunds. The restricted fund shall not exceed one percent of the total appropriation authorization for
18 the current year. Amounts in excess of one percent will be remitted to the general fund.

19 **33.2.** (DHHS: Long Term Care Facility Reimbursement Rate) The department, in calculating a reimbursement rate for long term
20 care facility providers, shall obtain for each contract period an inflation factor, developed by the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office.
21 Data obtained from Medicaid cost reporting records applicable to long term care providers will be supplied to the Revenue and Fiscal
22 Affairs Office. A composite index, developed by the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office will be used to reflect the respective costs
23 of the components of the Medicaid program expenditures in computing the maximum inflation factor to be used in long term care
24 contractual arrangements involving reimbursement of providers. The Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office shall update the composite
25 index so as to have the index available for each contract renewal.

26 The department may apply the inflation factor in calculating the reimbursement rate for the new contract period from zero percent
27 up to the inflation factor developed by the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office.

28 **33.3.** (DHHS: Medical Assistance Audit Program Remittance) The Department of Health and Human Services shall remit to
29 the State Auditor's Office an amount representing fifty percent (allowable Federal Financial Participation) of the cost of the Medical
30 Assistance Audit Program as established in the State Auditor's Office of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority, Section 105.
31 Such amount shall also include appropriated salary adjustments and employer contributions allocable to the Medical Assistance
32 Audit Program. Such remittance to the State Auditor's Office shall be made monthly and based on invoices as provided by the State
33 Auditor's Office of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority.

34 **33.4.** (DHHS: Third Party Liability Collection) The Department of Health and Human Services is allowed to fund the net costs
35 of any Third Party Liability and Drug Rebate collection efforts from the monies collected in that effort.

1 **33.5.** (DHHS: Medicaid State Plan) Where the Medicaid State Plan has been altered to cover services that previously were
2 provided by one hundred percent state funds, or that have been requested to be added by other state agencies, the department can bill
3 other agencies for the state share of services provided through Medicaid. In order to comply with Federal regulations regarding
4 allowable sources of matching funds, state agencies are authorized to make appropriation transfers to the Department of Health and
5 Human Services to be used as the state share when certified public expenditures are not allowed for those state agency Medicaid
6 services. The department will keep a record of all services affected and submit periodic reports to the Senate Finance and House
7 Ways and Means Committees.

8 **33.6.** (DHHS: Medically Indigent Assistance Fund) The department is authorized to expend disproportionate share funds to all
9 eligible hospitals with the condition that all audit exceptions through the receipt and expenditures of these funds are the liability of
10 the hospital receiving the funds.

11 **33.7.** (DHHS: Registration Fees) The department is authorized to receive and expend registration fees for educational, training,
12 and certification programs.

13 **33.8.** (DHHS: Fraud and Abuse Collections) The Department of Health and Human Services may offset the administrative costs
14 associated with controlling fraud and abuse.

15 **33.9.** (DHHS: Medicaid Eligibility Transfer) The South Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) is hereby
16 authorized to determine the eligibility of applicants for the South Carolina Medicaid Program in accordance with the State Plan
17 Under Title XIX of The Social Security Act Medical Assistance Program. The governing authority of each county shall provide
18 office space and facility service for this function as they do for DSS functions under Section 43-3-65.

19 With funds available to the department and by November first, the Director of the Department of Health and Human Services shall
20 provide the governing authority and the legislative delegation of each county with information on the condition of space furnished
21 for this purpose and shall specifically identify any known deficiencies with respect to the accessibility requirements of the Americans
22 with Disabilities Act (ADA). By May first, the governing authority of any county with an identified ADA-related deficiency shall
23 report to its legislative delegation and the Director of the Department of Health and Human Services on its progress in correcting
24 such deficiency.

25 **33.10.** (DHHS: Franchise Fees Suspension) Franchise fees imposed on nursing home beds and enacted by the General Assembly
26 during the 2002 session are suspended.

27 **33.11.** (DHHS: Program Integrity Efforts) The Department of Health and Human Services is instructed to expand its program
28 integrity efforts by utilizing resources both within and external to the agency including, but not limited to, the ability to contract with
29 other entities for the purpose of maximizing the department's ability to detect and eliminate provider fraud.

30 **33.12.** (DHHS: Post Payment Review) The department is directed to perform post payment reviews as permitted under Medicaid
31 regulations to ensure compliance with the Hyde Amendment provisions as it relates to the performance of medically necessary
32 services under the Medicaid program. The results of such reviews shall be available to the General Assembly upon request in a
33 format that meets the requirements of the Health Insurance Accountability and Portability Act (HIPAA) and Medicaid confidentiality
34 regulations.

35 **33.13.** (DHHS: Long Term Care Facility Reimbursement Rates) The department shall direct staff to complete and submit its
36 Medicaid State Plan Amendment for long term care facility reimbursement rates to the Director of the Department of Health and

1 Human Services by August first of each year. The director shall review the plan and submit to the Federal Government on or before
2 August fifteenth of each year provided the State Appropriations Act has been enacted by that date. All additional requests for
3 information from CMS concerning the plan shall be promptly submitted to CMS by the Department of Health and Human Services.

4 **33.14.** (DHHS: Nursing Services to High Risk/High Tech Children) The Department of Health and Human Services shall continue
5 a separate classification and compensation plan for Registered Nurses (RN) and Licensed Practical Nurses (LPN) who provide
6 services to Medically Fragile Children, who are Ventilator dependent, Respirator dependent, Intubated, and Parenteral feeding or
7 any combination of the above. The classification plan shall recognize the skill level that these nurses caring for these Medically
8 Fragile Children must have over and above normal home-care or school-based nurses.

9 **33.15.** (DHHS: CHIP Enrollment and Recertification) The Department of Health and Human Services shall enroll and recertify
10 eligible children *and households* to the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) *and/or Medicaid* and must use available state
11 agency program data including, but not limited to, that housed in the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office, ~~to include~~ the Department
12 of Social Services' Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP) and ~~the department may use the~~ poverty-related
13 information from the Department of Education. Use of this data and cooperative efforts between state agencies reduces the cost of
14 outreach and ~~maintenance of eligibility for CHIP activities.~~ *In the current fiscal year and with funds available to it, the department*
15 *shall submit to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services such waivers and/or plan amendments necessary to ensure that the*
16 *CHIP upper income limit is at least that of the average of the states within CMS Region IV and shall enroll children into the program*
17 *accordingly.*

18 **33.16.** (DHHS: Carry Forward) The Department of Health and Human Services is authorized to carry forward and expend any
19 General Fund balance and any cash balances from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year for any earmarked or restricted
20 trust and agency, or special revenue account or subfund. The department shall submit a comprehensive reporting of all cash balances
21 brought forward from the prior fiscal year. The report shall, at a minimum, for each account or subfund include the following: the
22 statutory authority that allows the funds to be carried forward, the maximum authorized amount that can be carried forward, the
23 general purpose or need for the carry forward, the specific source(s) of funding or revenue that generated the carry forward, and a
24 detailed description of any pending obligations against the carry forward. The report must be submitted to the President Pro Tempore
25 of the Senate, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Speaker of the House of Representatives, and Chairman of the House
26 Ways and Means Committee, within fifteen days after the Comptroller General closes the fiscal year.

27 **33.17.** (DHHS: Medicaid Provider Fraud) The department shall expand and increase its effort to identify, report, and combat
28 Medicaid provider fraud. The department shall publish on its' agency homepage by April first, of the current fiscal year, the results
29 of these efforts, the funds recovered, and information pertaining to prosecutions of such cases, including pleas agreements entered
30 into.

31 **33.18.** (DHHS: GAPS) The requirements of Article 5, Chapter 6, Title 44 shall be suspended for the current state fiscal year.

32 **33.19.** (DHHS: Contract Authority) The Department of Health and Human Services is authorized to contract with
33 community-based not-for-profit organizations for local projects that further the objectives of department programs. The department
34 shall develop policies and procedures and may promulgate regulations to assure compliance with state and federal requirements
35 associated with the funds used for the contracts and to assure fairness and accountability in the award and administration of these

1 contracts. The department may require a match from contract recipients. The department shall report to the Chairman of the Senate
2 Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committees on the contracts administered.

3 **33.20.** (DHHS: Medicaid Accountability and Quality Improvement Initiative) From the funds appropriated and authorized to the
4 Department of Health and Human Services, the department is authorized to implement the following accountability and quality
5 improvement initiatives:

6 (A) Healthy Outcomes Initiative - The Department of Health and Human Services may tie Disproportionate Share Hospital
7 (DSH) payments to participation in the Healthy Outcomes Initiative and may expand the program as DSH funding is available.

8 (B) To improve community health, the department may explore various health outreach, education, patient wellness and
9 incentive programs. The department may pilot health interventions targeting diabetes, smoking cessation, weight management, heart
10 disease, and other health conditions. These programs may be expanded as their potential to improve health and lower costs are
11 identified by the department.

12 (C) Rural Hospital DSH Payment - Medicaid-designated rural hospitals in South Carolina may be eligible to receive up to one
13 hundred percent of costs associated with uncompensated care as part of the DSH program. Funds shall be allocated from the existing
14 DSH program. To be eligible, rural hospitals must participate in reporting and quality guidelines published by the department and
15 outlined in the Healthy Outcomes Initiative. In addition to the requirements placed upon them by the department, rural hospitals
16 must actively participate with the department and any other stakeholder identified by the department, in efforts to design an alternative
17 health care delivery system in these regions.

18 (D) Primary Care Safety Net - The department shall implement a methodology to reimburse safety net providers participating
19 in a hospital Healthy Outcomes Initiative program to provide primary care, behavioral health services, and pharmacy services for
20 chronically ill individuals that do not have access to affordable insurance. Qualifying safety net providers are approved, licensed,
21 and duly organized Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs and other entities receiving funding under Section 330 of the Public
22 Health Services Act), Rural Health Clinics (RHCs), local alcohol and drug abuse authorities established by Act 301 of 1973, Free
23 Clinics, other clinics serving the uninsured, and Welvista. The department shall formulate a methodology and allocate \$3,600,000
24 for innovative care strategies for qualifying safety net providers. The department shall formulate a separate methodology and allocate
25 \$5,000,000 of funding to FQHCs, at least \$1,500,000 of funding for Free Clinics, and \$1,500,000 of funding for local alcohol and
26 drug abuse authorities created under Act 301 of 1973 and up to \$4,000,000 for capital improvements to the Act 301 facilities through
27 consultation with the Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services, to ensure funds are provided on a needs based approach.
28 The department may continue to develop and implement a process for obtaining encounter-level data that may be used to assess the
29 cost and impact of services provided through this proviso. Any newly established Community Health Center/FQHC shall receive an
30 amount equivalent to the average disbursement made to all centers/FQHCs.

31 (E) The department shall allocate funds to be used for obesity education for patients, reimbursement payments for providers,
32 and continuing education for all providers through partnerships with the Department.

33 (F) To be eligible for funds in this proviso, providers must provide the department with patient, service and financial data to
34 assist in the operation and ongoing evaluation of both the initiatives resulting from this proviso, and other price, quality, transparency
35 and DSH accountability efforts currently underway or initiated by the department. The Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office shall

1 provide the department with any information required by the department in order to implement this proviso in accordance with state
2 law and regulations.

3 (G) The department may pilot a behavioral health intervention program for wrap-around care to vulnerable mental health
4 patients who frequent the emergency room in hotspots and underserved areas within the state. The pilot program must provide
5 reports detailing progress on the target population and health outcomes achieved. These programs may be expanded as their potential
6 to improve health and lower costs are identified by the department.

7 (H) The department shall publish quarterly reports on the agency's website regarding the department's progress in meeting the
8 goals established by this provision.

9 **33.21.** (DHHS: Medicaid Healthcare Initiatives Outcomes) Prior to February fifteenth of the current fiscal year, the Director of
10 the Department of Health and Human Services shall make a presentation to the House Ways and Means Healthcare Budget
11 Subcommittee on the outcomes of Medicaid healthcare initiatives enacted during the current fiscal year to improve the well-being of
12 persons enrolled in the Medicaid program and receiving services from Medicaid providers.

13 **33.22.** (DHHS: Rural Health Initiative) From the funds appropriated to the Department of Health and Human Services for the
14 Rural Health Initiative in the current fiscal year, the department shall partner with the following state agencies, institutions, and other
15 key stakeholders to implement these components of a Rural Health Initiative to better meet the needs of medically underserved
16 communities throughout the state. The department may leverage any and all available federal funds to implement this initiative.
17 Recurring and non-recurring funding for the Rural Health Initiative may be carried forward by the department and expended for the
18 same purpose.

19 (A) The Department of Health and Human Services shall incentivize the development of primary care access in rural and
20 underserved areas, leverage Medicaid spending on Graduate Medical Education (GME) by implementing methodologies that support
21 recommendations contained in the January 2014 report of the South Carolina GME Advisory Group, and continue to leverage the
22 use of teaching hospitals to ensure rural physician coverage in counties with a demonstrated lack of adequate access and coverage
23 through the following provisions:

24 (1) Rural and Underserved Area Provider Capacity - the department shall partner with the University of South Carolina
25 School of Medicine to develop a statewide Rural Health Initiative to identify strategies for significantly improving health care access,
26 supporting physicians, and reducing health inequities in rural communities. In addition, the department shall also contract with the
27 MUSC Hospital Authority in the amount of \$1,000,000, and the USC School of Medicine in the amount of \$2,000,000 to further
28 develop statewide teaching partnerships. The department shall also expend \$4,000,000 in accordance with a graduate medical
29 education plan developed cooperatively by the Medical University of South Carolina, the University of South Carolina and Francis
30 Marion University.

31 (2) Rural Healthcare Coverage and Education - The USC School of Medicine, in consultation with the South Carolina
32 Office of Rural Health, shall continue to operate a Center of Excellence to support and develop rural medical education and delivery
33 infrastructure with a statewide focus, through clinical practice, training, and research, as well as collaboration with other state
34 agencies and institutions. The center's activities must be centered on efforts to improve access to care and expand healthcare provider
35 capacity in rural communities. The department shall authorize at least \$1,000,000 to support center staffing as well as the programs
36 and collaborations delivering rural health research, the ICARED program, workforce development scholarships and recruitment,

1 rural fellowships, health education development, and/or rural practice support and education. Funding released by the department
2 pursuant to this section must not be used by the recipient(s) to supplant existing resources already used for the same or comparable
3 purposes. No later than February first of the current fiscal year, the USC School of Medicine shall report to the Chairman of the
4 House Ways and Means Committee, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and the Director of the Department of Health
5 and Human Services on the specific uses of funds budgeted and/or expended pursuant to this provision.

6 (3) Rural Medicine Workforce Development - The department, in consultation with the Medical Education Advisory
7 Committee (MEAC), shall support the development of additional residency and/or fellowship slots or programs in rural medicine,
8 family medicine, and any other appropriate primary care specialties that have been identified by the department as not being
9 adequately served by existing Graduate Medical Education programs. The department shall ensure that each in-state member of the
10 Association of American Medical Colleges is afforded the opportunity to participate in MEAC. New training sites and/or residency
11 positions are subject to approval as specified by the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME). The
12 department may also accept proposals and award grants for programs designed to expose resident physicians to rural practice and
13 enhance the opportunity to recruit these residents for long-term practice in these rural and/or underserved communities. Up to
14 \$500,000 of the recurring funds appropriated to the department for the Rural Health Initiative may be used for this purpose.
15 Additionally, the department shall use up to \$200,000 of the recurring funds appropriated for the Department of Aging's Geriatric
16 Physicians Loan Forgiveness program.

17 (4) Statewide Health Innovations - At least \$2,000,000 must be expended by the department to contract with the USC
18 School of Medicine to develop and continue innovative healthcare delivery and training opportunities through collaborative
19 community engagement via ICARED and other innovative programs that provide clinical services, mental and behavioral health
20 services, children's health, OB/GYN services, and/or chronic disease coverage gaps. In consultation with the Office of Rural Health,
21 the department must ensure collaborative efforts with the greatest potential for impact are prioritized.

22 (B) The department shall continue to investigate the potential use of DSH and/or any other allowable and appropriate source
23 of funds in order to improve access to emergency medical services in one or more communities identified by the department in which
24 such access has been degraded due to a hospital's closure during the past five years.

25 (1) In the current fiscal year, the department is authorized to establish a DSH pool, or carry forward DSH capacity from
26 a previous period as federally permissible, for this purpose and/or if deemed necessary to implement transformation plans for which
27 conforming applications were filed with the department pursuant to this or a previous hospital transformation or rural health initiative
28 proviso, but for which additional negotiations or development were required. An emergency department that is established within
29 35 miles of its sponsoring hospital pursuant to this or a previous hospital transformation or rural health initiative proviso and which
30 receives dedicated funding pursuant to this proviso shall be exempt from any Department of Health and Environmental Control
31 Certificate of Need requirements or regulations. Any such facility shall participate in the South Carolina Telemedicine Network.

32 (2) The department may solicit proposals from and provide financial support for capital expenditures associated with the
33 ~~consolidation~~ replacement of two or more rural hospitals, not to exceed one-quarter of the total project capital budget ~~for the~~
34 ~~consolidation~~. Such a ~~consolidation~~ plan must be submitted by a hospital system approved to advise a rural transformation project,
35 and the ~~consolidation~~ project must be subject to ongoing advisement by the submitting facility, or subject to acquisition by the
36 advising facility. ~~At least one of the facilities subject to consolidation~~ The advised facility must be designated as a critical access

1 hospital in a county experiencing not less than four percent decrease in population between the most recent decennial censuses and
2 have been deemed eligible to participate in the rural transformation pool in a prior fiscal year. The department shall require such
3 written agreements which may require project milestone, last-dollar funding, and other stipulations deemed necessary and prudent
4 by the department to ensure proper use of the funds.

5 (C) The Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office and the Area Health Education Consortium's Office of Healthcare Workforce
6 Analysis and Planning shall provide the department with any information required by the department in order to implement this
7 proviso in accordance with state law and regulations.

8 **33.23.** (DHHS: BabyNet Compliance) With the funds available to the department, the Department of Health and Human Services
9 shall report to the Governor, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means
10 Committee no later than December 31, ~~2018~~ 2019 on the status of the department's efforts to bring the BabyNet program into
11 compliance with federal requirements. This report must specifically address areas in which the BabyNet program has received low
12 performance scores and include any relevant correspondence from the U.S. Department of Education. The report must explain the
13 department's plan for bringing BabyNet into compliance, including specific steps and the associated timeline.

14 **33.24.** *(DHHS: Personal Emergency Response System) With funds appropriated and authorized to the Department of Health and*
15 *Human Services for Fiscal Year 2019-20, the department shall develop one or more Requests for Proposals, to provide for Personal*
16 *Emergency Response Systems (PERS) to be issued to Medicaid recipients pursuant to the department's Medicaid Home and Community-*
17 *based waiver. The PERS devices must include in addition to emergency response services, unlimited twenty-four hour, seven-day a week*
18 *live phone contact with experienced registered nurses for triage services. A PERS nurse triage call center must be accredited and must*
19 *be separate from the PERS emergency response call center. The PERS device must have a wireless radio transmitter and a console that*
20 *is cellular and does not require a traditional land line. A PERS device that includes nurse triage services also must comply with the*
21 *requirements of Federal Communications Commission rules, 47 C.F.R. Part 68; and be approved by the Underwriters Laboratory or*
22 *Equipment Testing Laboratories as a health care signaling product. The Department of Health and Human Services shall apply for any*
23 *waiver necessary under the department's Medicaid Home and Community-based waiver to implement these provisions.*

24 **33.25.** *(DHHS: Family Planning Funds) The State has enacted Section 43-5-1185 of the 1976 Code that prohibits state funds,*
25 *directly or indirectly, from being utilized by Planned Parenthood for abortions, abortion services or procedures, or administrative*
26 *functions related to abortions. Having prevented Planned Parenthood from performing abortions with state funds, once the federal*
27 *injunction is lifted, the Department of Health and Human Services may not direct any federal funds to Planned Parenthood. An*
28 *otherwise qualified organization may not be disqualified from receipt of these funds because of its affiliation with an organization*
29 *that provides abortion services, provided that the affiliated organization that provides abortion services is independent of the*
30 *qualified organization. An independent affiliate that provides abortion services must be separately incorporated from any*
31 *organization that receives these funds. An organization that provides abortion services in compliance with Part 1.B., Proviso 33.12*
32 *of this act is excepted from the above restriction on state family planning funds and may receive state family planning funds.*

1 **SECTION 34 - J040 - DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONTROL**
2

3 **34.1.** (DHEC: County Health Departments Funding) Out of the appropriation provided in this section for “Access to Care,” the
4 sum of \$25,000 shall be distributed to the county health departments by the commissioner, with the approval of the Board of
5 Department of Health and Environmental Control, for the following purposes:

- 6 (1) To insure the provision of a reasonably adequate public health program in each county.
7 (2) To provide funds to combat special health problems that may exist in certain counties.
8 (3) To establish and maintain demonstration projects in improved public health methods in one or more counties in the
9 promotion of better public health service throughout the State.
10 (4) To encourage and promote local participation in financial support of the county health departments.
11 (5) To meet emergency situations which may arise in local areas.
12 (6) To fit funds available to amounts budgeted when small differences occur.

13 The provisions of this proviso shall not supersede or suspend the provisions of Section 13-7-30 of the 1976 Code.

14 **34.2.** (DHEC: County Health Units) General funds made available to the Department of Health and Environmental Control for
15 the allocation to the counties of the State for operation of county health units be allotted on a basis approved by the Board of the
16 Department of Health and Environmental Control. The amount of general funds appropriated herein for Access to Care shall be
17 allocated on a basis such that no county budget shall receive less than the amount received in the prior fiscal year, except when
18 instructed by the Executive Budget Office or the General Assembly to reduce funds within the department by a certain percentage,
19 the department may unilaterally reduce the county health units up to the stipulated percentage.

20 **34.3.** (DHEC: Camp Burnt Gin) Private donations or contributions for the operation of Camp Burnt Gin shall be deposited in a
21 restricted account. These funds may be carried forward and shall be made available as needed to fund the operation of the camp.
22 Withdrawals from this restricted account must be in accordance with approved procedures.

23 **34.4.** (DHEC: Children’s Rehabilitative Services) The Children’s Rehabilitative Services shall be required to utilize any
24 available financial resources including insurance benefits and/or governmental assistance programs, to which the child may otherwise
25 be entitled in providing and/or arranging for medical care and related services to physically handicapped children eligible for such
26 services, as a prerequisite to the child receiving such services.

27 **34.5.** (DHEC: Cancer/Hemophilia) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this act, the funds appropriated herein for
28 prevention, detection and surveillance of cancer as well as providing for cancer treatment services, \$545,449 and the hemophilia
29 assistance program, \$1,186,928 shall not be transferred to other programs within the agency and when instructed by the Executive
30 Budget Office or the General Assembly to reduce funds within the department by a certain percentage, the department may not act
31 unilaterally to reduce the funds for any cancer treatment program and hemophilia assistance program provided for herein greater than
32 such stipulated percentage.

33 **34.6.** (DHEC: Local Health Departments) Counties of the state will be relieved of contribution requirements for salary, fringe
34 benefits and travel reimbursement to local health departments. The amount of \$5,430,697 is appropriated for county health
35 department salaries, fringe benefits and travel. These funds and other state funds appropriated for county health units may, based
36 upon need, be utilized in either salary or travel categories. Each county shall provide all other operating expenses of the local health

1 department in an amount at least equal to that appropriated for operations for each county in Fiscal Year 1981. In the event any
2 county makes uniform reductions in appropriations to all agencies or departments for maintenance and operations, exclusive of
3 salaries and fringe benefits, a like reduction shall be made in funds appropriated for the operating expenses of the local health
4 department.

5 **34.7.** (DHEC: Insurance Refunds) The Department of Health and Environmental Control is authorized to budget and expend
6 monies resulting from insurance refunds for prior year operations for case services in family health.

7 **34.8.** (DHEC: Emergency Medical Services) Funds appropriated herein for Emergency Medical Services, shall be allocated for
8 the purpose of improving and upgrading the EMS system throughout the state. The monies allocated to the Counties are for the
9 purpose of improving or upgrading the local EMS system through the licensed ambulance services, the monies allocated to the EMS
10 Regional Councils are for the administration of training programs and technical assistance to local EMS organizations and county
11 systems. All additional funds are to be allocated as follows: to the counties at the ratio of eighty-one percent of the additional funds
12 appropriated herein, to the EMS Regions at a ratio of twelve percent of the additional funds appropriated herein and to the state EMS
13 Office at the ratio of seven percent of the additional funds appropriated herein. The Department of Health and Environmental Control
14 shall develop criteria and guidelines and administer the system to make allocations to each region and county within the state, based
15 on demonstrated need and local match. Funds appropriated to Emergency Medical Services shall not be transferred to other programs
16 within the department's budget. Unexpended funds appropriated to the program may be carried forward to succeeding fiscal years,
17 and *fifty percent may be* expended for administrative and operational support and for temporary and contract employees to assist
18 with duties related to improving and upgrading the EMS system throughout the state, including training of EMS personnel and
19 administration of grants to local EMS providers. *After January 1st of the current fiscal year, the remaining fifty percent of unexpended*
20 *funds carried forward shall be transferred to the South Carolina EMS Association to promote and encourage education of emergency*
21 *medical technicians and directors of emergency medical services; to collect, analyze, and distribute information about emergency*
22 *medical services; to promote the improvement of patient care; to cooperate with other organizations; and to effect more efficient*
23 *administration of emergency medical services in the State of South Carolina.* In addition, when instructed by the Executive Budget
24 Office or the General Assembly to reduce funds by a certain percentage, the department may not reduce the funds appropriated for
25 EMS Regional Councils or Aid to Counties greater than such stipulated percentage.

26 **34.9.** (DHEC: Rape Violence Prevention Contract) Of the amounts appropriated in Rape Violence Prevention, \$1,103,956 shall
27 be used to support programmatic efforts of the state's rape crisis centers with distribution of these funds based on the Standards and
28 Outcomes for Rape Crisis Centers and each center's accomplishment of a preapproved annual action plan. For the current fiscal
29 year, the department shall not reduce these contracts below the current funding level.

30 **34.10.** (DHEC: Sickle Cell Blood Sample Analysis) \$16,000 is appropriated in Independent Living for the Sickle Cell Program
31 for Blood Sample Analysis and shall be used by the department to analyze blood samples submitted by the four existing regional
32 programs - Region I, Barksdale Sickle Cell Anemia Foundation in Spartanburg; Region II, Clark Sickle Cell Anemia Foundation in
33 Columbia; Region III, Committee on Better Racial Assurance Hemoglobinopathy Program in Charleston; and the Orangeburg Area
34 Sickle Cell Anemia Foundation.

35 **34.11.** (DHEC: Sickle Cell Programs) \$761,233 is appropriated for Sickle Cell program services and shall be apportioned as
36 follows:

1 (1) sixty-seven percent is to be divided equitably between the existing Community Based Sickle Cell Programs located in
2 Spartanburg, Columbia, Orangeburg, and Charleston; and

3 (2) thirty-three percent is for the Community Based Sickle Cell Program at DHEC.

4 The funds shall be used for providing prevention programs, educational programs, testing, counseling and newborn screening.
5 The existing Community Based Sickle Cell Programs will provide counseling for families of newborns who test positive for sickle
6 cell trait or other similar blood traits upon referral from DHEC. The balance of the total appropriation must be used for Sickle Cell
7 Services operated by the Independent Living program of DHEC. The funds appropriated to the community based sickle cell centers
8 shall be reduced to reflect any percent reduction assigned to the Department of Health and Environmental Control by the Executive
9 Budget Office; provided, however, that the department may not act unilaterally to reduce the funds for the Sickle Cell program
10 greater than such stipulated percentage. The department shall not be required to undertake any treatment, medical management or
11 health care follow-up for any person with sickle cell disease identified through any neonatal testing program, beyond the level of
12 services supported by funds now or subsequently appropriated for such services. No funds appropriated for ongoing or newly
13 established sickle cell services may be diverted to other budget categories within the DHEC budget. For the current fiscal year, the
14 department shall not reduce these funds below the current funding level.

15 **34.12.** (DHEC: Genetic Services) The sum of \$104,086 appearing under the Independent Living program of this act shall be
16 appropriated to and administered by the Department of Health and Environmental Control for the purpose of providing appropriate
17 genetic services to medically needy and underserved persons. Such funds shall be used by the department to administer the program
18 and to contract with appropriate providers of genetic services. Such services will include genetic screening, laboratory testing,
19 counseling, and other services as may be deemed beneficial by the department, and these funds shall be divided equally among the
20 three Regional Genetic Centers of South Carolina, composed of units from the Medical University of South Carolina, the University
21 of South Carolina School of Medicine, and the Greenwood Genetic Center.

22 **34.13.** (DHEC: Revenue Carry Forward Authorization) The Department of Health and Environmental Control is hereby
23 authorized to collect, expend, and carry forward revenues in the following programs: Sale of Goods (confiscated goods, arm patches,
24 etc.), sale of meals at Camp Burnt Gin, sale of publications, brochures, Spoil Easement Areas revenue, performance bond forfeiture
25 revenue for restoring damaged critical areas, beach renourishment appropriations, photo copies and certificate forms, including but
26 not limited to, pet rabies vaccination certificate books, sale of listings and labels, sale of State Code and Supplements, sale of films
27 and slides, sale of maps, sale of items to be recycled, including, but not limited to, used motor oil and batteries, sale and/or licensing
28 of software products developed and owned by the Department, and collection of registration fees for non-DHEC employees. Any
29 unexpended balance carried forward must be used for the same purpose.

30 **34.14.** (DHEC: Medicaid Nursing Home Bed Days) Pursuant to Section 44-7-84(A) of the 1976 Code, the maximum number of
31 Medicaid patient days for which the Department of Health and Environmental Control is authorized to issue Medicaid nursing home
32 permits is 4,452,015.

33 **34.15.** (DHEC: Health Licensing Fee) Funds resulting from an increase in the Health Licensing Fee Schedule shall be retained
34 by the department to fund increased responsibilities of the health licensing programs. Failure to submit a license renewal application
35 or fee to the department by the license expiration date shall result in a late fee of \$75 or twenty-five percent of the licensing fee
36 amount, whichever is greater, in addition to the licensing fee. Continual failure to submit completed and accurate renewal

1 applications and/or fees by the time period specified by the department shall result in enforcement actions. The department may
2 waive any or all of the assessed late fees in extenuating circumstances, as long as it is with public knowledge.

3 **34.16.** (DHEC: Infectious Waste Contingency Fund) The Department of Health and Environmental Control is authorized to use
4 not more than \$75,000 from the Infectious Waste Contingency Fund per year for personnel and operating expenses to implement the
5 Infectious Waste Act.

6 **34.17.** (DHEC: Nursing Home Medicaid Bed Day Permit) When a Medicaid patient is transferred from a nursing home to a
7 receiving nursing home due to violations of state or federal law or Medicaid certification requirements, the Medicaid patient day
8 permit shall be transferred with the patient to the receiving nursing home, provided that the receiving nursing home is an enrolled
9 Medicaid provider that already holds Medicaid patient day permits, in which case the receiving facility shall apply to permanently
10 retain the Medicaid patient day permit within sixty days of receipt of the patient.

11 **34.18.** (DHEC: Spoil Easement Areas Revenue) The department is authorized to collect, retain and expend funds received from
12 the sale of and/or third party use of spoil easement areas, for the purpose of meeting the State of South Carolina's responsibility for
13 providing adequate spoil easement areas for the Atlantic Intracoastal Waterway in South Carolina.

14 **34.19.** (DHEC: Per Visit Rate) The SC DHEC is authorized to compensate nonpermanent, part-time employees on a fixed rate
15 per visit basis. Compensation on a fixed rate per visit may be paid to employees for whom the department receives per visit
16 reimbursement from other sources. These individuals will provide direct patient care in a home environment. The per visit rate may
17 vary based on the discipline providing the care and the geographical location of services rendered. Management may pay exempt or
18 nonexempt employees as defined by the Fair Labor Standards Act only when they are needed to work. Individuals employed in this
19 category may exceed twelve months, but are not eligible for State benefits except for the option of contributing to the State Retirement
20 System.

21 **34.20.** (DHEC: Allocation of Indirect Cost and Recoveries) The department shall continue to deposit in the general fund all
22 indirect cost recoveries derived from state general funds participating in the calculation of the approved indirect cost rate. Further
23 administration cost funded with other funds used in the indirect cost calculation may, based on their percentage, be retained by the
24 agency to support the remaining administrative costs of the agency.

25 **34.21.** (DHEC: Permitted Site Fund) The South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control may expend funds as
26 necessary from the permitted site fund established pursuant to Section 44-56-160(B)(1), for legal services related to environmental
27 response, regulatory, and enforcement matters, including administrative proceedings and actions in state and all federal courts.

28 **34.22.** (DHEC: Shift Increased Funds) The director is authorized to shift increased appropriated funds in this act to offset
29 shortfalls in other critical program areas.

30 **34.23.** (DHEC: Health Licensing Monetary Penalties) In the course of regulating health care facilities/services, the Bureau of
31 Health Facilities Licensing (BHFL) assesses civil monetary penalties against nonconforming providers. BHFL shall retain up to the
32 first \$50,000 of civil monetary penalties collected each fiscal year and these funds shall be utilized solely to carry out and enforce
33 the provisions of regulations applicable to that division. These funds shall be separately accounted for in the department's fiscal
34 records.

35 **34.24.** (DHEC: Health Facilities Licensing Monetary Penalties) In the course of regulating health care facilities and services, the
36 Bureau of Health Facilities Licensing (BHFL) assesses civil monetary penalties against nonconforming providers. BHFL shall retain

1 up to the first \$100,000 of civil monetary penalties collected each fiscal year and these funds shall be utilized solely to carry out and
2 enforce the provisions of regulations applicable to that division. These funds shall be separately accounted for in the department's
3 fiscal records. Regulations for nursing home staffing for the current fiscal year must (1) provide a minimum of one and sixty-three
4 hundredths (1.63) hours of direct care per resident per day from the non-licensed nursing staff; and (2) maintain at least one licensed
5 nurse per shift for each staff work area. All other staffing standards and non-staffing standards established in Standards for Licensing
6 Nursing Homes: R61-17, Code of State Regulations, must be enforced.

7 **34.25.** (DHEC: Radiological Health Monetary Penalties) In the course of regulating health care facilities/services, the Bureau of
8 Radiological Health (BRH) assesses civil monetary penalties against nonconforming providers. BRH shall retain up to the first
9 \$30,000 of civil monetary penalties collected each fiscal year and these funds shall be utilized solely to carry out and enforce the
10 provisions of regulations applicable to that Bureau. These funds shall be separately accounted for in the department's fiscal records.

11 **34.26.** (DHEC: Prohibit Use of Funds) The Department of Health and Environmental Control must not use any state appropriated
12 funds to terminate a pregnancy or induce a miscarriage by chemical means.

13 **34.27.** (DHEC: Meals in Emergency Operations) The cost of meals may be provided to state employees who are required to work
14 during actual emergencies and emergency simulation exercises when they are not permitted to leave their stations.

15 **34.28.** (DHEC: Compensatory Payment) In the event the President of the United States has declared a state of emergency or the
16 Governor has declared a state of emergency in a county in the State, Fair Labor Standards Act exempt employees of the department
17 may be paid for actual hours worked in lieu of accruing compensatory time, at the discretion of the agency Director, and providing
18 funds are available.

19 **34.29.** (DHEC: Beach Renourishment and Monitoring and Coastal Access Improvement) If state funds are made available or
20 carried forward from any general revenue, capital, surplus or bond funding appropriated to the department for beach renourishment
21 and maintenance, the department shall be able to expend not more than \$100,000 of these funds annually to support annual beach
22 profile monitoring. Additional funds made available or carried forward for beach renourishment projects that are certified by the
23 department as excess may be spent for beach renourishment and departmental activities that advance the policy goals contained in
24 the State Beachfront Management Plan, R.30-21.

25 **34.30.** (DHEC: South Carolina State Trauma Care Fund) Of the funds appropriated to the South Carolina State Trauma Care
26 Fund, \$2,268,885 shall be utilized for increasing the reimbursement rates for trauma hospitals, for trauma specialists' professional
27 fees, for increasing the capability of EMS trauma care providers from counties with a high rate of traumatic injury deaths to care for
28 injury patients, and for support of the trauma system, based on a methodology as determined by the department with guidance and
29 input from the Trauma Council as established in Section 44-61-530 of the South Carolina Code of Laws. The methodology to be
30 developed will include a breakdown of disbursement of funds by percentage, with a proposed seventy-six and one half percent
31 disbursed to hospitals and trauma physician fees, sixteen percent of the twenty-one percent must be disbursed to EMS providers for
32 training EMTs, Advanced EMTs and paramedics by the four regional councils of this state and the remaining five percent must be
33 disbursed to EMS providers in counties with high trauma mortality rates, and two and one half percent allocated to the department
34 for administration of the fund and support of the trauma system. The Department of Health and Environmental Control shall
35 promulgate regulations as required in Section 44-61-540 of the 1976 Code for the administration and oversight of the Trauma Care
36 Fund.

1 **34.31.** (DHEC: Pandemic Influenza) The Department of Health and Environmental Control shall assess South Carolina's ability
2 to cope with a major influenza outbreak or pandemic influenza and maintain an emergency plan and stockpile of medicines and
3 supplies to improve the state's readiness condition. The department shall report on preparedness measures to the Speaker of the
4 House of Representatives, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and the Governor by November first, each year. The department,
5 in conjunction with the Department of Health and Human Services, is authorized to establish a fund for the purpose of developing
6 an emergency supply, stockpile, and distribution system of appropriate antiviral, antibiotic, and vaccine medicines and medical
7 supplies. In the event the United States Department of Health and Human Services makes available medicines or vaccines for
8 purchase by states via federal contract or federally subsidized contract or other mechanism, the department, with Executive Budget
9 Office approval, may access appropriated or earmarked funds as necessary to purchase an emergency supply of these medicines for
10 the State of South Carolina.

11 **34.32.** (DHEC: Pharmacist Services) For the current fiscal year, provisions requiring that all department facilities distributing or
12 dispensing prescription drugs be permitted by the Board of Pharmacy and that each pharmacy have a pharmacist-in-charge are
13 suspended. Each Department of Health and Environmental Control Public Health Region shall be required to have a permit to
14 distribute or dispense prescription drugs. A department pharmacist may serve as the pharmacist-in-charge without being physically
15 present in the pharmacy. The department is authorized to designate one pharmacist-in-charge to serve more than one department
16 facility. Only pharmacists, nurses, or physicians are allowed to dispense and provide prescription drugs/products/vaccines for
17 conditions or diseases that the department treats, monitors, or investigates. In the event of a public health emergency or upon
18 activation of the strategic national stockpile, other medications may be dispensed as necessary.

19 **34.33.** (DHEC: Coastal Zone Appellate Panel) ~~The Coastal Zone Appellate Panel as delineated in Section 48-39-40 of the 1976~~
20 ~~Code under the Department of Health and Environmental Control shall be suspended for the current fiscal year.~~

21 **34.34.** (DHEC: Rural Hospital Grants) Rural Hospital Grants funds shall be allocated to public hospitals in very rural or rural
22 areas whose largest town is less than 25,000 and whose licensed bed capacity does not exceed two hundred beds. Hospitals qualifying
23 for the grants shall utilize such funds for any of the following purposes: (a) the development of preventive health programs, medical
24 homes, and primary care diversion from emergency departments; (b) expanded health services, including physician recruitment and
25 retention; (c) to improve hospital facilities; (d) activities involving electronic medical records or claims processing systems; (e) to
26 enhance disease prevention activities in diabetes, heart disease, etc; and (f) activities to ensure compliance with State or Federal
27 regulations.

28 **34.35.** (DHEC: Camp Burnt Gin) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the funds appropriated to the department pursuant
29 to Part IA, or funds from any other source, for Camp Burnt Gin must not be reduced in the event the department is required to take
30 a budget reduction.

31 **34.36.** (DHEC: Metabolic Screening) The department may suspend any activity related to blood sample storage as outlined in
32 Section 44-37-30 (D) and (E) of the 1976 Code, if there are insufficient state funds to support the storage requirements. In that event,
33 the samples may be destroyed in a scientifically appropriate manner after testing. The department shall notify providers of the
34 suspension within thirty days of its effective date.

35 **34.37.** (DHEC: Fetal Pain Awareness) (A) The department must utilize at least one hundred dollars to prepare printed materials
36 concerning information that unborn children at twenty weeks gestation and beyond are fully capable of feeling pain and the right of

1 a woman seeking an abortion to ask for and receive anesthesia to alleviate or eliminate pain to the fetus during an abortion procedure.
2 The materials must be provided to each abortion provider in the State and must be placed in a conspicuous place in each examination
3 room at the doctor's office. The materials must contain only the following information:

4 "Fetal Pain Awareness

5 An unborn child who is twenty weeks old or more is fully capable of experiencing pain. Anesthesia provided to a woman for an
6 abortion typically offers little pain prevention for the unborn child. If you choose to end your pregnancy, you have a right to have
7 anesthesia or analgesic administered to alleviate the pain to your unborn child during the abortion."

8 (B) The materials must be easily comprehensible and must be printed in a typeface large and bold enough to be clearly legible.

9 **34.38.** (DHEC: SCHIDS) From funds appropriated for Chronic Disease Prevention, the department shall establish a South
10 Carolina Health Integrated Data Services (SCHIDS) program to disseminate data about prevalence, treatment and cost of disease
11 from the South Carolina Health and Human Services Data Warehouse and in particular the Medicaid System. The purpose of the
12 program is to educate communities statewide about improving health and wellness through lifestyle changes.

13 The Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office shall provide data needed by the SCHIDS program to fulfill its mission, and all state
14 agencies and public universities involved in educating South Carolinians through public programs for the purpose of improving
15 health and wellness shall communicate with the program in order to improve collaboration and coordination and the possible use of
16 SCHIDS to assist in the evaluation of program outcomes.

17 Medicaid staff shall coordinate with the SCHIDS program staff to target Prevention Partnership Grant awards to those communities
18 demonstrating a prevalence of chronic disease and/or lack of access to care.

19 **34.39.** (DHEC: Abstinence Education Contract) For the current fiscal year, funds made available to the State of South Carolina
20 under the provisions of Title V, Section 510, may only be awarded to other entities through a competitive bidding process.

21 **34.40.** (DHEC: Immunizations) The department is authorized to utilize the funds appropriated for immunizations to hire
22 temporary personnel to address periods of high demand for immunizations at local health departments.

23 **34.41.** (DHEC: Residential Treatment Facilities Swing Beds) For Fiscal Year 2017-18 in coordination with the South Carolina
24 Health Plan and to improve access for acute psychiatric beds as patient populations demand, Residential Treatment Facilities (RTF)
25 may swing up to eighteen beds per qualifying facility to accommodate patients with a diagnosis of an acute psychiatric disorder. In
26 order to qualify to utilize swing beds a facility must meet the following criteria: the facility must currently have both licensed acute
27 psychiatric and residential treatment facility beds, the RTF beds must meet the same licensure requirements as the existing licensed
28 acute psychiatric beds, and any facility utilizing swing beds must keep the acute and RTF patient populations separate and distinct.
29 The utilization of swing beds must also comply with all federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services rules and regulations.

30 **34.42.** (DHEC: Tuberculosis Outbreak) (A) Upon discovery of a tuberculosis outbreak, the Department of Health and
31 Environmental Control may expend any funds available to the agency, for the purpose of surveillance, investigation, containment,
32 and treatment activities related thereto.

33 (B) Upon identification of a tuberculosis outbreak, the department will conduct a comprehensive contact investigation and
34 implement control measures consistent with guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. As part of the
35 investigation and control of the outbreak, the department will alert the appropriate healthcare providers and community members
36 using the most effective means available.

1 (C) Upon being informed of or having reason to suspect a case of tuberculosis that is capable of transmitting tubercle bacilli at a
2 school or child care center involving a student, teacher, employee, volunteer, or an individual working at the school or child care
3 center for an employer providing services to the school or child care center, the department immediately shall notify:

4 (1) if the case is at a school, the principal, and the Superintendent of the school district if the school is a public school; and

5 (2) if the case is at a child care center, the director of the child care center; and

6 (D) When informing the principal of a school or the director of a child care center about a known or suspected case of tuberculosis
7 that is capable of transmitting tubercle bacilli as provided for in subsection (C), the department shall provide:

8 (1) an update addressing the:

9 (a) status of the investigation, including the steps the department is taking to identify the source and extent of the
10 exposure and the risks of additional exposure; and

11 (b) steps the school or child care center must take to assist the department in controlling the spread of the tuberculosis
12 infection; and

13 (2) information and other resources to distribute to parents and guardians that discuss how to assist the department in
14 identifying and managing the tuberculosis infection.

15 **34.43.** (DHEC: Abstinence-Until-Marriage Emerging Programs) (A) From the funds appropriated to DHEC in this act as a
16 Special Item and titled "Abstinence-Until Marriage Emerging Programs" the department shall award a twelve month grant for
17 abstinence-until-marriage emerging programs. This funding shall be awarded by the department only to nonprofit 501(c)(3) agencies
18 meeting all the A-H Title V, Section 510 definitions of Abstinence Education.

19 (B) Contracts must be awarded utilizing a competitive approach in accordance with the South Carolina Procurement Code.

20 (C) Applicants must provide a budget and budget narrative to the department that explains how the funds will be used.

21 (D) Prior to application, proposed programs/curricula must be certified by the National Abstinence Education Association
22 (NAEA) as meeting and being in compliance with all of the Title V, Section 510 A-H requirements for abstinence-until-marriage
23 education programs.

24 (E) The department shall determine and develop the necessary application for awards.

25 (F) The programs implemented by the entity awarded a contract pursuant to this proviso may not violate any portion of the South
26 Carolina Comprehensive Health Education Act when implemented in a school setting. An entity that violates any portion of the
27 South Carolina Comprehensive Health Education Act must reimburse the State for all funds disbursed.

28 Organizations or individuals awarded grants must provide quarterly reports on expenditures and participation to the Department
29 of Health and Environmental Control and the Department of Social Services within fifteen days of the end of each quarter.

30 (G) Grantees failing to submit reports within thirty days of the end of each quarter will be terminated.

31 **34.44.** (DHEC: Abstinence Until Marriage Evidence-Based Programs Funding) From the monies appropriated for the
32 Continuation of Teen Pregnancy Prevention, contracts must be awarded to separate private, nonprofit 501(c)(3) entities to provide
33 Abstinence Until Marriage teen pregnancy prevention programs and services within the State that meet all of the A-H Title V, Section
34 510 definitions of Abstinence Education. Contracts must be awarded utilizing a competitive approach in accordance with the South
35 Carolina Procurement Code. Proposed programs/curricula must be certified by the National Abstinence Education Association
36 (NAEA) as meeting and being in compliance with all of the Title V, Section 510 A-H requirement for abstinence-until-marriage

1 education programs. Applicants must provide a budget for the proposed project for which the application is being made. Monies
2 will be paid over a twelve month basis for services rendered. Unexpended funds shall be carried forward for the purpose of fulfilling
3 the department's contractual agreement. The programs implemented by the entity awarded a contract pursuant to this proviso may
4 not violate any portion of the South Carolina Comprehensive Health Education Act when implemented in a school setting. An entity
5 that violates any portion of the South Carolina Comprehensive Health Education Act must reimburse the State for all funds disbursed.

6 **34.45.** (DHEC: Wave Dissipation Device) From funds appropriated to the department for the Coastal Resource Improvement
7 program, the department shall permit a Wave Dissipation Device pilot program to be initiated.

8 The deployment of a qualified wave dissipation device seaward of the setback line or baseline pursuant to a study conducted by
9 the Citadel or a research university is not construction and meets the permitting exception contained in Section 48-39-130(D)(2).
10 Prior to deploying or expanding a qualified wave dissipation device, a person proposing to deploy or expand the device must pay the
11 department a fee of ten cents per linear foot of the proposed deployment or expansion. The department may order the removal of all
12 or any portion of a qualified wave dissipation device that the department determines causes material harm to the flora, fauna, physical
13 or aesthetic resources of the area under Section 48-39-130(D)(2) of the 1976 Code.

14 A 'qualified wave dissipation device' is a device that:

- 15 (1) is placed mostly parallel to the shoreline;
- 16 (2) is designed to dissipate wave energy;
- 17 (3) is designed to minimize scouring seaward of and adjacent to the device by permitting sand to move landward and seaward
18 through the device;
- 19 (4) the horizontal panels designed to dissipate wave energy can be deployed within one-hundred twenty hours or less and can
20 be removed within one-hundred twenty hours or less;
- 21 (5) does not negatively impact or inhibit sea turtle nesting or other fauna;
- 22 (6) can be adjusted after initial deployment in response to fluctuations in beach elevations; and
- 23 (7) otherwise prevents down-coast erosion, protects property, and limits negative impacts to public safety and welfare, beach
24 access, and the health of the beach dune system.

25 **34.46.** (DHEC: Birth Center Inspections) With the funds appropriated and authorized to the Department of Health and
26 Environmental Control for this fiscal year, the department shall ensure that all licensed birth centers must register an on-call
27 agreement and any transfer policies with the Department of Health and Environmental Control. The on-call agreement shall contain
28 provisions which provide that the on-call physician, or another physician designated by the on-call physician, is readily available to
29 provide medical assistance either in person or by telecommunications or other electronic means, which means the physician must be
30 within a thirty minute drive of the birth center or hospital, must be licensed in the State of South Carolina, and have hospital admitting
31 or consulting privileges, and shall provide consultation and advice to the birth center at all times it is serving the public. Furthermore,
32 a birth center shall document in its practice guidelines and policies the ability to transfer care to an acute care hospital with obstetrical
33 and newborn services and must demonstrate this by: (A) coordinated transfer care plans, protocols, procedures, arrangements, or
34 through collaboration with one or more acute care hospitals with appropriate obstetrical and newborn services; and (B) admitting or
35 consulting privileges at one or more hospitals with appropriate obstetrical and newborn services by a birth center's consulting
36 physician. The department shall require a \$25.00 registration fee upon receipt and review of the agreements containing these

1 provisions. Acute care hospitals licensed by the department must negotiate in good faith and fair dealing effort with any birth center
2 licensed by the department within a 50 mile radius to establish a written transfer agreement pursuant to this proviso. Birth centers
3 registering on-call and transfer policies in accordance with this proviso shall be deemed by the department to be in compliance with
4 Section 44-89-60(3) of the South Carolina Code and any implementing regulations for this fiscal year.

5 **34.47.** (DHEC: Abortion Clinic Certification) Prior to January 31, 2017, a facility other than a hospital that is licensed and
6 certified by the department to perform abortions must file a report with the department that provides the number of physicians that
7 performed an abortion at the facility between July 1, 2016 and December 31, 2016, who did not have admitting privileges at a local
8 certified hospital and staff privileges to replace on-staff physicians at the certified hospital and the percentage of these physician in
9 relation to the overall number of physicians who performed abortions at the facility. The report must include a summation of any
10 abortion that resulted in an outcome which required a level of aftercare that exceeds what is customarily provided by physicians in
11 such cases in accordance with accepted medical practice and indicate whether or not the abortion was performed by a physician with
12 admitting privileges at a local certified hospital and staff privileges to replace on-staff physicians at the certified hospital. Any
13 summation of any abortion must not divulge any information that is privileged or required to be maintained as confidential by any
14 provision of law. An applicable facility must remit a twenty-five dollar filing fee to the department for the report required by this
15 provision.

16 **34.48.** (DHEC: Data Center Migration) Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Health and Environmental Control for
17 Data Center Migration, the department must utilize the Department of Administration, Division of Technology Operations for shared
18 services, including but not limited to, mainframe services, application hosting, servers, managed servers, storage, network services
19 and disaster recovery services. Unexpended funds appropriated for the data center migration may be carried forward from the prior
20 fiscal year and used for the same purpose.

21 **34.49.** (DHEC: AIDS Service Provision Program) For the current fiscal year, funds appropriated and authorized to the Department
22 of Health and Environmental Control for clinical services and medical case management shall be used to direct the department to
23 establish through contract a pilot program for the expansion of direct services to clients who are HIV positive. As part of the pilot
24 program, the department shall facilitate 340b pricing for the AIDS Healthcare Foundation by utilizing Ryan White Part B federal
25 funding to support this pilot in order to maximize the state's resources and service provision beyond its current levels. The department
26 shall require that the AIDS Healthcare Foundation provide any reports or information required by the 340b pricing program, and
27 shall provide proof of the contractual relationship between the department and the AIDS Healthcare Foundation to the Office of
28 Pharmacy Affairs at HRSA.

29 **34.50.** (DHEC: EMS Monetary Penalties) In the course of regulating Emergency Medical Services (EMS) agencies and personnel,
30 the Bureau of EMS assesses civil monetary penalties against nonconforming providers. The Bureau of EMS shall retain up to the
31 first \$40,000 of civil monetary penalties collected each fiscal year and these funds shall be utilized solely to carry out and enforce
32 the provisions of regulations applicable to that bureau. These funds shall be separately accounted for in the department's fiscal
33 records. The agency shall provide a report on how these funds are expended to the Governor, the Chairman of the Senate Finance
34 Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

35 **34.51.** (DHEC: Greenwood Sewer Extension Line) Funds remaining from the \$990,000 appropriated in Act 117 of 2007, by
36 Proviso 73.12, Item 65(S) to the Department of Health and Environmental Control for the Greenwood Sewer Extension Line shall

1 be redirected for any project on the Eagles Harbor priority list, less any outstanding expenses associated with the Greenwood Sewer
2 Extension Line. Unexpended funds may be carried forward into the current fiscal year to be expended for the same purpose.

3 **34.52.** (DHEC: Ocean Water Quality Outfall Initiative) In the current fiscal year, funds appropriated and authorized to the
4 Department of Health and Environmental Control in the department's Beach Renourishment Fund shall be made available as state
5 matching funds for Horry County Ocean Water Quality Outfall Initiatives. The department is authorized to retain and carry forward
6 these funds into the current fiscal year to be used for the same purpose. Any interest generated by the account must be credited and
7 deposited into this account, to be used as state matching funds for either local or federal funding, and utilized for Ocean Water
8 Quality Outfall Initiatives in Horry County.

9 **34.53.** RESERVED

10 **34.54.** (DHEC: Best Chance Network/Colon Cancer Prevention) Of the funds appropriated to the department for Best Chance
11 Network and Colon Cancer Prevention, the department shall utilize \$1,000,000 for the Best Chance Network and \$1,000,000 as
12 matching funds for the Colon Cancer Prevention Network.

13 **34.55.** (DHEC: Hazardous Waste Fund County Account) Funds in each county's Hazardous Waste Fund County Account must
14 be released by the State Treasurer, upon the written request of a majority of the county's legislative delegation representing the
15 economically depressed area of the county, and shall be used for infrastructure within the economically depressed area of that county.
16 For purposes of this provision the definition of "infrastructure" includes, but is not limited to, improvements for water, sewer, gas,
17 steam, electric energy, communication and other ancillary services that may be made to a building or land which are considered
18 necessary, suitable, or useful to an eligible project that has a documented impact on economic development.

19 **34.56.** (DHEC: Water Quality Initiative) ~~The department shall expend the funds remaining from appropriations to the department
20 for State Beachfront Management and Beach Renourishment in prior fiscal years as follows: \$1,000,000 to the City of Myrtle Beach
21 for the Ocean Water Quality Outfall Initiative \$1,000,000 to the City of North Myrtle Beach for the Ocean Water Quality Outfall
22 Initiative and \$187,291 to Horry County for Socastee Creek Flood Control. Unexpended funds may be carried forward from the
23 prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year to be expended for the same purpose.~~

24 **34.57.** (DHEC: HIV/AIDS Treatment and Prevention) From the funds appropriated to the Department of Health and
25 Environmental Control in the current fiscal year for HIV and AIDS prevention and treatment, the department shall develop ~~one or~~
26 ~~more~~ partnerships with providers that offer the Joseph H. Neal Health Collaborative and CAN Community Health, Inc. to provide
27 comprehensive medical, psychological and educational services to all patients, regardless of their financial situation, insurance status,
28 or ability to pay. In addition, CAN Community Health, Inc. shall develop a plan for the treatment and prevention of Hepatitis C.
29 The department shall ensure the funds are expended solely for testing, ~~and~~ treatment, and follow-up services of HIV/AIDS and
30 Hepatitis C. Funds may be used to enhance the services provided through ~~any allocation of a combination of Ryan White Part B~~
31 Grant funds and other federal funds or the state's AIDS Drug Assistance Program rebate funds.

32 **34.58.** (DHEC: State Trauma Registry) From the funds appropriated or authorized in the current fiscal year, the Department of
33 Health and Environmental Control, through the State Trauma Registry, shall direct that all state verified trauma centers are required
34 to submit relevant patient care data. The department shall develop appropriate policies or regulations no later than January 1,
35 2020, to ensure data is collected by all trauma centers.

1 34.59. (DHEC: Storm Water and Ocean Outfalls) In the current fiscal year, funds appropriated to the department for Ocean
2 Outfalls shall be distributed equally to the City of Myrtle Beach and the City of North Myrtle Beach for the purpose of storm water
3 drainage and ocean outfall construction and repair as state matching funds for Horry County Ocean Water Quality Outfall
4 Initiatives. The department shall be authorized to retain and carry forward these funds into the current fiscal year to be used for the
5 same purpose. Any interest generated by the account must be retained and deposited into this account, to be used as state matching
6 funds for either local or federal funding, and utilized for Ocean Water Quality Outfall Initiatives in Horry County.
7

8 **SECTION 35 - J120 - DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH**

9

10 **35.1.** (DMH: Patient Fee Account) The Department of Mental Health is hereby authorized to retain and expend its Patient Fee
11 Account funds. In addition to funds collected for the maintenance and medical care for patients, Medicare funds collected by the
12 department from patients' Medicare benefits and funds collected by the department from its veteran facilities shall be considered as
13 patient fees. The department is authorized to expend these funds for departmental operations, for capital improvements and debt
14 service under the provisions of Act 1276 of 1970, and for the cost of patients' Medicare Part B premiums. The department shall
15 remit \$290,963 to the General Fund, \$400,000 to the Continuum of Care, \$50,000 to the Alliance for the Mentally Ill, and \$250,000
16 to S.C. Share Self Help Association Regarding Emotions.

17 **35.2.** (DMH: Institution Generated Funds) The Department of Mental Health is authorized to retain and expend institution
18 generated funds which are budgeted.

19 **35.3.** (DMH: Alzheimer's Funding) Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Mental Health for Community Mental
20 Health Centers, \$900,000 must be used for contractual services to provide respite care and diagnostic services to those who qualify
21 as determined by the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Association. The department must maximize, to the extent feasible,
22 federal matching dollars. On or before September thirtieth of each year, the Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Association
23 must submit to the department, Governor, Senate Finance Committee, and House Ways and Means Committee an annual financial
24 statement and outcomes measures attained for the fiscal year just ended. These funds may not be expended or transferred during the
25 current fiscal year until the required reports have been received by the department, Governor, Chairman of the Senate Finance
26 Committee, and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee. In addition, when instructed by the Executive Budget
27 Office or the General Assembly to reduce funds by a certain percentage, the department may not reduce the funds transferred to the
28 Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders Association greater than such stipulated percentage.

29 **35.4.** (DMH: Crisis Intervention Training) Of the funds appropriated to the department, \$275,000 shall be utilized for the
30 National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) SC for Crisis Intervention Training (CIT).

31 **35.5.** (DMH: Uncompensated Patient Medical Care) There is created an Uncompensated Patient Care Fund to be used by the
32 department for medical costs incurred for patients. These funds may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current
33 fiscal year to be used for the same purpose.

34 **35.6.** (DMH: Meals in Emergency Operations) The cost of meals may be provided to state employees who are required to work
35 during actual emergencies and emergency simulation exercises when they are not permitted to leave their stations.

1 **35.7.** (DMH: Deferred Maintenance, Capital Projects, Ordinary Repair and Maintenance) The Department of Mental Health is
2 authorized to establish an interest bearing fund with the State Treasurer to deposit funds for deferred maintenance and other one-time
3 funds from any source. The department is also authorized to retain and deposit into the fund proceeds from the sale of excess real
4 property owned by, under the control of, or assigned to the department. After receiving any required approvals, the department is
5 authorized to expend these funds for the purpose of deferred maintenance, capital projects, and ordinary repair and maintenance.
6 These funds may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year to be used for the same purpose.

7 **35.8.** (DMH: Lease Payments to SFAA for SVP Program) In the current fiscal year, funds appropriated and authorized to the
8 Department of Mental Health for Lease Payments to the State Fiscal Accountability Authority for the Sexually Violent Predator
9 Program are exempt from any across-the-board base reductions.

10 **35.9.** (DMH: Commitments to Treatment Facilities) The authorization for continued implementation of Article 7, Chapter 17,
11 Title 44 of the 1976 Code, Chapter 24, Title 44 of the 1976 Code, and Chapter 52, Title 44 of the 1976 Code, relating to commitments,
12 admissions and discharges to mental health facilities, or treatment facility for the purpose of alcohol and drug abuse treatment, shall
13 be expended for the compensation of court appointed private examiners, guardians ad litem, and attorneys for proposed patients,
14 and related costs arising from the filing, service and copying of legal papers and the transcription of hearings or testimony. Court
15 appointed private examiners, guardians ad litem and attorneys shall be paid at such rates or schedules as are jointly determined to
16 be reasonable by the South Carolina Association of Probate Judges, the Office of Court Administration, and the Department of
17 Mental Health with the approval of the Attorney General. The Department of Mental Health shall notify the Senate Finance
18 Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee of any fee adjustment or change in schedule before implementation and may
19 enter into an agreement with the Commission on Indigent Defense solely for the purpose of processing vouchers for the payment of
20 above fees and costs.

21 **35.10.** (DMH: Judicial Commitment) Except as otherwise provided in Proviso 117.5, no money authorized to be expended for
22 the purposes set forth in Proviso 35.9 shall be used to compensate any state employees appointed by the court as examiners,
23 guardians ad litem, or attorneys nor shall such funds be used in payment to any state agency for providing such services by their
24 employees.

25 SECTION 36 - J160 - DEPARTMENT OF DISABILITIES AND SPECIAL NEEDS

26
27
28 **36.1.** (DDSN: Work Activity Programs) All revenues derived from production contracts earned by individuals served by the
29 department in Work Activity Programs be retained by the South Carolina Department of Disabilities and Special Needs and carried
30 forward as necessary into the following fiscal year to be used for other operating expenses and/or permanent improvements of these
31 Work Activity Programs.

32 **36.2.** (DDSN: Sale of Excess Real Property) The department is authorized to retain revenues associated with the sale of excess
33 real property owned by, under the control of, or assigned to the department and may expend these funds as grants to purchase or
34 build community residences and day program facilities for the individuals DDSN serves. The department shall follow all the policies
35 and procedures of the Department of Administration or State Fiscal Accountability Authority and the Joint Bond Review Committee.

1 **36.3.** (DDSN: Prenatal Diagnosis) Revenues not to exceed \$126,000 from client fees, credited to the debt service fund and not
2 required to meet the department's debt service requirement, may be expended only in the current fiscal year to promote expanded
3 prenatal diagnosis of intellectual and/or other related disabilities by the Greenwood Genetic Center.

4 **36.4.** (DDSN: Medicaid-Funded Contract Settlements) The department is authorized to carry forward and retain settlements
5 under Medicaid-funded contracts.

6 **36.5.** (DDSN: Departmental Generated Revenue) The department is authorized to continue to expend departmental generated
7 revenues that are authorized in the budget.

8 **36.6.** (DDSN: Transfer of Capital/Property) The department may transfer capital to include property and buildings to local DSN
9 providers with State Fiscal Accountability Authority approval.

10 **36.7.** (DDSN: Unlicensed Medication Providers) The provision of selected prescribed medications may be performed by
11 designated unlicensed persons in community-based programs sponsored, licensed or certified by the South Carolina Department of
12 Disabilities and Special Needs, provided the unlicensed persons have documented successful completion of medication training and
13 competency evaluation. Licensed nurses, licensed pharmacists and licensed medical doctors may train and supervise designated
14 unlicensed persons to provide medications and, after reviewing competency evaluations, may approve designated unlicensed persons
15 for the provision of medications. The provision of medications by designated unlicensed persons is limited to oral, sublingual,
16 buccal, topical, inhalation and transdermal medications; ear drops, eye drops, nasal sprays, injections of regularly scheduled insulin
17 and injections of prescribed anaphylactic treatments. The provision of medications by designated unlicensed persons does not include
18 rectal and vaginal medications, sliding scale insulin or other injectable medications. A written or electronic record regarding each
19 medication provided, including time and amount administered, is required as part of the provision of medication. Provision of
20 medication does not include judgment, evaluation or assessment by the designated unlicensed persons. The designated unlicensed
21 persons and the nurses, pharmacists and medical doctors that train, approve, and supervise these staff shall be protected against tort
22 liability provided their actions are within the scope of their job duties and the established medical protocol.

23 The Department of Disabilities and Special Needs shall establish curriculum and standards for training and oversight.

24 This provision shall not apply to a facility licensed as an intermediate care facility for individuals with intellectual and/or related
25 disability.

26 **36.8.** (DDSN: Child Daycare Centers) Of the funds appropriated to the department, the department shall provide reimbursement
27 for services provided to department eligible children at daycare centers previously under contract prior to December 31, 2008. The
28 reimbursement shall not be less than eighty percent of the amount reimbursed in the previous fiscal year. By September fifteenth,
29 the department must transfer \$100,000 to the Anderson County Disabilities Board for the provision of these services.

30 **36.9.** (DDSN: Debt Service Account) The department shall utilize the uncommitted dollars in their debt service account, account
31 E164660, for operations and services that are not funded in the appropriations bill. By August first, the department must report to
32 the Governor, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee on the
33 remaining balance in this account and on the amounts and purposes for which the account was used in the prior fiscal year.

34 **36.10.** (DDSN: Traumatic Brain Injury) Funds appropriated to the agency for Traumatic Brain Injury/Spinal Cord Injury
35 Post-Acute Rehabilitation shall be used for that purpose only. In the event the department receives a general fund reduction in the

1 current fiscal year, any reductions to the post-acute rehabilitation funding shall not exceed reductions in proportion to the agency as
2 a whole.

3 **36.11.** (DDSN: Medicaid Direct Billing) The department shall facilitate Medicaid direct billing for all providers, including local
4 disabilities and special needs boards, who choose to initiate the direct billing process regardless of the receipt of capital grant funds
5 from the department for the specific facility involved. All entities receiving capital grant funds must use the funds as originally
6 specified in the award. If the purpose or use of a facility constructed or purchased with departmental grant funds is altered without
7 the department's approval, the entity must repay the department the amount of the funds awarded. The use of direct billing shall not
8 be construed as a change in the purpose or use of a facility.

9 **36.12.** (DDSN: Carry Forward Authorization) For the current fiscal year, the department is authorized to carry forward any
10 balance of General Funds appropriated for the reduction of the department's waiting lists in the prior fiscal year and must utilize
11 these funds for the same purpose in the current fiscal year. Within thirty days after the close of the fiscal year, the department shall
12 report the balance carried forward to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and
13 Means Committee.

14 **36.13.** (DDSN: Service Providers Expenditure Requirement) For the current fiscal year, in order to accommodate service provider
15 infrastructure needs resulting from the reductions in the department's waiting lists, service providers including local disabilities and
16 special needs boards are authorized to carry forward from the prior fiscal year unexpended funds based on a ninety percent
17 expenditure requirement for capitated services. Service providers shall not withhold services in order to generate funds to be carried
18 forward. The expenditure requirement shall not affect the department's three month reserve limitation policy. If the department's
19 Medicaid allowable costs, in the aggregate, do not meet the level of certified public expenditures (CPEs) reported to the Department
20 of Health and Human Services, the department is allowed to recoup funds necessary to remain in compliance with federal Medicaid
21 CPE rules.

22 **36.14.** (DDSN: Beaufort DSN Facility) For Fiscal Year 2018-19, the Department of Disabilities and Special Needs is authorized
23 to retain the full amount of proceeds from the sale of the local Disabilities and Special Needs Board of Beaufort County property.
24 The funds retained from this sale must be used by the department to purchase a new property for the local Disabilities and Special
25 Needs Board in Beaufort County that more appropriately meets the needs of the individuals served. Unexpended funds may be
26 carried forward into the current fiscal year and used for the same purpose. The department must provide a status report to the
27 Beaufort County Legislative Delegation by June 30, 2019, detailing the retention of any sale proceeds and/or the expenditures of
28 those funds.

29
30 **SECTION 37 - J200 - DEPARTMENT OF ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG ABUSE SERVICES**

31
32 **37.1.** (DAODAS: Training & Conference Revenue) The department may charge fees for training events and conferences. The
33 revenues from such events shall be retained by the department to increase education and professional development initiatives.

34 **37.2.** (DAODAS: Gambling Addiction Services) In that gambling is a serious problem in South Carolina, the department through
35 its local county commissions may provide, from funds appropriated to the department, information, education, and referral services
36 to persons experiencing gambling addictions.

1 **37.3.** (DAODAS: Medicaid Match Transfer) At the beginning of the fiscal year, the Department of Alcohol and Other Drug
2 Abuse Services will transfer \$1,915,902 to the Department of Health and Human Services to meet federal Medicaid Match
3 participation requirements for the delivery of alcohol and other drug abuse services to the Medicaid beneficiary population.

4 **37.4.** (DAODAS: Carry Forward Unexpended Funds) The Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services is authorized
5 to carry forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year unexpended funds in excess of ten percent of the agency's
6 general fund appropriations to continue to fund prevention, treatment and recovery services for opioid addiction services and
7 addiction programs as prioritized by the department.
8

9 **SECTION 38 - L040 - DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL SERVICES**
10

11 **38.1.** (DSS: Fee Retention) The Department of Social Services shall recoup all refunds and identified program overpayments
12 and all such overpayments shall be recouped in accordance with established collection policy. Funds of \$800,000 collected under
13 the Child Support Enforcement Program (Title IV-D) which are state funds shall be remitted to the State Treasurer and credited to
14 the General Fund of the State. All state funds above \$800,000 shall be retained by the department to fund Self-Sufficiency and
15 Family Preservation and Support initiatives.

16 **38.2.** (DSS: Recovered State Funds) The department shall withhold a portion of the State Funds recovered, under the Title IV-D
17 Program, for credit to the general fund in order to allow full participation in the federal "set off" program offered through the Internal
18 Revenue Service, the withholding of unemployment insurance benefits through the Department of Employment and Workforce and
19 reimbursement for expenditures related to blood testing. Such funds may not be expended for any other purpose. The Department
20 of Social Services shall be allowed to utilize the State share of Federally required fees, collected from non-TANF clients, in the
21 administration of the Child Support Enforcement Program. Such funds may not be expended for any other purpose. However, this
22 shall not include Child Support Enforcement Program incentives paid to the program from federal funds to encourage and reward
23 cost effective performance. Such incentives are to be reinvested in the program to increase collections of support at the state and
24 county levels in a manner consistent with federal laws and regulations governing such incentive payments. The department shall not
25 use clerk of court incentive funds to replace agency operating funds. Such funds shall be remitted to the appropriate state
26 governmental entity to further child support collection efforts.

27 **38.3.** (DSS: Burial Expenses) The expenditure of funds allocated for burials of foster children and adults in the custody of the
28 Department of Social Services shall not exceed one thousand five hundred dollars per burial.

29 **38.4.** (DSS: Battered Spouse Funds) Appropriations included in Subprogram II.J. entitled Battered Spouse shall be allocated
30 through contractual agreement to providers of this service. These appropriations may also be used for public awareness and
31 contracted services for victims of this social problem including the abused and children accompanying the abused. Such funds may
32 not be expended for any other purpose nor be reduced by any amount greater than that stipulated by the Executive Budget Office or
33 the General Assembly for the agency as a whole.

34 **38.5.** (DSS: Court Examiner Service Exemption) In order to prevent the loss of federal funds to the State, employees of the
35 Department of Social Services whose salaries are paid in full or in part from federal funds will be exempt from serving as court
36 examiners.

1 **38.6.** (DSS: TANF Advance Funds) The Department of Social Services is authorized to advance sufficient funds during each
 2 fiscal year from the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Assistance Payments general fund appropriations to the Temporary
 3 Assistance for Needy Families Assistance Payments federal account only for the purpose of allowing a sufficient cash flow in the
 4 federal account. The advance must be refunded no later than April of the same fiscal year. Upon the advance of funds as provided
 5 herein, the Comptroller General is authorized to process the July voucher for the funding of benefit checks.

6 **38.7.** (DSS: Fee Schedule) The Department of Social Services shall be allowed to charge fees and accept donations, grants, and
 7 bequests for social services provided under their direct responsibility on the basis of a fee schedule. The fees collected shall be
 8 utilized by the Department of Social Services to further develop and administer these program efforts. The below fee schedule is
 9 established for the current fiscal year.

6 **38.8.** (DSS: Food Stamp Fraud) The state portion of funds recouped from the collection of recipient claims in the TANF and
7 Food Stamp programs shall be retained by the department. A portion of these funds shall be distributed to local county offices for
8 emergency and program operations.

9 **38.9.** (DSS: TANF - Immunizations Certificates) The department shall require all TANF applicants and/or recipients to provide
10 proof of age appropriate immunizations for children. If such immunizations have not been administered, the department shall assist
11 in referring applicants to appropriate county health departments to obtain the immunizations.

12 **38.10.** (DSS: County Directors' Pay) With respect to the amounts allocated to the Department of Social Services for Employee
13 Pay Increase in this act, the Department of Social Services is authorized to allot funds for pay increases to individual county directors
14 and regional directors in classified positions without uniformity. Pay increases for DSS county directors and regional directors shall
15 be administered in accordance with the guidelines established by the Department of Administration for Executive Compensation
16 System and other nonacademic unclassified employees. Any employees subject to the provisions of this paragraph shall not be
17 eligible for any other compensation increases provided in this act.

18 **38.11.** (DSS: Use of Funds Authorization) Department investigative units shall be authorized to receive and expend funds
19 awarded to these units as a result of a donation, contribution, prize, grant, and/or court order. These funds shall be retained by the
20 department on behalf of the investigative units and deposited in a separate, special account and shall be carried forward from year to
21 year and withdrawn and expended as needed to fulfill the purposes and conditions of the donation, contribution, prize, grant, and/or
22 court order, if specified, and if not specified, as may be directed by the Director of the Department of Social Services. These accounts
23 shall not be used to supplant operating funds in the current or future budgets. The agency shall report to the Senate Finance
24 Committee and Ways and Means Committee by January thirtieth of the current fiscal year on the amount of funds received and how
25 expended.

26 **38.12.** (DSS: Use of Funds Authorization) Unless specifically directed by the General Assembly, when DSS is directed to provide
27 funds to a not-for-profit or 501(c)(3) organization, that organization must use the funds to serve persons who are eligible for services
28 in one or more DSS programs.

29 **38.13.** (DSS: Grant Authority) The Department of Social Services is authorized to make grants to community-based not-for-profit
30 organizations for local projects that further the objectives of DSS programs. The department shall develop policies and procedures
31 and may promulgate regulations to assure compliance with state and federal requirements associated with the funds used for the
32 grants and to assure fairness and accountability in the award and administration of these grants. The department shall require a match
33 from all grant recipients.

34 **38.14.** (DSS: Family Foster Care Payments) The Department of Social Services shall furnish as Family Foster Care payments for
35 individual foster children under their sponsorship and under kinship care:

36 ages 0 - 5 \$404 per month

1 ages 6 - 12 \$469 per month

2 ages 13 + \$535 per month

3 These specified amounts are for the basic needs of the foster children to include kinship care assistance. Basic needs within this
4 proviso are identified as food (at home and away), clothing, housing, transportation, education and other costs as defined in the U.S.
5 Department of Agriculture study of "Annual Cost of Raising a Child to Age Eighteen". Further, each agency shall identify and
6 justify, as another line item, all material and/or services, in excess of those basic needs listed above, which were a direct result of a
7 professional agency evaluation of clientele need. Legitimate medical care in excess of Medicaid reimbursement or such care not
8 recognized by Medicaid may be considered as special needs if approved by the sponsoring/responsible agency and shall be
9 reimbursed by the sponsoring agency in the same manner of reimbursing other special needs of foster children.

10 **38.15.** (DSS: Penalty Assessment) The Department of Social Services may impose monetary penalties against a person, facility,
11 or other entity for violation of statutes or regulations pertaining to programs, other than foster home licensing, that the department
12 regulates. Penalties collected must be remitted to the State Treasurer for deposit into the State General Fund. The department shall
13 promulgate regulations for each program in which penalties may be imposed. The regulations must include guidance on the decision
14 to assess a penalty, the effect of failure to pay a penalty in a timely manner, and a schedule of penalty ranges that takes into account
15 severity and frequency of violations. These regulations must provide for notice of the penalty and the right to a contested case
16 hearing before a designee of or panel appointed by the director of the department. Judicial review of the final agency decision
17 concerning a penalty must be in accordance with statutes or regulations that apply to judicial review of final revocation and denial
18 decisions in that particular program. The department, in accordance with regulations promulgated pursuant to this provision, shall
19 have discretion in determining the appropriateness of assessing a monetary penalty against a person or facility and the amount of the
20 penalty. The authority to assess monetary penalties shall be in addition to other statutory provisions authorizing the department to
21 seek injunctive relief or to deny, revoke, suspend, or otherwise restrict or limit a license or other types of operating or practice
22 registrations, approvals, or certificates.

23 **38.16.** (DSS: Child Support Enforcement Automated System Carry Forward) The department shall be authorized to retain and
24 carry forward any unexpended funds appropriated for the Child Support Enforcement automated system and related penalties.

25 **38.17.** (DSS: Child Support Enforcement System) From the funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 38 (II.F.), the Department of
26 Social Services shall prepare a detailed report on the status of the Child Support Enforcement System. The report shall include, but
27 not be limited to, actions currently being undertaken to become compliant with federal government requirements; the cost required
28 to meet minimum federal guidelines; total funds spent so far on the system; the amount of fines assessed by the federal government
29 associated with noncompliance; how much has been spent to satisfy actions taken by the state judicial system; and how much has
30 been spent related to actions taken by any other entity which may have altered the amount required for meeting minimum federal
31 guidelines. The report shall be submitted to the General Assembly by August thirty-first of the current fiscal year.

32 **38.18.** (DSS: Child Care Voucher) State funds allocated to the Department of Social Services and used for child care vouchers
33 must be used to enroll eligible recipients within provider settings exceeding the state's minimum child care licensing standards. The
34 department may waive this requirement on a case by case basis.

1 **38.19.** (DSS: Meals in Emergency Operations) The cost of meals may be provided to state employees who are not permitted to
2 leave their stations and are required to work during actual emergencies, emergency situation exercises, and when the Governor
3 declares a state of emergency.

4 **38.20.** (DSS: Day Care Facilities Supervision Ratios) For the current fiscal year, staff-child ratios contained in Regulations
5 114-504(B), 114-504(C), 114-524(B), and 114-524(C) shall remain at the June 24, 2008 levels.

6 **38.21.** (DSS: Foster Care Goals) To comply with the requirements of 42 U.S.C. Section 671(a)(14) and 45 C.F.R. Section
7 1356.21(n), it shall be the goal of the state that the maximum number of Title IV-E funded children who will remain in foster care
8 for more than twenty-four months will not exceed a total of 2,617 during the fiscal year. The Department of Social Services shall
9 develop appropriate plans for timely permanency and use appropriate data benchmarks and targets that will achieve this goal.

10 **38.22.** (DSS: Comprehensive Teen Pregnancy Prevention Funding) (A) From the monies appropriated for the Continuation of
11 Teen Pregnancy Prevention, the department must award the dollars allocated to a nonprofit 501(c)(3) entity to provide abstinence
12 first, age appropriate comprehensive approach to health and sexuality education with a goal of preventing adolescent pregnancy
13 throughout South Carolina.

14 (B) Contracts must be awarded utilizing a competitive approach in accordance with the South Carolina Procurement Code.

15 (C) The monies appropriated must be paid over a twelve month basis for services rendered. Unexpended funds shall be carried
16 forward for the purpose of fulfilling the department's contractual agreement.

17 (D) The programs implemented by the entity awarded a contract pursuant to this proviso may not violate any portion of the South
18 Carolina Comprehensive Health Education Act when implemented in a school setting. An entity that violates any portion of the
19 South Carolina Comprehensive Health Education Act must reimburse the State for all funds disbursed.

20 **38.23.** (DSS: SNAP Coupons) The Department of Social Services shall continue the "Healthy Bucks" program established to
21 provide coupons that allow Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients to obtain additional fresh fruits and
22 vegetables when purchasing fresh produce at grocery stores or farmers markets with SNAP benefits through their EBT cards. Each
23 coupon shall allow the beneficiary to double the amount of produce purchased, up to ten dollars per month. The agency shall utilize
24 all funds received in the prior and current fiscal years from the U.S. Department of Agriculture as a bonus for reducing the error rate
25 in processing SNAP applications to fund the program. The agency shall work to identify and utilize funds as matching dollars for
26 the continued success of the "Healthy Bucks" program and shall report semi-annually to the General Assembly on the status of the
27 program. The report shall include, at a minimum, the number of recipients, counties served, and cumulative expenditure data for the
28 program.

29 **38.24.** (DSS: Internal Child Fatality Review Committees) For Fiscal Year 2018-19, the Director of the Department of Social
30 Services shall create and fund Internal Child Fatality Review Committees (internal committees) pursuant to the authority granted in
31 Sections 43-1-60(3), 43-1-80, and 63-7-910(E) of the 1976 Code to allow for the rapid and expeditious review of reported child
32 fatalities that are reported to the Department of Social Services on suspicion of abandonment, child abuse, neglect or harm as defined
33 in Section 63-7-20. This review process will enable the department to respond to the safety needs of any surviving siblings and will
34 lead to improvement in the department's efforts to prevent child fatalities caused by abandonment, child abuse, neglect or harm.
35 Each internal committee shall be composed of a board-certified child abuse pediatrician, an agent from the State Law Enforcement
36 Division, a local law enforcement officer, a representative from the local coroner's office, and representatives from the Department

1 of Social Services. The internal committee may invite other service provider organizations as deemed necessary. The department
2 is authorized to provide reasonable compensation for board-certified child abuse pediatricians serving on an internal committee.
3 Internal committees shall have access to information and records maintained by a provider of medical care regarding a child whose
4 death is being reviewed by the internal committee, including information on prenatal care; all information and records maintained
5 by any state, county, or local government agency, including, but not limited to, birth certificates, law enforcement investigation data,
6 county coroner or medical examiner investigation data, parole and probation information and records, and information and records
7 of health agencies that provided services to the child or family. The meetings, information obtained by, reports prepared by, and
8 statements made before the internal committees are confidential and protected from disclosure pursuant to the Freedom of
9 Information Act, criminal and civil proceedings, and subpoenas as set forth in Sections 63-7-940 and 63-7-1990.

10 **38.25.** (DSS: Tuition Reimbursement/Student Loan Repayment) The Department of Social Services is allowed to spend state,
11 federal, and other sources of revenue to provide tuition reimbursement and/or student loan repayment to aid in retaining caseworkers
12 and critical needs department jobs based on objective guidelines established by the State Director of the Department of Social
13 Services.

14 The department may also provide paid educational leave for any employees in an FTE position to attend class while enrolled in
15 programs that are related to the agency's mission. All such leave is at the agency head's discretion.

16 The department may enter into an agreement with staff employed in critical need departments to repay them for their outstanding
17 student loans and/or reimburse tuition expenses. The employee must be employed in a critical needs area, which would be identified
18 at the agency head's discretion, be in a covered FTE, and not have any disciplinary actions. Participants in this program must agree
19 to remain at the department for a period of five years. The department may pay these employees up to \$7,500 each year over a
20 five-year period in accordance with a program developed by the department. Payments will be made directly to the employee at the
21 end of each year of employment. Payments cannot exceed the balance of the student loan or the cost of tuition.

22 **38.26.** (DSS: Federally Certified Child Support Enforcement System Project) In order to expedite the completion and certification
23 of the Automated Child Support Enforcement System required by the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. Section 654a), the Department
24 of Social Services is authorized to adopt, to the fullest extent possible, the system and operating procedures of the Delaware Transfer
25 System. To the extent the Transfer System operating processes deviate from, or are incompatible with, current South Carolina
26 practice, the department is authorized to determine the most effective and efficient practice to comply with federal requirements.
27 The department shall work with Clerks of Court to identify and prepare for the changes involved in the implementation of the Transfer
28 System which may impact their current operating practices with regards to performance of required child support functions. Pursuant
29 to the Social Security Act and S.C. Code Section 63-17-610, Clerks of Court shall utilize the federally certifiable child support system
30 and the state disbursement unit developed by the department to perform required child support functions.

31 **38.27.** (DSS: Wilderness Therapeutic Camps) The Department of Social Services shall make and promulgate such rules and
32 regulations relating to licensing standards and other matters as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of Title 63, Chapter 11,
33 Article 1 of the 1976 Code as applied to Wilderness Therapeutic Camps. For this purpose, a "Wilderness Therapeutic Camp" is a
34 therapeutic camp organization or facility with an outdoor or wilderness focus that is engaged in receiving children for care and
35 maintenance, either part or full time, but shall not include any summer camp, day camp, or after school program, and shall also not
36 include any other outdoor education or youth development program or facility where participants usually attend for less than 15 days,

1 and does not include any licensed residential group care organization, child caring institution or group home or facility that meets
2 the facility requirements of S.C. Code of Regulations Section 114-590.

3 **38.28.** (DSS: Group Home Transition) For the current fiscal year, the Department of Social Services shall provide financial and
4 administrative support and flexibility to Group Homes in order to best enable any necessary transition of services or the development
5 of new service models for children and young adults. Group Homes with young adults between the ages of 18 to 23 years residing
6 in approved and supervised independent living programs shall not be required to provide 24 hours per day face to face supervision
7 for the resident. Regulatory and contractual requirements must not be different for supervision and staff ratios when a young adult
8 aged 18 to 23 is a resident in an approved and supervised independent living program.

9 **38.29.** (DSS: Faith-Based Private Child Placing Agencies) From the funds appropriated to the Department of Social Services, the
10 department shall make and promulgate such rules and regulations relating to licensing standards and other matters as may be
11 necessary to carry out the purposes of Title 63, Chapter 11, Article 1 of the 1976 Code as applied to faith-based private Child Placing
12 Agencies. For purposes of these regulations, any person or entity who holds legal or physical custody of a child for the purpose of
13 placement for foster care or adoption or a private placement and, which for the purposes of these regulations, retain their own system
14 of foster homes, is a child placing agency as defined in S.C. Code of Regulations 114-550. Such regulation must not discriminate or
15 suggest the taking of any adverse action against a faith-based child-placing agency or an agency seeking to become a child-placing
16 agency on the basis, wholly or partly, that a faith-based child placing agency has declined or will decline to provide any service that
17 conflicts with, or provide any service under circumstances that conflict with, a sincerely-held religious belief or moral conviction of
18 the faith-based child placing agency.

19 **38.30.** (DSS: Foster Care Child Placements) With funds appropriated and authorized to the Department of Social Services for
20 Fiscal Year 2018-19, the department shall ensure that the following provisions are implemented related to child placements. The
21 department shall promulgate any necessary rules or regulations to implement these provisions:

22 (A) If a child in foster care has been placed within the same foster home for at least 9 consecutive months and if the foster
23 parents are willing to provide permanency through adoption for the child, the department must obtain an attachment assessment, as
24 defined through rules or regulations promulgated by the agency, of the child and current foster parents before selecting a different
25 adoptive placement or other alternative setting. The attachment assessment must be conducted by a qualified attachment expert.
26 Qualified attachment experts may include individuals who can demonstrate training and or education in attachment theory,
27 developmental psychology, and other qualifications defined through rules or regulations promulgated by the agency.

28 (B) If a child's permanency plan includes reunification with a parent or caregiver, the department shall develop a transition
29 plan for the child, with input from the Guardian ad Litem and a child-focused or other appropriate mental health professional. The
30 department's proposed transition plan must include sufficient visitation with the permanent guardian to promote a successful and
31 emotionally healthy transition for the child, facilitate a positive relationship between caregiver and child, and lessen trauma that may
32 result from the move. If the department pursues placement with a natural parent, relative, or other adult with whom the child has
33 never lived, as determined to be in the child's best interest, the department's proposed transition plan must be progressive and include
34 increased overnight visitation with ongoing assessment of the plan and the child's adjustment by the Guardian ad Litem and child
35 focused or other appropriate mental health professional. Modifications to the plan must be driven by the child's adjustment to the
36 transition.

1 (C) The department must file a Termination of Parental Rights petition if a child has been in foster care for 15 of the last 22
2 months unless there are extenuating circumstances as defined in Section 63-7-1710 as follows:

3 (1) When the child is over the age of 16 and the department has identified another planned permanent living arrangement.

4 (2) The department asserts to the court that the child may be safely returned to the parent because the parent has remedied
5 the conditions that caused the removal, with or without supervision by the department for up to 12 months.

6 (3) The department's proposed treatment plan can be extended up to 18 months but only if: (a) the department presents
7 compelling and persuasive evidence of how the parent has demonstrated due diligence in completing the plan; (b) the department
8 can articulate for the court specific reasons to believe the parent will timely remedy the conditions which led to the removal; (c) the
9 department affirms that the return of child to the parent would not cause unreasonable risk of harm; (d) the department has compelling
10 reasons to assert that a Termination of Parental Rights is not in the best interests of the child; (e) the department has compelling
11 reasons to assert the best interests of the child will be served by the extension.

12 (4) If the department assesses the viability of adoption and determines that adoption is not a viable option and has
13 compelling reasons to assert that Termination of Parental Rights is not in the best interests of the child, then the department may
14 pursue a permanent plan of custody or legal guardianship to relative or other person.

15 (D) In accordance with Sections 63-7-1640(G) and 1700(E), the department must file the petition for a Termination of Parental
16 Rights within sixty days of the family court order designating the child's permanent plan or concurrent plan as Termination of Parental
17 Rights and adoption.

18 **38.31.** (DSS: Comprehensive Child Welfare Information System) A portion of the recurring funds appropriated to the department
19 shall be used to issue a request for proposal, no later than September 30, 2018, for a vendor to implement a comprehensive case
20 management data and analysis system.

21 **38.32.** (DSS: SNAP Eligibility) The Department of Social Services shall not seek, apply for, accept, or renew any waiver of the
22 requirements established pursuant to 7 U.S.C. Section 2015(o), relating to the mandatory work requirements of the Supplemental
23 Nutrition Assistance Program.
24

25 **SECTION 39 - L240 - COMMISSION FOR THE BLIND**

26
27 **39.1.** (BLIND: Matching Federal Funds) For the current fiscal year the amount appropriated in this section under Program II for
28 Rehabilitative Services is conditioned upon matching by federal funds to the maximum amount available under the Federal
29 Vocational Rehabilitation Program.
30

31 **SECTION 40 - L600 - DEPARTMENT ON AGING**

32
33 **40.1.** (AGING: State Matching Funds Carry Forward) Any unexpended balance on June thirtieth of the prior fiscal year of the
34 required state matching funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 40, Distribution to Subdivisions, shall be carried forward into the
35 current fiscal year to be used as required state match for federal funds awarded to subdivisions on or before September thirtieth of
36 the current fiscal year.

1 40.2. (AGING: State Match Funding Formula) Of the state funds appropriated under “Distribution to Subdivisions,” the first
2 allocation by the Department on Aging shall be for the provision of required State matching funds according to the Department on
3 Aging formula for distributing Older Americans Act funds. The balance of this item shall be distributed to the planning and service
4 areas of the State. In the event state appropriations are reduced, reductions to the planning and service areas shall be based on
5 amounts distributed in accordance with the previous requirements.

6 40.3. (AGING: Registration Fees) The Department on Aging is authorized to receive and expend registration fees for
7 educational, training and certification programs.

8 40.4. (AGING: Council Meeting Requirements) The duties and responsibilities, including the statutory requirement to hold
9 meetings of the Coordinating Council established pursuant to Section 43-21-120 and of the Long Term Care Council established
10 pursuant to Section 43-21-130, both under the Department on Aging, are suspended for the current fiscal year.

11 40.5. (AGING: Home and Community-Based Services) State funds appropriated for Home and Community-Based Services shall
12 be used to fund those services that most directly meet the goal of allowing seniors to live safely and independently at home. Allowable
13 services as defined in the Department on Aging’s State Plan include: group dining, home delivered meals, transportation to group
14 dining sites, transportation for essential trips, personal care (formerly Home Care Level I), homemaker (formerly Home Care Level
15 II), Home Chore, Home Modification, Legal Assistance, and Assessments. Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs) may expend no more
16 than ten percent for administrative services and one-quarter of one percent shall be retained by the Department on Aging to provide
17 monitoring and oversight of the program. However, up to three percent of the annual state appropriation for Home and
18 Community-Based Services may be retained at the Department on Aging to be allocated by the department to the affected regions in
19 cases of an emergency and/or natural disaster recognized by the Governor. If these funds are not utilized in the fiscal year allocated,
20 they are to be treated as carry forward funds and reallocated to the AAAs. The Interstate Funding Formula shall be used as a
21 guideline for the allocation of state funds appropriated for Home and Community-Based Services. The Department on Aging shall
22 develop and implement a structured methodology to allocate the state Home and Community-Based Services funding. The
23 methodology shall include flexibility to reallocate funds amongst the AAAs, and be composed of, at a minimum, the following factors:
24 a minimum base amount, the fiscal year’s federally allocated funds, federal and state carry forwards funds, and an appropriate
25 weighted proportion that will achieve the mission of the Department on Aging to provide as many services as possible to the citizens
26 of South Carolina. Each AAA shall submit a budget for approval by the Department on Aging indicating the services to be provided.
27 Any unexpended Home and Community-Base Services funds in this program shall be carried forward by the Department on Aging
28 and used for the same purposes. Funds may not be transferred from the Home and Community-Based special line item for any other
29 purpose.

30 40.6. (AGING: Geriatric Loan Forgiveness Program) In lieu of quarterly payments to a recipient of the Geriatric Physician
31 Loan Program, the Department on Aging is authorized to make a single lump sum payment to the lending institution of up to \$35,000
32 or the loan balance, whichever is less.

33 Any unexpended balance on June thirtieth of the prior fiscal year of funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 40, Geriatric Physician
34 Loan Program, shall be carried forward and used for the same purpose as originally appropriated.

35 40.7. (AGING: Caregivers Carry Forward) Unexpended funds from appropriations to the Department on Aging for caregivers
36 shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year and used for the same purpose.

1 40.8. (AGING: Vulnerable Adult Guardian ad Litem Carry Forward) Any unexpended funds from appropriation to the
2 Department on Aging for the Vulnerable Adult Guardian ad Litem Program shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year and
3 used for the same purpose.
4

5 **SECTION 41 - L800 - DEPARTMENT OF CHILDREN'S ADVOCACY**
6

7 41.1. (DCA: Foster Care-Private Foster Care Reviews) The Department of Children's Advocacy, Foster Care Program is
8 authorized to restructure its programs, including but not limited to, suspending reviews of children privately placed in private foster
9 care and/or changing the location of reviews of children in public foster care, to maintain continuous operations within existing
10 resources as dictated by recent budget reductions. These decisions must be based upon the availability of existing funds. This
11 provision supersedes any previous statutory or regulatory mandate.

12 41.2. (DCA: Guardian Ad Litem Program) Both the program and the funds appropriated to the Department of Children's
13 Advocacy, Guardian ad Litem Program must be administered separately from other programs within the Department of Children's
14 Advocacy and must be expended for the exclusive use of the Guardian ad Litem Program.

15 For the current fiscal year, the Department of Revenue is directed to reduce the rate of interest paid on eligible refunds by two
16 percentage points. The revenue resulting from this reduction must be used exclusively for operations of the Guardian ad Litem
17 program and be deposited in the State Treasury in a separate and distinct fund known as the "South Carolina Guardian ad Litem
18 Trust Fund." Unexpended revenues in this fund carry forward to succeeding fiscal years, and earnings in this fund must be credited
19 to it. The Guardian ad Litem program may carry forward the other funds authorized herein for its operations from the prior fiscal
20 year into the current fiscal year.

21 41.3. (DCA: Continuum of Care Carry Forward) The Department of Children's Advocacy, Continuum of Care Program may
22 carry forward funds appropriated herein to continue services.

23 41.4. (DCA: CCRS Evaluations & Placements) The amount appropriated in this section under Special Items Children's Case
24 Resolution System for Private Placement of Handicapped School-Age Children must be used for expenses incurred in the evaluation
25 of children referred to the CCRS to facilitate appropriate placement and to pay up to forty percent when placement is made in-state
26 and up to thirty percent when placement must be made out-of-state of the excess cost of private placement over and above
27 one-per-pupil share of state and local funds generated by the Education Finance Act, and the one per pupil share of applicable
28 federal funds; provided it has been established that all other possible public placements are exhausted or inappropriate. The balance
29 of funding responsibility necessary to provide the child with services must be determined by the Children's Case Resolution System
30 (CCRS) and apportioned among the appropriate public agencies on the basis of the reasons for the private placement. When the
31 amount appropriated in this section is exhausted, the funding responsibility must be apportioned according to the procedures of the
32 CCRS.

33 41.5. (DCA: CCRS Significant Fiscal Impact) In accordance with Section 20-7-5240(e) of the 1976 Code, "significant fiscal
34 impact" in the current fiscal year shall be defined for each designated agency as the greater of (1) funds appropriated by the General
35 Assembly for the current fiscal year on cases referred to, decided or placed through the Children's Case Resolution System or (2)
36 that agency's assigned shares in the current fiscal year of five cases decided by the Children's Case Resolution System.

1 **SECTION 42 - L320 - HOUSING FINANCE AND DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY**

2

3 **42.1.** (HFDA: Federal Rental Assistance Administrative Fee Carry Forward) All federal rental assistance administrative fees
4 shall be carried forward to the current fiscal year for use by the authority in the administration of the federal programs under contract
5 with the authority.

6 **42.2.** (HFDA: Program Expenses Carry Forward) For the prior fiscal year monies withdrawn from the authority's various
7 bond-financed trust indentures and resolutions, which monies are deposited with the State Treasurer to pay program expenses, may
8 be carried forward by the authority into the current fiscal year.

9 **42.3.** (HFDA: Advisory Committee Mileage Reimbursement) Members of the nine member South Carolina Housing Trust Fund
10 Advisory Committee are eligible for mileage reimbursement at the rate allowed for state employees as established in Proviso
11 117.20(J) (Travel-Subsistence Expenses & Mileage) in this act.

12 **42.4.** (HFDA: Allocation of Indirect Cost Recoveries) The authority shall deposit in the state general fund indirect cost
13 recoveries for the authority's portion of the Statewide Central Services Cost Allocation
14 Plan (SWCAP). The authority shall retain recoveries in excess of the SWCAP amount to be deposited in the state general fund.

15 **42.5.** (HFDA: Housing Trust Fund Disaster Initiative) Funds allocated, granted, or awarded under the Housing Trust Fund's
16 Disaster Initiative shall not be included when calculating the percentage of trust fund expenditures per county.

17

18 **SECTION 43 - P120 - FORESTRY COMMISSION**

19

20 **43.1.** (FC: Grant Funds Carry Forward) The Forestry Commission is authorized to use unexpended federal grant funds in the
21 current year to pay for expenditures incurred in the prior year.

22 **43.2.** (FC: Retention of Emergency Expenditure Refunds) The Forestry Commission is authorized to retain all funds received
23 as reimbursement of expenditures from other state or federal agencies when personnel and equipment are mobilized due to
24 an emergency.

25 **43.3.** (FC: Commissioned Officers' Physicals) The Forestry Commission is authorized to pay the cost of physical examinations
26 for agency personnel who are required to receive such physical examinations prior to receiving a law enforcement commission.

27 **43.4.** (FC: Compensatory Payment) In the event a State of Emergency is declared by the Governor, exempt employees of the
28 Forestry Commission may be paid for actual hours worked in lieu of accruing compensatory time, at the discretion of the agency
29 director, and providing funds are available.

30

31 **SECTION 44 - P160 - DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE**

32

33 **44.1.** (AGRI: Market Bulletin) The Market Bulletin shall be mailed only to those persons who request it in writing and a record
34 of each request shall be maintained by the department. Provided further, that the Department of Agriculture is authorized to charge
35 a yearly subscription fee to each person requesting the bulletin and may charge for classified advertisements printed in the bulletin.

1 The funds collected pursuant to this provision shall be retained by the department to defray the costs of publication and related
2 incidental expenses.

3 **44.2.** (AGRI: Fruit/Vegetable Inspectors Subsistence) A daily subsistence allowance of up to \$30.00 may be allowed for
4 temporarily employed fruits and vegetables inspectors from funds generated by fruits and vegetables inspection fees and budgeted
5 under other funds in Program III. Marketing Services, D. Inspection Services, in lieu of reimbursements for meals and lodging
6 expense.

7 **44.3.** (AGRI: Warehouse Receipts Guaranty Fund) The Department of Agriculture may retain and expend fifty thousand dollars
8 from the Warehouse Receipts Guaranty Fund established by Section 39-22-150 of the 1976 Code as is necessary for the department
9 to administer the funding of the program.

10 **44.4.** (AGRI: Weights & Measures Registration) All servicepersons required to be registered with the Department of Agriculture
11 pursuant to the provisions of Section 39-9-65 of the 1976 Code shall pay to the department a registration fee of \$25.00. Revenues
12 generated by this provision shall be for use by the Department of Agriculture to offset expenses incurred in administering this
13 registration program.

14 **44.5.** (AGRI: Sale of Property Revenue) The department may retain revenues associated with the sale of the property titled to
15 or utilized by the department, except for the State Farmers Market property, and must expend these funds on capital improvements
16 approved by the Joint Bond Review Committee and the State Fiscal Accountability Authority. The department must continue to
17 occupy any property until replacement capital improvements are completed.

18 **44.6.** (AGRI: Export Certification) The Department of Agriculture is allowed to charge up to \$250 for each export certification
19 of agricultural products and to retain revenues to offset expenses incurred in performing certifications.

20 **44.7.** (AGRI: Feed Label Registration) The Department of Agriculture is authorized to require the annual registration of feed
21 labels by manufacturers and to charge a fee of \$15.00 for such registrations. Revenues generated by these fees shall be retained and
22 used by the department to offset expenses incurred in operating the Feed Inspection Program.

23 **44.8.** (AGRI: Commodity Boards) In the current fiscal year, the provisions of the Consolidated Procurement Code related to a
24 commodity board's expenditure of assessments collected from producers, as those terms are defined in Section 46-17-40 of the 1976
25 Code, are suspended.

26 **44.9.** *(AGRI: Agribusiness Infrastructure Carry Forward) The Department of Agriculture is authorized to carry forward any*
27 *revenues, accrued interest, and unexpended Agribusiness Infrastructure funds from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year*
28 *to be expended for the same purpose.*

29 **44.10.** *(AGRI: Grain Producers Guaranty Fund) The Department of Agriculture may retain and expend one hundred thousand*
30 *dollars from the Grain Producers Guaranty Fund as outlined in Section 46-41-230 of the 1976 Code of Laws to administer the*
31 *program.*

32
33 **SECTION 45 - P200 - CLEMSON UNIVERSITY - PSA**

34
35 **45.1.** (CU-PSA: Phytosanitary Certificates) Revenues collected from the issuance of phytosanitary certificates shall be retained
36 by the Division of Regulatory and Public Service for the purpose of carrying out phytosanitary inspections.

1 **45.2.** (CU-PSA: Witness Fee) The Public Service Activities of Clemson University are hereby authorized to charge a witness
2 fee of \$100.00 per hour up to \$400.00 per day for each PSA employee testifying as ~~an expert witness~~ a fact witness regarding matters
3 related to his or her professional expertise, or the exercise of his or her employment duties, in civil matters which do not involve the
4 State as a party in interest. This fee shall be charged in addition to any court prescribed payment due as compensation or
5 reimbursement for judicial appearances and deposited into a designated revenue account.

6 **45.3.** (CU-PSA: Nursery/Nursery Dealer Registration Fee) The Division of Regulatory and Public Service Programs is
7 authorized to retain up to \$92,000 of revenue collected from the issuance of Nursery/Nursery Dealer Fees for the purpose of carrying
8 out nursery/nursery dealer inspections. Revenue collected from this fee above \$92,000 shall be deposited into the general fund.

9 **45.4.** (CU-PSA: Retention of Fees) All revenues collected from the regulatory programs of agrichemical, plant industry and
10 crop protection including: fertilizer, lime, and soil amendments registration fees; pesticide licensing fees; seed certification fees; and
11 fertilizer tax/inspection fees must be retained by Clemson University PSA regulatory programs.

12 **45.5.** (CU-PSA: Pesticide Registration) All revenues collected from pesticide registration fees and revenue collected from
13 structural pest control businesses for business licensing must be retained by Clemson University PSA Regulatory and Public Service
14 Programs to support general regulatory, enforcement, and education programs and to carry out provisions of the South Carolina
15 Pesticide Control Act and regulations related to it.

16 **45.6.** (CU-PSA: Lime Inspection Fee) The Public Service Activities of Clemson University are hereby authorized to charge an
17 inspection fee of \$0.50 per ton on Agricultural Liming Materials sold or distributed in this state. Clemson University-PSA may
18 retain, expend, and carry forward these funds to maintain its programs.

19 **45.7.** (CU-PSA: Livestock-Poultry Health Programs) For the current fiscal year Clemson University Public Service Activities
20 shall maintain operation of the state Meat Inspection Program. All revenues and recoveries from USDA Food Safety Inspection
21 Services and from USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Services for Clemson University PSA's Livestock-Poultry Health
22 Programs and its departments shall be retained by Clemson University-PSA's Livestock-Poultry Health Program for purposes of
23 carrying out the operation of its programs.

24 **45.8.** (CU-PSA: Boll Weevil Eradication) For the current fiscal year Clemson University Public Services Activities shall
25 maintain operation of the Boll Weevil Eradication Program. In the calculation of any across-the-board budget reduction mandated
26 by the Executive Budget Office or the General Assembly, the amount appropriated for the Boll Weevil Eradication Program shall be
27 excluded from Clemson PSA's base budget. In the event of such a reduction Clemson PSA may reduce the amount of funds
28 appropriated for this program by an amount not to exceed the percentage associated with the mandated reduction.

29 **45.9.** (CU-PSA: Landplaster Inspection Fee) For the purpose of regulating its use as applied to land for crop production,
30 landplaster (gypsum), shall be defined as a product consisting chiefly of calcium sulfate with two combined water ($\text{CaSO}_4 \cdot 2\text{H}_2\text{O}$)
31 and is incapable of neutralizing soil acidity. It shall contain not less than seventy percent $\text{CaSO}_4 \cdot 2\text{H}_2\text{O}$. All registrants of landplaster
32 who sell or distribute in this state that previously were required to pay an inspection fee of \$1.50 per ton shall now pay to Clemson
33 University Regulatory Services an inspection fee of fifty cents for each ton sold. Clemson University-PSA may retain, expend, and
34 carry forward these funds from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year to maintain its programs.

1 **SECTION 47 - P240 - DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES**
2

3 **47.1.** (DNR: Publications Revenue) For the current fiscal year all revenue generated from the sale of the “South Carolina
4 Wildlife” magazine, its by-products and other publications, shall be retained by the department and used to support the production
5 of same in order for the magazine to be self-sustaining. In addition, the department is authorized to sell advertising in the magazine
6 and to increase the magazine’s subscription rate, if necessary, to be self-sustaining. No general funds may be used for the operation
7 and support of the “South Carolina Wildlife” magazine.

8 **47.2.** (DNR: Casual Sales Tax Collection) The Department of Natural Resources shall continue to collect the casual sales tax as
9 contained in the contractual agreement between the Department of Revenue and the Department of Natural Resources and the State
10 Treasurer is authorized to reimburse the department on a quarterly basis for the actual cost of collecting the casual sales tax and such
11 reimbursement shall be paid from revenues generated by the casual sales tax.

12 **47.3.** (DNR: Proportionate Funding) Each of South Carolina’s forty-six soil and water conservation districts shall receive a
13 proportionate share of funding set aside for Aid to Conservation Districts at \$15,000 per district for general assistance to the district’s
14 program. Available funding above \$15,000 for each district will be apportioned by the Department of Natural Resources based upon
15 local needs and priorities as determined by the board. During the fiscal year, the districts’ funding may only be reduced in an amount
16 not to exceed the percentage of each agency budget reduction. No district shall receive any funds under this provision unless the
17 county or counties wherein the district is located shall have appropriated no less than three hundred dollars to the district from county
18 funds for the same purposes.

19 **47.4.** (DNR: Carry Forward - Contract for Goods & Services) If any funds accumulated by the Department of Natural Resources
20 Geology Program, under contract for the provision of goods and services not covered by the department’s appropriated funds, are
21 not expended during the preceding fiscal years, such funds may be carried forward and expended for the costs associated with the
22 provision of such goods and services.

23 **47.5.** (DNR: Revenue Carry Forward) The department may collect, expend, and carry forward revenues derived from the sale
24 of goods and services in order to support aerial photography, map services, climatology data, and geological services. The department
25 shall annually report to the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee the amount of revenue generated
26 from the sale of these goods and services.

27 **47.6.** (DNR: Clothing Allowance) The Department of Natural Resources is hereby authorized to provide Natural Resource
28 Enforcement Officers on special assignment with an annual clothing allowance (on a prorata basis) not to exceed \$600 per officer
29 for required clothing used in the line of duty.

30 **47.7.** (DNR: Commissioned Officers’ Physicals) The department is authorized to pay for the cost of physical examinations for
31 department personnel who are required to receive such physical examinations prior to receiving a law enforcement commission.

32 **47.8.** (DNR: Cormorant Control) ~~The Department of Natural Resources shall continue to coordinate a public Cormorant control~~
33 ~~program with the US Fish and Wildlife Service for Lake Marion and Moultrie. The department shall try to coordinate with the Army~~
34 ~~Corp of Engineers, Santee Cooper, and the USFWS to include waters above and below each spillway, Wildlife Management Areas,~~
35 ~~and national refuges. The department shall assess the need to expand the program to other public waters and implement a plan if~~
36 ~~warranted. If the USFWS allows continuation of the control program, the department shall establish an online method of permitting.~~

1 **47.9.** (DNR: Web Services and Technology Development) The department may carry forward any unexpended general fund
2 balance remaining on the Other Operating Expenses line, identified in the “Web Services and Technology Development” program
3 of the department appropriations from Part IA in this Act. Balances carried forward from the prior fiscal year are only authorized to
4 be expended to support technology operating expenses within the department.

5 **47.10.** (DNR: Predator Control Program) Of the funds authorized and appropriated in this Act, the Department of Natural
6 Resources is directed to develop and implement a coyote tagging and reward program within this state. They must tag and release
7 four coyotes in each of the four game zones and apply a reward of a complimentary lifetime hunting license per tagged coyote to the
8 hunter/trapper, or his designee.

9 **47.11.** (DNR: Triploid Grass Carp) For the current fiscal year, no water recreation funds or any other funding source may be used
10 to fund the stocking of triploid grass carp on Lake Marion and Lake Moultrie.
11

12 **SECTION 48 - P260 - SEA GRANT CONSORTIUM**
13

14 **48.1.** (SGC: Publications Revenue) Funds generated by the sale of pamphlets, books, and other promotional materials, the
15 production of which has been paid for by non-state funding, may be deposited in a special account by the consortium and utilized as
16 other funds for the purchase of additional pamphlets, books, and other promotional materials for distribution to the public.
17

18 **SECTION 49 - P280 - DEPARTMENT OF PARKS, RECREATION, AND TOURISM**
19

20 **49.1.** (PRT: Tourism and Promotion) The funds appropriated in this act for Regional Promotions shall be distributed equally to
21 the eleven Regional Tourism groups, except that the Grandstrand Tourism Region’s funds shall be divided, with \$50,000 distributed
22 to the Myrtle Beach Chamber of Commerce, \$115,000 distributed to the Georgetown Chamber of Commerce, \$30,000 distributed to
23 the City of Georgetown, and \$30,000 distributed to the Williamsburg Chamber of Commerce for tourism related activities. In
24 addition, \$50,000 shall be distributed to the Lake Wylie Chamber of Commerce. The Myrtle Beach Chamber of Commerce and the
25 Georgetown Chamber of Commerce shall submit a report to the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means
26 Committee by December first each year describing how these funds were expended in the prior fiscal year.

27 **49.2.** (PRT: Destination Specific Tourism Marketing) The minimum grant awarded by the Destination Specific Tourism
28 Program shall be \$250,000. Each state dollar must be matched with two dollars of private funds. An organization receiving a state
29 grant must certify that, as of the date of the application: (i) the private funds are new dollars specifically designated for the purpose
30 of matching state funds; (ii) the private funds have not been previously allocated or designated for tourism-related destination
31 marketing; (iii) the organization has on hand or has an approved line of credit of not less than the amount of private funds needed to
32 provide the required match. Organizations applying for a grant must include in the grant application, information on how the
33 organization proposes to measure the success of the marketing and public relations program, including the estimated return on
34 investment to the state. Promotional programs proposed by an applicant must be based on research-based outcomes. Grants must
35 be made only to organizations that have a proven record of success in creating and sustaining new and repeat visitation to its area
36 and must have sufficient resources to create, plan, implement, and measure the marketing and promotional efforts undertaken as a

1 part of the program. The department must award a grant only to one qualified destination marketing organization within their tourism
2 region where the organization's private funds are raised. An organization receiving a grant must use the public and private funds
3 only for the purpose of destination specific marketing and public relations designed to target international and/or domestic travelers
4 outside the state to destinations within the state. All grants that qualify under the program must be funded if funds are available.
5 Funding of all qualified grants will be on a first come first served basis with such basis retained throughout the term of this proviso.
6 No organization shall receive in the first quarter more than fifty percent of the state dollars allocated to the program. If by the end
7 of the third quarter matching funds are still available with no other organizations meeting the criteria for funding, the funds will be
8 distributed to the organization or organizations that have and can meet all of the requirements of this proviso. Grant recipients shall
9 provide an annual report by November first, to the Chairmen of the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means
10 Committee and the director of the Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism on the expenditure of the grants funds and on the
11 proposed outcome measures.

12 **49.3.** (PRT: Advertising Funds Carry Forward) The Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism may carry forward any
13 unexpended funds appropriated on the Advertising line within Program II. A. Tourism Sales and Marketing from the prior fiscal year
14 into the current fiscal year to be used for the same purposes which include the Tourism Partnership Fund, Destination Specific
15 Marketing Grants and the agency advertising fund.

16 **49.4.** (PRT: Film Marketing) From the funds authorized to the Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism in Section 49, Part
17 IA of this Act for the South Carolina Film Commission, the department may use the film marketing funds for the following purposes:
18 (1) to allow for assistance with recruitment and infrastructure development of the film industry; (2) to develop a film crew base; (3)
19 to develop ally support in the film industry; (4) marketing and special events; and (5) to allow for assistance with the auditing and
20 legal service expenses associated with the Motion Picture Incentive Act.

21 **49.5.** (PRT: Motion Picture Administration Application Fee) The Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism may charge an
22 application fee for the Motion Picture Incentive programs and may retain and expend these funds for the purposes of meeting
23 administrative, data collection, credit analysis, cost-benefit analysis, reporting and auditing, and other statutory obligations. A fee
24 schedule must be established and approved by the Director of the Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism.

25 **49.6.** (PRT: Gift Shops) At the discretion of the Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism, the State House Gift Shop may
26 close on weekends.

27 **49.7.** (PRT: PARD Interest) The department is hereby prohibited from utilizing the interest generated in the PARD program for
28 anything other than the uses authorized by the law creating PARD. Should the PARD account not reach the required amount of
29 \$920,000 to activate the minimum \$20,000 per county distribution, the department shall carry forward the funding until such time as
30 the funds are sufficient to distribute as originally intended.

31 **49.8.** (PRT: Wage and Supplier Rebate Funds) From the funds set aside pursuant to the Motion Picture Incentive Act, any funds
32 committed to film projects shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year and used for the same purpose. Any uncommitted funds
33 shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year and must be used solely for wage and supplier rebate funds pursuant to the Motion
34 Picture Incentive Act and may not be used for any other purpose.

1 **49.9.** (PRT: Funds Exempt from Budget Cut) In the calculation of any across the board cut mandated by the Executive Budget
2 Office or the General Assembly, any amounts appropriated for pass through, special items, or other items specified in any general
3 proviso, which are exempt from reduction, shall be excluded from the Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism's base budget.

4 **49.10.** (PRT: PARD) The Department of Parks, Recreation, and Tourism shall be authorized to expend restricted funds for the
5 Parks and Recreation Development Fund (PARD) in accordance with the Section 51-23-20 of the 1976 Code, Regulations, and
6 generally accepted accounting standards. The department is allowed to reimburse PARD grantees from current year funds for prior
7 year expenditures ~~for a period of three years~~ as allowed in Section 51-23-30 of the 1976 Code.

8 *For the current fiscal year, funds placed in a County Area account as allowed in Section 51-23-30 of the 1976 Code may remain*
9 *unexpended in the account indefinitely, any regulation or provision to the contrary notwithstanding.*

10 **49.11.** (PRT: Admission Fees and Charges) The department may impose reasonable fees and charges for admission to and/or use
11 of park and recreational facilities and the revenues from such fees and charges must be used for park and recreational uses.

12 **49.12.** (PRT: Vending Services) The State Park Service, an office within the Department of Parks, Recreation, and Tourism shall
13 be granted an exemption requiring the State Park Service to use the Commission for the Blind for vending services. All revenues
14 earned by vending and retail operations at the State Parks shall be retained by the department to support the operational costs of the
15 South Carolina State Parks. These funds may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year and must be used for the same purpose.
16 This exemption does not apply to vending services at the State Welcome Centers.

17 **49.13.** (PRT: State Funded Grant Programs) Any unexpended general funds appropriated for the PARD Grants, Undiscovered
18 SC, and Sports Marketing Grants Programs shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and used
19 for the same purpose.

20 **49.14.** (PRT: Beach Access) Of the funds appropriated for state parks, the department shall utilize such funds to open pedestrian,
21 non-motorized vehicular and golf cart ingress and egress to Myrtle Beach State Park at the intersection of US Highway 17 and Center
22 South Road in Myrtle Beach, and/or at other location(s) which legally and safely affords such ingress and egress. Said access shall
23 be subject to the rules and regulations of the department governing uniform closure of park ingress during periods of peak usage.

24 **49.15.** (PRT: SC Film Office Rebate Funds) From the funds authorized pursuant to the Motion Picture Incentive Act, any rebates
25 awarded by the SC Film Office may be paid without distinction of the source of funds.

26 **49.16.** RESERVED

27 *49.17. (PRT: Compensatory Payment) In the event the Governor declares a State of Emergency, employees of the Department of*
28 *Parks, Recreation and Tourism may be paid for actual hours worked in lieu of accruing compensatory time, at the discretion of the*
29 *agency director, and providing funds are available.*

30 *49.18. (PRT: State Parks Maintenance) The Department of Parks, Recreation, and Tourism shall utilize the \$1,000,000*
31 *appropriated in Act No. 91 of 2015, by proviso 118.14, Item (41)(h) and the \$3,000,000 appropriated in Act No. 284 of 2016, by*
32 *proviso 118.16, Item (39)(g) for the Medal of Honor Museum for state parks maintenance needs.*

1 **SECTION 50 - P320 - DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE**
2

3 **50.1.** (CMRC: Development - Publications Revenue) The proceeds from the sale of publications may be retained in the agency's
4 printing, binding, and advertising account to offset increased costs.

5 **50.2.** (CMRC: Economic Dev. Coordinating Council - Set Aside Fund) From the amount set aside in Section 12-28-2910, the
6 council is authorized to use up to ten percent of such amount for actual operating expenses in support of administrative program costs
7 and business recruitment and retention and up to \$60,000 to support the Geographic Information Systems (GIS) program, as approved
8 by council. Any balance on June thirtieth of the prior fiscal year may be carried forward and expended for the same purposes in the
9 current fiscal year.

10 **50.3.** (CMRC: Coordinating Council Funds) In order to provide maximum flexibility to encourage the creation of new jobs and
11 capital investment, the Coordinating Council for Economic Development has the authority to transfer economic development funds
12 at its disposal to the Closing Fund, provided the transfer is approved by a majority vote of the Coordinating Council members in a
13 public meeting. Any unexpended balance on June thirtieth, of the prior fiscal year may be carried forward and expended in the
14 current fiscal year by the Department of Commerce for the same purpose.

15 **50.4.** (CMRC: Export Trade Show Funds) Funds collected from South Carolina companies for offsetting costs associated with
16 participation in future trade shows may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year to the current fiscal year and used for that
17 purpose.

18 **50.5.** (CMRC: Special Events Advisory Committee) The Department of Commerce is required to establish a Special Events
19 Advisory Committee to provide oversight to the department as it relates to the department's Special Events Fund. The Advisory
20 Committee shall be made up of contributors to the Fund appointed by the Secretary of Commerce and shall consist of no fewer than
21 eight members, including a chairman. The Advisory Committee shall establish guidelines for the use of these funds. The Department
22 of Commerce shall prepare a detailed report and have an independent audit of all expenditures of the fund during the previous
23 calendar year. None of these funds shall be used for operating expenses. The report shall be submitted to the Governor, the Speaker
24 of the House, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and Chairman of
25 the Senate Finance Committee.

26 **50.6.** (CMRC: Development-Rental Revenue) Revenue received from the sublease on non-state-owned office space may be
27 retained and expended to offset the cost of the department's leased office space.

28 **50.7.** (CMRC: Development-Ad Sales Revenue) The department may charge a fee for ad sales in department authorized
29 publications and may use these fees to offset the cost of printing and production of the publications. Any revenue generated above
30 the actual cost shall be remitted to the General Fund.

31 **50.8.** (CMRC: Foreign Offices) The Secretary of Commerce shall be authorized to appoint the staff of the department's foreign
32 offices on a contractual basis on such terms as the Secretary deems appropriate, subject to review by the Department of
33 Administration.

34 **50.9.** (CMRC: Funding For I-73) Of the funds authorized for the Coordinating Council Economic Development, \$500,000 shall
35 be made available for the routing, planning and construction of I-73.

1 **50.10.** (CMRC: Closing Fund) In order to encourage and facilitate economic development, funds appropriated for the Closing
 2 Fund for competitive recruitment purposes shall be used as approved by the Coordinating Council for Economic Development. Any
 3 unexpended at the end of the prior fiscal year may be carried forward and expended in the current fiscal year by the Department of
 4 Commerce for the same purposes.

5 **50.11.** (CMRC: Coordinating Council - Application Fee Deposits) Application fees received by the department must be deposited
 6 within five business days from the Coordinating Council application approval date.

7 **50.12.** (CMRC: Recycling Advisory Council Reporting) The Recycling Market Development Advisory Council must submit an
 8 annual report outlining recycling activities to the Governor and members of the General Assembly by March fifteenth each year.

9 **50.13.** (CMRC: Regional Economic Development Organizations) The Department of Commerce shall utilize \$5,000,000
 10 appropriated in ~~Fiscal Year 2018-19~~ *the current fiscal year* for Regional Economic Development Organizations to provide funds to
 11 the following economic development organizations and must be disbursed as follows:

 23 the organization as defined by the Department of Commerce.

 30 House Ways and Means Committee and the Secretary of Commerce on the expenditure of the funds and on the outcome measures.

31 Any unexpended, unallocated, or undistributed funds appropriated in prior fiscal years for Regional Economic Development
 32 Organizations shall first be made available to Regional Economic Development Organizations and any remainder shall be transferred
 33 to the Rural Infrastructure Fund at the Department of Commerce. If more than one alliance applies for the same funds, the funds
 34 will be distributed pro-rata.

35 **50.14.** (CMRC: SC Mfg Extension Partnership) No funds appropriated to the department that are designated for the SC
 36 Manufacturing Extension Partnership may be utilized to compensate employees or individuals who engage in lobbying services on

1 behalf of the department or the partnership. In addition, the department shall prepare an annual report on the SC Manufacturing
2 Extension Partnership's expenditures for the prior fiscal year and shall submit the report to the Chairman of the Senate Finance
3 Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee by November first.

4 **50.15.** (CMRC: Business Incubator/Innovation Program) Any funds appropriated to the department for the Business
5 Incubator/Innovation Program shall be used for eligible projects that address one or more of the goals in the South Carolina
6 Innovation Plan and any investments must be accompanied by a dollar-for-dollar match from non-state appropriated funds. Up to
7 \$300,000 may be used by the department for administrative costs associated with this program.

8 **50.16.** (CMRC: Council on Competitiveness) The Department of Commerce shall utilize the funds appropriated in the current
9 fiscal year for the South Carolina Council on Competitiveness to provide funds for existing business economic development
10 activities. Each dollar of state funds disbursed must be matched equally with non-state appropriated funds and prior to the
11 disbursement of funds, the Council on Competitiveness must certify that these funds are new dollars specifically designated for the
12 purpose of matching state funds and have not been previously allocated or designated for economic development. The Council on
13 Competitiveness shall provide a report on the expenditure of the funds and on the outcome measures by January first, to the Chairman
14 of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee and the Secretary of Commerce.

15 **50.17.** (CMRC: Grant Funds Carry Forward) The Department of Commerce may carry forward any unexpended balance on June
16 thirtieth of the prior fiscal year of grant funds appropriated and/or authorized for Innovation, Research/Applied Research Centers,
17 SCOPE, and LocateSC and expend such funds in the current fiscal year for the same purpose.

18 **50.18.** (CMRC: Road Closures Related to Navy Base Intermodal Facility) The Division of Public Railways is authorized to close
19 any street or road on or in the vicinity of the former Charleston Navy Base to the extent necessary to implement the Navy Base
20 Intermodal Facility. Such closure shall not deny access to any property owners abutting the closed section of the street or road, or
21 in the event access is denied, alternate access shall be provided.

22 **50.19.** (CMRC: Funding for Rail Infrastructure) Of the funds authorized for the Coordinating Council for Economic Development
23 under Section 12-10-85 (B) of the 1976 Code, the Secretary of Commerce may utilize these funds toward state-owned rail
24 infrastructure projects.

25 **50.20.** (CMRC: Distribution Facility) The Navy Base Intermodal Facility owned by Palmetto Railways, a division of the
26 Department of Commerce, shall be considered a distribution facility for the purpose of sales tax exemptions associated with the
27 purchase of equipment and construction materials.

28 **50.21.** (CMRC: Development - Funding for Rural Infrastructure) *There is established within the Department of Commerce the*
29 *Rural School District and Economic Development Closing Fund. The Secretary of Commerce shall use the fund to facilitate*
30 *economic development and infrastructure improvements for projects that create a minimum of fifty jobs located within the twenty-*
31 *eight school districts with the lowest Index of Taxpaying Ability (ITA) in the State of South Carolina. The ITA for any given school*
32 *district is based on the assessed value of total taxable property in the district divided by the total taxable property in the state. The*
33 *Department of Commerce shall coordinate with the Department of Revenue to receive the annual list of state school districts index*
34 *of taxpaying ability. Funds are to be used on, but not limited to, economic development projects, water and sewer infrastructure,*
35 *and school building infrastructure. The funds must be designated for a district project in a year that the district is one of the twenty-*
36 *eight lowest school districts on the ITA list. However, once a project begins, the funds may be utilized to finish that specified project.*

6 **52.1.** (PPDA: USS Laffey Overnight Stays) From the funds authorized or appropriated to Patriots Point Development Authority
7 as “other operating expenses” members of the USS Laffey Association who are temporarily present at Patriots Point to perform
8 voluntary maintenance on the USS Laffey may remain onboard the vessel overnight if the Executive Director approves and has
9 deemed it safe to do so.
10

11 **SECTION 54 - P450 - RURAL INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY**
12

13 **54.1.** (RIA: Rural Infrastructure Fund Carry Forward) The Rural Infrastructure Authority may carry forward from the prior
14 fiscal year into the current fiscal year, funds appropriated to the Rural Infrastructure Fund. The authority shall retain any unexpended
15 funds at the close of the fiscal year and these funds shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year.

16 **54.2.** (RIA: Carry Forward - Local Government Assistance) The Rural Infrastructure Authority may carry forward from prior
17 fiscal years to the current fiscal year funds appropriated for the purpose of providing financial assistance and for matching federal
18 funds for financial assistance to local governments with water, wastewater, and sewer projects.

19 **54.3.** (RIA: Carry Forward Calculation) For purposes of calculating the amount of funds which may be carried forward by the
20 Rural Infrastructure Authority, grant and loan program funds carried forward by the Office of Local Government shall be excluded
21 from the calculation of the carry forward authorized by provision elsewhere in this act.

22 **54.4.** (RIA: State Water Pollution Control Revolving Fund) In the event that any state funds remain after fully matching federal
23 grants for the State Revolving Funds under the Clean Water Act or Safe Drinking Water Act, such funds may be deposited into the
24 South Carolina Infrastructure Revolving Loan Fund established pursuant to Section 11-40-50.

25 **54.5.** (RIA: Statewide Water and Sewer Fund) The Rural Infrastructure Authority shall use the funds allocated for the Statewide
26 Water and Sewer Fund to assist qualified infrastructure projects not eligible for the Rural Infrastructure Fund. The authority shall
27 utilize the same procedures and guidelines established for the Rural Infrastructure Fund to select qualified projects for the Statewide
28 Water and Sewer Fund. The authority may carry forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year, funds appropriated
29 to the Statewide Water and Sewer Fund.
30

31 **SECTION 57 - B040 - JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT**
32

33 **57.1.** (JUD: Prohibit County Salary Supplements) County salary supplements of Judicial Department personnel shall be
34 prohibited.

1 **57.2.** (JUD: County Offices For Judges) Every county shall provide for each circuit and family judge residing therein an office
2 with all utilities including a private telephone, and shall provide the same for Supreme Court Justices and Judges of the Court of
3 Appeals upon their request.

4 **57.3.** (JUD: Commitments to Treatment Facilities) ~~The appropriation for continued implementation of Article 7, Chapter 17,~~
5 ~~Title 44 of the 1976 Code, Chapter 24, Title 44 of the 1976 Code, and Chapter 52, Title 44 of the 1976 Code, relating to commitments,~~
6 ~~admissions and discharges to mental health facilities, or treatment facility for the purpose of alcohol and drug abuse treatment, shall~~
7 ~~be expended for the compensation of court appointed private examiners, guardians ad litem, and attorneys for proposed patients, and~~
8 ~~related costs arising from the filing, service and copying of legal papers and the transcription of hearings or testimony. Court~~
9 ~~appointed private examiners, guardians ad litem and attorneys shall be paid at such rates or schedules as are jointly determined to be~~
10 ~~reasonable by the South Carolina Association of Probate Judges, the State Court Administrator, and the South Carolina Department~~
11 ~~of Mental Health with the approval of the Attorney General. The Judicial Department shall notify the Senate Finance Committee~~
12 ~~and the House Ways and Means Committee of any fee adjustment or change in schedule before implementation.~~

13 **57.4.** (JUD: Judicial Commitment) ~~Except as otherwise provided in Section 117.5, no money appropriated pursuant to Item VI,~~
14 ~~Judicial Commitment shall be used to compensate any state employees appointed by the court as examiners, guardians ad litem, or~~
15 ~~attorneys nor shall such funds be used in payment to any state agency for providing such services by their employees.~~

16 **57.5.** (JUD: Judicial Expense Allowance) Each Supreme Court Justice, Court of Appeals Judge, Family Court Judge and Circuit
17 Court Judge and any retired judge who receives payment for performing full-time judicial duties pursuant to Section 9-8-120 of the
18 South Carolina Code of Laws, shall receive one thousand dollars per month as expense allowance.

19 **57.6.** (JUD: Special Judge Compensation) In the payment of funds from “Contractual Services”, and “Administrative Fund”,
20 that no special judge shall be paid for more than a two week term within a fiscal year except that this restriction will not apply in
21 case of an ongoing trial.

22 **57.7.** (JUD: BPI/Merit) Judicial employees shall receive base and average merit pay in the same percentages as such pay are
23 granted to classified state employees.

24 **57.8.** (JUD: Supreme Court Bar Admissions) Any funds collected from the Supreme Court Bar Admissions Office may be
25 deposited into an escrow account with the State Treasurer’s Office. The department is authorized to receive, expend, retain, and
26 carry forward these funds.

27 **57.9.** (JUD: Travel Reimbursement) State employees of the Judicial Department traveling on official state business must be
28 reimbursed in accordance with Section 117.20(J) of this act.

29 **57.10.** (JUD: Interpreters) The funds appropriated in this section for “Interpreters” shall be used to offset costs associated with
30 interpreters appointed in judicial proceedings under Sections 17-1-50, 15-27-155, and 15-27-15. The selection, use, and
31 reimbursement of interpreters shall be determined under such guidelines as may be established by the Chief Justice of the Supreme
32 Court.

33 **57.11.** (JUD: Reimbursement Receipt Deposit) Amounts received as payment for reproducing, printing, and distributing copies
34 of court rules and other department documents shall be retained for use by the department.

35 **57.12.** (JUD: Surplus Property Disposal) Technology equipment that has been declared surplus may be donated directly to
36 counties for use in court-related activities.

1 **57.13.** (JUD: Judicial Carry Forward) In addition to the funds appropriated in this section, the funds appropriated for the Judicial
2 Department in the prior fiscal year which are not expended during that fiscal year may be carried forward to be expended in the
3 current fiscal year.

4 **57.14.** (JUD: Case Management Services) The Judicial Department shall retain revenue generated by charging a fee for
5 technology support services provided to users of the State case management system. These funds may be expended and carried
6 forward to offset the costs of supporting and maintaining the case management system.

7 **57.15.** (JUD: Magistrates' Training) From the funds appropriated to the Judicial Department, the department shall provide
8 magistrates annual continuing education on domestic violence, which may include, but is not limited to:

9 (1) the nature, extent, and causes of domestic and family violence;

10 (2) issues of domestic and family violence concerning children;

11 (3) prevention of the use of violence by children;

12 (4) sensitivity to gender bias and cultural, racial, and sexual issues;

13 (5) the lethality of domestic and family violence;

14 (6) legal issues relating to domestic violence and child custody;

15 (7) procedures, penalties, programs, and other issues relating to criminal domestic violence, including social and psychological
16 issues relating to such violence, the vulnerability of victims and volatility of perpetrators, and the court's role in ensuring that the
17 parties have appropriate and adequate representation;

18 (8) procedures and other matters relating to issuing orders of protection from domestic violence.

19 **57.16.** (JUD: Judges Salary Exemption) For the current fiscal year, judges' salaries and related employer contributions in Part
20 IA, Section 57, are exempt from mid-year across-the-board reductions.

21 **57.17.** (JUD: Judicial Department Applicability) For purposes of this act and any other provision of law that would have any
22 effect on the expenditure of state revenue through the applicability of the particular provision or through compliance with a mandate
23 or requirement of the provision, the terms "state agency" or "agency" do not include any component of the Judicial Department
24 unless the provision of law specifically includes these entities and the inclusion only applies for purposes of the particular provision.

25 **57.18.** (JUD: Court Costs Carry Forward) The Judicial Department shall retain the funds collected from costs related to court
26 proceedings (including the cost of hearings, investigations, prosecution, service of process and court reporter services) under Rules
27 413 or 502 of the SC Appellate Court Rules, or from costs related to the appointment of a receiver or an attorney to assist the receiver
28 under Rule 413, that are assessed against a party. The department is authorized to receive, expend, retain, and carry forward these
29 funds which shall be used for the same purpose.

30 **57.19.** (JUD: Appellate Court Fee) The Judicial Department shall retain the funds collected as required by the SC Appellate Court
31 Rules. The department is authorized to receive, expend, retain, and carry forward these funds which shall be used by the department.

32 **57.20.** (JUD: Interpreter Training and Certification) The Judicial Department shall collect and retain funds received from
33 applicants for interpreter training and certification tests. These funds shall be used to offset expenses incurred for the SC Court
34 Interpreter Certification Program. The department is authorized to receive, expend, retain, and carry forward these funds.

1 **SECTION 58 - C050 - ADMINISTRATIVE LAW COURT**

2

3 **58.1.** (ALC: Copying Costs Revenue Deposit) The Administrative Law Court shall retain and expend, for the same purpose for
4 which it is generated, all revenue received during the current fiscal year as payment for printing and distributing copies of court rules
5 and other agency documents.

6 **58.2.** (ALC: County Office Space for Judges) Every county shall provide for each Administrative Law Judge residing therein,
7 upon their request, an office within the existing physical facilities if space is available, to include all utilities and a private telephone.
8 The request shall only be made provided that the judge's residence is not within fifty miles of the official headquarters of the agency
9 by which the Administrative Law Judge is employed.

10 **58.3.** (ALC: ALJ Travel) While holding court or on other official business outside the county in which he resides, within fifty
11 miles of his residence, an Administrative Law Judge is entitled to a subsistence allowance in the amount of \$35 per day plus such
12 mileage allowance for travel as is provided for other employees of the State. While holding court or on other official business at a
13 location fifty miles or more from his residence, an Administrative Law Judge is entitled to a subsistence allowance in the amount as
14 provided in this act for members of the General Assembly plus such mileage allowance for travel as is provided for other employees
15 of the State. However, notwithstanding any other provision of law, the allowance as provided shall not exceed \$8,000 per judge in
16 a fiscal year.

17

18 **SECTION 59 - E200 - OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL**

19

20 **59.1.** (AG: Prior Year Expenditures) The Office of the Attorney General is authorized to use unexpended federal funds in the
21 current fiscal year to pay for expenditures incurred in the prior fiscal year.

22 **59.2.** (AG: Other Funds Carry Forward) Any balance of unexpended funds, not including general fund appropriations, may be
23 carried forward for the operation of the Office of Attorney General.

24 **59.3.** (AG: Reimbursement for Expenditures) The Office of the Attorney General may retain for general operating purposes,
25 any reimbursement of funds for expenses incurred in a prior fiscal year.

26 **59.4.** (AG: Donation Carry Forward) All revenue derived from donations received at the Office of the Attorney General shall
27 be retained, carried forward, and expended according to agreement reached between the donor, or donors, and the Attorney General.

28 **59.5.** (AG: Securities Fee Revenue) After the provisions of Section 35-1-702(b) of the 1976 Code have been satisfied, and upon
29 notification to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee that such
30 provisions have been satisfied, the next \$20,500,000 of Securities Fee revenues collected during the current fiscal year by the Office
31 of the Attorney General shall be remitted to the General Fund of the State. The Office of the Attorney General may retain the next
32 \$400,000 collected and may utilize these funds for operations to include expert witness expenses, investigative costs, trial preparation,
33 and other related expenses associated with the increase in licensed securities agents. These funds may be carried forward from the
34 prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and utilized for the same purpose. Remaining Securities Fee revenues collected during
35 the current fiscal year shall be remitted to the General Fund of the State.

1 **59.6.** (AG: Savannah River Maritime Commission Funds) The Office of the Attorney General is authorized to use funds
2 appropriated for litigation expenses related to the Savannah River Maritime Commission to reimburse litigation expenditures incurred
3 by the Office of the Attorney General on behalf of the Savannah River Maritime Commission during the current fiscal year.
4 Following the conclusion of these litigation matters any remaining funds shall be deposited in the General Fund.

5 **59.7.** (AG: Gang Violence Prevention/Youth Mentor) The Office of the Attorney General may expend other funds to implement
6 and maintain gang prevention and youth mentoring programs in conjunction with Section 63-19-1430 of the 1976 Code, the Youth
7 Mentor Act.

8 **59.8.** (AG: Litigation Recovery Account) During the current fiscal year, when there is a recovery or an award in any litigation
9 managed by the Attorney General, any funds received that would have otherwise been credited to the General Fund shall be deposited
10 to the credit of a special account created in the Office of State Treasurer entitled "Litigation Recovery Account." The funds deposited
11 in this account must be expended only as prescribed by law.

12 **59.9.** (AG: Public Official Attorney Fees) The Executive Director of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority shall pay from
13 the Insurance Reserve Fund, up to \$50,000 of opposing attorney's fees and court costs as ordered by the court in those cases in which
14 the Attorney General defends one or more public officers in their official capacities.

15 The Attorney General must certify to the Executive Director the amount the court has ordered the Attorney General to pay for
16 opposing attorney's fees and court costs and upon receipt of the certification, the Executive Director shall pay up to \$50,000 of the
17 amount certified to the appropriate individual or entity. The Attorney General must report any court ordered payment of attorney's
18 fees and court costs that exceed \$50,000 to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives,
19 the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee for consideration by
20 the General Assembly.

21 **59.10.** (AG: Victim/Witness Program Formula Distribution) If funds in the South Carolina Victims' Compensation Fund exceed
22 the amount required to operate the State Crime Victim Compensation Department and pay claims of crime victims, the first \$650,000
23 of such excess must be used for Victim/Witness programs by distribution to Judicial Circuits based on a formula and criteria
24 developed by the policy committee, and otherwise subject to requirements of Proviso 60.8.

25 **59.11.** (AG: Physical Abuse Examinations) Of the funds appropriated in this section for Victims' Rights, up to \$120,000 may be
26 expended for physical abuse examinations.

27 **59.12.** (AG: Procuring Services) In order to maximize services for victims of crime, if the fulfilling of requirements pursuant to
28 Section 16-3-1410 of the 1976 Code, necessitates hiring any outside entities, the State Crime Victim Compensation Department must
29 follow procedures established by the SC Consolidated Procurement Code. Any entity contracting with the agency will submit an
30 annual report by August first to the Governor's Office and to the Chairmen of the Senate Finance Committee and House Ways and
31 Means Committee detailing expenditures from the prior fiscal year in accordance with the State Office of Victims' Assistance. The
32 Attorney General's Office is directed to transfer \$122,032 of the funds carried forward from the prior fiscal year in the Victims'
33 Compensation Fund, and up to \$41,892 from general funds from Victim's Assistance to pay for any contracts or services procured.

34 **59.13.** (AG: Crime Victims Ombudsman) For the current fiscal year, the State Crime Victim Compensation Department shall
35 transfer \$116,000 to the Crime Victims Ombudsman's Office to be used for administrative and operational support.

1 **59.14.** (AG: State Crime Victim Compensation Department) For the current fiscal year, The State Crime Victim Compensation
2 Department may enter into memoranda of agreement with third-party victim service providers to secure emergency medical,
3 transportation, or other crisis stabilization services on a reimbursable basis. Such agreements shall not allow for more than eight
4 percent of the total reimbursement to cover a provider's administrative, marketing, and advocacy costs. Annually, and no later than
5 October first of each year, the State Crime Victim Compensation Department shall report to the Governor, the Chairman of the
6 Senate Finance Committee, and the Chairman of House Ways and Means Committee on the performance of third-party providers
7 and the use of funds authorized pursuant to this provision in the prior fiscal year.

8 **59.15.** (AG: State Crime Victim Compensation) A county or municipality may retain carry forward funds that were collected
9 pursuant to Sections 14-1-206 (B) and (D), 14-1-207 (B) and (D), 14-1-208 (B) and (D), and 14-1-211 (B) of the 1976 Code, but no
10 more than \$25,000 or ten percent of funds collected in the prior fiscal year, whichever is higher. If a county or municipality does
11 not spend at least ninety percent of the funds collected pursuant to Sections 14-1-206 (B) and (D), 14-1-207 (B) and (D), 14-1-208
12 (B) and (D), and 14-1-211 (B) on Article 16, Chapter 3, Title 16 first priority and/or second priority programs during the fiscal year
13 that the funds are received then the county or municipality shall remit any unspent funds that are greater than the allowed carried
14 forward funds, regardless of the year collected, to the State Victim Assistance Program (SVAP) with the Office of the Attorney
15 General within 120 days after the end of the fiscal year. All funds must be accounted for in the annual audit for each county or
16 municipality.

17 The State Crime Victim Compensation Department shall offer training and technical assistance to each municipality and county
18 annually on acceptable use of both priority one and priority two funds and funds available for competitive bid.

19 The State Crime Victim Compensation Department is authorized to transfer to the State Victim Assistance Program any state funds
20 deemed available under Crime Victims Compensation authority to the State Victim Assistance Programs be placed in the competitive
21 bid process.

22 The State Victim Assistance Program shall offer any funds remitted to it to non-profit organizations that provide direct victim
23 services on a competitive bid process. These funds may be used by the non-profit for administrative costs and victim services.

24 **59.16.** (AG: Crime Victim Training Certification and Statistical Analysis) Of the funds appropriated and/or authorized for the
25 State Crime Victim Compensation Fund, \$75,000 may be used to support the State Crime Victim Training, Certification and
26 Statistical Analysis Division.

27 **59.17.** (AG: Crime Victim Services Funeral and Burial Compensation) The Department of Crime Victim Compensation shall set
28 a funeral and burial compensation maximum of \$6,500.

30 **SECTION 60 - E210 - COMMISSION ON PROSECUTION COORDINATION**

31
32 **60.1.** (PCC: Solicitor Salary) The amount appropriated in this section for salaries of solicitors shall be paid to each full-time
33 solicitor. Each full-time circuit solicitor shall earn a salary not less than each full-time circuit court judge.

34 **60.2.** (PCC: Solicitor Expense Allowance) Each solicitor shall receive one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) per month as expense
35 allowance.

1 **60.3.** (PCC: Judicial Circuits State Support) The amount appropriated and authorized in this section for Judicial Circuits (16
2 State Support shall be apportioned among the circuits. The first \$4,692,961 shall be distributed on a per capita basis based upon the
3 current official census. The next \$1,179,041 shall be distributed on a pro-rata basis. Payment shall be made as soon after the
4 beginning of each quarter as practical.

5 **60.4.** (PCC: Solicitor Carry Forward) Any unexpended balance on June thirtieth, of the prior fiscal year, may be carried forward
6 into the current fiscal year and expended for the operation of the solicitor's office relating to operational expenses.

7 **60.5.** (PCC: Solicitor's Office - County Funding Level) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the amounts appropriated
8 for solicitors' offices shall be in addition to any amounts presently being provided by the county for these services and may not be
9 used to supplant funding already allocated for such services without any additional charges. If the county reduces the amount of
10 support provided to solicitors' offices below the level provided in the prior fiscal year, the Solicitor shall notify the Chairman of the
11 Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee of the amount of such reduced support.

12 **60.6.** (PCC: Solicitors Victim/Witness Assistance Programs) When funds are available, the amount appropriated and authorized
13 in Part IA, Section 60 for Solicitors Victim/Witness Assistance Programs shall be apportioned among the circuits on a per capita
14 basis and based upon the current official census. Payment shall be made as soon after the beginning of each quarter as practical.

15 **60.7.** (PCC: CDV Prosecution) The amount appropriated and authorized in this section for Criminal Domestic Violence
16 Prosecution shall be apportioned among the circuits on a pro-rata basis. If not privileged information, the Prosecution Coordination
17 Commission shall collect and retain information and data regarding Criminal Domestic Violence Prosecution and shall include:
18 the number of dispositions, types of dispositions and county in which the disposition took place and shall provide the General
19 Assembly with an annual report no later than sixty days after the conclusion of the fiscal year.

20 **60.8.** (PCC: Establish Victim/Witness Program) The funds appropriated in this section for Victim/Witness Program must be
21 equally divided among the judicial circuits, less any adjustments made for budget reductions. The funds for each circuit must be
22 distributed to the solicitor's office of that circuit and only used by the solicitor for the purpose of establishing a Victim/Witness
23 Program in the circuit which shall provide, but not be limited to, the following services:

24 (1) Make available to victims/witnesses information concerning their cases from filing in general sessions court through
25 disposition.

26 (2) Keep the victim/witness informed of his rights and support his right to protection from intimidation.

27 (3) Inform victims/witnesses of and make appropriate referrals to available services such as medical, social, counseling, and
28 victims' compensation services.

29 (4) Assist in the preparation of victims/witnesses for court.

30 (5) Provide assistance and support to the families or survivors of victims where appropriate.

31 (6) Provide any other necessary support services to victims/witnesses such as contact with employers or creditors.

32 (7) Promote public awareness of the program and services available for crime victims.

33 The funds may not be used for other victim-related services until the above functions are provided in an adequate manner.

34 It is the intent of the General Assembly that the amounts appropriated in this section for victim assistance programs in solicitors'
35 offices shall be in addition to any amounts presently being provided by the county for these services and may not be used to supplant
36 funding already allocated for such services. Any reduction by any county in funding for victim assistance programs in solicitors'

1 offices shall result in a corresponding decrease of state funds provided to the solicitors' office in that county for victim assistance
2 services. Each solicitor's office shall submit an annual financial and programmatic report which describes the use of these funds.
3 The report shall be submitted to the Governor, the Attorney General, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and the
4 Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee on October first, for the preceding fiscal year.

5 **60.9.** (PCC: DUI Prosecution) The amount appropriated and authorized in this section for Driving Under the Influence
6 Prosecution shall be apportioned among the circuits on a pro-rata basis. If not privileged information, the Prosecution Coordination
7 Commission shall collect and retain information and data regarding Driving Under the Influence Prosecution and shall include: the
8 number of dispositions, types of dispositions and county in which the disposition took place and shall provide the General Assembly
9 with an annual report no later than sixty days after the conclusion of the fiscal year.

10 **60.10.** (PCC: Violent Crime Prosecution) The amount appropriated and authorized in this section for Violent Crime Prosecution
11 shall be apportioned pro rata among the circuits. Payment shall be made as soon after the beginning of each quarter as practical.

12 **60.11.** (PCC: Caseload Equalization Funding) The amount appropriated in this Act and authorized for Caseload Equalization will
13 have the first \$3,450,000 distributed at an amount of \$75,000 per county. The remaining \$4,376,872 shall be distributed based upon
14 the average incoming caseload for each county as reported by the Judicial Department for the prior three fiscal years.

15 **60.12.** (PCC: Summary Court Domestic Violence Fund Distribution) The Summary Court Domestic Violence Prosecution
16 funding shall be distributed based upon ten percent of the average incoming caseload for each county as reported by the South
17 Carolina Judicial Department for the prior 3 fiscal years.

18
19 **SECTION 61 - E230 - COMMISSION ON INDIGENT DEFENSE**
20

21 **61.1.** (INDEF: Defense of Indigents Formula) The amount appropriated in this act for "Defense of Indigents" shall be
22 apportioned among counties in accord with Section 17-3-330 of the 1976 Code, but on a per capita basis and based upon the most
23 current official decennial census of the United States; provided that no county shall receive funding in an amount less than the amount
24 apportioned to it as of July 1, 2005. The level of contribution of each county as of July 1, 2001, must be maintained. No county
25 shall be permitted to contribute less money than the amount the county contributed in the prior fiscal year. Within the amount of
26 money established for indigent defense services, the State shall set aside \$3,000,000 (Death Penalty Trial Fund) annually for use of
27 the defense in capital cases pursuant to Section 16-3-26 of the 1976 Code, for juveniles facing the possibility of a sentence of life
28 without parole, and for the expenses of the operation of the Commission on Indigent Defense to include salaries and operations
29 expenses of the Death Penalty Trial Division. The State also shall set aside \$2,500,000 annually to pay fees and expenses of private
30 counsel appointed in noncapital cases pursuant to Section 17-3-50 (Conflict Fund). Of the funds generated from the fees imposed
31 under Sections 14-1-206(C)(4), 14-1-207(C)(6) and 14-1-208(C)(6) and the application fee provided in Section 17-3-30(B), on a
32 monthly basis, fifty percent must be deposited into the Death Penalty Trial Fund, fifteen percent must be deposited into the Conflict
33 Fund, and the remaining funds each month must be apportioned among the counties' public defender offices pursuant to Section
34 17-3-330. At the end of each fiscal year any leftover funds shall carryover to the next fiscal year. All applications for the payment
35 of fees and expenses in capital cases shall be applied for from the Death Penalty Trial Fund which shall be administered by the
36 Commission on Indigent Defense. All applications for the payment of fees and expenses of private counsel or expenses of public

1 defenders pursuant to Section 17-3-50 shall be applied for from the Conflict Fund administered by the Commission on Indigent
2 Defense. Reimbursement in excess of the hourly rate and limit set forth in Section 17-3-50 is authorized only if the court certifies,
3 in a written order with specific findings of fact, prior to the fees being incurred, that reimbursement in excess of the rates or limit is
4 necessary to provide reimbursement adequate to ensure effective assistance of counsel and reimbursement in excess of the limit is
5 appropriate because the services to be provided are reasonable and necessary. If prior approval by written order of the court is not
6 obtained, no additional fees shall be paid under any circumstances.

7 Upon a finding in ex parte proceedings that investigative, expert, or other services are reasonable and necessary for the
8 representation of the defendant, the court shall authorize the defendant's attorney to obtain such services on behalf of the defendant
9 and shall authorize the payment, from funds available to the Commission on Indigent Defense, of fees and expenses not to exceed
10 five hundred dollars as the court considers appropriate. Payment in excess of the five hundred dollar limit is authorized only if the
11 court certifies, in a written order with specific findings of fact, prior to the expense being incurred, that payment in excess of the
12 limit is appropriate because the services to be provided are reasonable and necessary to provide adequate defense. Payments shall
13 be made from funds appropriated for this purpose from the Commission of Indigent Defense. If prior approval by written order of
14 the court is not obtained, no additional expenses shall be paid under any circumstances.

15 Indigent defense vouchers authorized in this provision must be reviewed and paid pursuant to procedures and policies established
16 by the Commission on Indigent Defense. The commission shall provide a copy of the established procedures and policies to the
17 Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee.

18 **61.2.** (INDEF: State Employee Compensation Prohibited) Except as otherwise provided in Section 117.5, no money
19 appropriated pursuant to Defense of Indigents shall be used to compensate any state employees appointed by the court as examiners,
20 guardians ad litem or attorneys nor shall such funds be used in payment to any state agency for providing such services by their
21 employees.

22 **61.3.** (INDEF: Appellate Conflict Fund) The purpose of the Appellate Conflict Fund is to provide money to pay attorneys for
23 representing indigent defendants on appellate review when the Office of Appellate Defense is unable to do so. Funds designated for
24 appellate use in conflict cases shall be administered by the Commission on Indigent Defense. The Office of Appellate Defense must
25 first determine that it is unable to provide representation. Fees shall be \$40 per hour for out of court work and \$60 for in court work,
26 with a maximum of \$3,500 per case for noncapital appeals. Fees shall be \$50 per hour for out of court work and \$75 per hour for in
27 court work in capital appeals with a maximum of \$10,000 per capital appeal. The appropriate appellate court shall review and
28 approve vouchers for payment for appellate conflict cases. The Office of Appellate Defense shall continue to provide printing and
29 other support functions currently provided from their resources. On June thirtieth of each year, the Commission on Indigent Defense
30 shall review all outstanding obligations in this fund. Any unspent and unobligated money shall be used to pay outstanding vouchers
31 in the Death Penalty Trial Fund or the Conflict Fund, provided the designated fund has become exhausted during the year.

32 **61.4.** (INDEF: SC Appellate Court Rule 608 Appointments) The funds appropriated under "SC Appellate Court Rule 608
33 Appointments" shall be used for Civil Court Appointments including Termination of Parental Rights, Abuse and Neglect, Probate
34 Court Commitments, Sexually Violent Predator Act, and Post-Conviction Relief (PCR) and Criminal Conflict appointments to
35 reimburse court appointed private attorneys and for other expenditures as specified in this provision. SC Appellate Court Rule 608
36 Appointments funds may not be transferred or used for any other purpose.

1 A portion of the funds appropriated under “SC Appellate Court Rule 608 Appointments” shall be used for “Termination of Parental
2 Rights” cases and “Abuse and Neglect” cases to reimburse private attorneys who are appointed by the Family Court to represent
3 guardians ad litem, children, or parents under the provisions of S.C. Code Sections 20-7-110 et seq., 20-7-1570 et seq., 20-7-1695
4 (A)(2) et seq., 20-7-7205 et seq., and 20-7-8705 (4)(a) et seq.; for “Probate Court Commitment” cases to reimburse private attorneys
5 who are appointed by the Probate Court to represent indigent persons; and for “Sexually Violent Predator” cases to reimburse private
6 attorneys who are appointed by the Circuit Court pursuant to Sections 44-48-10, et seq., to represent indigent persons. When private
7 counsel is appointed pursuant to these provisions, counsel shall be reimbursed a reasonable fee to be determined on the basis of fifty
8 dollars per hour or reimbursement may also be made on the basis of a set (flat) fee. The method of payment and the amount of the
9 set fee will be determined by the Commission on Indigent Defense. Attorney fees shall not exceed two thousand dollars for any case
10 under which such private attorney is appointed.

11 A portion of the funds appropriated under “SC Appellate Court Rule 608 Appointments” shall be used for noncapital Post
12 Conviction Relief Cases. Any attorney appointed shall be compensated at a rate not to exceed forty dollars per hour for time expended
13 out of court and sixty dollars per hour for time expended in court, or on the basis of a set (flat) fee. The method of payment and
14 amount of set (flat) fee will be determined by the Commission on Indigent Defense. Attorney fees shall not exceed one thousand
15 dollars in any single case.

16 A portion of the funds appropriated under “SC Appellate Court Rule 608 Appointments” shall be used for noncapital criminal
17 cases pursuant to Section 17-3-50 (Conflict Fund). Any attorney appointed shall be compensated at a rate not to exceed forty dollars
18 per hour for time expended out of court and sixty dollars per hour for time expended in court, or on the basis of a set (flat) fee. The
19 method of payment and amount of set (flat) fee will be determined by the Commission on Indigent Defense. Attorney fees shall not
20 exceed three thousand five hundred dollars in any single felony case or one thousand dollars in any single misdemeanor case.

21 Reimbursement in excess of the hourly rate and limit set forth herein is authorized only if the court certifies, in a written order
22 with specific findings of fact, prior to the fees being incurred, that reimbursement in excess of the rates or limit is necessary to provide
23 reimbursement adequate to ensure effective assistance of counsel and reimbursement in excess of the limit is appropriate because
24 the services to be provided are reasonable and necessary. If prior approval by written order of the court is not obtained, no additional
25 fees shall be paid under any circumstances.

26 Upon a finding in ex parte proceedings that investigative, expert, or other services are reasonable and necessary for the
27 representation of the defendant, the court shall authorize the defendant’s attorney to obtain such services on behalf of the defendant
28 and shall authorize the payment, from funds available to the Commission on Indigent Defense, of fees and expenses not to exceed
29 five hundred dollars as the court considers appropriate. Payment in excess of the five hundred dollar limit is authorized only if the
30 court certifies, in a written order with specific findings of fact, prior to the expense being incurred, that payment in excess of the
31 limit is appropriate because the services to be provided are reasonable and necessary to provide adequate defense. Payments shall
32 be made from funds appropriated for this purpose from the Commission of Indigent Defense. If prior approval by written order of
33 the court is not obtained, no additional expenses shall be paid under any circumstances.

34 Indigent defense vouchers authorized in this provision must be reviewed and paid pursuant to procedures and policies established
35 by the Commission on Indigent Defense. The commission shall provide a copy of the established procedures and policies to the
36 Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee.

1 A portion of the funds appropriated under “SC Appellate Court Rule 608 Appointments” may be used by the Commission on
2 Indigent Defense to retain, on a contractual basis, the services of attorneys qualified to handle civil and criminal court appointments,
3 to be reimbursed in accordance with applicable provisos and statutes.

4 **61.5.** (INDEF: Carry Forward) To offset budget reductions, the Commission on Indigent Defense may carry forward and utilize
5 any unencumbered balances available in the Appellate Conflict Fund and the SC Appellate Court Rule 608 Appointment Fund at the
6 end of the prior fiscal year.

7 **61.6.** (INDEF: Public Defender Fee) Every person placed on probation on or after July 1, 2003, who was represented by a public
8 defender or appointed counsel, shall be assessed a fee of five hundred dollars. The revenue generated from this fee must be collected
9 by the clerk of court and sent on a monthly basis to the Commission on Indigent Defense. However, if a defendant fails to pay this
10 fee, this failure alone is not sufficient basis for incarceration for a probation violation. This assessment shall be collected and paid
11 over before any other fees.

12 **61.7.** (INDEF: Defense of Indigents Civil Action Application Fee) (A) A person requesting appointment of counsel in any
13 termination of parental rights (TPR), abuse and neglect, or any other civil court action in this state shall execute an affidavit that the
14 person is financially unable to employ counsel and that affidavit shall set forth all of the person’s assets. This affidavit must be
15 completed before counsel may be appointed. If it appears that the person has some assets but they are insufficient to employ private
16 counsel, the court, in its discretion, may order the person to pay these assets or a portion thereof to the Commission on Indigent
17 Defense.

18 (B) A forty dollar application fee for appointed counsel services must be collected from every person who executes an affidavit
19 that they are financially unable to employ counsel. The person may apply to the court, the clerk of court, or other appropriate official
20 for a waiver or reduction in the application fee. If it is determined that the person is unable to pay the application fee, the fee may
21 be waived or reduced, provided that if the fee is waived or reduced, the clerk or appropriate official shall report the amount waived
22 or reduced to the trial judge and the trial judge shall order the remainder of the fee paid by a time payment method or such method
23 as the trial judge deems appropriate. The clerk of court or other appropriate official shall collect the application fee imposed by this
24 section and remit the proceeds to the Commission on Indigent Defense on a monthly basis. The monies must be deposited in an
25 interest-bearing account separate from the general fund and used only to provide for indigent defense services. The monies shall be
26 administered by the Commission on Indigent Defense. The clerk of court or other appropriate official shall maintain a record of all
27 persons applying for representation and the disposition of the application and shall provide this information to the Commission on
28 Indigent Defense on a monthly basis as well as reporting the amount of funds collected or waived.

29 (C) In matters in which a juvenile is brought before a court, the parents or legal guardian of such juvenile shall execute the above
30 affidavit based upon their financial status and shall be responsible for paying any fee. In matters concerning juveniles, the parents
31 or legal guardians of said juvenile, shall be advised in writing of this requirement at the earliest stage of the proceedings against said
32 juvenile.

33 (D) Nothing contained above shall restrict or hinder a court from appointing counsel in any emergency proceedings or where
34 existing statutes do not provide sufficient time for an individual to complete the application process.

1 (E) The appointment of counsel, as herein before provided, creates a claim against the assets and estate of the person who is
2 provided counsel or the parents or legal guardians of a juvenile in an amount equal to the costs of representation as determined by a
3 voucher submitted by the appointed counsel and approved by the court, less that amount that the person pays to the appointed counsel.

4 (F) Such claim shall be filed in the office of the clerk of court in the county where the person is assigned counsel, but the filing
5 of a claim shall not constitute a lien against real or personal property of the person unless, in the discretion of the court, part or all of
6 such claim is reduced to judgment by appropriate order of the court, after serving the person with at least thirty days' notice that
7 judgment will be entered. When a claim is reduced to judgment, it shall have the same effect as judgments, except as modified by
8 this provision.

9 **61.8.** (INDEF: Exemption for Pass Through Funding) The funds distributed by the Commission on Indigent Defense to the
10 Legal Services Corporation in accordance with Section 14-1-204 of the 1976 Code shall not be considered part of the commission's
11 budget for purposes of calculating budget reductions.

12 **61.9.** (INDEF: Reporting Requirement) Circuit Public Defenders shall provide, in a manner and form as the agency head
13 requires, information and data concerning caseloads, dispositions, and other information as required by the agency head or General
14 Assembly. The agency shall withhold payments and transfers to Circuit Public Defenders who are not in compliance with the agency
15 reporting requirements.

16 **61.10.** (INDEF: Donation Carry Forward) The Commission on Indigent Defense may accept donations for the publication of
17 "The South Carolina Juvenile Collateral Consequences Checklist." All revenue derived from donations received at the Commission
18 on Indigent Defense shall be retained, carried forward and expended according to agreement reached between the donor, or donors,
19 and the Commission on Indigent Defense.

20 **61.11.** (INDEF: Capital Case Contract Attorneys) Funds appropriated from the Death Penalty Trial Fund may be used by the
21 commission to retain, on a contractual basis, the service of attorneys qualified to provide representation in capital proceedings to
22 include: capital trials, post-conviction relief actions, re-sentencing, appeals or any other capital litigation proceeding.

23 The commission shall establish all policies, procedures and contract provisions as it deems appropriate for the implementation of
24 the system, including but not limited to the selection and compensation of contract awardees.

25 **61.12.** (INDEF: Optional Courts and Indigent Representation) If a municipality has or elects to have an optional municipal court
26 system, it must provide adequate funds for representation of indigents. No public defender shall be appointed in any such court
27 unless the municipality and the office of the circuit public defender have reached an agreement for indigent representation and no
28 funds allocated to the commission shall be used to provide compensation for appointed counsel in municipal courts.

29
30 **SECTION 62 - D100 - STATE LAW ENFORCEMENT DIVISION**

31
32 **62.1.** (SLED: Special Account Carry Forward) Funds awarded to the State Law Enforcement Division by either court order or
33 from donations or contributions shall be deposited in a special account with the State Treasurer, and shall be carried forward from
34 year to year, and withdrawn from the Treasurer as needed to fulfill the purposes and conditions of the said order, donations or
35 contributions, if specified, and if not specified, as may be directed by the Chief of the State Law Enforcement Division. Funds

1 expended from the special account must be annually reported by October first to the Senate Finance Committee and the Ways and
2 Means Committee.

3 **62.2.** (SLED: Computer/Communications Center Carry Forward) Revenue generated from the operation of the division's
4 criminal justice computer/communications center and not expended during the prior fiscal year may be carried forward and expended
5 for the same purpose during the current fiscal year.

6 **62.3.** (SLED: Agents Operations Carry Forward) Any unexpended balance on June thirtieth, of the prior fiscal year, in Part IA,
7 Section 62 of the section "Agents Operations" may be carried forward and expended for the same purpose in the current fiscal year.

8 **62.4.** (SLED: Match for Federal Grants Carry Forward) State appropriations to SLED that are required to provide match for
9 federal grant programs in the prior fiscal year may be carried forward into the current fiscal year and expended for the same purpose
10 as originally appropriated.

11 **62.5.** (SLED: Clothing Allowance) The State Law Enforcement Division is hereby authorized to provide agents and criminalists
12 with an annual clothing allowance (on a pro rata basis) not to exceed \$600 per agent/criminalist for required clothing used in the line
13 of duty.

14 **62.6.** (SLED: Witness Fee) The State Law Enforcement Division is hereby authorized to charge a witness fee of \$130.00 per
15 hour up to \$1,000 per day for each employee testifying in civil matters which do not involve the State as a part in interest. This fee
16 shall be charged in addition to any court prescribed payment due as compensation or reimbursement for judicial appearances and
17 deposited into a designated revenue account.

18 **62.7.** (SLED: Commissioned Officers' Physicals) The department is authorized to pay for the cost of physical examinations for
19 department personnel who are required to receive such physical examinations prior to receiving a law enforcement commission.

20 **62.8.** (SLED: Meals in Emergency Operations) The State Law Enforcement Division may provide meals to employees of SLED
21 who are not permitted to leave assigned duty stations and are required to work during deployment, emergency simulation exercises
22 and when the Governor declares a state of emergency.

23 **62.9.** (SLED: Hazardous Materials Security Detail) The State Law Enforcement Division (SLED) is authorized to be reimbursed
24 for security related law enforcement services provided to entities authorized to transport sensitive materials within the borders of
25 South Carolina. SLED shall determine all costs associated with security details and is authorized to coordinate the collection,
26 retention, and distribution to any assisting agency. SLED and each assisting agency shall expend any funds associated with
27 minimizing risks related to the transportation of these hazardous materials for the implementation of homeland security initiatives.

28 **62.10.** (SLED: Sex Offender Registry Fee) Each Sheriff is authorized to charge and collect an annual amount of one hundred
29 fifty dollars from each sex offender required to register by law. If such sex offender has been declared indigent by the Sheriff of the
30 county in which the offender must register and provides proof of the declaration at the time of registration, the fee will automatically
31 be waived. If an offender is not declared indigent and fails to pay the fee, he is officially declared unregistered. This fee shall be
32 divided between the Sheriffs and the State Law Enforcement Division with one hundred dollars of the fee retained by the Sheriffs
33 and the remaining fifty dollars remitted by the Sheriffs to SLED on a quarterly basis. These funds must be used to support the
34 Statewide Sex Offender Registry.

35 **62.11.** (SLED: Private Detective Fees Criminal History Checks) The State Law Enforcement Division is authorized to charge
36 private detective companies, individual private detectives, private security companies, armed security guards, and proprietary

1 security companies a fee of twenty-five dollars to process state criminal history checks and fifty dollars for federal fingerprint based
2 criminal history checks. These funds shall be collected, retained, expended and carried forward by the State Law Enforcement
3 Division.

4 **62.12.** (SLED: CWP Instructors Certification) The State Law Enforcement Division is authorized to charge one hundred dollars
5 for the issuance of a Certified Concealable Weapons Permit Instructor certificate, and one hundred dollars every three years for each
6 renewal. These funds shall be collected, retained, expended and carried forward by the State Law Enforcement Division.

7 **62.13.** (SLED: Expungement Requests) The State Law Enforcement Division is authorized to collect a twenty-five dollar
8 expungement fee for each request to expunge criminal records. These funds shall be used to offset the operational and research
9 expenses associated with processing these expungement requests. SLED is authorized to collect, retain, expend, and carry forward
10 these funds. Persons found not guilty by a court of competent jurisdiction or where charges have been dismissed or nolle prossed
11 shall be excluded from the fee requirement.

12 **62.14.** (SLED: Retention of Funds Reimbursed by State or Federal Agencies) The State Law Enforcement Division is authorized to
13 collect, expend, retain, and carry forward all funds received from other state or federal agencies in the current fiscal year as
14 reimbursement of expenditures incurred in the current or prior fiscal year.

15 **62.15.** (SLED: Monies Associated with Illegal Gaming Devices) The State Law Enforcement Division is authorized to retain,
16 expend, and carry forward all monies associated with illegal gaming devices seized by the division, once orders of destruction and
17 awarding of these monies have been received from a court of competent jurisdiction.

18 **62.16.** (SLED: Private Detective/Security Fee) The license and registration fees set by the State Law Enforcement Division for
19 private detective businesses, private security businesses, including employees of these businesses, and companies which provide
20 private security on their own premises must not exceed those fees set by regulation as of January 1, 2011, unless otherwise approved
21 by the General Assembly. From the funds collected from these fees, the State Law Enforcement Division must transfer \$480,000 to
22 the Department of Public Safety which shall be used for the purpose of providing security in the Capitol Complex area.

23 **62.17.** (SLED: Criminal Record Search Fees) The State Law Enforcement Division is authorized to charge and collect a fee of
24 eight dollars for a criminal record search for local park and recreation volunteers through a commission, municipality, county, or the
25 South Carolina Department of Parks, Recreation, and Tourism. Any organization that is authorized to receive the reduced fee must
26 not charge the volunteer, mentor, member, or employee more than the eight dollars or any additional fee that is not required by the
27 State Law Enforcement Division. All criminal record searches conducted under this provision must be for a volunteer, mentor,
28 member or employee performing in an official capacity of the organization and must not be resold.

29 **62.18.** (SLED: Compensatory Payment) In the event a State of Emergency is declared by the Governor, exempt employees of the
30 State Law Enforcement Division may be paid for actual hours worked in lieu of accruing compensatory time, at the discretion of the
31 Chief, and providing funds are available.

32 **62.19.** (SLED: Meth Lab Clean Up Carry Forward) Any unexpended balance on June thirtieth of the prior fiscal year, in the
33 special line "Meth Lab Clean Up" may be carried forward and expended for agency law enforcement operations in the current fiscal
34 year.

35 **62.20.** (SLED: CWP Renewal and Replacement) A concealed weapons permit may not be suspended by a state official, agent, or
36 employee supported by state funds if the permit holder has initiated a renewal or replacement application and the processing and

1 issuance of a renewal or replacement permit is delayed for administrative reasons. A concealed weapons permit remains valid during
2 the pendency of the renewal or replacement process so long as the application for replacement renewal is submitted prior to the
3 expiration of the permit.

4 **62.21.** (SLED: Drug Lab Electronic Mandatory Reporting System) Of the funds appropriated for Meth Lab Clean Up, the State
5 Law Enforcement Division is authorized to expend such funds for the development and implementation of a statewide electronic
6 mandatory reporting system for municipal, county and state governmental entities to report information, as directed by the State Law
7 Enforcement Division, pertaining to the discovery or seizure of methamphetamine laboratories and dumpsites.

8 **62.22.** (SLED: Mandatory Meth Lab Reporting) If a municipal, county, or state governmental entity locates, finds, or seizes a
9 methamphetamine laboratory or dumpsite within the State, the governmental entity shall report the incident within three business
10 days to the State Law Enforcement Division.

11 The State Law Enforcement Division shall determine the reporting mechanism and is authorized to request, receive, catalogue,
12 classify, and maintain all information it determines necessary pertaining to the laboratory or dumpsite including, but not limited to,
13 the location, the type of manufacturing method used, and suspect information. The State Law Enforcement Division shall maintain
14 information related to these governmental reports on its website, which must be made available to the public, and is authorized to
15 use funds appropriated for Meth Lab Clean Up towards the prudent maintenance of information reported.

16 A governmental entity that fails to report information to the State Law Enforcement Division pursuant to this proviso is ineligible
17 to receive public safety grants that are funded through the South Carolina Public Safety Coordinating Council pursuant to Section
18 23-6-520(2) of the 1976 Code.

19 **62.23.** (SLED: First Responder PTSD Treatment) From the funds provided for First Responder PTSD Treatment, the State Law
20 Enforcement Division shall distribute fifty percent to the South Carolina Law Enforcement Assistance Program to reimburse law
21 enforcement officers who incur mental injury as a result of a critical incident during the scope of employment for actual out-of-pocket
22 expenses not covered through worker's compensation claims and/or other insurance and can also be utilized to provide services
23 through the South Carolina Law Enforcement Assistance Program. The State Law Enforcement Division shall distribute fifty percent
24 to the South Carolina State Firefighters Association for the South Carolina Firefighter Assistance Support Team to reimburse
25 firefighters and emergency medical technicians who incur mental injury as a result of a critical incident during the scope of
26 employment for actual out-of-pocket expenses not covered through worker's compensation claims and/or other insurance and can
27 also be utilized to provide services through the South Carolina Firefighter Assistance Support Team. The State Law Enforcement
28 Division shall promulgate any administrative regulations necessary to carry out the provisions of this section.

29
30 **SECTION 63 - K050 - DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY**

31
32 **63.1.** (DPS: Special Events Traffic Control) The highway patrol must not charge any fee associated with special events for
33 maintaining traffic control and ensuring safety on South Carolina public roads and highways unless approved by the General
34 Assembly. Nothing shall prohibit the Treasury of the State from accepting voluntary payment of fees from private or public entities
35 to defray the actual expenses incurred for services provided by the Department of Public Safety.

1 **63.2.** (DPS: Retention of Private Detective Fees) The Department of Public Safety is hereby authorized to receive, expend,
2 retain, and carry forward all funds transmitted from SLED related to fees charged and collected by SLED from license and registration
3 fees for private detective businesses, private security businesses, including employees of these businesses, and companies which
4 provide private security on their own premises. The funds transferred are to be used in the Bureau of Protective Services Program
5 to provide security for state agencies and the Capitol Complex.

6 **63.3.** (DPS: Motor Carrier Advisory Committee) From the funds appropriated and/or authorized to the Department of Public
7 Safety and the Department of Motor Vehicles, the departments are directed to jointly establish a Motor Carrier Advisory Committee
8 to solicit input from the Trucking Industry and other interested parties in developing policies and procedures for the regulation of
9 this industry. The members of the advisory committee shall serve without compensation.

10 **63.4.** (DPS: CMV Driver Rest Areas) A joint working group is to be established between the Department of Transportation,
11 Department of Public Safety, State Transport Police and the South Carolina Trucking Association to review and evaluate where
12 critical rest areas may be made available for commercial motor vehicle drivers to park and obtain their federally mandated required
13 rest.

14 **63.5.** (DPS: SC Law Enforcement Officers Hall of Fame Scholarships) The Department of Public Safety is hereby authorized
15 to accept donations from the public in order to provide scholarships to the children of law enforcement officers killed in the line of
16 duty. The South Carolina Law Enforcement Officers Hall of Fame Advisory Committee is authorized to set the criteria for awarding
17 such scholarships. All revenue received for this purpose shall be used to provide scholarships and shall be retained, carried forward,
18 and expended for the same purpose.

19 **63.6.** (DPS: Body Cameras) The Department of Public Safety is authorized to retain and carry forward unexpended funds
20 associated with body cameras from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and expend those funds for the same purpose.

21 **63.7.** (DPS: Overtime Pay) For Fiscal Year 2019-20, the department is authorized and required to pay current non-exempt law
22 enforcement officers by October 1st for any compensatory time earned and not used in the prior fiscal year. The funds for this
23 compensation must be provided from available personal services, appropriated overtime funding, and/or employer contributions
24 funds carried forward from the prior fiscal year. If the amount of carried forward funds is not sufficient to pay all the non-exempt
25 law enforcement officers accrued compensatory time, the department shall pay the officers on a percentage distribution based on
26 the hours owed per officer up to the total amount that the department has carried forward.

27 28 SECTION 64 -N200 - LAW ENFORCEMENT TRAINING COUNCIL

29
30 **64.1.** (LETC: CJA-Federal, Other Flow Through Funds) In order to complete projects begun in a prior fiscal year, the Law
31 Enforcement Training Council, Criminal Justice Academy is authorized to expend federal and earmarked funds in the current fiscal
32 year for expenditures incurred in the prior fiscal year.

33 **64.2.** (LETC: CJA-Retention of Emergency Expenditure Refunds) The Law Enforcement Training Council, Criminal Justice
34 Academy is authorized to collect, expend, retain, and carry forward all funds received from other state or federal agencies in the
35 current fiscal year as reimbursement of expenditures incurred in the current or prior fiscal year when personnel and equipment are
36 mobilized and expenses incurred due to an emergency.

1 **64.3.** (LETC: CJA-Unexpended FY 2017-18 General Funds) ~~The Law Enforcement Training Council, Criminal Justice~~
2 ~~Academy, is authorized to carry forward unexpended general funds from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year to complete~~
3 ~~Village Dorm restroom repairs and technology upgrades for the training program.~~
4

5 **SECTION 65 - N040 - DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS**
6

7 **65.1.** (CORR: Canteen Operations) Revenue derived wholly from the canteen operations within the Department of Corrections
8 on behalf of the inmate population, may be retained and expended by the department for the continuation of the operation of said
9 canteens and the welfare of the inmate population or, at the discretion of the Director, used to supplement costs of operations. The
10 canteen operation is to be treated as an enterprise fund within the Department of Corrections and is not to be subsidized by state
11 appropriated funds.

12 **65.2.** (CORR: E.H. Cooper Trust Fund) Any unclaimed funds remaining in any inmate account, after appropriate and necessary
13 steps are taken to determine and contact a rightful owner of such funds, shall be deposited into the Inmate Welfare Fund.

14 **65.3.** (CORR: Instructional Salaries) The certified instructional personnel of the Department of Corrections shall receive a
15 percentage increase in their annual salary for the current fiscal year equal to the percentage allocated to the instructional personnel
16 throughout the State.

17 **65.4.** (CORR: Funding Through State Criminal Assistance Program) All funds received by the State from the United States
18 Department of Justice, State Criminal Alien Assistance Program, for care and custody of illegal aliens housed in the state correctional
19 facilities shall be retained by the South Carolina Department of Corrections to offset incurred expenses.

20 **65.5.** (CORR: Remedial Education Funding) A criminal offender committed to the custody of the Department of Corrections,
21 who has been evaluated to function at less than an eighth grade educational level, or less than the equivalent of an eighth grade
22 educational level, may be required by department officials to enroll and actively participate in academic education programs. Funds
23 appropriated to the Department of Corrections for educational programs shall be prioritized to assure such remedial services are
24 provided.

25 **65.6.** (CORR: Tire Retreading Program Restriction) The tire retreading program at the Lieber Correctional Institution shall be
26 limited to the marketing and sale of retreads to state governmental entities.

27 **65.7.** (CORR: Social Security Administration Funding) All funds received by the South Carolina Department of Corrections
28 from the Social Security Administration under Section 1611 (e)(1)(I) of the Social Security Act, which provides payment for
29 information regarding incarcerated Social Security Insurance recipients, shall be retained by the South Carolina Department of
30 Corrections and credited to a fund entitled "Special Social Security" for the care and custody of inmates housed in the state
31 correctional facilities.

32 **65.8.** (CORR: Medical Expenses) The Department of Corrections shall be authorized to charge inmates a nominal fee for any
33 medical treatment or consultation provided at the request of or initiated by the inmate. A nominal co-pay shall be charged for
34 prescribed medications. Inmates shall not be charged for psychological or mental health visits.

35 **65.9.** (CORR: Prison Industry Funds) The Director of the Department of Corrections, at his discretion, is hereby authorized to
36 utilize prison industry funds for projects or services benefiting the general welfare of the inmate population or to supplement costs

1 of operations. These funds may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year to be used for the same
2 purpose.

3 **65.10.** (CORR: Reimbursement for Expenditures) The Department of Corrections may retain for general operating purposes any
4 reimbursement of funds for expenses incurred in a prior fiscal year.

5 **65.11.** (CORR: Sale of Real Property) Funds generated from the sale of real property owned by the Department of Corrections
6 shall be retained by the department to offset renovation and maintenance capital expenditures.

7 **65.12.** (CORR: Funds From Vehicle Cleaning) Monies generated by inmates engaged in the cleaning and waxing of private
8 vehicles, or any other adult work activity center, shall be placed in a special account and utilized for the welfare of the inmate
9 population.

10 **65.13.** (CORR: Release of Inmates) The Director of the Department of Corrections and other persons having charge of prisoners
11 who are required to serve a period of six months or more, may release all such prisoners, including prisoners to whom Section
12 24-13-150(A) of the 1976 Code applies, on the first day of the month in which their sentences expire, and if the first day of the month
13 falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or a legal holiday, such prisoners may be released on the last weekday prior to the first of the month
14 which is not a holiday.

15 **65.14.** (CORR: Western Union Funding) All funds received by the South Carolina Department of Corrections from the Western
16 Union Quick Collect Revenue Sharing Program or similar private sector entities, which provides payment for processing electronic
17 transfers into the E.H. Cooper Trust Fund, shall be retained by the South Carolina Department of Corrections and credited to a fund
18 entitled "Inmate Welfare Fund" to be expended for the benefit of the inmate population.

19 **65.15.** (CORR: Monitoring Fees) The Department of Corrections is authorized to charge an inmate who participates in community
20 programs a reasonable fee for the cost of supplying electronic and telephonic monitoring. The fees charged may not exceed the
21 actual cost of the monitoring.

22 **65.16.** (CORR: Inmate Insurance Policies) The Department of Corrections may collect and record private health insurance
23 information from incarcerated individuals. The department may file against any private insurance policy covering an inmate to
24 recoup any health care expenditures covered by the policy. Health care will be provided in accordance with law and standards
25 regardless of whether or not an inmate is covered by insurance.

26 **65.17.** (CORR: Work Release Transportation Fee) The South Carolina Department of Corrections is authorized to charge a \$4.00
27 per day transportation fee to participants in the work release program only when such transportation is provided by the department.
28 Monies collected shall be credited to the South Carolina Department of Corrections, and utilized solely to fund transportation of
29 work release participants and vehicle replacement for the work release program.

30 **65.18.** (CORR: Special Assignment Pay Level 2 & 3 Facilities) Funds appropriated for special assignment pay at the Department
31 of Corrections are for the purpose of addressing vacancies and turnover of staff by providing a pay differential for certain employees
32 assigned to institutions with a Level II or Level III security designation. The funds are to be used for special assignment pay only
33 and may not be transferred to any other program. If the employee leaves one of the qualifying job classes or leaves a Level II or
34 Level III institution for a non-Level II or non-Level III facility, they shall no longer be eligible for this special assignment pay. Only
35 employees in full-time equivalent positions are eligible for this special assignment pay.

1 The special assignment pay is not a part of the employee's base salary and is as determined by the Director of the Department of
2 Corrections at Level II and Level III institutions:

- 3 (1) Cadets;
- 4 (2) Correctional Officers, including Class Code JD-30 (Officer I and II positions);
- 5 (3) Corporals I and II;
- 6 (4) Sergeants and Lieutenants;
- 7 (5) Captains and Majors;
- 8 (6) Nursing Staff;
- 9 (7) Food Services Staff; and
- 10 (8) Warden.

11 **65.19.** (CORR: Quota Elimination) Pursuant to Section 24-3-60 of the 1976 Code, upon notification by the county, the
12 Department of Corrections shall accept newly sentenced inmates from each local jail and detention center.

13 For sentenced inmates who the county is willing to transport, the department may limit the acceptance at the Kirkland Correctional
14 Institution to the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, excluding holidays, and at the Perry and Lieber Correctional
15 Institutions to the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 10:30 a.m., Monday through Friday, excluding holidays.

16 By mutual agreement between the Department of Corrections and a local jail or detention center, the department may establish an
17 alternate admissions schedule for receiving inmates at the Reception and Evaluation Center.

18 At the time of transfer of the inmate to the department, the county shall provide the sentencing order, and if available copies of
19 medical screening records, booking reports, and other documents to assist the department in its intake processing. Counties that have
20 not completed medical screenings at the time of transfer shall not be required to do so.

21 In the event there are inadequate beds within the Reception and Evaluation Center, the Department of Corrections may create a
22 "jail" within the Kirkland Correctional Institution using one or more of the available 192-bed housing units to accept newly sentenced
23 state inmates who are awaiting R & E processing. The department may operate such "jail," to the extent feasible, in accordance with
24 standards applicable to the local jails.

25 The department shall use the funds appropriated in this act for "Quota Elimination" to accomplish this initiative and to open a
26 96-bed unit at the MacDougall Correctional Institution and the 192-bed housing units at Kirkland Correctional Institution. The funds
27 may not be transferred to any other program or used for any other purpose.

28 **65.20.** (CORR: Public/Private Partnerships for Construction) Funds appropriated in Act 407 of 2006, item 23, shall be used to
29 construct as many multi-purpose buildings at Department of Corrections institutions as possible. For such facilities at Lieber,
30 McCormick, Leath, Perry, or Allendale Correctional Institution, at least \$150,000 in matching funds and/or construction materials
31 or services must be donated before construction of the facility may begin. At other Department of Corrections locations, the Director
32 may require that donated funds and/or materials or services equal one-half of the cost of construction, including design and
33 engineering costs.

34 **65.21.** (CORR: Inmate Barbering Program) Inmate barbers in the Inmate Barbering Program at the Department of Corrections,
35 shall not be subject to the licensing requirement of Section 40-7-30 of the 1976 Code.

1 **65.22.** (CORR: Executed Inmate Autopsy) For the current fiscal year, the autopsy requirements of Section 17-7-10 of the 1976
2 Code are suspended when an inmate is executed by the Department of Corrections pursuant to a valid order of the Supreme Court of
3 South Carolina.

4 **65.23.** (CORR: Recoupment of Expenses Associated with Inmate Cremation) If the Department of Corrections incurs expenses
5 for cremating and disposing of an unclaimed deceased inmate, the department may recoup all associated costs of cremation, including
6 transportation, through the deceased inmate's E.H. Cooper account, providing funds are available.

7 **65.24.** (CORR: Credited Jail Time; DNA Sample Collection) Inmates committed to the Department of Corrections for sentences
8 greater than ninety days, but who have credit for jail time in excess of their sentence to incarceration are not required to be transported
9 to the Reception and Evaluation Center of the Department of Corrections. Cities and counties housing inmates who have credit for
10 jail time in excess of their sentence may, through written agreement with the Department of Corrections, transfer required
11 commitment records to the department electronically or by other means. The Department of Corrections must establish reasonable
12 documentation requirements to facilitate the implementation of this cost savings measure. Employees of the Department of
13 Probation, Parole and Pardon Services assigned to the court or employees of the Department of Corrections, as applicable, shall
14 obtain DNA samples from the offenders who are required to submit DNA samples. This provision does not exempt the above
15 referenced inmates from the \$250 DNA fee as required by Section 23-3-670 of the 1976 Code. The \$250 fee shall be collected in
16 the same manner as other fines and fees and submitted to the State Treasurer for remittance to SLED.

17 **65.25.** (CORR: Cell Phone Interdiction) The Director of the Department of Corrections is granted the right to add a surcharge to
18 all inmate pay phone calls to offset the cost of equipment and operations of cell phone interdiction measures. The surcharge will be
19 added to the cost per call, collected by chosen telephone vendor and paid to the department on a monthly basis. The department is
20 authorized to retain the funds to pay, either directly or through the State lease program, for equipment required to enact cell phone
21 interdiction or retrieval or for critical security needs. When the equipment has been paid in full, the surcharge amount will be
22 reviewed and adjusted to cover the cost of ongoing operational expenses of the interdiction equipment. Any unexpended balance
23 may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and be used for the same purpose or for critical security
24 needs.

25 **65.26.** (CORR: Correctional Institution Maintenance and Construction) For maintenance and construction activities funded in the
26 current fiscal year, the Department of Corrections may utilize inmate labor to perform any portion of the work on its own grounds
27 and facilities. The provisions of Section 40-11-360(A)(9) of the 1976 Code shall apply to any such project, including new
28 construction.

29 **65.27.** (CORR: Meals in Emergency Operations) The Department of Corrections may provide meals to public employees who
30 are not permitted to leave their stations and are required to work during actual emergencies, emergency simulation exercises, or when
31 the Governor declares a state of emergency.

32 **65.28.** (CORR: Prohibition on Funding Certain Surgery) (A) The Department of Corrections is prohibited from using state funds
33 or state resources to provide a prisoner in the state prison system sexual reassignment surgery; however, if a person is taking hormonal
34 therapy at the time the person is committed to the Department of Corrections, the department shall continue to provide this therapy
35 to the person as long as medically necessary for the health of the person.

36 (B) As used in this provision:

1 (1) ‘Hormonal therapy’ means the use of hormones to stimulate the development or alteration of a person’s sexual
2 characteristics in order to alter the person’s physical appearance so that the person appears more like the opposite gender;

3 (2) ‘Sexual reassignment surgery’ means a surgical procedure to alter a person’s physical appearance so that the person
4 appears more like the opposite gender.

5 **65.29. RESERVED**

6 **65.30.** (CORR: Video Bond Conferencing) In the current fiscal year, and from the funds appropriated to the Department of
7 Corrections, the video conferencing bond system shall be used for all bond hearings for inmates incarcerated at facilities with video
8 conferencing capabilities that are compatible with county video conferencing equipment, network, firewalls, etc. and charged with
9 criminal offenses that require a bond hearing. The Department of Corrections shall not be responsible for recording any of these
10 proceedings or for providing the counties with any equipment.
11

12 **SECTION 66 - N080 - DEPARTMENT OF PROBATION, PAROLE AND PARDON SERVICES**
13

14 **66.1.** (DPPP: Sale of Equipment) All revenue generated by the Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services from the
15 sale of various equipment in excess of \$575, less the cost of disposition incurred by the Department of Administration, may be
16 retained and carried forward into the current fiscal year and expended for the purpose of purchasing like items.

17 **66.2.** (DPPP: Interstate Compact Application Fee) The department may charge offenders an application fee set by the
18 department, not to exceed the department’s actual costs, to offenders applying for transfers out of or into the state under the Interstate
19 Compact Act. The application fee shall be retained by the department to offset the cost of the Interstate Compact Act. All unexpended
20 funds at year-end may be retained and carried forward by the department to be expended for the same purpose.

21 **66.3.** (DPPP: GED Learn and Earn Program) From the funds appropriated in Part IA, the department may enter into agreements
22 with statewide colleges, technical colleges, and school districts for the purpose of providing GED and GED Prep education to
23 offenders. Offenders of the department enrolled in the program must repay the department the cost of the course and materials within
24 six months of obtaining their GED.

25 **66.4.** (DPPP: Sex Offender Monitoring Carry Forward) The Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services is authorized
26 to carry forward any unexpended funds in the Sex Offender Monitoring program. These funds must be used for the sex offender
27 monitoring program. For the purpose of calculating the amount of funds which may be carried forward by the department, Sex
28 Offender Monitoring program funds carried forward by this provision shall be excluded from the calculation of the carry forward
29 authorized by provision elsewhere in this act.

30 **66.5.** (DPPP: Offender Drug Testing Fee) The department may charge offenders a fee set by the department, not to exceed \$50,
31 for the purpose of drug testing. If it is determined that the offender is indigent, this fee must be waived. The fee shall be retained by
32 the department to offset the cost of drug testing. All unexpended funds at year-end may be retained and carried forward by the
33 department to be expended for the same purpose.

34 **66.6.** (DPPP: Public Service Employment Set-Up Fee) In addition to any other fee, the department may charge an adult offender
35 placed under the jurisdiction of the department, who is ordered to public service employment by the court, a twenty-five dollar Public
36 Service Employment set-up fee. The fee must be retained by the department and applied to the department’s supervision process.

1 ~~The department shall submit a report to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and~~
2 ~~Means Committee on the number of offenders who were assessed the set-up fee and the amount of funds collected.~~

3
4 **SECTION 67 - N120 - DEPARTMENT OF JUVENILE JUSTICE**

5
6 **67.1.** (DJJ: Meal Ticket Revenue) The revenue generated from sale of meal tickets by the Department of Juvenile Justice shall
7 be retained and carried forward into the current fiscal year by the agency and expended for the operation of the agency's cafeterias
8 and food service programs.

9 **67.2.** (DJJ: Interstate Compact Revenue) The revenue returned to the Interstate Compact Program shall be retained and carried
10 forward into the current fiscal year by the agency and expended for the operation of the program.

11 **67.3.** (DJJ: Children's Projects Revenue) Funds generated from the projects undertaken by children under the supervision of the
12 Department of Juvenile Justice may be retained by the department and utilized for the benefit of those children. Such funds may be
13 carried forward into the following fiscal year.

14 **67.4.** (DJJ: Instructional Salaries) The certified instructional personnel of the Department of Juvenile Justice shall receive a
15 percentage increase in their annual salary for the current fiscal year equal to the percentage allocated to the instructional personnel
16 throughout the State.

17 **67.5.** (DJJ: Reimbursements for Expenditures) The Department of Juvenile Justice may retain for general operating purposes
18 any reimbursement of funds for expenses incurred in a prior fiscal year.

19 **67.6.** (DJJ: Juvenile Arbitration/Community Advocacy Program) The amount appropriated and authorized in this section for the
20 Juvenile Arbitration Program shall be retained and expended by the Department of Juvenile Justice for the purpose of providing
21 juvenile arbitration services through the sixteen Judicial Circuit Solicitors' offices in the state and used to fund necessary
22 administrative and personnel costs for the programs.

23 The Department of Juvenile Justice shall contract with Solicitors to administer the Juvenile Arbitration Program and disburse up
24 to \$60,000 per Judicial Circuit based on services rendered. The amount payable to Solicitors may vary based on consistent adherence
25 to established statewide program guidelines to assess program performance.

26 The \$250,000 appropriated for the Community Advocacy Program in the first Judicial Circuit, will be used to fund necessary
27 administrative and personnel costs for this status offender diversion program. The Department of Juvenile Justice shall monitor and
28 provide support to this program.

29 All unexpended funds may be retained and carried forward from the prior fiscal year to be used for the same purposes.

30 **67.7.** (DJJ: Sale of Real Property) After receiving approval from the Department of Administration or State Fiscal Accountability
31 Authority, for the sale of property, the department is authorized to retain revenues associated with the sale of department-owned real
32 property and may expend these funds on capital improvements reviewed by the Joint Bond Review Committee and approved by the
33 State Fiscal Accountability Authority.

34 **67.8.** (DJJ: Sale of Timber) The Department of Juvenile Justice is hereby authorized to sell mature trees and other timber suitable
35 for commercial purposes from lands owned by the department. Prior to such sales, the director shall consult with the State Forester
36 to determine economic and environmental feasibility and to obtain approval for such sales. Funds derived from timber sales shall be

1 retained and utilized for family support services after setting aside a reasonable amount, as determined by the State Forester, for
2 reforestation of the lands from which the trees and timber are sold.

3 **67.9.** (DJJ: Drug Free Workplace) The critical mission of the Department of Juvenile Justice requires a safe and drug free work
4 environment. In order to accomplish this, the department may conduct and pay for the cost of pre-employment drug testing and
5 random employee drug testing. The department is authorized to expend funds in order to provide or procure these services.

6 **67.10.** (DJJ: Definition of Juveniles) The Department of Juvenile Justice is authorized to place juveniles in marine and wilderness
7 programs or other community residence programs operated by nongovernmental entities. Juveniles receiving services in these
8 community residence programs must either be referred to such a program by the Family Court as a condition of probation, released
9 to such a program by the Board of Juvenile Parole, or voluntarily agree to be assigned and released to such a program by the
10 Department of Juvenile Justice.

11 **67.11.** (DJJ: Adult Education - GED) Juveniles committed to the Department of Juvenile Justice who have been enrolled in, but
12 not yet completed, a GED educational program while at the department, at the discretion of the local school district, upon release
13 from the department shall be allowed to enroll in either the juvenile's local school district's regular education program, in their
14 appropriate grade placement, or allowed to enroll in that district's or county's adult education program. If enrolled in an adult
15 education program, the juvenile's eligibility for taking the GED shall be based upon the regulations promulgated by the Department
16 of Education for youth who are confined in, or under the custody of, the Department of Juvenile Justice.

17 **67.12.** (DJJ: Local District Effort) Upon commitment or confinement to a Department of Juvenile Justice facility, the school
18 district in which that child resides shall pay an amount equivalent to the statewide average of the local base student cost (thirty
19 percent), multiplied by the appropriate pupil weighting set forth in Section 59-20-40, for instructional services provided to
20 out-of-district students to the Department of Juvenile Justice for the time period in which the child is committed or confined to a
21 department facility. EFA funding for school districts is provided for a one hundred eighty day school year. The billing provided by
22 the department shall be calculated by dividing the local base student cost by two hundred twenty-five days to determine the daily
23 rate. The department shall notify the school district in writing within forty-five calendar days that a student from the nonresident
24 district is receiving education services pursuant to this provision. The notice shall also contain the student's name, date of birth,
25 disabling condition if available, and dates of service.

26 The invoice shall be paid within sixty days of billing, provided the department has provided a copy of the invoice to both the
27 superintendent and the finance office of the school district being invoiced. Should the school district fail to pay the invoice within
28 sixty days, the department can seek relief from the Department of Education. The Department of Education shall withhold EFA
29 funding equal to the billing from the district refusing to pay and submit the funding (equal to the invoice) to the department. If
30 adequate funding is not received, the department shall have the flexibility to use funds from other programmatic areas to maintain
31 an appropriate level of service.

32 **67.13.** (DJJ: Early Release Authorization) In order to avoid unconstitutional levels of overcrowding and other unconstitutional
33 conditions from occurring in facilities operated by the department and in residential programs operated for the department, the
34 number of children housed in residential placements (either committed to the custody of the Department of Juvenile Justice or who
35 are under the department's supervision) shall not exceed the number of beds available to the department to house them. Should
36 appropriation reductions necessitate that the department close any additional facility, program, or housing unit it operates, or to be

1 unable to fund any additional residential program operated for its benefit, the department is authorized and empowered to release
2 from its residential placements sufficient numbers of children committed to its custody or supervision for a status offense, a
3 misdemeanor offense, other than Assault and Battery of a High and Aggravated Nature and Assault with Intent to Kill, or for violation
4 of probation/contempt of a status offense or a misdemeanor offense, other than Assault and Battery of a High and Aggravated Nature
5 and Assault with Intent to Kill, so that the number of children in its custody or under its supervision and placed in these residential
6 placements does not exceed the number of housing units/beds available to properly house those children. No child adjudicated
7 delinquent for a violent crime as defined in Section 16-1-60 of the 1976 Code, a felony offense as defined in Section 16-1-90 of the
8 1976 Code, or a sexual offense shall be released pursuant to this proviso.
9

10 **SECTION 70 - L360 - HUMAN AFFAIRS COMMISSION**

11
12 **70.1.** (HAC: Human Affairs Forum Carry Forward) All revenue derived from donations and registration fees received for
13 attendance at Human Affairs Forums shall be retained and carried forward and expended for the purpose of general operations of the
14 Human Affairs Commission.

15 **70.2.** (HAC: Training Revenue) All revenue derived from fees received from training and technical assistance provided by the
16 Human Affairs Commission to entities other than state agencies shall be retained, carried forward, and expended for the purpose of
17 general operations of the Human Affairs Commission.

18 **70.3.** (HAC: Revenue from Copying Fees) All revenue derived from providing requested copies of commission files, final
19 opinions, orders, and determinations shall be retained, carried forward, and expended for the purpose of general operations of the
20 Human Affairs Commission.
21

22 **SECTION 71 - L460 - COMMISSION FOR MINORITY AFFAIRS**

23
24 **71.1.** (CMA: Private Contributions and Sponsorship) Monies derived from private sources for agency research, forums, training,
25 and institutes may be retained and expended by the commission for the said purpose. Any remaining balance may be carried forward
26 and expended for the same purpose.

27 **71.2.** (CMA: Carry Forward Registration Fees) Revenue derived from registration fees received from training and institutes may
28 be retained and carried forward for the purpose of conducting future training and institutes.

29 **71.3.** (CMA: Carry Forward Grant Awards) Revenues pooled from public and private sources for the purpose of awarding grants
30 to address problems in the minority community may be retained and carried forward by the commission.

31 **71.4.** (CMA: Carry Forward Bingo Revenues) Bingo revenues received by the commission in the prior fiscal year pursuant to
32 Section 12-21-4200(3) of the 1976 Code which are not expended during that fiscal year may be carried forward to be expended in
33 the current fiscal year.

34 **71.5.** (CMA: Retention of Photocopy Fees) Revenue derived from photocopy fees and other fees related to Freedom of
35 Information Act requests from the general public may be retained and carried forward by the Commission.

1 **SECTION 73 - R060 - OFFICE OF REGULATORY STAFF**

2

3 **73.1.** (ORS: Transportation Fee Refund) The Transportation Department of the Office of Regulatory Staff is hereby authorized
4 to make refunds of fees which were erroneously collected.

5 **73.2.** (ORS: Assessment Certification) Office of Regulatory Staff shall certify to the Department of Revenue the amounts to be
6 assessed to cover appropriations in this section as follows: (1) the amount applicable to the assessment on public utility, telephone
7 utility, radio common carrier and electric utility companies as provided for by Section 58-4-60, Code of Laws of 1976, (2) the amount
8 to be assessed against gas utility companies as provided for in Section 58-5-940, Code of Laws of 1976, (3) the amount to be assessed
9 against electric light and power companies as provided for in Sections 58-4-60 and 58-27-50, Code of Laws of 1976, and (4) the
10 amount to be covered by revenue from motor transport fees as provided for by Section 58-23-630, and other fees as set forth in
11 Section 58-4-60, Code of Laws of 1976. The amount to be assessed against railroad companies shall consist of all expenses related
12 to the operations of the Railway subprogram of the Agency's Transportation Division, to include the related distribution of salary
13 increments and employer contributions not reflected in the related subprogram of this act as set forth in Section 58-4-60, Code of
14 Laws of 1976.

15 **73.3.** (ORS: Assessment Adjustments) If the Office of Regulatory Staff determines that a person or entity subject to Title 58 of
16 the 1976 Code has been assessed an amount greater than that authorized by Sections 58-4-60, 58-3-100 and 58-3-540, the Office of
17 Regulatory Staff shall, at its discretion:

- 18 (a) refund the person or entity the amount of over collection using funds from the current fiscal year;
19 (b) refund the person or entity the amount of over collection using any unexpended funds from the prior fiscal year;
20 (c) credit the amount the person or entity will be assessed in the next fiscal year for the amount of over collection; or
21 (d) any combination of these.

22 The Office of Regulatory Staff, when determining the amount to be assessed in the next fiscal year, may take into consideration
23 any underpayment or overpayment by a person or entity during a given year. Any unexpended funds from revenue generated pursuant
24 to this section may be retained and carried forward and expended for the same purposes.

25 **73.4.** (ORS: SSEB Annual Dues) The annual dues of the Southern States Energy Board shall be paid from the Radioactive Waste
26 Operating Fund.

27 **73.5.** (ORS: Acting Executive Director) ~~(A) When the position of agency head at any of the State's various agencies is vacant,~~
28 ~~the General Assembly finds that a person acting in the capacity of acting agency head has the full legal authority to take any and all~~
29 ~~official actions to fulfill the duties and responsibilities of agency head until such time as the vacancy has been filled. Therefore, the~~
30 ~~acting Executive Director of the Office of Regulatory Staff is authorized to exercise all of the powers and duties of the Executive~~
31 ~~Director, as designated in statute, including the power to expend funds for the purpose of executing the duties required of the office~~
32 ~~and as otherwise may be required to fulfill the Office of Regulatory Staff's statutory responsibilities until such time as the previous~~
33 ~~executive director's successor is appointed by the Governor. Further, the General Assembly hereby ratifies any and all official~~

3 ~~(1) an entity has provided goods or services, including, but not limited to, plans, studies, and reports related to the design,~~
4 ~~construction, or operation of a facility located in South Carolina and that facility has been the subject of a proceeding concerning the~~
5 ~~Base Load Review Act;~~

6 ~~(2) the executive director determines that the production of documents or witnesses from the entity described in item (1) is~~

10 ~~(C) The relief that may be granted in an action described above is an order requiring the production of documents, an order~~
11 ~~requiring the appearance of a witness or witnesses, an order allowing the Office of Regulatory Staff to take depositions of witnesses,~~
12 ~~or any combination thereof. Any order granting such relief must provide reasonable protections to the entity subject to the order,~~
13 ~~including that any depositions will be taken at a location convenient to the witnesses. In the event that a deposition is ordered, the~~
14 ~~Office of Regulatory Staff must give notice to the utility and any other party to any proceeding in which the deposition may be used,~~
15 ~~so that the utility and any such party will have an opportunity to appear and participate in the deposition.~~

16 ~~(D) An action brought by the executive director or acting director pursuant to this proviso shall be given administrative priority~~
17 ~~by the chief administrative judge for the circuit in which it has been brought and must be heard and decided as expeditiously as is~~
18 ~~consistent with due process. Failure to comply with an aforementioned court order issued may be found in contempt and fined in~~
19 ~~the discretion of the court.~~

21 **SECTION 74 - R080 - WORKERS' COMPENSATION COMMISSION**

22
23 **74.1.** (WCC: Educational Seminar Revenue) All revenue earned from educational seminars shall be retained by the agency to be
24 used for the printing of educational materials and other expenses related to conducting the seminar.

25 **74.2.** (WCC: Retention of Filing Fees) The Workers' Compensation Commission is authorized to retain and expend all revenues
26 received as a result of a \$50.00 filing fee for each requested hearing, settlement, or motion. If it is determined that the individual is
27 indigent, this filing fee must be waived.

28
29 **SECTION 75 - R120 - STATE ACCIDENT FUND**

30
31 **75.1.** (SAF: Educational Seminar Revenue) The State Accident Fund is authorized to set and collect fees for educational
32 seminars. All revenue earned from educational seminars shall be retained by the agency and used for supplies, materials, and other
33 expenses relating to the seminars.

1 **SECTION 78 - R200 - DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE**

2

3 **78.1.** (INS: Examiners Travel/Subsistence Reimbursement) Notwithstanding the limitations in this act as to amounts payable or
4 reimbursable for lodging, meals, and travel, the Department of Insurance is authorized to reimburse department examiners in
5 accordance with guidelines established by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners only when the State is reimbursed
6 by an insurance company for the travel and subsistence expenses of Insurance Department examiners pursuant to Section 38-13-10
7 of the 1976 Code.

8 **78.2.** (INS: Reimbursement Carry Forward) Reimbursements received for Data Processing Services, Revenue, Miscellaneous
9 Revenue and Sale of Listings and Labels shall be retained for use by the department. These funds may be carried forward in the
10 current fiscal year.

11 **78.3.** (INS: Fees for Licenses) The Department of Insurance shall be authorized to charge a twenty-five dollar initial producer
12 license fee; a twenty-five dollar biennial producer license renewal fee; and a two hundred-fifty dollar penalty fee for late appointment
13 renewals. The director shall specify the time and manner of payment of these fees. These fees shall be retained by the department
14 for the administration of Title 38.

15

16 **SECTION 79 - R230 - BOARD OF FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS**

17

18 **79.1.** (FI: Supervisory Fees) The Board of Financial Institutions shall fix supervisory fees of banks, savings and loan associations
19 and credit unions on a scale which, together with fees collected by the Consumer Finance Division will fully cover the total funds
20 expended under this section.

21

22 **SECTION 80 - R280 - DEPARTMENT OF CONSUMER AFFAIRS**

23

24 **80.1.** (CA: Consumer Protection Code Violations Revenue) Funds, paid to the department in resolution of cases involving
25 violations of the South Carolina Consumer Protection Code and other statutes enforced by the department be retained and expended
26 within the agency's budget to help offset the costs of investigating, prosecuting, and the administrative costs associated with these
27 violations, may be carried forward and expended for the same purposes in the current fiscal year.

28 **80.2.** (CA: Student Athlete/Agents Registration) ~~Funds received by the department of Consumer Affairs pursuant to registrations~~
29 ~~under Chapter 102, Title 59 of the 1976 Code may be retained by the department for its enforcement duties relating to athlete agents~~
30 ~~and student athletes under that chapter.~~

31 **80.3.** (CA: Expert Witness/Assistance Carry Forward) Unexpended encumbered appropriated funds for the Consumer Advocacy
32 expert witness/assistance program (under Section 37-6-603) may be carried forward into the next fiscal year to meet contractual
33 obligations existing at June thirtieth and not paid by July thirty-first.

34 **80.4.** (CA: Registered Credit Grantor Notification and Maximum Rate Filing Fees Retention) The Department of Consumer
35 Affairs may retain all filing fees collected under Chapters 2, 3 and 6, Title 37 of the 1976 Code. These fees shall be used to offset

1 the cost of administering and enforcing Title 37 and may be applied to the cost of operations. Unexpended balances may be carried
2 forward for the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and be utilized for the same purposes.

3 **80.5.** (CA: Retention of Fees) For the current fiscal year, the department may retain all fees collected pursuant to Sections
4 39-61-80, 39-61-120, 40-39-120, and 44-79-80 of the 1976 Code. The funds retained shall be utilized to implement the requirements
5 of the programs mandated by those sections of the code.
6

7 **SECTION 81 - R360 - DEPARTMENT OF LABOR, LICENSING AND REGULATION**
8

9 **81.1.** (LLR: Fire Marshal - Authorization to Charge Fees for Training) The Fire Academy may charge participants a fee to cover
10 the cost of education, training programs, and operations. The revenue generated may be applied to the cost of operations, and any
11 unexpended balance may be carried forward to the current fiscal year and utilized for the same purposes.

12 **81.2.** (LLR: Real Estate - Special Account) Revenue in the Real Estate Appraisal Registry account shall not be subject to fiscal
13 year limitations and shall carry forward each fiscal year for the designated purpose.

14 **81.3.** (LLR: POLA - Ten Percent, Other Funds) The Professional and Occupational Offices in Program II.F. Professional and
15 Occupational Licensing must remit annually an amount equal to ten percent of the expenditures to the general fund. The Contractor's
16 Licensing Board must remit all revenues above their expenditures to the general fund. The revenue remitted by the Contractor's
17 Licensing Board to the general fund includes the ten percent.

18 **81.4.** (LLR: Fire Marshal Fallen Firefighters Memorial) The Department of Labor, Licensing and Regulation - Division of the
19 State Fire Marshal is authorized to accept gifts or grants of services, properties, or monies from individuals or public and private
20 organizations to honor South Carolina firefighters who have died in the line of duty. All excess monies collected to erect a memorial
21 are to be placed in a fund for upkeep and maintenance. Any later contributions are to be used for upkeep and maintenance.

22 **81.5.** (LLR: Firefighter Mobilization Project) The department is directed to utilize \$165,000 of the funds derived under Section
23 2 of Act 1377 of 1968, as amended by Act 60 of 2001 from the tax of thirty-five one-hundredths percent imposed annually on the
24 gross premium receipts less premiums returned on canceled policy contracts and less dividends and returns of unabsorbed premium
25 deposits of all fire insurance companies doing business in the State to fund the Firefighter Mobilization Project.

26 **81.6.** (LLR: Match for Federal Funds) State appropriations to the Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation that are
27 required to provide match for federal grant programs in the prior fiscal year may be carried forward into the current fiscal year and
28 expended for the same purpose as originally appropriated.

29 **81.7.** (LLR: Flexibility) In order to provide maximum flexibility in absorbing the general fund reductions to the OSHA and
30 OSHA Voluntary Programs, the Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation shall be authorized to spend agency earmarked and
31 restricted accounts to maintain these critical programs previously funded with general fund appropriations. Any increase in spending
32 authorization for these purposes must receive the prior approval of the Executive Budget Office.

33 **81.8.** (LLR: Immigration Bill Funding Report) Prior to any funds carried forward from the prior fiscal year in Subfund 3135
34 being transferred to fund any other purpose, \$250,000 must be retained by the Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation to
35 fund the department's responsibilities under the South Carolina Illegal Immigration Reform Act. The department shall compile an
36 accountability report outlining expenditures of the Immigration Bill funding to be issued to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate,

1 the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Natural Resources and Economic Development
2 Subcommittee, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and the
3 Chairman of the House Ways and Means Transportation and Regulatory Subcommittee. Said report must be issued on the first
4 Tuesday of February in the current fiscal year.

5 **81.9.** (LLR: Authorized Reimbursement) The Director of the Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation cannot authorize
6 reimbursement under Section 40-1-50(A) of the 1976 Code to members of any board listed in Section 40-1-40(B) for meetings held
7 at any location other than the offices of the department unless there has been a determination that the department is unable to provide
8 space for the meeting in a state-owned or leased facility in Richland or Lexington County.

9 **81.10.** (LLR: Illegal Immigration Hotline Assistance) Upon the request of the Commission on Minority Affairs, the Department
10 of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation shall provide assistance to establish and maintain a twenty-four hour toll free telephone number
11 and electronic website to receive, record, collect, and report allegations of violations of federal immigration laws or related provisions
12 of South Carolina law by any non-United States citizen or immigrant, and allegations of violations of any federal immigration laws
13 or related provisions in South Carolina law against any non-United States citizen or immigrant.

14 Such violations shall include, but are not limited to, E-Verify or other federal work authorization program violations, violations of
15 Chapter 83, Title 40 of the 1976 Code relating to immigration assistance services, or any regulations enacted governing the operation
16 of immigration assistance services, false or fraudulent statements made or documents filed in relation to an immigration matter, as
17 defined by Section 40-83-20, violation of human trafficking laws, as defined in Section 16-3-930, landlord tenant law violations, or
18 violations of any law pertaining to the provision or receipt of public assistance benefits or public services.

19 **81.11.** (LLR: Board of Pharmacy) The Board of Pharmacy must accept affidavits of practical experience from interns whose
20 practical experience internships occurred in this State. The affidavit must provide that the supervising pharmacist and the site of
21 experience is licensed and in good standing with the board and that the internship falls within the criteria for internships set by the
22 board. The affidavit must be accompanied by a ten dollar fee to cover administrative costs associated with compliance with this
23 proviso.

24 **81.12.** (LLR: Office of State Fire Marshal - Clothing) The Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation is authorized to
25 purchase and issue clothing to the non-administrative staff of the Office of the State Fire Marshal that are field personnel working in
26 a regulatory aspect and/or certified to be a resident state fire marshal.

27 **81.13.** RESERVED

28

29 SECTION 82 - R400 - DEPARTMENT OF MOTOR VEHICLES

30

31 **82.1.** (DMV: Federal, Other Flow Through Funds) In order to complete projects begun in a prior fiscal year, the Department of
32 Motor Vehicles is authorized to expend federal and earmarked funds in the current fiscal year for expenditures incurred in the prior
33 fiscal year.

34 **82.2.** (DMV: Cost Recovery Fee/Sale of Photos or Digitized Images) The Department of Motor Vehicles may collect processing
35 fees and fees to recover the costs of the production, purchase, handling and mailing of documents, publications, records and data
36 sets. The amount charged by the Department of Motor Vehicles for any fees collected pursuant to this proviso may not exceed the

1 rates that the department charged as of February 1, 2001. The Department of Motor Vehicles may not sell, provide or otherwise
2 furnish to private parties, copies of photographs, whether digitized or not, taken for the purpose of a driver's license or personal
3 identification card. Photographs and digitized images from a driver's license or personal identification card are not considered public
4 records. Funds derived from these sources shall be retained by the department.

5 **82.3.** (DMV: DPPA Compliance Audit) The Department of Motor Vehicles may charge fees to defray the costs associated with
6 auditing and enforcing compliance of all Federal or State statutes and regulations pertaining to personal information for customers
7 receiving information disseminated by the department as allowed by law. This provision does not pertain to state agencies. The
8 Comptroller General shall place the funds into a special restricted account to be used by the department.

9 **82.4.** (DMV: Underutilized Offices) The Director of the Department of Motor Vehicles is authorized to develop and implement
10 a plan to reduce the hours of operation in underutilized DMV field offices; however the legislative delegation of the county in which
11 the affected field office is located must be notified prior to implementation of the plan. In addition, the director shall review field
12 offices which have a high volume of traffic to determine whether it would be beneficial to expand the hours of operation.

13 **82.5.** (DMV: Activities Allowed on Special Restricted Driver's License) In the current fiscal year, employing funds authorized
14 or appropriated to the Department of Motor Vehicles pursuant to Section 82, Part IA of this act, the department must include
15 employment, school, church-related or sponsored activities, and parentally approved sports activities in the categories for which it
16 may waive or modify restrictions in the special restricted driver's license for certain minors. The licensee must provide the
17 department a statement of the purpose of the waiver or modification of restrictions executed by the parents or legal guardian of the
18 licensee and documents executed by church representatives and/or representatives of the sports entity for which the waiver is being
19 requested.

20 **82.6.** (DMV: General Fund Balance Carry Forward) The Department of Motor Vehicles may carry forward any unexpended
21 general fund balance from the prior fiscal year and expend those funds in the current fiscal year.

22 **82.7.** (DMV: Phoenix III Migration Pilot) In Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, the department shall be authorized to expend the
23 remainder of the \$1,000,000 authorized in the prior fiscal year from any available other earmarked cash balances to conduct a
24 proof-of-concept pilot for Phoenix III development and data migration. Funds may be expended only upon review and approval of
25 the Department of Administration through the IT project governance process established by Proviso 117.117.

26 **82.8.** (DMV: Real ID) For Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, the Department of Motor Vehicles may expend any available
27 earmarked cash reserves, with the exception of the funds designated for the Phoenix III pilot, on the implementation of Real ID.

28 **82.9.** (DMV: Electronic Verification Processing Fees) In the current fiscal year, the Department of Motor Vehicles is exempt
29 from paying fees to the Department of Health and Environmental Control associated with the use of the Electronic Verification of
30 Vital Events (EVVE) system to verify or certify birth certificates during the driver's license or identification card issuance process.

31 **82.10.** (DMV: Minor Identification Card Fees) In the current fiscal year, the Department of Motor Vehicles may waive the five
32 dollar fee associated with issuing an identification card to someone less than 17-years-old if the card issuance is through an
33 established partnership with a state or federal agency.

1 SECTION 83 - R600 - DEPARTMENT OF EMPLOYMENT AND WORKFORCE

2
3 **83.1.** (DEW: Business Intelligence Division Program Contracts) All earmarked funds collected for the Business Intelligence
4 Division Program Contracts through the Department of Employment and Workforce may be retained by the agency to be used for
5 the exclusive purpose of operating these programs. All funds not expended in the prior fiscal year may be carried forward for use in
6 the current fiscal year.

7 **83.2.** (DEW: Federal and Earmarked Prior Year Payments) The Department of Employment and Workforce shall be allowed to
8 pay federal and earmarked prior year obligations with current year funds.

9 **83.3.** (DEW: Transparency of Funding Appropriation) In order to promote accountability and transparency, the Department of
10 Employment and Workforce must provide and release to the public via the agency's website, a report of all aggregate amounts of
11 taxes, fees and payments that were charged, collected and paid by that state agency in the prior fiscal year. For the purpose of
12 efficiency and conservation of resources, this report shall be incorporated into the Trust Fund Report due by October first as required
13 by Section 41-33-45 of the 1976 Code. In addition to the requirements of Section 41-33-45, the Trust Fund Report shall include, but
14 not be limited to: (1) SUTA taxes collected per Tier; (2) unemployment benefit claims paid; (3) how many unemployment claims
15 were made in error; (4) loan repayments made to the federal government; and (5) the amount of funds left in the agency's account at
16 the end of the fiscal year. The report must be posted online by October first of the current fiscal year. Additionally, the report must
17 be delivered to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee by
18 October first. Funds appropriated to and/or authorized for use by the department shall be used to accomplish this directive.

19 **83.4.** (DEW: Negotiation of Interest) For the current fiscal year and upon final repayment of all Title XII advances from the
20 Federal Unemployment Account received by the state beginning in December of 2008, any interest assessment funds received by the
21 Department of Employment and Workforce Interest Assessment Fund pursuant to Section 41-33-810 of the 1976 Code shall be
22 transferred to the Unemployment Compensation Fund.

23 **83.5.** (DEW: UI Tax System Modernization) The Department of Employment and Workforce is authorized to expend up to
24 ~~\$3,178,053~~ \$2,749,690 of funds made available to the State under Section 903 of the United States Social Security Act, as amended.
25 The funds must be used under the direction of the Department of Employment and Workforce, for the purpose of acquiring software,
26 equipment, and necessary services to replace the agency's unemployment tax information system with a modern technology solution.
27 No part of the funds herein authorized may be obligated after a two-year period beginning on July 1, 2018. The amount obligated
28 pursuant to this provision shall not at any time exceed the amount by which (a) the aggregate of amounts transferred to the accounts
29 of the State pursuant to Section 903 of the Social Security Act exceeds (b) the aggregate of the amounts obligated for administration
30 and paid out for administration and paid out for benefits and required by law to be charged against the amounts transferred to the
31 account of this State.

32 **83.6.** (DEW: Employment Training Outcomes Data Sharing) The Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) (P.L.
33 113-128), requires integration of training and employment data for the purposes of improving assessment of employment outcomes
34 for the various training providers eligible to receive funding appropriated or authorized by this Act.

35 (A) The department must enter into a data-sharing agreement with eligible training providers (ETPs) prior to the ETP entering
36 student data into the Palmetto Academic Training Hub (PATH). ETPs will submit data related to the types of training programs

1 offered, individual student coursework, including personal identifying information (PII) to match training, employment data and
2 performance outcomes, program completion and time to complete, and program costs, as outlined in federal guidance.

3 (B) State agencies needing data from the Department of Employment and Workforce must meet an exception permitting
4 disclosure, pursuant to 20 C.F.R. Part 603. Prior to providing data to a state agency, the department must enter into a data sharing
5 agreement with the requesting agency, as described in 20 C.F.R. Part 603. Requesting state agencies must identify a need in the
6 administration of the official duties for department data, as required by 20 C.F.R. Part 603. The department shall charge state
7 agencies, ~~excluding the Department of Commerce~~, for costs, as described in federal and state law, for the data sharing requests. ~~The~~
8 ~~Department of Commerce shall not be charged for costs associated with this provision.~~

10 SECTION 84 - U120 - DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

11
12 **84.1.** (DOT: Expenditure Authority Limitation) The Department of Transportation is hereby authorized to expend all cash
13 balances brought forward from the previous year and all income including all federal funds, unexpended general funds and proceeds
14 from bond sales accruing to the Department of Transportation, but in no case shall the expenditures of the Department of
15 Transportation exceed the amount of cash balances brought forward from the preceding year plus the amount of all income including
16 federal funds, general funds and proceeds from bond sales.

17 **84.2.** (DOT: Special Fund Authorization) The Department of Transportation with the approval of the State Treasurer, is hereby
18 authorized to set up with the State Treasurer such special funds out of the Department of Transportation funds as may be deemed
19 advisable for proper accounting purposes.

20 **84.3.** (DOT: Secure Bonds & Insurance) The Department of Transportation is hereby authorized to secure bonds and insurance
21 covering such activities of the department as may be deemed proper and advisable, due consideration being given to the security
22 offered and the service of claims.

23 **84.4.** (DOT: Benefits) Employees of the Department of Transportation shall receive equal compensation increases, health
24 insurance benefits and employee bonuses provided in this act for employees of the State generally. The amount will be funded from
25 Department of Transportation funding sources.

26 **84.5.** (DOT: Document Fees) The Department of Transportation is hereby authorized to establish an appropriate schedule of
27 fees to be charged for copies of records, lists, bidder's proposals, plans, maps, etc. based upon approximate actual costs and handling
28 costs of producing such copies, lists, bidder's proposals, plans, maps, etc.

29 **84.6.** (DOT: Meals in Emergency Operations) The Department of Transportation may provide meals to employees of the
30 department who are not permitted to leave assigned duty stations and are required to work during deployment, emergency simulation
31 exercises, and when the Governor declares a state of emergency.

32 **84.7.** (DOT: Rest Area Water Rates) For the current fiscal year, rest areas of the Department of Transportation shall be charged
33 in-district water rates by providers of water and sewer services, unless the rate currently charged by the provider is less than in-district
34 rates.

1 **84.8.** (DOT: Shop Road Farmers Market Bypass Carry Forward) Unexpended funds appropriated for the Shop Road Farmers
2 Market Bypass may be carried forward into the current fiscal year and expended for the matching requirement for the widening and
3 expansion of Leesburg Road from Fairmont to Wildcat Road (Lower Richland roads-Phase I).

4 **84.9.** (DOT: Bridge Replacement in McCormick County) ~~Planning and construction on a new U.S. 378 bridge crossing Lake J.~~
5 ~~Strom Thurmond must provide for and allow McCormick County to affix water lines to the new bridge just as the water lines are~~
6 ~~affixed to the existing bridge. McCormick County shall bear the cost of affixing the water lines to the new bridge.~~

7 **84.10.** (DOT: Project Priority List) From the funds appropriated to the department, the Department of Transportation Commission
8 project priority lists, as required under Act 114 of 2007, shall be published in a conspicuous place on the department's website in a
9 manner easily accessible to the public. The priority lists shall be accompanied by the associated engineering directives explaining
10 the ranking process and methodology for applying the commission approved criteria.

11 **84.11.** (DOT: General Fund Balance Carry Forward) The Department of Transportation may carry forward any unexpended
12 general fund balance from the prior fiscal year and expend those funds in the current fiscal year.

13 **84.12.** (DOT: Reimbursement for Vehicle Damage) Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Transportation, the
14 department must develop direct internet access from the department's home page to any document or claim form that may be used
15 by the public to seek reimbursement for vehicle damages caused by poor road conditions. The department must post a link to the
16 documents or claim forms on the department's home page in a prominent, easily viewed location.

17 **84.13.** (DOT: Preventative Maintenance Credit) The Department of Transportation is authorized to transfer a portion of proceeds
18 of the motor fuel user fee received from Section 12-28-310(D) to the Department of Revenue in order to satisfy the requirements of
19 the preventive maintenance credit in Section 12-6-3780(B)(2).

20 **84.14.** (DOT: Emergency Meetings) The Department of Transportation Commission is authorized to use funds under this Act in
21 order to convene a meeting in cases of emergency as determined by the Secretary of Transportation when a natural disaster or other
22 dire situation requires immediate action. Notice shall be given to the press and the public as soon as a decision is made to convene
23 an emergency meeting. Only emergency matters may be considered in such a meeting. The meeting shall be open to the public, and
24 may be conducted over a conference call if necessary.

25 **84.15.** (DOT: CTC Donor Bonus) The Department of Transportation is authorized, in order to meet the requirements of Act 40
26 of 2017, to transfer a portion of the proceeds of the motor fuel user fee received from Section 12-28-310(D) of the 1976 Code to
27 satisfy the donor bonus for County Transportation Committees in Section 12-28-2740(H).

28 **84.16.** (DOT: Public Utility Relocation) ~~From the funds authorized in the current fiscal year, the Department of Transportation~~
29 ~~may use its federal aid road and bridge program funds for the relocation of public water and sewer lines in accordance with federal~~
30 ~~guidelines.~~

31 32 SECTION 85 - U150 - INFRASTRUCTURE BANK BOARD

33
34 **85.1.** (IBB: Board Meeting Coverage) Of the funds authorized for the State Transportation Infrastructure Bank Board, the Bank
35 must provide live-streamed coverage of all Board meetings to ensure transparency and access for the public. The board meetings
36 shall be recorded and archived and made available on the South Carolina Transportation Infrastructure Bank's website.

1 **SECTION 86 - U200 - COUNTY TRANSPORTATION FUNDS**

2

3 **86.1.** (CTC: Increased Funding) The requirement of Section 13 of Act 40 of 2017 for increased funding to the County
 4 Transportation Committees shall come from the proceeds of Section 12-28-310(D), and shall be used exclusively for repairs,
 5 maintenance, and improvements to the state highway system.

6

7 **SECTION 87 - U300 - DIVISION OF AERONAUTICS**

8

9 **87.1.** (AERO: Reimbursement for Services Carry Forward) The Division of Aeronautics may retain and expend reimbursements
 10 derived from charges to other government agencies for service and supplies for operating purposes and that a reserve not to exceed
 11 \$300,000 may be carried forward to the current fiscal year for the replacement of time limit aircraft components.

12 **87.2.** (AERO: Office Space Rental) Revenue received from rental of Division of Aeronautics office space may be retained and
 13 expended to cover the cost of building operations.

14 **87.3.** (AERO: Funding Sequence) All General Aviation Airports will receive funding prior to the four air carrier airports (i.e.
 15 Columbia, Charleston, Greenville-Spartanburg, Myrtle Beach Jetport) as these qualify for special funding under the DOT/FAA
 16 appropriations based on enplanements in South Carolina.

17 **87.4.** (AERO: Hangar/Parking Facilities) The Division of Aeronautics will provide hangar/parking facilities for government
 18 owned and/or operated aircraft on a first come basis. Funds shall be
 19 retained by the division for the purpose of hangar and parking facility maintenance. The Hangar Fee Schedule shall be determined
 20 by the division and shall not exceed local average market rates.

21 Personnel from the agencies owning and/or operating aircraft will be responsible for ground movement of their aircraft.

22 **87.5.** (AERO: Aviation Grants) The funds appropriated for Aviation Grants, in this bill or any bill supplemental thereto, shall
 23 be credited to the State Aviation Fund within the Division of Aeronautics for the following purposes:

24 (1) to allow the maximization of grant funds available through the Federal Aviation Administration for capital improvement
 25 projects;

26 (2) for maintenance projects of general aviation airports; and or

27 (3) for aviation education related programs including, but not limited to, educating young people about careers in the aviation
 28 industry and/or the promotion of aviation in general.

29 Sponsors of publicly owned airports for public use are eligible to receive grants pursuant to this provision, but the airport must
 30 have a current development plan that meets the planning requirements of the National Plan of Integrated Airports Systems.

31 The Aeronautics Commission shall promulgate regulations establishing the grants program that, at a minimum, address: (1)
 32 priorities among improvements qualifying for grants; (2) an airport selection process to ensure an equitable distribution of funds
 33 among eligible airports; and (3) the criteria for distribution of funds among eligible airports.

34 Enabling airport sponsors to meet basic Federal Aviation Administration safety guidelines for obstruction clearance must be a
 35 major factor in the priority guidelines established by the Aeronautics Commission pursuant to this provision. The Commission also
 36 shall have discretion consistent with Section 55-5-170 of the 1976 Code to establish a program to grant Aviation Fund dollars for

1 these purposes at the ratio of eighty percent from the fund to twenty percent from the local airport sponsor, or any ratio with a smaller
2 relative contribution from the fund.

3 A report on the expenditure of these funds shall be submitted to the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means
4 Committee.

5 Unspent funds from the prior fiscal year may be carried forward to the current fiscal year and spent for like purposes.
6

7 SECTION 88 - Y140 - STATE PORTS AUTHORITY

8

9 **88.1.** (SPA: Charleston Cooper River Bridge Project) The State Ports Authority shall, from other general fund or operating fund
10 surplus available and any funds appropriated to the authority in prior fiscal years and left unexpended as of July 1, ~~2018~~ 2019, pay
11 to the State Transportation Infrastructure Bank one million dollars before June 30, ~~2019~~ 2020, to continue the Charleston Cooper
12 River Bridge Project.

13 **88.2.** (SPA: Georgetown Port Marketing) The State Ports Authority will continue its cargo diversification strategy which
14 enhances the marketing of all terminal capabilities in Charleston and Georgetown highlighting cruise, breakbulk, bulk, and roll
15 on/roll-off.

16 **88.3.** (SPA: Harbor Deepening Reserve Fund) The State Ports Authority shall maintain the Harbor Deepening Reserve Fund.
17 This fund shall be separate and distinct from the General Fund and interest accrued by the fund must remain in the fund. This fund
18 must be used exclusively by the South Carolina Ports Authority for the activities associated with deepening the state's harbors. Prior
19 to expending any amount from the fund, the State Ports Authority must present a comprehensive plan for the use of the fund for
20 harbor deepening to the Joint Bond Review Committee for review and comment. These funds shall be carried forward from the prior
21 fiscal year into the current fiscal year and must be used for the same purpose.

22 **88.4.** (SPA: Georgetown Port Maintenance Dredging Fund) The State Ports Authority shall maintain the Georgetown Port
23 Maintenance Dredging Fund and any funds appropriated in this act for this purpose shall be deposited into this account. This fund
24 shall be separate and distinct from the General Fund and the Harbor Deepening Reserve Fund and interest accrued by the fund must
25 remain in the fund. This fund must be used exclusively by the South Carolina Ports Authority for the activities associated with the
26 maintenance dredging of the Port of Georgetown. Prior to expending any amount from the fund, the State Ports Authority must
27 present a comprehensive plan for the use of the fund for maintenance dredging to the Joint Bond Review Committee for review and
28 comment. These funds shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and must be used for the same
29 purpose.

30 **88.5.** (SPA: Jasper Ocean Terminal Permitting) The funds appropriated to the State Ports Authority (SPA) for the Jasper Ocean
31 Terminal shall be utilized by the SPA to pay for activities approved and directed by the joint venture governing board and associated
32 with advancing the Project during FY ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20. In connection with activities that are approved and directed by the joint
33 venture, SPA shall comply with the directive of Section 54-3-115 of the South Carolina Code in regard to taking "all action necessary
34 to expeditiously develop a port in Jasper County." Activities undertaken during FY ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20 may include, but are not limited
35 to, the following:

- 36 1. working on a corporate governance model for the joint venture as an operating port;

- 1 2. working on terminal simulation for design and operation;
- 2 3. working on plans, studies, and modeling in conjunction with the respective South Carolina and Georgia Departments of
- 3 Transportation and the metropolitan planning organization to identify and assess supporting road and rail infrastructure for the
- 4 terminal footprint including, but not limited to, supporting infrastructure that may have independent utility;
- 5 4. working on sedimentation modeling for impacts on construction and dredging;
- 6 5. taking actions in furtherance of obtaining: (a) a Department of the Army permit pursuant to Section 10 of the Rivers and
- 7 Harbors Act; (b) a permit pursuant to Section 404 of the Clean Water Act, to prepare a Channel Modification Feasibility Study; and
- 8 (c) studies necessary in connection with developing an Environmental Impact Statement for the Project; and
- 9 6. discharging its obligations pursuant to its Joint Venture Agreement with the Georgia Ports Authority.

10 The funds appropriated to SPA for the Jasper Ocean Terminal Permitting may not be used for reimbursement of SPA expenditures
11 made in a prior fiscal year and must be used only for one or more of the purposes set forth above.

12 SPA shall provide a detailed report in writing to the members of the South Carolina General Assembly on or before the first day
13 of the ~~2019~~ 2020 legislative session and another such report on or before June 30, ~~2019~~ 2020, describing the progress made as of the
14 dates of those reports in regard to the Jasper Ocean Terminal, such to include a description of the ongoing and planned work.

15 **88.6.** *(SPA: Jasper Ocean Terminal Port Facility Infrastructure Fund) There is created within the State Ports Authority the*
16 *Jasper Ocean Terminal Port Facility Infrastructure Fund. The State Ports Authority shall maintain the Jasper Ocean Terminal Port*
17 *Facility Infrastructure Fund and any funds appropriated in this act for this purpose shall be deposited into this account. This fund*
18 *shall be separate and distinct from the General Fund and interest accrued by the fund must remain in the fund. This fund must be*
19 *used exclusively by the State Ports Authority for activities associated with the development of the Jasper Ocean Terminal Port facility*
20 *and infrastructure necessary to support the facility. These funds shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current*
21 *fiscal year and must be used for the same purpose.*

22 SECTION 91 - A990 - LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

23
24
25 **91.1.** (LEG: Legislative Employee Designations) The positions included in this section designated (P) shall denote a permanent
26 employee and the salary is an annual rate. The positions designated (T) shall denote a temporary employee and the salary is for a
27 period of six months to be paid at that rate only while the General Assembly is in session. The positions designated as (Interim) shall
28 denote a temporary employee and the salary is for a period of six months to be paid at that rate while the General Assembly is not in
29 session. The positions designated (PTT) shall denote part-time temporary employees on a twelve-months basis. The positions
30 designated (PPT) shall denote permanent part-time employees retained for full-time work for a period of months or the duration of
31 the legislative session.

32 **91.2.** (LEG: Legislative Employee BPI/Merit) Legislative employees designated (P) or (PPT) shall receive base pay and average
33 merit pay in the same manner as such pay is granted to classified state employees, but for purposes of this paragraph, the term
34 “legislative employees” does not include employees of the House of Representatives. From the funds appropriated for Employee
35 Pay Increases, the Speaker of the House and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall determine the amount necessary for
36 compensation of the employees of the House and Senate.

1 **91.3.** (LEG: Interim Expenses Allowance) The Chairman of the Standing House and Senate Committees shall each be allowed
2 the sum of six hundred and fifty dollars for expenses during the interim, between sessions of the General Assembly, to be paid from
3 the House or Senate approved accounts, with each body paying the expense allowance of the chairman in its membership. The
4 Speaker of the House is authorized to approve not more than six hundred and fifty dollars for expenses during the interim for
5 Chairmen of the Standing Committees of the House.

6 **91.4.** (LEG: Subsistence/Travel Regulations) (A) Members of the General Assembly shall receive subsistence for each
7 legislative day that the respective body is in session and in any other instance in which a member is allowed subsistence expense.
8 No member of the General Assembly except those present are eligible for subsistence on that day. Legislative day is defined as those
9 days commencing on the regular annual convening day of the General Assembly and continuing through the day of adjournment sine
10 die, excluding Friday, Saturday, Sunday, and Monday.

11 (B) Standing Committees of the Senate and House of Representatives are authorized to continue work during the interim;
12 however, House members must receive advanced approval by the Speaker of the House and Senate members must receive advanced
13 approval by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate or Standing Committee Chairman to meet. If such advanced approval is not
14 received, the members of the General Assembly shall not be paid the per diem authorized in this provision. When certified by the
15 Speaker of the House, President Pro Tempore of the Senate, or Standing Committee Chairman, the members serving on such
16 committees shall receive a subsistence and mileage at the rate provided for by law, and the regular per diem established in this act
17 for members of boards, commissions, and committees while attending scheduled meetings. Members may elect to receive actual
18 expenses incurred for lodging and meals in lieu of the allowable subsistence expense. The funds for allowances specified in this
19 proviso shall be paid to the members of the Senate or House of Representatives from the Approved Accounts of the respective body
20 except as otherwise may be provided.

21 (C) Joint Study Committees created pursuant to Acts and Resolutions of the General Assembly are authorized to continue work
22 during the interim to secure such information and complete such investigations as may be assigned to the respective committees;
23 however, House members must receive advanced approval by the Speaker of the House and Senate members must receive advanced
24 approval by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate or Standing Committee Chairman to meet. If such advanced approval is not
25 received, the House and Senate members of the Joint Study Committee shall not be paid the per diem authorized in this provision.
26 When certified by the appropriate authority, the members appointed to such committees shall receive a subsistence and mileage at
27 the rate provided for by law, and the regular per diem established in this act for members of boards, commissions, and committees
28 while attending scheduled meetings. Members may elect to receive actual expenses incurred for lodging and meals in lieu of the
29 allowable subsistence expense. The allowances specified in this proviso shall be paid from funds appropriated to the respective
30 committees for such purposes, or from Approved Accounts of the respective body of the General Assembly if no funds have been
31 appropriated to such a committee for these purposes.

32 (D) Members of the Senate and the House of Representatives when traveling on official State business shall be allowed a
33 subsistence and transportation expenses as provided for by law, and the regular per diem established in this act for members of
34 boards, commissions, and committees upon approval of the appropriate chairman. When traveling on official business of the Senate
35 or the House of Representatives not directly associated with a committee of the General Assembly, members shall be paid the same
36 allowance upon approval of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate or the Speaker of the House of Representatives. In either

1 instance, the members may elect to receive actual expenses incurred for lodging and meals in lieu of the allowable subsistence
2 expense. The funds for the allowances specified in this proviso shall be paid from the Approved Accounts of the Senate or the House
3 of Representatives or from the appropriate account of the agency, board, commission, task force or committee upon which the
4 member serves.

5 (E) Members of the House of Representatives shall not be reimbursed for per diem, subsistence, or travel in connection with any
6 function held outside of the regular session of the General Assembly unless prior approval has been received from the Speaker of the
7 House.

8 (F) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, subsistence and mileage reimbursement for members of the General Assembly
9 shall be the level authorized by the Internal Revenue Service for the Columbia area. Provided, in calculating the subsistence
10 reimbursement for members of the General Assembly the reimbursement rate for the lodging component shall be the average daily
11 rate for hotels in the Columbia Downtown area as defined by the Columbia Metro Convention and Visitor's Bureau for the preceding
12 fiscal year.

13 **91.5.** (LEG: Senate Voucher Approval) All payroll vouchers, disbursement vouchers, and interdepartmental transfers of the
14 Senate shall only require the approval of the Clerk of the Senate.

15 **91.6.** (LEG: Supplies Approval) All supplies for the Senate shall be purchased only upon the authority of the Clerk of the Senate
16 and all supplies for the House of Representatives shall be purchased only upon the authority of the Clerk of the House.

17 **91.7.** (LEG: House Pages) Up to one hundred forty-four Pages may be appointed pursuant to House policies and procedures and
18 they shall be available for any necessary service to the House of Representatives.

19 **91.8.** (LEG: Senate Research Personnel Compensation) Senate Research personnel other than Directors of Research and the
20 committee research staff shall be paid from funds appropriated for Senate Research at the direction of the Clerk of the Senate.

21 **91.9.** (LEG: Contract for Services) The Standing Committees of the Senate may, upon approval of the President Pro Tempore,
22 contract with state agencies and other entities for such projects, programs, and services as may be necessary to the work of the
23 respective committees. Any such projects, programs, or services shall be paid from funds appropriated for contractual services.

24 **91.10.** (LEG: Jt. Leg. Committee Operational Authorization) Only the Joint Legislative Committees for which funding is provided
25 herein are authorized to continue operating during the current fiscal year under the same laws, resolutions, rules or regulations which
26 provided for their operations during the prior fiscal year.

27 **91.11.** (LEG: Legislative Carry Forward) In addition to the funds appropriated in this section, the funds appropriated under Part
28 IA, Sections 91A, 91B, 91C, 91D, and 91E for the prior fiscal year which are not expended during that fiscal year may be carried
29 forward to be expended for the same purposes in the current fiscal year.

30 **91.12.** (LEG: Senate Expenditures/O&M Committee) Notwithstanding any limitation or other provisions of law to the contrary,
31 funds expended by the Senate for salary adjustments, professional fees and dues, and necessary expenses, supplies, and equipment
32 for Senate employees, must be paid from funds appropriated to the Senate Operations and Management Committee and funds
33 available in approved accounts of the Senate, and shall be authorized and allocated in such manner as determined by the Senate
34 Operations and Management Committee. From the funds annually allocated to each Senator and Representative for postage and
35 telephone, \$250 may be used to purchase American and State flags.

- 1 **91.13.** (LEG: In-District Compensation) All members of the General Assembly shall receive an in-district compensation of \$1,000
2 per month.
- 3 **91.14.** (LEG: Additional House Support Personnel) The House Operations and Management Committee shall determine
4 procedures and policies for the administration and operation of the Legislative Aide program and the House Operations and
5 Management Committee shall manage the program. Appropriations to the House of Representatives in Part IA shall fund the
6 program.
- 7 **91.15.** (LEG: House Postage) The Speaker of the House is authorized to approve no more than ~~\$700~~ \$1,200 per member per
8 fiscal year for postage.
- 9 **91.16.** (LEG: Legislative Dual Employment) Each committee and joint legislative committee provide a list to the members of the
10 General Assembly of all employees who hold dual positions of state employment.
- 11 **91.17.** (LEG: Code of Law Reimbursement) The Legislative Council may require reimbursement from public sector recipients
12 except for the General Assembly of its cost of acquiring codes of law, supplements, or replacement volumes distributed to them.
- 13 **91.18.** (LEG: Statewide Acts Availability) From the funds appropriated in Part IA, Section 91D of this act, for the current fiscal
14 year the clerks of the House of Representatives and the Senate are to make all statewide Acts available to the public electronically.
15 The provisions of this section are in lieu of the House and Senate Clerks' duties related to the printing and mailing of acts as set forth
16 in Sections 2-13-190, 2-13-210, and 11-25-640 through 11-25-680 of the 1976 Code.
- 17 **91.19.** (LEG: LAC Matching Federal Funds) The Legislative Audit Council is authorized to use funds appropriated in this act as
18 state matching funds for federal funds available for audits and reviews. The council is also authorized to charge state agencies for
19 federal funds, if available, for the costs associated with audits and reviews. Agencies shall remit the federal funds to the Legislative
20 Audit Council as reimbursement for the costs of audits and reviews.
- 21 **91.20.** (LEG: Other Funds Oversight Committee) There is created a joint committee of the Senate and of the House of
22 Representatives entitled the Other Funds Oversight Committee. The committee shall consist of eight members as follows: the
23 Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, or his designee; one member of the Senate Finance Committee appointed by the
24 Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee; the Chairman of the House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee, or his
25 designee; one member of the House Ways and Means Committee appointed by the Chairman of the House Ways and Means
26 Committee; the Senate Majority Leader, or his designee; the Senate Minority Leader, or his designee; the House Majority Leader, or
27 his designee; and the House Minority Leader, or his designee.
- 28 The committee shall review and examine the source of other funds in this State, ~~excluding other funds for institutions of higher~~
29 ~~learning as designated in Proviso 117.8(B)~~, and recommend to the General Assembly the appropriate policy for the receipt,
30 appropriation, expenditure, and reporting of other funds. In making its determination, the committee shall solicit and receive
31 testimony from state agencies, departments, boards or commissions regarding the status of the receipt of other funds, the conditions
32 of receipt, the expenditure of other funds, and any relevant statistic or measurement. The committee shall make recommendations
33 to the General Assembly regarding any necessary action.
- 34 The Executive Budget Office must notify the committee of any request for an increase in interim budget authorization resulting
35 from other funds collections that is made by any state agency, department, board, or commission. The committee shall review each
36 request and recommend appropriate action.

1 Members of the committee shall serve without compensation, but are allowed the usual per diem and mileage as provided by law
2 for members of boards, commissions, and committees while on official business.

3 For purposes of the proviso, 'other funds' means any revenues received by an agency which are not federal funds and are not
4 general funds appropriated by the General Assembly in the appropriations act.

5 **91.21.** (LEG: DMV Audit Review) For the current fiscal year, the provisions of Section 56-1-5(F) are suspended. Any savings
6 generated by not conducting the review shall be used to conduct audits required by Section 2-15-60 of the 1976 Code.

7 **91.22.** (LEG: Electronic Correspondence) For the current fiscal year, the House of Representatives may not expend any funds for
8 the printing or mailing of bills, summaries, committee agendas, etc. to committee members. The House of Representatives shall
9 send all relevant information concerning committee meetings to committee members via electronic means.

10 **91.23.** (LEG: Technology Panel) Of the funds appropriated in the Department of Education's program VIII.D. for Technology
11 the K-12 Technology Initiative partnership shall provide a report to the House Education and Public Works Committee, the House
12 Ways and Means Committee, the Senate Education Committee and the Senate Finance Committee, describing the state's efforts to
13 facilitate the cost effective provision of connectivity and internet bandwidth to schools and libraries on a statewide basis, regardless
14 of location, activities to assist schools and libraries in minimizing and detecting internet security threats, the development and
15 utilization of technological and online resources to support student development and achievement, the development and utilization
16 of curriculum and professional training to support the use of instructional technology in schools and libraries, and other educational
17 technology related activities engaged in by the partnership. Further, the report must detail information on the expenditure of the
18 K-12 Technology funds by each district as well as a list of the districts requesting flexibility in the use of those funds. The report
19 shall be submitted no later than June 1, ~~2019~~ 2020.

20 **91.24.** (LEG: Legislative Department Applicability) For purposes of this act and any other provision of law that would have any
21 effect on the expenditure of state revenue through the applicability of the particular provision or through compliance with a mandate
22 or requirement of the provision, the terms "state agency" or "agency" do not include any component of the Legislative Department
23 unless the provision of law specifically includes these entities and the inclusion only applies for purposes of the particular provision.

24 **91.25.** (LEG: Requested Information) The departments, bureaus, officers, commissions, institutions, and other agencies or
25 undertakings of the State, upon request, shall immediately furnish to President Pro Tempore of the Senate or the Speaker of the
26 House of Representatives in such form as he may require, any information requested in relation to their respective affairs or activities.

27 **91.26.** (LEG: Lawsuit Party of Interest) When the Lieutenant Governor is named as a party to a lawsuit challenging actions taken
28 by the Senate, the President Pro Tempore shall be automatically substituted as the party representing the Senate as the Lieutenant
29 Governor is not a party in interest. Upon being served with the lawsuit, the Lieutenant Governor shall immediately notify the
30 President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Clerk of the Senate. Upon receiving notice from the Lieutenant Governor, the President
31 Pro Tempore shall notify the court and the plaintiff/petitioner that the President Pro Tempore of the Senate is invoking the provisions
32 of this proviso and substituting himself as the party representing the Senate. The Court shall make necessary changes to the caption
33 of the lawsuit and otherwise. However, the provisions of this proviso are not effective if the actions challenged are solely the actions
34 taken by the Lieutenant Governor. The provisions contained in this proviso do not apply to actions filed before, or otherwise pending,
35 as of the effective date of this act.

1 **SECTION 92 - D210 - OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR**

3 **92.1.** (GOV: Governor's Office Budget) All other provisions of law notwithstanding, the Executive Control of State section and
4 Mansion and Grounds section shall be treated as a single budget section for the purpose of transfers and budget reconciliation.

5 **92.2.** (GOV: Mansion and Grounds Budget) The Governor's Office of Mansion and Grounds shall not exceed ten percent of its
6 quarterly allocation of funds so as to provide for agency operations on a uniform basis throughout the fiscal year.

7 **92.3.** (GOV: Mansion and Grounds Maintenance and Complex Facilities) Revenue collected from rental of Mansion Complex
8 facilities and grounds must be retained and expended by the Governor's Office, Mansion and Grounds to support its operations.
9 Unexpended funds shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and be utilized for the same purposes.

10 **92.4.** (GOV: Use of Funds Report) In order to ensure transparency and accountability, the Governor's Office of Executive
11 Control of State shall report quarterly to the Senate Finance Committee and House Ways and Means Committee on financial
12 transactions that have taken place between Executive Control of State and Mansion and Grounds. These transactions shall include,
13 but are not limited to, any transfer of funds or payments or reimbursements for services rendered. For each transfer, payment, or
14 reimbursement the report must specify the amount, the reason for, or circumstance that necessitated the transaction, and the source
15 of funds used. In the event federal or other funds were utilized, the source from which the revenue was generated must also be
16 included. The report must be submitted as soon after the end of each quarter as practicable.

18 **SECTION 93 - D500 - DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION**

20 **93.1.** (DOA: Developmental Disabilities Council) Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Administration, Office of
21 Executive Policy and Programs, \$50,000 must be used as state match for the Developmental Disabilities Council federal grant. These
22 funds shall be excluded from the Department of Administration's base budget calculation of any across-the-board agency base
23 reductions mandated by the Executive Budget Office or General Assembly.

24 **93.2.** (DOA: CCRS Evaluations & Placements) ~~The amount appropriated in this section under Special Items Children's Case
25 Resolution System for Private Placement of Handicapped School Age Children must be used for expenses incurred in the evaluation
26 of children referred to the CCRS to facilitate appropriate placement and to pay up to forty percent when placement is made in state
27 and up to thirty percent when placement must be made out of state of the excess cost of private placement over and above
28 one per pupil share of state and local funds generated by the Education Finance Act, and the one per pupil share of applicable federal
29 funds; provided it has been established that all other possible public placements are exhausted or inappropriate. The balance of
30 funding responsibility necessary to provide the child with services must be determined by the Children's Case Resolution System
31 (CCRS) and apportioned among the appropriate public agencies on the basis of the reasons for the private placement. When the
32 amount appropriated in this section is exhausted, the funding responsibility must be apportioned according to the procedures of the
33 CCRS.~~

34 **93.3.** (DOA: CCRS Significant Fiscal Impact) ~~In accordance with Section 20-7-5240(e) of the 1976 Code, "significant fiscal
35 impact" in the current fiscal year shall be defined for each designated agency as the greater of (1) funds appropriated by the General~~

1 Assembly for the current fiscal year on cases referred to, decided or placed through the Children's Case Resolution System or (2)
2 that agency's assigned shares in the current fiscal year of five cases decided by the Children's Case Resolution System.

3 **93.4.** (DOA: Foster Care-Private Foster Care Reviews) ~~The Department of Administration, Office of Executive Policy and~~
4 ~~Programs, Division of Foster Care is authorized to restructure its programs, including but not limited to, suspending reviews of~~
5 ~~children privately placed in private foster care and/or changing the location of reviews of children in public foster care, to maintain~~
6 ~~continuous operations within existing resources as dictated by recent budget reductions. These decisions must be based upon the~~
7 ~~availability of existing funds. This provision supersedes any previous statutory or regulatory mandate.~~

8 **93.5.** (DOA: Guardian Ad Litem Program) ~~Both the program and the funds appropriated to the Department of Administration,~~
9 ~~Office of Executive Policy and Programs, Division of Children's Services, Guardian ad Litem Program must be administered~~
10 ~~separately from other programs within the Division of Children's Services and must be expended for the exclusive use of the Guardian~~
11 ~~ad Litem Program.~~

12 ~~For the current fiscal year, the Department of Revenue is directed to reduce the rate of interest paid on eligible refunds by two~~
13 ~~percentage points. The revenue resulting from this reduction must be used exclusively for operations of the Guardian ad Litem~~
14 ~~program and be deposited in the State Treasury in a separate and distinct fund known as the "South Carolina Guardian ad Litem~~
15 ~~Trust Fund." Unexpended revenues in this fund carry forward to succeeding fiscal years, and earnings in this fund must be credited~~
16 ~~to it. The Guardian ad Litem program may carry forward the other funds authorized herein for its operations from the prior fiscal~~
17 ~~year into the current fiscal year.~~

18 **93.6.** (DOA: Continuum of Care Carry Forward) ~~The Department of Administration, Office of Executive Policy and Programs,~~
19 ~~Division of Continuum of Care may carry forward funds appropriated herein to continue services.~~

20 **93.7.** (DOA: M.J. "Dolly" Cooper Veterans Cemetery Carry Forward) The Department of Administration, Office of Executive
21 Policy and Programs, Veterans' Affairs Program may carry forward unexpended funds appropriated and/or authorized for the M.J.
22 "Dolly" Cooper Veterans Cemetery from the prior fiscal year and shall use such funds for the same purpose. In addition, any
23 unexpended funds in the Veterans' Affairs Program, including Special Line Items, shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year
24 into the current fiscal year and used for operation of the M.J. "Dolly" Cooper Veterans Cemetery. Funds carried forward in excess
25 of the amount needed for the operation of the Cemetery may be used for other expenses of the Veterans' Affairs Program. Funds
26 carried forward may not be transferred to any other Department of Administration programs.

27 **93.8.** (DOA: Veterans' Affairs Budget Reduction Exemption) Funds appropriated for the Department of Administration, Office
28 of Executive Policy and Program, Veterans' Affairs Program shall be excluded from the Department of Administration's base budget
29 in the calculation of any across-the-board agency base reductions mandated by the Executive Budget Office or General Assembly.

30 **93.9.** (DOA: State House Operation & Maintenance Account) Funds appropriated to the Department of Administration - for
31 State House Maintenance & Operations & Renovations must be set aside in a separate account for the operation and maintenance of
32 the State House. The department shall report annually to the State House Committee on the amount expended from this fund.

33 **93.10.** (DOA: Compensation - Reporting of Supplemental Salaries) No supplement shall be paid to an agency's employee unless
34 the agency head or designated official of the employing agency, or in the case of supplements paid to college and university
35 presidents, their board of trustees, has approved the conditions and amount of salary supplement. Any compensation, excluding
36 travel reimbursement, from an affiliated public charity, foundation, clinical faculty practice plan, or other public source or any

1 supplement from a private source to the salary appropriated for a state employee and fixed by the State must be reported by the
2 employing agency to the Department of Administration. The report must include the employee's base salary, amount of the
3 supplement, source of the supplement, and any condition of the supplement. The employing agency must report this information on
4 or before August thirty-first of each year and must include the total amount and source of the salary supplement received by the
5 employee during the preceding fiscal year (July first through June thirtieth). The Department of Administration shall formulate
6 policies and procedures to ensure compliance with the reporting provisions of this proviso. Copies of the reports shall be made
7 available to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, upon
8 request.

9 **93.11.** (DOA: Compensation Increase - Appropriated Funds Ratio) Appropriated funds may be used for compensation increases
10 for classified and unclassified employees and agency heads only in the same ratio that the employee's base salary is paid from
11 appropriated sources.

12 **93.12.** (DOA: Local Provider Health Insurance) The local health care providers of the Department of Disabilities and Special
13 Needs shall be awarded funding increases as prescribed for state agencies to cover the employer's share for the cost of providing
14 health and dental insurance to their employees.

15 **93.13.** (DOA: Military Service) Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 8-11-610 of the 1976 Code, a permanent full-time
16 state employee who serves on active duty as a result of an emergency or conflict declared by the President of the United States, and
17 performs such duty, may use up to forty-five days of accumulated annual leave and may use up to ninety days of accumulated sick
18 leave in a calendar year as if it were annual leave.

19 **93.14.** (DOA: First Responder Interoperability) The Department of Administration is directed to administer and coordinate First
20 Responder Interoperability operations for the statewide Palmetto 800 radio system to better coordinate public safety disaster
21 responses and communications. First Responder Interoperability administration and coordination shall be funded as provided in this
22 act. The cost-proportional funds shall be utilized for radio user fees of state agencies and public safety first responders (Fire, EMS
23 and Law Enforcement) that participate in the statewide Palmetto 800 radio system (Palmetto 800 participants). The Department of
24 Administration, in consultation with the State Law Enforcement Division, the Department of Public Safety, and the State Emergency
25 Management Division, and a representative of the South Carolina Sheriff's Association, shall set a baseline number of radios used
26 by each Palmetto 800 participant based on the technical aspects of the Palmetto 800 radio system and the jurisdictional requirements
27 of the participant. If a Palmetto 800 participant reduces the baseline number of radios in use, the amount of funds allocated for the
28 participant's radio user fees shall be reduced in a proportional amount. The funds shall also be utilized to provide private county and
29 city radio systems with grant funds to be used for purchases of equipment that support interoperability with the statewide Palmetto
30 800 radio system and its users. Grant funds shall be allocated to private county and city radio systems based on the criteria used for
31 Palmetto 800 Participants and in amounts proportional to the amounts allocated to support the per-site radio user fees of Palmetto
32 800 participants. A matching share is required by a Palmetto 800 participant or by a private county or city radio system in order to
33 qualify for receipt of funds pursuant to this proviso. Each fiscal year the Department of Administration shall establish the level of
34 match required based upon funding provided by this act. These entities shall be required to furnish such documentation as may be
35 required by the department to verify that the matching funds requirement is met. Upon funding state agency and public safety first
36 responder user fees and private county and city equipment purchases, any remaining funds may be used to enhance and expand the

1 statewide Palmetto 800 radio system. All funds shall be held in a separate account established by the department for the purposes
2 set forth herein. Any unexpended portion of these funds may be carried forward and used for the same purpose. In the calculation
3 of any across-the-board budget reduction mandated by the Executive Budget Office or General Assembly, the amount appropriated
4 to the Department of Administration for First Responder Interoperability must be excluded from the department's base budget.

5 The Department of Administration shall provide a report on the status of the integration of the statewide Palmetto 800 radio system
6 which shall include, but not be limited to, a list of entities who are not integrated into the system as of the end of the immediately
7 preceding fiscal year and the reason why they are not integrated. The report shall be submitted by October first, of the current fiscal
8 year to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

9 **93.15.** (DOA: Sale of Surplus Real Property) Up to fifty percent of the proceeds, net of selling expenses, from the sale of surplus
10 real properties shall be retained by the Department of Administration and used for the deferred maintenance of state-owned buildings.
11 The remaining fifty percent of the net proceeds shall be returned to the agency that the property is owned by, under the control of, or
12 assigned to and shall be used by that agency for nonrecurring purposes. This provision applies to all state agencies and departments
13 except: institutions of higher learning; the Public Service Authority; the Ports Authority; the MUSC Hospital Authority; the Myrtle
14 Beach Air Force Redevelopment Authority; the Department of Transportation; the Columbia State Farmers Market; the Department
15 of Agriculture's Columbia Metrology Lab building and property; the Charleston Naval Complex Redevelopment Authority; the
16 Department of Commerce's Division of Public Railways; the Midlands Technical College Enterprise Campus Authority; the Trident
17 Technical College Enterprise Campus Authority; the Commissioners residence at the Department of Corrections and the Educational
18 Television Commission's Key Road property.

19 The Educational Television Commission shall be authorized to retain the net proceeds from the sale of its property on Key Road,
20 and such proceeds may be used for the renovation of the ETV Telecommunications Center and other maintenance and operating
21 expenses. If it is determined that sufficient net proceeds are not to be derived from the sale of its property on Key Road to cover the
22 cost of all renovations of the Telecommunications Center, the property on Key Road shall not be sold. Any proposed sale hereunder
23 shall, prior to said sale, be submitted to the Department of Administration for approval as being in compliance with the requirements
24 of this subsection.

25 The Department of Corrections shall be authorized to retain the net proceeds from the sale of the residence provided for the
26 Commissioner of the Department of Corrections and use such proceeds for deferred maintenance needs at the Department of
27 Corrections.

28 The Forestry Commission shall be authorized to retain the net proceeds from the sale of surplus land for use in firefighting
29 operations and replacement of firefighting equipment.

30 The Department of Natural Resources shall be authorized to retain the net proceeds from the sale of existing offices originally
31 purchased with a federal grant or with restricted revenue from hunting and fishing license sales for the improvement, consolidation,
32 and/or establishment of regional offices and related facilities.

33 The Department of Agriculture, the Educational Television Commission, the Department of Corrections, the Department of
34 Natural Resources, the Forestry Commission, and the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation shall annually submit a report, within
35 sixty days after the close of the fiscal year, to the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee on the
36 status of the sale of the identified property and a detailed accounting on the expenditure of funds resulting from such sale.

1 This provision is comprehensive and supersedes any conflicting provisions concerning disposition of state-owned real property
2 whether in permanent law, temporary law or by provision elsewhere in this act.

3 Any unused portion of these funds may be carried forward into succeeding fiscal years and used for the same purposes.

4 **93.16.** (DOA: Cyber Security) All state agencies must adopt and implement cyber security policies, guidelines and standards
5 developed by the Department of Administration. The department may conduct audits on state agencies except public institutions of
6 higher learning, technical colleges, political subdivisions, and quasi-governmental bodies as necessary to monitor compliance with
7 established cyber security policies, guidelines and standards. Upon request, public institutions of higher learning, technical colleges,
8 political subdivisions, and quasi-governmental bodies shall submit sufficient evidence that their cyber security policies, guidelines
9 and standards meet or exceed those adopted and implemented by the department. In addition, while agencies retain the primary
10 responsibility and accountability for ensuring responses to breach incidents comply with federal and state laws, the department shall
11 be informed of all agency cyber security breaches, and is authorized to oversee incident responses in a manner determined by the
12 department to be the most prudent. Upon request of the Department of Administration for information or data, all agencies must
13 fully cooperate with and furnish the department with all documents, reports, assessments, and any other data and documentary
14 information needed by the department to perform its mission and to exercise its functions, powers and duties. The Judicial and
15 Legislative Branches are specifically exempt from the requirements set forth herein.

16 **93.17.** (DOA: Holidays) When a legal holiday specified in Section 53-5-10 of the 1976 Code falls on Sunday, the following
17 Monday and when a holiday specified in that section falls on Saturday, the preceding Friday next preceding is deemed a public
18 holiday for all of the purposes. If either the following Monday or the preceding Friday is also a legal holiday, then the State Human
19 Resources Director will designate the day upon which the legal holiday will be observed by state employees. To insure that no more
20 than the legal holidays specified in Section 53-5-10 are observed in the calendar year, a New Year's Day that falls on Saturday must
21 be observed on the following Monday. All bills of exchange, checks, and promissory notes which would otherwise be presentable
22 for acceptance or payment on a Monday or Friday observed as a holiday pursuant to this section are deemed presentable for
23 acceptance or payment on the secular or business day succeeding the holiday.

24 **93.18.** (DOA: Nuclear Advisory Council) The Office of Regulatory Staff shall reimburse the Department of Administration for
25 travel expenses associated with the Governor's Nuclear Advisory Council from the SC Energy Office's radioactive waste funds.

26 **93.19.** RESERVED

27 **93.20.** (DOA: QECB Allocation) From the funds appropriated to the department, the director of the Department of Administration
28 shall develop and implement a plan to utilize the state's remaining Qualified Energy Conservation Bond allocation to fund energy
29 conservation projects on state-owned buildings and other eligible capital expenditures that benefit state agencies.

30 **93.21.** (DOA: OCAB Head Start Program) ~~Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Administration, III. Executive Policy~~
31 ~~& Programs, the department is directed to transfer \$30,000 to OCAB Community Action Agency, Inc., Head Start Program in order~~
32 ~~to match a grant award for the purchase of a 36-passenger bus to transport Head Start students.~~

33 **93.22.** (DOA: Cherry Grove Deferred Maintenance) ~~In the current fiscal year, the Department of Administration shall transfer~~
34 ~~any remaining fund balance appropriated or authorized for the Cherry Grove Building Roof Repair pursuant to Act 286 of 2014 to~~
35 ~~the Department of Education. The remaining funds shall be used by the Department of Education for deferred maintenance and other~~
36 ~~capital improvements.~~

26 ~~Allowable services as defined in the Lieutenant Governor’s State Plan include: group dining, home delivered meals, transportation~~

12 Loan Program, shall be carried forward and used for the same purpose as originally appropriated.

13 **95.7.** (LTG: Caregivers Carry Forward) Unexpended funds from appropriations to the Lieutenant Governor's Office on Aging
14 for caregivers shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year and used for the same purpose.

15 **95.8.** (LTG: Vulnerable Adult Guardian ad Litem Carry Forward) Any unexpended funds from appropriation to the Lieutenant
16 Governor's Office on Aging for the Vulnerable Adult Guardian ad Litem Program shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year
17 and used for the same purpose.

18 SECTION 96 - E080 - OFFICE OF SECRETARY OF STATE

19 **96.1.** (SS: UCC Filing Fees) Revenues from the fees raised pursuant to Section 36-9-525(a), not to exceed \$180,000, may be
20 retained by the Secretary of State for purposes of UCC administration.

21 **96.2.** (SS: Charitable Funds Act Disclosure Violations) The Secretary of State shall refer to the Attorney General for
22 investigation under Section 33-56-145 of the Solicitation of Charitable Funds Act any person who is alleged to have violated the
23 mandatory disclosure requirements of Section 33-56-90 of the Act, and who has been fined \$10,000 or more for those violations.

24 **96.3.** (SS: Charitable Funds Act Misrepresentation Violations) The Secretary of State shall refer to the Attorney General for
25 investigation under Section 33-56-145 of the Solicitation of Charitable Funds Act any person who is alleged to have violated the
26 misrepresentation provisions of Section 33-56-120 of the Act, and who has been fined \$10,000 or more for those violations.

27 SECTION 97 - E120 - OFFICE OF COMPTROLLER GENERAL

28 **97.1.** (CG: Signature Authorization) The Comptroller General is hereby authorized to designate certain employees to approve,
29 in his stead, disbursement documents authorizing payment, and the State Treasurer is hereby authorized to accept such approved
30 disbursement documents when notified by the Comptroller General. This provision shall in no way relieve the Comptroller General
31 of responsibility.

1 **97.2.** (CG: GAAP Implementation & Refinement) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the State of South Carolina issue
2 financial statements in conformance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). To this end, the Comptroller General
3 is directed, as the State Accounting Officer, to maintain an Enterprise Information System for State Government (SCEIS) that will
4 result in proper authorization and control of agency expenditures, including payroll transactions, and in the preparation and issuance
5 of the official financial reports for the State of South Carolina. Under the oversight of the General Assembly, the Comptroller
6 General is given full power and authority to issue accounting policy directives to state agencies in order to comply with GAAP. The
7 Comptroller General is also given full authority to conduct surveys, acquire consulting services, and implement new procedures
8 required to implement fully changes required by GAAP.

9 **97.3.** (CG: Payroll Deduction Processing Fee) There shall be a fee for processing payroll deductions, not to exceed twenty-five
10 cents, for insurance plans, credit unions, deferred compensation plans, benefit providers, and professional associations per deduction
11 per pay day. This fee shall not be applied to charitable deductions. Vendors and other third
12 parties receiving payroll deductions shall bear the entire cost of this fee, at no cost to state employees. The revenues generated from
13 these fees and those provided for child support deductions in accordance with Section 63-17-1460(C), South Carolina Code of Laws,
14 1976, as amended, may be used to support the operations of the Office of Comptroller General and any unexpended balance may be
15 carried forward from the prior fiscal year to the current fiscal year and utilized for the same purposes.

16 **97.4.** (CG: Unemployment Compensation Fund Administration) The lesser of two percent or \$200,000 of the fund balance of
17 the Unemployment Compensation Fund shall be paid out annually to the Office of Comptroller General to be used by that agency to
18 recover the costs of administering the fund. The Unemployment Compensation Fund is provided for in Section 41-31-820, South
19 Carolina Code of Laws, 1976, as amended. Any unexpended balance may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year to the current
20 fiscal year and used for the same purposes.

21 **97.5.** (CG: Purchasing Card Rebate Program) The Office of Comptroller General is authorized to retain the first \$100,000 of
22 rebate associated with the Purchasing Card Program and \$200,000 of agency incentive rebates.

23 The funds retained may be used to support the operations of the Office of Comptroller General and any unexpended balance may
24 be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and be utilized for the same purposes.
25

26 **SECTION 98 - E160 - OFFICE OF STATE TREASURER**

27
28 **98.1.** (TREAS: Nat'l. Forest Fund - Local Govt. Compliance) In order to conform to federal requirements local governments
29 receiving distributions of National Forest Fund revenues are required to report annually to the State Treasurer indicating compliance
30 with authorized purposes.

31 **98.2.** (TREAS: STARS Approval) Decisions relating to the Statewide Accounting and Reporting System (STARS) and the
32 South Carolina Enterprise Information System (SCEIS) which involve the State Treasurer's Banking Operations and other functions
33 of the State Treasurer's Office shall require the approval of the State Treasurer.

34 **98.3.** (TREAS: Investments) The State Treasurer may pool funds from accounts for investment purposes and may invest all
35 monies in the same types of investments as set forth in Section 11-9-660.

1 **98.4.** (TREAS: Management Fees) The State Treasurer is authorized to charge a fee for the operating and management costs
2 associated with the Local Government Investment Pool, the Deferred Compensation Program, the Tuition Prepayment Program, and
3 the College Investment Program and is further authorized to retain and expend the fees to provide these services. The fees assessed
4 may not exceed the cost of the provision of such services.

5 **98.5.** (TREAS: Investment Management Fees) Unless otherwise prohibited by law, the State Treasurer may charge a fee for the
6 operating and management costs associated with the investment management and support operations of various state funds and
7 programs, and further, may retain and expend the fees to provide these services. The fees assessed may not exceed the actual cost
8 of the provision of these services or the earnings on these investments.

9 **98.6.** (TREAS: Debt Management Cost Allocation) Unless otherwise prohibited by law, the State Treasurer may charge actual
10 costs associated with the administration and management of the indebtedness of the State, its agencies and institutions, and further,
11 may retain and expend any amounts so allocated to provide these services. Costs associated with the original issuance of bonds and
12 other indebtedness must be assessed on an hourly basis, must be taken from the costs of issuance of any bond issue or other
13 indebtedness, and must not exceed the actual cost of providing these services. Ongoing costs of administration and maintenance
14 must be assessed against expenses of debt service, and must not exceed the actual costs of providing these services.

15 **98.7.** (TREAS: Withheld Accommodations Tax Revenues) Before noncompliant expenditures and penalties withheld pursuant
16 to Sections 6-4-35(B)(1)(a) and (b) are reallocated, the Tourism Expenditure Review Committee must certify to the Office of State
17 Treasurer that the time period for an appeal of the committee's action to the Administrative Law Court has expired or that the action
18 of the committee has been upheld or overturned by the Administrative Law Court. Noncompliant expenditures and penalties withheld
19 must be reallocated annually after August first. Allocations withheld must be reallocated proportionately based on the most recent
20 completed fiscal year's total statewide collections of the accommodations tax revenue according to the Office of State Treasurer
21 records. Each annual reallocation of withheld funds to non-offending counties and municipalities must be calculated separately then
22 combined if necessary. Each reallocation to a county or municipality calculated less than a dollar must be transferred to the General
23 Fund of the State.

24 **98.8.** (TREAS: Tuition Prepayment Program) The South Carolina Tuition Prepayment Program shall not accept any new
25 enrollment in the current fiscal year. The annual increase in tuition for the purposes of the Tuition Prepayment Program, for an
26 institution cannot exceed seven percent per year from the 2006-07 level. To the extent that actual tuition for an institution exceeds
27 an annual growth of seven percent per year since Fiscal Year 2006-07, colleges and universities must grant a waiver of the difference
28 to the designated beneficiary and shall not pass along this difference to any student.

29 **98.9.** (TREAS: Penalties for Non-reporting) If a municipality fails to submit the audited financial statements required under
30 Section 14-1-208 of the 1976 Code to the State Treasurer within thirteen months of the end of their fiscal year, the State Treasurer
31 must withhold all state payments to that municipality until the required audited financial statement is received.

32 If the State Treasurer receives an audit report from either a county or municipality that contains a significant finding related to
33 court fine reports or remittances to the Office of State Treasurer, the requirements of Proviso 117.50 shall be followed if an amount
34 due is specified, otherwise the State Treasurer shall withhold twenty-five percent of all state payments to the county or municipality
35 until the estimated deficiency has been satisfied.

1 If a county or municipality is more than ninety days delinquent in remitting a monthly court fines report, the State Treasurer shall
2 withhold twenty-five percent of state funding for that county or municipality until all monthly reports are current.

3 After ninety days, any funds held by the Office of State Treasurer will be made available to the State Auditor to conduct an audit
4 of the entity for the purpose of determining an amount due to the Office of State Treasurer, if any.

5 **98.10.** (TREAS: Signature Authorization) The State Treasurer is hereby authorized to designate certain employees to sign
6 payments for the current fiscal year in accordance with Section 11-5-140 of the 1976 Code to meet the ordinary expenses of the
7 State. This provision shall in no way relieve the State Treasurer of responsibility.

8 **98.11.** (TREAS: Unclaimed Property) The State Treasurer may not expend funds to retain a third party, private sector auditor, or
9 auditing firms to fulfill his duties pursuant to the South Carolina Uniform Unclaimed Property Act on a contingency basis or any
10 basis other than an hourly basis, with the exception that the State Treasurer may join other state(s) in multi-state contingent fee
11 auditors' examinations, not to include companies whose parent company is headquartered or incorporated in South Carolina, when
12 there is a reason to believe that those companies being audited are holding funds belonging to South Carolina citizens. The Office
13 of State Treasurer shall retain \$200,000 from the Unclaimed Property Program for the sole purpose of employing internal compliance
14 auditors to enforce the Unclaimed Property Act.

15 **98.12.** (TREAS: Municipality Accommodations Tax Withholdings) If the State Treasurer is withholding accommodations tax
16 revenue distributions to a municipality due to an expenditure the Tourism Expenditure Review Committee determined to be in
17 noncompliance, then the municipality may refund an amount equivalent to the amount determined to be in noncompliance to the
18 municipality's accommodations tax fund from the municipality's general fund. If the municipality certifies to the Tourism
19 Expenditure Review Committee that the amount has been refunded, the State Treasurer shall refund the withheld funds to the
20 municipality's general fund. The expenditure of funds refunded to the municipality's accommodations tax fund and any subsequent
21 expenditures are subject to review by the Tourism Expenditure Review Committee. Prior to notification to the State Treasurer of
22 noncompliance by a municipality, the Tourism Expenditure Review Committee must notify the municipality if an expenditure is
23 found to be in noncompliance. If the committee informs the municipality of an expenditure determined to be in noncompliance and
24 the municipality does not refund the noncompliant amount, the committee shall certify the noncompliance to the State Treasurer. If
25 the committee determines an expenditure of any refunded amount to be in noncompliance, the municipality may not refund an
26 equivalent amount in order to avoid future withholdings.

27 **98.13.** (TREAS: Investment Earnings and Interest) In accordance with the requirements of Section 11-13-125 of the 1976 Code,
28 the State Treasurer shall remit earnings and interest from investments of general deposit funds into the General Fund of the State.
29 Nothing in this provision shall be construed to limit the State Treasurer from incurring and paying fees, expenses, losses, *statutory*
30 *commitments*, salaries, and other costs associated with the routine investment of funds pursuant to Section 11-9-660 of the 1976
31 Code.

32 33 SECTION 100 - E240 - OFFICE OF ADJUTANT GENERAL

35 **100.1.** (ADJ: Unit Maintenance Funds) The funds appropriated as unit maintenance funds shall be distributed to the various
36 National Guard units at the direction of the Adjutant General.

1 **100.2.** (ADJ: Use of Agency Property and Revenue Collections) The Adjutant General is authorized to rent, lease, or sub-lease
2 any area under his ownership or control including facilities, unimproved real-estate, and parking areas. The Adjutant General is
3 authorized to collect funds received from any sources including, but not limited to, All revenues collected by National Guard units
4 from county and city appropriations, short or long-term lease or rental payments, revenues from vending machines, rental of
5 armories, court martial military justice fines or other monetary penalties, federal reimbursements under cooperative agreements,
6 and gifts to the agency to armories for utility expenses, and other collections may be retained and expended in its budgeted operations.
7 These revenues shall be retained and expended as authorized by the Adjutant General.

8 **100.3.** (ADJ: Rental Fee for Election Purposes) The maximum fee that an armory may charge for the use of its premises for
9 election purposes shall be the cost of providing custodial services, utilities and maintenance.

10 **100.4.** (ADJ: Parking Lot Revenues Event Parking Contracts) Notwithstanding other provisions of this act, as a security measure
11 for the State Military Department's headquarters building and grounds, the Adjutant General may control and contractually lease the
12 headquarters building parking facilities, during events at execute agreements addressing event-parking related services, sub-leases
13 or licenses, or other appropriate subject in order to generate revenue from parking areas under his ownership or control near the
14 University of South Carolina's Williams-Brice Stadium; The Adjutant General's authority to enter such agreements applies to the
15 headquarters building parking facilities currently owned by the Department of Administration, whether or not those are subject of a
16 current lease to the Adjutant General. The agreements may relate to parking for specific events, a series of events (USC home
17 football games), or for all events. The Adjutant General may enter agreements with to a state chartered and federally recognized tax
18 exempt 501(c)(4) tax exempt agency employees' association who which may then sub-lease or sub-license individual parking spaces
19 for use during an event, or a series of events (USC home football games). Such a contract The agreements must require the employees
20 association to obtain either event coverage, general liability insurance coverage against wrongful death or injury, or similar coverage
21 that is suitable to the Adjutant General. The contract All agreements must clearly obligate the employees association to hold
22 harmless, indemnify, and defend the Adjutant General's Office Office of the Adjutant General, the Department of Administration,
23 the State of South Carolina, and their respective its officers, and the State of South Carolina harmless and employees from any
24 liability resulting from the use of the parking lot when rented by the employees association parking patrons or their guests activities
25 or presence during these events. In addition, the contract The agreements must specify that the State of South Carolina's Military
26 Department Office of the Adjutant General shall receive no less than thirty-three percent of the gross profits from the sub-leasing,
27 licensing, or other grants of use for of the parking spaces. The contract agreements must also allow the State to audit the employees
28 association's funds. Funds at the Adjutant General's Office derived wholly from the rental of Adjutant General's headquarters'
29 parking lot may be retained at the Adjutant General's Office, but may not be used for employee perquisites.

30 **100.5.** (ADJ: Armory Rental Program) The Adjutant General is authorized to develop and implement an armory rental program
31 to recoup costs associated with the use of armories by state agencies or other non-Guard organizations. The rental program must be
32 uniform in its application to the maximum extent possible. Funds generated by this program may be retained and expended for
33 armory maintenance and operations.

34 **100.6.** (ADJ: Meals in Emergency Operations Centers) The cost of meals, or the advanced purchase of food products to be stored
35 and prepared for meals, may be provided to state employees who are required to work at the State Emergency Operations Centers
36 during actual emergencies and emergency simulation exercises when they are not permitted to leave their stations.

1 **100.7.** (ADJ: Educational Seminar Revenue) All revenue earned from educational seminars shall be retained by the agency to be
2 used for the printing of materials and other expenses related to conducting the seminars. The balance of funds shall be reported
3 annually to the General Assembly.

4 **100.8.** (ADJ: Retention of Lease Property Revenue) ~~The Adjutant General is authorized to lease all real property under the control~~
5 ~~of SCMD. All revenue generated by the lease program may be retained for SCMD armory operations and maintenance as authorized~~
6 ~~by the Adjutant General or Deputy Adjutant General.~~

7 **100.9.** (ADJ: Billeting Operations) All revenues collected by the Billeting operations at the R.L. McCrady Training Center shall
8 be retained and expended in its budgeted operations. Expenditures from these funds shall be determined by the Billeting Committee
9 for Billeting operations.

10 **100.10.** (ADJ: EMD Compensatory Payment) In the event a State of Emergency is declared by the Governor, exempt employees
11 of the Emergency Management Division may be paid for actual hours worked in lieu of accruing compensatory time, at the discretion
12 of the Agency Director, and providing funds are available.

13 **100.11.** (ADJ: Civil Air Patrol) The funds appropriated in this section for the Civil Air Patrol shall be expended by the Civil Air
14 Patrol so as to discharge the state's obligations in conjunction with the Civil Air Patrol as outlined in the SARDA Plan, the South
15 Carolina Operational Radiological Emergency Response Plan, and to assist county and local authorities and other state agencies as
16 permitted by the regulations governing the Civil Air Patrol. All expenditures for equipment and services shall be in accordance with
17 state fiscal policies.

18 **100.12.** (ADJ: Parking Lot Revenues-Columbia Armory, Buildings and Grounds) ~~The Adjutant General may control and~~
19 ~~contractually lease the Columbia Armory, and its buildings and grounds parking facilities during events at the University of South~~
20 ~~Carolina's Williams-Brice Stadium. Funds derived wholly from the rental of the Columbia Armory, and its buildings and grounds~~
21 ~~parking facilities may be retained by the Adjutant General's Office and used for the Funeral Caisson and for SCMD operations,~~
22 ~~including matching federal funds and armory maintenance and operations. These funds may not be used for any other purpose.~~

23 **100.13.** (ADJ: Emergency Commodities) The Emergency Management Division shall be allowed to rotate and replace water,
24 Meals Ready to Eat (MREs), and other essential emergency commodities housed in the state's Logistic Center through the provision
25 of said commodities to neighboring states, counties, municipalities and other state agencies, and shall be allowed to accept
26 compensation for said commodities not to exceed replacement costs. Revenues from this exchange shall be utilized solely for the
27 replacement of state emergency commodities.

28 **100.14.** (ADJ: Funeral Caisson) In the event of a mandated general fund budget reduction, the Adjutant General's Office is
29 prohibited from reducing the funds appropriated for the Funeral Caisson. In addition, these funds shall not be transferred to any
30 other program or be used for any other purpose by the Office of Adjutant General.

31 **100.15.** (ADJ: Behavioral Health Care Facilitator/Coordinator) The funds appropriated and or authorized to the Office of the
32 Adjutant General may be utilized to hire a Behavioral Health Care Facilitator/Coordinator who shall act as a liaison to provide mental
33 health care coordination for mental health services to all members of the South Carolina National Guard. The responsibilities of the
34 position shall include, but are not limited to, focusing on individuals without health insurance or without adequate health insurance;
35 facilitating Memorandum of Understanding with mental health facilities across the state to provide assistance to National Guard
36 Service Members; assisting in coordinating Yellow Ribbon and Beyond and other post deployment and mental health events;

1 coordinating treatment for Service Members for conditions that may or may not result in their being medically non deployable; and
2 participating in staff meetings to discuss care of Service Members. The individual hired must be knowledgeable of state and federal
3 privacy laws, including the HIPAA privacy regulations. In addition, it is preferred that the individual have a previous background
4 in Social Work. A national security background check must be performed on the individual prior to a job offer being tendered.

5 **100.16.** (ADJ: National or State Guard State Active Duty) In the event of the activation of the South Carolina National Guard
6 or State Guard to State Active Duty in response to a declared emergency or in response to an imminent or anticipated emergency,
7 including support provided under Section 25-9-420 of the 1976 Code, the Emergency Management Assistance Compact, the State
8 Treasurer and the Comptroller General are hereby authorized and directed to pay from the general fund of the State such funds as
9 necessary, not to exceed \$500,000, to cover the actual costs incurred. Any funds reimbursed to the state shall be deposited in the
10 state general fund, up to the amount of funds advanced to the Office of Adjutant General for these activities.

11 **100.17.** (ADJ: National Guard Association and Foundation Support) From the funds authorized or appropriated for State Military
12 Department operations, the Adjutant General may authorize National Guard personnel to support and assist the National Guard
13 Association of South Carolina and the South Carolina National Guard Foundation in their missions to promote the health, safety,
14 education, and welfare of South Carolina National Guard personnel and their families.

15 **100.18.** (ADJ: State Guard Activation) In the event of activation of the State Guard of the South Carolina National Guard to
16 State Active Duty, the Office of the Adjutant General is authorized to compensate State Guard personnel at a rate of \$150 per day
17 and to also compensate such personnel for meal per diem as authorized by National Guard and State policy.

18 **100.19.** (ADJ: Disasters Expenditure Status Report) The Emergency Management Division of the Office of the Adjutant General
19 shall prepare a quarterly report on the status of the expenditure of the funds appropriated in the current fiscal year or in a previous
20 fiscal year for FEMA Match for the 2015 Flooding, for Hurricane Matthew, and for the Pinnacle Mountain Fire. The quarterly report
21 must include, but is not limited to, expenditure by category of work by state/local and by county and shall be submitted to the
22 Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee beginning September 30,
23 2018.

24 **100.20.** (ADJ: Armory Revitalizations Carry Forward) The funds appropriated for Armory Revitalizations may be carried
25 forward from the prior fiscal year and expended for the same purpose in the current fiscal year.

26 **100.21.** (ADJ: ~~2017 Hurricane Irma and 2014 Ice Storm~~ Natural Disaster FEMA Match) The Office of Adjutant General,
27 Emergency Management Division shall be authorized to utilize existing fund balances to provide the non-federal cost share to state
28 and local government entities for work that is eligible under the Federal Emergency Management Agency Public Assistance Program
29 for Hurricane Irma and Hurricane Florence. Existing fund balances may not be used to provide the non-federal cost share to private
30 non-profit entities.

31 The Office of Adjutant General, Emergency Management Division is directed to use existing fund balances for the 2015 Flood
32 disaster (Presidential Disaster Declaration DR-4241) to reimburse counties and municipalities with unreimbursed non-federal cost
33 share from the 2014 Ice Storm disaster for storm cleanup expenses incurred during and after states of emergency declared by
34 Executive Orders 2014-06 and 2014-11 and Presidential Disaster Declaration DR-4166. Counties and municipalities must submit
35 an application for such funds by July 31, 2018.

1 The Office of Adjutant General, Emergency Management Division is directed to use \$500,000 of existing fund balances to provide
2 grants to non-profit entities, not to exceed \$50,000 each, for materials to renovate homes affected by the 2015 flood disaster. Non-
3 profit entities must submit a grant application by December 1, 2018, in a manner prescribed by the Emergency Management Division.
4 The \$500,000 authorized by Proviso 100.21 in Act 264 of 2018 for grants for non-profit entities may be carried forward and used
5 for the same purpose in Fiscal Year 2019-20. The Emergency Management Division shall prepare a report listing the name of the
6 grant recipient and the amount received and submit the report to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman
7 of the House Ways and Means Committee by January 15, ~~2019~~ 2020.

8 100.22. (ADJ: Authorization to Use Reimbursement Method) The Office of the Adjutant General, at the discretion of the Adjutant
9 General, may utilize the "reimbursement method" instead of the "advance method" for funding under all Cooperative Agreements.
10 The Adjutant General may transfer or shift any of its appropriations and, accordingly, to the extent that federal reimbursements are
11 expected within a reasonable period of time, the State Comptroller General may draw warrants for payment on the service contract
12 fund which exceeded the cash balance available in that fund at the time of the warrant.
13

14 SECTION 101 - E280 - ELECTION COMMISSION

15

16 **101.1.** (ELECT: County Boards of Voter Registration and Elections Compensation) The amounts appropriated in this section for
17 "County Boards of Voter Registration and Elections Board Members," shall be disbursed annually to the County Treasurer at the
18 rate of \$1,500 for each member, not to exceed \$13,500 per county. The County Treasurer shall use these funds only for the
19 compensation of County Boards of Voter Registration and Elections Board Members. Any funds not used for this purpose shall be
20 returned to the State Treasurer. These funds are exempted from mandated budget reductions. In addition, in the calculation of any
21 across the board agency base reductions mandated by the Executive Budget Office or the General Assembly, the amount of funds
22 appropriated for compensation of County Boards of Voter Registration and Elections Board Members shall be excluded from the
23 agency's base budget. Unexpended funds shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year and shall be utilized for special primaries,
24 runoffs, and elections.

25 **101.2.** (ELECT: Elections Managers & Clerks Per Diem) Managers and clerks of state and county elections shall receive a per
26 diem of \$75.00 for the day of work and \$60.00 for training and paperwork. Managers shall not be paid for more than two days for
27 any election and clerks for not more than three days for any election. The commission may adjust the per diem of \$75.00 for the
28 managers and clerks of the statewide election to a higher level only to the extent that the appropriation for the statewide election is
29 sufficient to bear the added cost of increasing the per diem and the cost of the statewide election. Up to three additional managers
30 per county may be appointed to assist county boards of voter registration and elections with the absentee/fail safe voting process
31 prior to, on Election Day, and immediately following statewide elections. Managers assisting the county boards of voter registration
32 and elections in the absentee/fail safe process may receive a per diem of \$75.00 per day for not more than a total of fifteen days
33 regardless of whether one, two, or three additional managers are used.

34 **101.3.** (ELECT: Board of State Canvassers Compensation) \$100.00 additional compensation per day may be paid to each member
35 of the Board of State Canvassers up to a total of fifteen days that may be required for hearings held by the members of the Board of
36 State Canvassers.

1 **101.4.** (ELECT: Sale of Lists Revenue Carry Forward) Any revenue generated from the sale of election lists may be retained and
2 expended by the South Carolina Election Commission to reimburse the Department of Administration, for the printing of such lists
3 and to pay expenses of postage and shipment of these lists to electors who purchase them. After such reimbursement has been made
4 an amount, not to exceed \$400,000, shall be used for nonrecurring expenses in conjunction with extraordinary special election and
5 legal costs and costs for upgrading the Statewide Voter Registration System. Any balance in the Sale of Lists Account on June
6 thirtieth, of the prior fiscal year may be carried forward and expended for the same purposes during the current fiscal year.

7 **101.5.** (ELECT: Budget Reduction Exemption) Funds appropriated for recurring and nonrecurring general and primary election
8 expenses are exempted from mandated across the board reductions. In addition, in the calculation of any across the board agency
9 base reductions mandated by the Executive Budget Office or the General Assembly, the amount of funds appropriated for recurring
10 and nonrecurring primary and general election expenses shall be excluded from the agency's base budget.

11 **101.6.** (ELECT: Primary and General Election Carry Forward) Filing fees received from candidates filing to run in statewide or
12 special primary elections may be retained and expended by the State Election Commission to pay for the conduct of primary elections.
13 Any balance in the filing fee accounts on June thirtieth, of the prior fiscal year may be carried forward and expended for the same
14 purposes during the current fiscal year. In addition, any balance in the Primary and General Election Accounts on June thirtieth, of
15 the prior fiscal year may be carried forward and expended for the same purposes during the current fiscal year. In addition, the
16 aforementioned funds may also be utilized to conduct the Presidential Preference Primary elections.

17 **101.7.** (ELECT: Training & Certification Program) All members and staff of County Boards of Voter Registration and Elections
18 will receive a common curriculum to include core courses on the duties and responsibilities of county boards of voter registration
19 and elections and electives to promote quality service and professional development. The State Election Commission shall make
20 these courses available in various locations, including but not be limited to, the upstate, coastal, and midlands areas of the state. Up
21 to \$35,000 of revenue generated by charging a fee to attend these courses may be retained and expended by the South Carolina
22 Election Commission to help cover the cost of providing the training. Any balance in the training and certification account on June
23 thirtieth, of the prior fiscal year may be carried forward and expended for the same purpose during the current fiscal year.

24 The State Election Commission is required to withhold the stipend of members who do not complete the training and certification
25 program as required in Section 7-5-10 of the 1976 Code. Additionally, funds will also be withheld if a board member completes the
26 training and certification program, but fails to complete at least one training course per year. The board member and members of
27 that county's legislative delegation will be notified of the withholding of the stipend and the requirements needed to bring the member
28 into compliance with the law. If a board member cannot complete the program or complete the required continuing education due
29 to extenuating circumstances, the board member must submit a written request to the county legislative delegation for approval or
30 funds will continue to be withheld as described in this proviso. If a board member does not become compliant with the law within
31 eighteen months of initial notification of stipend withholding, the county's legislative delegation must replace that person on the
32 board.

33 **101.8.** (ELECT: Penalty for Late Submission of Reimbursable Expenses) In the event that a county submits reimbursable election
34 expenses to the Commission for payment more than thirty days after the election is held, the Commission may deduct a penalty of
35 ten percent of the late-submitted amount. The county is responsible for payment of this amount. If the Commission finds good
36 reason for such late submission, the penalty may be waived. The Election Commission shall be authorized to expend funds

1 appropriated/authorized in the current fiscal year to pay election expenses incurred by a county in the prior fiscal year. If a county
2 submits a request for reimbursement of election expenses through any means other than the Voter Registration and Election
3 Management System (VREMS), the Commission may deduct a penalty of ten percent of the amount submitted.

4 **101.9.** (ELECT: HAVA Carry Forward) The Election Commission shall be authorized to carry forward unexpended Help
5 America Vote Act funds into the current fiscal year and to use these funds for the same purpose.

6 **101.10.** (ELECT: HAVA Match Funds) Funds appropriated through the General Fund for the purpose of providing a match for
7 federal funds received through the Help America Vote Act (HAVA) shall be moved to a restricted account in order that the funds
8 may accrue interest as per Section 254 (b) (1) of the Help America Vote Act. Unexpended funds shall be carried forward from the
9 prior fiscal year and shall be utilized for special primaries, runoffs, and elections. These funds may also be used to reimburse local
10 governmental entities for expenses incurred in the prior fiscal year associated with special primaries, runoffs, and general elections.

11 **101.11.** (ELECT: Use of Election Funds) Funds appropriated to the Election Commission for the purpose of conducting elections
12 shall not be used for any other purpose unless specifically authorized in this act. However, up to \$200,000 may be transferred to
13 other operating accounts from General Election accounts upon approval from the Executive Budget Office, which shall then notify
14 the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and the Governor of such
15 transfer of funds.

16 **101.12.** (ELECT: Statewide Voting System Reserve Fund) Of the funds appropriated for the New Statewide Voting System,
17 there is created within the State Election Commission the Statewide Voting System Reserve Fund. This fund shall be separate and
18 distinct from the General Fund and interest accrued by the fund must remain in the fund. This fund may only be used by the State
19 Election Commission for the procurement of a new Statewide Voting System. The State Election Commission must receive
20 authorization from the General Assembly prior to expending any amount from the fund. These funds shall be carried forward from
21 the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and must be used for the same purpose.

22 **101.13.** (ELECT: Match for Additional HAVA Funds) In the event that additional Help America Vote Act federal funds become
23 available, the commission shall be authorized to utilize funds appropriated for primary and general elections and for voting system
24 refurbishment to provide a match for the federal funds.
25

26 SECTION 102 - E500 - REVENUE AND FISCAL AFFAIRS OFFICE

27
28 **102.1.** (RFAO: Geodetic Mapping Program) Funds appropriated or authorized to the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office for
29 Mapping, shall be used to clarify county boundary determinations as directed by Section 27-2-105, of the 1976 Code and resolution
30 of the boundary between the states of South Carolina and North Carolina.

31 An affected party disagreeing with a county boundary certified by the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office may appeal the
32 certification to the South Carolina Administrative Law Court, which is vested with jurisdiction to hear and decide the case subject to
33 the provisions of Section 1-23-380 of the 1976 Code, except that the case must be heard 'de novo.' Additionally, for purposes of
34 determining the timelines of an appeal, notice is deemed to have been provided on the date of the written notice to affected parties.
35 An affected party has sixty calendar days from the date of a written notice sent to the affected party to file an appeal with the
36 Administrative Law Court.

1 **102.2.** (RFAO: Election File Merge) In order to assist the County Registration and Election Commissions to ensure that registered
2 voters are assigned to proper election districts, the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office, in conjunction with the South Carolina Election
3 Commission, shall merge the voter registration file with the office's Geocoded Address List and the district boundaries of the
4 Congress, South Carolina Senate, South Carolina House of Representatives, county councils, and such other districts as the office
5 possesses official district boundary records in electronic format. The merged systems will allow the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs
6 Office to provide the respective county officials with a list of potential voters who are possibly assigned to the wrong election district.
7 File merger is required only for those districts in which elections are scheduled. Counties and municipalities shall release GIS to the
8 Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office upon the office's written request. Written request must be sent to the chief administrative officer
9 of the county or municipality and advise the county or municipality that failure to comply within thirty days of request may result in
10 the withholding of ten percent of the county's or municipality's state aid. The Executive Director of the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs
11 Office may grant additional time for good cause and must waive release if the county or municipality does not possess GIS data. For
12 counties and municipalities that possess GIS data but do not release it, the Executive Director of the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs
13 Office shall notify the State Treasurer of the failure to comply with this provision after the required notice. Notification shall result
14 in the withholding of ten percent of subsequent payments of state aid to the entity until the GIS data is provided. Municipal and
15 county data acquired by the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office in the course of performing its responsibilities may be used for other
16 functions of the office as well as shared with other state agencies. For this provision GIS data includes, but is not limited to, road
17 centerlines; orthophotography; parcel boundaries; address points; political boundaries; and administrative boundaries.

18 **102.3.** (RFAO: SC Health & Human Services Data Warehouse) There is hereby established within the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs
19 Office, the South Carolina Health and Human Services Data Warehouse. The purpose of the Warehouse is to ensure that the operation
20 of health and human services agencies may be enhanced by coordination and integration of client information. Client data is defined
21 as person-level data that is created, received, and/or maintained by state agencies and other entities required to report client
22 information to the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office under this provision. To integrate client information, client data from health
23 and human services state agencies will be linked to improve client outcome measures, enabling state agencies to analyze coordination
24 and continuity of care issues. The addition of these data will enhance existing agency systems by providing client data from other
25 state agency programs to assist in the provision of client services. Certain client information shall be delivered to the Revenue and
26 Fiscal Affairs Office in order to assist in the development and maintenance of this Warehouse. The following agencies shall report
27 client information:

- 29 (1) Health and Human Services;
 - 30 (2) Health and Environmental Control;
 - 31 (3) Mental Health;
 - 32 (4) Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services;
 - 33 (5) Disabilities and Special Needs;
 - 34 (6) Social Services;
 - 35 (7) Vocational Rehabilitation;
 - 36 (8) Education;

- 1 (9) Juvenile Justice;
- 2 (10) Corrections;
- 3 (11) Probation, Parole and Pardon Services;
- 4 • Department of ~~Administration~~ Children's Advocacy:
- 5 (1) Children's Foster Care Review Board;
- 6 (2) Continuum of Care;
- 7 • ~~Office of the Lieutenant Governor, Division~~ Department on Aging;
- 8 • South Carolina School for the Deaf and the Blind;
- 9 • Commission for the Blind; and
- 10 • Other entities as deemed necessary by the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office.

11 These agencies and departments shall collect and provide client data in formats and schedules to be specified by the Revenue and
12 Fiscal Affairs Office (Office). The Office shall establish a Memorandum of Agreement with each agency, department or division.
13 These Memorandums of Agreement shall specify, but are not limited to, the confidentiality of client information, the conditions for
14 the release of data that may identify agencies, departments, divisions, programs and services, or clients, any restrictions on the release
15 of data so as to be compliant with state and federal statutes and regulations on confidentiality of data, conditions under which the
16 data may be used for research purposes, and any security measures to be taken to insure the confidentiality of client information.

17 To ensure accountability and the coordinated, efficient delivery of health and human services, the Office shall implement, in
18 consultation with state health and human services agencies and other entities as deemed necessary by the Office, an integrated data
19 system that includes client data from all participating agencies.

20 In order to provide for inclusion of other entities into the South Carolina Health and Human Services Data Warehouse and other
21 research and analytic-oriented applications that will assist the state in the efficient and effective provision of services, the Office shall
22 have the authority to enter into agreements or transactions with any federal, state or municipal agency or other public institution or
23 with any private individual, partnership, firm, corporation, association or other entity to provide statistical, research and information
24 dissemination services including, but not limited to, program and outcomes evaluation, program monitoring/surveillance, projects to
25 determine the feasibility of data collection and/or analyses, information dissemination and research. The confidentiality of data
26 collected under these initiatives shall comply with applicable state and federal laws governing the privacy of data. The Office shall
27 have the power to promulgate regulations, policies and procedures, in consultation with the participating agencies, for the
28 development, protection and operation of the Data Warehouse, other research and analytic-oriented applications, and their underlying
29 processes.

30 The Office shall develop internet-accessible secure analytic query tools (such as analytic cubes) using integrated client data from
31 the Warehouse. All agencies shall cooperate with the Office in the development of these analytic tools. It is the intent of this provision
32 that the analytic tools developed under this provision shall be made available to members of the South Carolina General Assembly
33 and their research staff members, state agencies, and researchers. To that end, the Office shall, in consultation with the participating
34 agencies, promulgate regulations addressing access to and use and release of information generated through use of the query tools.

35 All state agencies participating in the Warehouse shall utilize it and its associated software applications in the day-to-day operation
36 of their programs and for coordination, collaboration, program evaluation and outcomes analysis. The Department of Health and

1 Environmental Control shall be exempt from usage of the integrated client management system and the analytic query tools in the
2 day-to-day operation of their Client Automated Record and Encounter System and their South Carolina Community Assessment
3 Network, but shall provide the Warehouse with client data from the system and network.

4 No state agency shall duplicate any of the responsibilities of this provision.

5 For purposes of this subsection, all state laws, regulations, or any rule of any state agency, department, board, or commission
6 having the effect or force of law that prohibits or is inconsistent with any provision of this subsection is hereby declared inapplicable
7 to this subsection.

8 **102.4.** (RFAO: E911 PSAPs) The Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office, utilizing the funds appropriated and or authorized herein
9 for the E911 program, must ensure that any new plans or proposed amendments to existing plans maintain comprehensive coverage
10 for the full Public Safety Answering Points area as well as improve cost effectiveness. No new plans or amendments may be
11 considered by Revenue and Fiscal Affairs that do not include the written agreement of all jurisdictions affected by the new plan or
12 proposed change as well as provide cost savings on the state and local level. Local Public Safety Answering Points are encouraged
13 to cooperate to find ways to continue to improve cost effectiveness and efficiencies for all affected entities.

14 **102.5.** (RFAO: Revenue for Goods and Services) The respective sections of the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office are authorized
15 to provide and receive from other governmental entities, including other divisions, state and local agencies and departments, and the
16 private sector, goods and services, as will in its opinion promote efficient and economical operations. The sections may charge and
17 pay the entities for the goods and services, the revenue from which shall be deposited in the state treasury in a special account and
18 expended only for the costs of providing the goods and services, and such funds may be retained and be expended for the same
19 purposes.

20 **102.6.** RESERVED

21 **102.7.** (RFAO: NG9-1-1 Strategic Plan) The Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office shall be authorized to use up to \$150,000 of the
22 funds from the 58.2 percent compliance cost portion of the wireless 9-1-1 fund for costs associated with the further planning,
23 development, and implementation of the comprehensive statewide NG9-1-1 system as outlined in the South Carolina NG9-1-1
24 strategic plan. Associated costs include, but are not limited to, the hiring of consultants, technical experts, or other professionals for
25 assistance in defining, developing, or implementing the operating model and standards, system or technical requirements, or other
26 elements of the system as outlined in the strategic plan.

27
28 **SECTION 104 - E550 - STATE FISCAL ACCOUNTABILITY AUTHORITY**

29
30 **104.1.** (SFAA: Procurement of Art Objects) Before any governmental body, with the exception of the South Carolina Museum
31 Commission, the Confederate Relic Room and Military Museum Commission, and the South Carolina Hunley Commission as
32 defined under the South Carolina Consolidated Procurement Code, procures any art objects such as paintings, antiques, sculptures,
33 or similar objects above \$1,000, the head of the Purchasing Agency shall prepare a written determination specifying the need for
34 such objects and benefits to the State. The South Carolina Arts Commission shall review such determination for approval prior to
35 any acquisition.

1 **104.2.** (SFAA: Lawsuit Funding) The Executive Director shall pay from the Insurance Reserve Fund the defense costs of the
2 State, which are incurred in the current fiscal year, in the Abbeville school funding litigation and the prisoner mental health care
3 litigation. The appropriate official from the House of Representatives and the Senate must certify to the Executive Director on a
4 monthly basis the costs incurred in defense of this litigation. Upon receipt of the certification, the Executive Director shall pay the
5 provider of these services the amount certified.

6 **104.3.** (SFAA: Public Procurement Unit) For purposes of participation in the Minnesota Multi State Contracting Alliance for
7 Pharmacy (MMCAP), a private, nonprofit corporation that provides only free medical care may be allowed to participate as a local
8 public procurement unit in the MMCAP cooperative purchase. The participation of nonprofit corporations in the program is
9 contingent upon approval of the Minnesota Multi-State Contracting Alliance for Pharmacy. Participating nonprofit corporations
10 must comply with all applicable federal laws or regulations for participation in the MMCAP cooperative purchase. The state shall
11 not be liable for any action or inaction of such a nonprofit corporation.

12 **104.4.** (SFAA: Insurance Coverage for Aging Entity Authorized) The State Fiscal Accountability Authority, through the
13 Insurance Reserve Fund, for Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, is also authorized to offer insurance coverage to an aging entity and its
14 employees serving clients countywide which previously obtained its tort liability insurance coverage through the board. The
15 Insurance Reserve Fund and the State of South Carolina shall not be liable to any person or entity, including an insured, for any
16 insufficiencies of coverage provided hereunder.

17 **104.5.** (SFAA: IRF Report) The State Fiscal Accountability Authority shall prepare a report on prior fiscal year utilization of the
18 Insurance Reserve Fund to include for each transaction the amount, the recipient of the funds, the date of the transfer or payment,
19 and the action or reason that necessitated the transfer. The report shall be submitted to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the
20 Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the Chairman of the House Ways and
21 Means Committee by October fifteenth, of the current fiscal year.

22 **104.6.** (SFAA: Second Injury Fund Closure Plan) The State Fiscal Accountability Authority is authorized and empowered to take
23 all necessary actions to administer the closure plan for the Second Injury Fund, as adopted pursuant to Section 42-7-320(A) of the
24 1976 Code, as amended, and to use the separate and distinct trust and administrative accounts established for this purpose.

25 **104.7.** (SFAA: IT Planning Transfer) The State Fiscal Accountability Authority shall transfer \$400,000 from revenue generated
26 from contract administration fees on information technology contracts to the Department of Administration to support the state's
27 information technology planning program.

28 **104.8.** (SFAA: Attorneys) For the current fiscal year, during the transition of the Insurance Reserve Fund from the Budget and
29 Control Board to the State Fiscal Accountability Authority, the Insurance Reserve Fund shall continue to approve the attorneys-at-law
30 retained to defend those it insures. In addition, the authority of the former Budget and Control Board under Section 1-7-170(A) is
31 devolved upon the State Fiscal Accountability Authority.

32 **104.9.** (SFAA: Compensation - Agency Head Salary) In the event of an agency head or technical college president vacancy, the
33 governing board of the agency or the Governor, or the appointing authority of a technical college president, must have the prior
34 favorable recommendation of the Agency Head Salary Commission to set, discuss, offer, or pay a salary for the agency head or
35 technical college president at a rate that exceeds the minimum of the range established by the Agency Head Salary Commission. No
36 agency head or technical college president shall be paid a salary higher than that recommended by the commission. Boards and

1 commissions, or the Governor if he is the appointing authority, of newly created agencies or technical colleges shall not offer or pay
2 a salary to a prospective agency head until a salary range has been established and the salary approved by the Agency Head Salary
3 Commission. The funding of the salaries of any agency head or technical college president should come from resources within the
4 agency. The State Fiscal Accountability Authority shall contract every four years for a study of agency head and technical college
5 president compensation. The cost of the study must be shared by the participating agencies. The staff of the State Fiscal
6 Accountability Authority shall serve as the support staff to the Agency Head Salary Commission. Limited only by the maximum of
7 the respective salary range, the General Assembly authorizes the respective appointing authority for an agency head or technical
8 college president to provide salary increases for an agency head or technical college president not to exceed that recommended by
9 the Agency Head Salary Commission. No agency head or technical college president shall be paid less than the minimum of the pay
10 range nor receive an increase that would have the effect of raising the salary above the maximum of the pay range.

11 **104.10.** (SFAA: Continuation of Authority) The respective divisions of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority are authorized
12 to provide to and receive from other governmental entities, including other divisions and state and local agencies and departments,
13 goods and services, as will in its opinion promote efficient and economical operations. The divisions may charge and pay the entities
14 for the goods and services, the revenue from which shall be deposited in the state treasury in a special account and expended only
15 for the costs of providing the goods and services, and such funds may be retained and expended for the same purposes.
16

17 SECTION 105 - F270 - SFAA, OFFICE OF STATE AUDITOR

18
19 **105.1.** (SFAA-AUD: Annual Audit of Federal Programs) Each state agency receiving federal funds subject to the audit
20 requirements of the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996 and Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R) Part 200, Uniform
21 Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance) shall remit to the
22 State Auditor an amount representing an equitable portion of the expense of contracting with a nationally recognized CPA firm to
23 conduct a portion of the audit of the State's federal financial assistance.

24 Each state agency's equitable portion of the expense will be determined by a schedule developed by the State Auditor. Such
25 remittance will be based upon invoices provided by the State Auditor. The audit shall be re-bid every five years. The State Auditor
26 shall retain and expend the funds received and shall carry forward any unexpended funds from the prior fiscal year into the current
27 fiscal year for the same purpose.

28 **105.2.** (SFAA-AUD: Medical Assistance Audit Carry Forward) The State Auditor's Office shall retain and expend the funds
29 received from the Department of Health and Human Services for the Medical Assistance Audit Program pursuant to Proviso 33.3 of
30 this act and shall carry forward any unexpended funds from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year for the same purpose.

31 **105.3.** (SFAA-AUD: Coordination with Inspector General) In the event the State Auditor's Office identifies instances of fraud,
32 waste, and abuse during any state agency audit, the State Auditor shall refer such instances to the State Inspector General for
33 examination. The State Auditor shall prepare and submit an annual report to the Chairmen of the House Ways and Means Committee
34 and the Senate Finance Committee and the Governor detailing all written referrals of fraud, waste, and abuse submitted to the State
35 Inspector General.

1 **105.4.** (SFAA-AUD: Annual Audit of Court Fees and Fines Reports) The State Auditor shall conduct a minimum of fifteen audits
2 annually of county treasurers, municipal treasurers, county clerks of court, magistrates and/or municipal courts as required by Section
3 14-1-210 of the 1976 Code and allowed by Section 14-1-240; however, the State Auditor shall not be required to spend more than
4 the annual amount of \$250,000, received from the State Treasurer to conduct the said audits pursuant to Section 14-1-210 of the 1976
5 Code. The State Auditor may contract with one or more CPA/accounting firms to conduct the required audits. The State Auditor
6 shall consult with the State Treasurer to determine the jurisdictions to be audited in the current fiscal year. Jurisdictions may be
7 selected randomly or based on an instance in the current or previous fiscal year of failing to report, incorrectly reporting or under
8 remitting amounts owed. The funds transferred to the State Auditor by the State Treasurer shall not be used for any purpose other
9 than to conduct the described audits and report whether or not the assessments, surcharges, fees, fines, forfeitures, escheatments, or
10 other monetary penalties imposed and/or mandated are properly collected and remitted to the State. Any unexpended balance on
11 June thirtieth of the prior fiscal year shall be carried forward and must be expended for the same purpose during the current fiscal
12 year. The State Auditor shall annually report by October first, its findings of the jurisdictions audited to the Senate Finance
13 Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee.
14

15 **SECTION 106 - F300 - STATEWIDE EMPLOYEE BENEFITS**

16

17 **106.1.** (SEB: SCRS & PORS Allocation) The funds appropriated in the current fiscal year for SCRS Employer Contributions and
18 PORS Employer Contributions shall be allocated to state agencies and school districts by the Department of Administration,
19 Executive Budget Office for SCRS and PORS rate increases.
20

21 **SECTION 108 - F500 - PUBLIC EMPLOYEE BENEFIT AUTHORITY**

22

23 **108.1.** (PEBA: Lottery, Infrastructure Bank, and Magistrates Health Insurance) South Carolina Lottery Commissioners and South
24 Carolina Transportation Infrastructure Bank Board members and their eligible dependents, and active volunteer firefighters and their
25 dependents who are eligible for the income tax deduction pursuant to Section 12-6-1140 of the 1976 Code, are eligible to participate
26 in the State Health and Dental Insurance Plan, upon paying the full premium costs as determined by the Public Employee Benefit
27 Authority. If a county is participating in the State Health and Dental Insurance Plan, magistrates and their eligible dependents are
28 eligible to participate in the State Health and Dental Insurance Plan, upon the magistrate paying the full premium costs as determined
29 by the Public Employee Benefit Authority.

30 **108.2.** (PEBA: Adoption Assistance Program) The Employee Adoption Assistance Program is established to provide grants to
31 eligible employees to assist them with the direct costs of adoption. The program shall be an employee benefit through the Public
32 Employee Benefit Authority (PEBA) and shall be funded from the appropriation for the State Health Plan as provided in this act.
33 Total funding for the Adoption Program shall not exceed the amount authorized by the General Assembly in the annual appropriations
34 act. Employees are eligible for the Adoption Program if they participate in PEBA insurance benefits, have adopted a child during
35 the prior fiscal year, apply for the grant during the annual application period, and meet any other Adoption Program criteria. The
36 application period shall be July first through September thirtieth of the current fiscal year for an adoption in the prior fiscal year.

1 The maximum grant amounts shall be \$10,000 in the case of the adoption of a special needs child and \$5,000 for all other child
2 adoptions. Should the total amount needed to fund grants at the maximum level exceed the amount authorized, the amount of a grant
3 to an eligible employee shall be determined by dividing the authorized amount evenly among qualified program applicants, with the
4 adoption of a special needs child qualifying for two times the benefit of a non-special needs child.

5 **108.3.** (PEBA: Health Plan Tobacco User Differential) For health plans adopted under the authority of Section 1-11-710 of the
6 1976 Code by the Public Employee Benefit Authority during the current fiscal year, the board is authorized to differentiate between
7 tobacco users and nonusers regarding rates charged to enrollees in its health plans by imposing a surcharge on enrollee rates based
8 upon tobacco use. The surcharge for tobacco use may not exceed \$40 per month per subscriber or \$60 per month per subscriber and
9 dependent(s).

10 **108.4.** (PEBA: Funding Abortions Prohibited) No funds appropriated for employer contributions to the State Health Insurance
11 Plan may be expended to reimburse the expenses of an abortion, except in cases of rape, incest or where the mother's medical
12 condition is one which, on the basis of the physician's good faith judgment, so complicates the pregnancy as to necessitate an
13 immediate abortion to avert the risk of her death or for which a delay will create serious risk of substantial and irreversible impairment
14 of major bodily function, and the State Health Plan may not offer coverage for abortion services, including ancillary services provided
15 contemporaneously with abortion services. The Public Employee Benefit Authority must determine the amount of the total premium
16 paid for health coverage necessary to cover the risks associated with reimbursing participants in the plan for obtaining an abortion in
17 the circumstances covered by this provision. The determination must be based on actuarial data and empirical study in the same
18 manner and by the same method that other risks are adjusted for in similar circumstances. The plan must report this determination
19 annually to the respective Chairmen of the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee.

20 **108.5.** (PEBA: TRICARE Supplement Policy) The Public Employee Benefit Authority (PEBA) shall offer a group TRICARE
21 Supplement policy or policies to its TRICARE-eligible subscribers through its flexible benefits program to provide that subscribers
22 may pay premiums for such policies on a pretax basis, in accordance with federal law and regulations. PEBA may charge TRICARE
23 Supplement subscribers an amount not to exceed \$2 per subscriber per month for any associated administrative costs.

24 **108.6.** (PEBA: State Health Plan) Of the funds authorized for the State Health Plan pursuant to Section 1-11-710(A)(2) of the
25 1976 Code, ~~an employer premium increase of 7.4 percent and a subscriber premium increase of zero percent for each tier (subscriber,~~
26 ~~subscriber/spouse, subscriber/children, full family) will result for the standard State Health Plan *employer and subscriber premiums*~~
27 ~~for Plan Year 2020 shall remain the same as~~ in Plan Year 2019. Copayments for participants of the State Health Plan shall remain
28 the same in Plan Year 2020 as in Plan Year 2019 ~~may be increased to the extent permitted to maintain status as a grandfathered plan~~
29 ~~under the federal Affordable Care Act.~~ Notwithstanding the foregoing, pursuant to Section 1-11-710(A)(3), the Public Employee
30 Benefit Authority may adjust the plan, benefits, or contributions of the State Health Plan during Plan Year ~~2019~~ 2020 to ensure the
31 fiscal stability of the Plan.

32 **108.7.** (PEBA: Exempt National Guard Pension Fund) In the calculation of any across-the-board cut mandated by the Executive
33 Budget Office or General Assembly, the amount of the appropriation for the National Guard Pension Fund shall be excluded.

34 **108.8.** (PEBA: Inactive SCRS Account Transfer) A current employee or teacher who is an active participant in the State Optional
35 Retirement Program but who has an inactive account in the South Carolina Retirement Program due to previous service in that

1 system, shall be allowed to transfer previous contributions to the employee's or teacher's active State Optional Retirement Program
2 account.

3 **108.9.** (PEBA: Network Pharmacy Publications) All pharmacy publications or lists must include independent retail pharmacies.
4 Abridged pharmacy lists are prohibited.

5 **108.10.** (PEBA: Covered Contraceptives) In its Plan of Benefits effective January 1, 2017, the State Health Plan shall not apply
6 patient cost sharing provisions to covered contraceptives. This provision does not alter the current approved list of contraceptives
7 and complies with the requirements of Proviso 108.4.

8 **108.11.** (PEBA: Former Spouses on the State Health Plan) In its Plan of Benefits effective January 1, 2018, the State Health
9 Plan shall cover a subscriber's former spouse, who is eligible to be covered pursuant to a court order, on the former spouse's own
10 individual policy and at the full amount of the premium for the coverage elected, with such rates, billing, and other administrative
11 policies to be determined by the Public Employee Benefit Authority. The former spouses may only elect such health, dental, and
12 vision coverage as required by the court order. The former spouse's individual coverage may continue under the State Health Plan
13 as long as authorized under the court order and the subscriber remains a participant in the State Health Plan. This proviso does not
14 affect a subscriber's ability to cover a current spouse on an employee/retiree and spouse or full family policy when the subscriber's
15 former spouse is covered on a separate policy.

16 **108.12.** RESERVED

17 **108.13.** RESERVED

18 **108.14.** RESERVED

19 **108.15.** (PEBA: Cafeteria Workers SCRS Opt Out) In the current fiscal year, a new part-time school cafeteria worker may
20 exercise the option, within thirty days after entering upon the discharge of such duties, to not become a member of the South Carolina
21 Retirement System.

22 **108.16.** (PEBA: Return to Covered Employment) For compensation earned during the current fiscal year, the earnings limitation
23 imposed pursuant to Sections 9-1-1790(A)(1) and 9-11-90(4)(a)(i) of the Code of Laws does not apply if the retired member has not
24 been engaged to perform services for a participating employer in the South Carolina Retirement System or South Carolina Police
25 Officers Retirement System for compensation in any capacity, whether as an employee, independent contractor, leased employee,
26 joint employee, or other classification of worker, for a period of at least twelve consecutive months subsequent to retirement.

27 28 SECTION 109 - R440 - DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE

29
30 **109.1.** (DOR: Subpoenaed Employee Expense Reimbursement) If any employee of the Department of Revenue is subpoenaed to
31 testify during litigation not involving the Department of Revenue, the party subpoenaing the employee(s) to testify shall reimburse
32 the State for expenses incurred by the employee(s) requested to testify. Expenses shall include but are not limited to the cost of
33 materials and the average daily salary of the employee or employees.

34 **109.2.** (DOR: Court Order Funds Carry Forward) Funds awarded to the Department of Revenue by court order shall be retained
35 in a special account and shall be carried forward from year to year, and expended as needed to accomplish the purposes and conditions
36 of said order if specified, and if not specified, as may be directed by the Director of the Department of Revenue.

1 **109.3.** (DOR: Rural Infrastructure Fund Transfer) Notwithstanding Section 12-10-85, the Department of Revenue is authorized
2 to deposit revenues from the Rural Infrastructure Fund in excess of \$12 million dollars to the Rural Infrastructure Fund under the
3 Rural Infrastructure Authority. Any revenues in excess of \$17 million shall be deposited in the Rural Infrastructure Fund under the
4 Department of Commerce, Coordinating Council.

5 **109.4.** (DOR: SCBOS Funds) The Department of Revenue shall share equally the collection assistance fees imposed on overdue
6 tax debt with the South Carolina Business One Stop program. The funds received by the department from this fee shall be used for
7 continued administration of the revenue laws in a fair and impartial manner. Any unexpended funds generated by the fee shall be
8 carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and shall also be shared equally between the Department of
9 Revenue and the South Carolina Business One Stop program.

10 **109.5.** (DOR: Across the Board Cut Exemption) Whenever the Executive Budget Office or General Assembly implements an
11 across the board budget reduction, the funds appropriated to the Department of Revenue shall be exempt from any such mandated
12 budget reduction.

13 **109.6.** (DOR: Candidate Tax Return Programs) (A) From the funds appropriated in this act, the department must develop a
14 program to process inquiries from a candidate for an office of this State or its political subdivisions or any gubernatorial appointee
15 concerning whether that candidate or appointee has filed annual state income tax returns that he was required to file during the past
16 ten years, regardless of the source of income, has paid all income taxes due during that time period, and has satisfied all judgments,
17 liens, or other penalties for failure to pay income taxes when due. The department may only respond to an inquiry if the inquiry is
18 made by a candidate or appointee concerning that candidate's or appointee's own income tax returns.

19 (B) Unless a candidate or appointee requests otherwise, the department must post the results of all inquiries from candidates or
20 appointees in a prominent place on its internet website. The information must be organized in the following manner: (1) the
21 candidates name as it will appear on the ballot or the appointee's name as it appears on his income tax returns; (2) identify the years
22 that the candidate or appointee was required to file income tax returns and identify the years, if any, that the candidate or appointee
23 was not required to file income tax returns; (3) state whether the candidate or appointee filed income tax returns in each year that the
24 candidate or appointee was required to file income tax returns; (4) state whether the candidate or appointee paid income taxes due
25 each year that the candidate or appointee was required to file income tax returns; and (5) state whether the candidate or appointee
26 had a judgment, lien, or other penalty levied against him for failure to pay income taxes when due, the year of the levy, and whether
27 that judgment, lien, or other penalty has been satisfied. The department may not post a candidate's complete income tax return when
28 fulfilling its obligations under this proviso.

29 (C) (1) Participation in this program by a candidate or appointee is voluntary.

30 (2) A candidate's or appointee's inquiry constitutes a waiver of confidentiality with the department concerning the
31 information posted.

32 **109.7.** (DOR: Fraudulent Tax Return Program) The Department of Revenue may establish a Fraudulent Tax Return Detection
33 Program to prevent payment of fraudulent tax refunds. To implement the program the department may contract with information
34 and technology entities to provide the necessary detection capabilities. The department shall pay for the program from the savings
35 realized by implementation.

1 **109.8.** (DOR: Treasury Offset Program) The Department of Revenue is authorized to retain up to \$140,000 of mailing and
2 associated administrative costs incurred as a result of the State's participation in and the notice requirements of the Federal Treasury
3 Offset Program. Retained expenses shall be from tax offset revenue received from the federal government. Remaining revenue shall
4 be deposited in the General Fund.

5 **109.9.** (DOR: May Events) Of the accommodation tax returned to Horry County or the municipalities therein, excluding
6 municipalities that have enacted a Tourism Development Fee up to one third of the total allocation may be set aside and used for
7 direct policing activities during events held in May within Horry County. By October thirty-first, the local government must inform
8 the Department of Revenue the percentage of accommodation tax to withhold, not to exceed one third of the estimated yearly return,
9 which will be dedicated to direct policing activities. These funds shall be sent by the Department of Revenue to the local governing
10 entity upon request of the local entity. A report on the expenditure of these funds, which must include the amount and purpose for
11 which the funds were expended shall be submitted by the county or municipalities to the Governor, the Chairman of Senate Finance
12 Committee and the Chairman of House Ways and Means Committee no later than ninety days after the end of any event in which
13 these funds are expended.

14 **109.10.** RESERVED

15 **109.11.** (DOR: Tourist Safety) Of the accommodation tax returned to any municipality in Horry County that has a Tourism
16 Development Fee, up to fifty percent of the allocation designated under Section 6-4-10(3) of the 1976 Code may be set aside and
17 used for direct policing purposes related to tourism. Direct policing purposes include temporary personnel, equipment, and the
18 installation and maintenance of infrastructure related thereto. These funds may not exceed sixty-five percent of the total new funds
19 dedicated to the additional policing purposes implemented. Each municipality utilizing this provision shall include expenditures and
20 revenue sources in its annual report to the Tourism Expenditure Review Committee and shall submit copies of the report to the
21 Governor, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

22 **109.12.** (DOR: Notification of Protest) In the current fiscal year and from the funds appropriated, if a taxpayer, other than an
23 individual, files a written protest pursuant to Section 12-60-2120 of the 1976 Code, the department shall notify any affected county
24 and school district of the written protest.

25 **109.13.** (DOR: Food Manufacturing Equipment) Clothing required by Current Good Manufacturing Practices pursuant to 21
26 C.F.R. Section 111.10, as it may be amended, at perishable prepared food manufacturing facilities defined by the North American
27 Industry Classification System 311991 to prevent health hazards, including outer garments, gloves of an impermeable material,
28 hairnets, headbands, beard covers, caps, hair covers or other effective hair restraints, and other attire required pursuant to 21 C.F.R.
29 Section 110.10 for persons working in direct contact with food, food contact services, and food packaging materials to protect against
30 contamination of food in perishable prepared food manufacturing facilities shall be exempt from all sales and use taxes.

31
32 **SECTION 110 - R520 - STATE ETHICS COMMISSION**

33
34 **110.1.** (ETHICS: Ethics Commission Website Changes) In the current fiscal year, prior to approving or adopting any changes to
35 the State Ethics Commission Public Disclosure and Accountability Reporting System, the State Ethics Commission shall submit the
36 proposed changes to the Senate Ethics Committee and House of Representatives Ethics Committee for their review and approval.

1 As third party beneficiaries to any agreement between the State Ethics Commission and a vendor relating to the State Ethics
2 Commission Public Disclosure and Accountability Reporting System, the General Assembly through its respective Ethics
3 Committees can submit suggested changes to any proposed agreement or contract relating to the State Ethics Commission Public
4 Disclosure and Accountability Reporting System and the State Ethics Commission shall be required to incorporate those suggestions
5 into any contractual negotiation.

6 **110.2.** (ETHICS: Commission Meeting) The Ethics Commission must meet at least one time each month and post notice of

9 SECTION 111 - S600 - PROCUREMENT REVIEW PANEL

11 **111.1.** (PRP: Filing Fee) Requests for administrative review before the South Carolina Procurement Review Panel shall be
12 accompanied by a filing fee of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00), payable to the SC Procurement Review Panel. The panel is
13 authorized to charge the party requesting an administrative review under the S.C. Code Sections 11-35-4210(6), 11-35-4220(5),
14 11-35-4230(6), 11-35-4330, and/or 11-35-4410. The funds generated by the filing fee shall be retained by the panel and carried
15 forward to be used for the operation of the panel. Withdrawal of an appeal will result in the filing fee being forfeited to the panel.
16 If a party desiring to file an appeal is unable to pay the filing fee because of financial hardship, the party shall submit a completed
17 Request for Filing Fee Waiver form at the same time the request for review is filed. The panel shall make the Request for Filing Fee

9 **SECTION 113 - X220 - AID TO SUBDIVISIONS, STATE TREASURER**

10
11 **113.1.** (AS-TREAS: Veterans’ Affairs-Aid to Counties) In the allocation of the appropriation in Part IA, Section 113, as adjusted
12 for “Aid to County Veteran Offices,” each county shall receive an effective annual amount equal to one hundred percent of the
13 amount allocated to it for the prior fiscal year plus an amount equivalent to base pay increases for state employees, less any
14 adjustments made for budget reductions. This allocation shall be distributed on a quarterly basis to the County Treasurer who will
15 handle and distribute these monies for the sole benefit and use of the County Veterans’ Affairs Offices.

16 **113.2.** (AS-TREAS: Quarterly Distributions) For Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, one quarter of the amount appropriated in Part
17 IA for Aid to Subdivisions-Local Government Fund shall be distributed as soon after the beginning of each quarter as practical with
18 the four distributions together totaling the Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20 Part IA appropriation for the Local Government Fund.

19 **113.3.** (AS-TREAS: Salary Supplements) The amounts appropriated in Part IA, Section 113, for Aid Cnty-Clerks of Court, Aid
20 Cnty-Probate Judges, Aid Cnty-Coroners, and Aid Cnty-Sheriffs shall be distributed by the State Treasurer to each county treasurer
21 equally on a quarterly basis, and shall be used as a salary supplement for each clerk of court, probate judge, county coroner, and
22 county sheriff. The amounts appropriated in Part IA, Section 113 for Aid Cnty-Register of Deeds, shall be equally distributed by the
23 State Treasurer to the appropriate county treasurer on a quarterly basis, and shall be used as a salary supplement for registers of
24 deeds.

25 The amount appropriated in Part IA, Section 113, for Aid Cnty-Auditors and Aid Cnty-Treasurers, shall be equally distributed to
26 each county auditor and county treasurer as a salary supplement in addition to any amounts presently being provided by the county
27 for these positions. It is the intent of the General Assembly that the amount appropriated by the county as salaries for these positions
28 shall not be reduced as a result of the appropriation and that such appropriation shall not disqualify each county auditor and each
29 county treasurer for salary increases that they might otherwise receive from county funds in the future. The salary supplement for
30 each county auditor and county treasurer shall be paid in accordance with the schedule and method of payment established for state
31 employees.

32 The amounts appropriated in Part IA, Section 113 for Clerks of Court, Probate Judges, Sheriffs, Register of Deeds, Coroners,
33 Auditors, and Treasurers shall be exempt from any across the board cut mandated by the Executive Budget Office or General
34 Assembly. However, the governing body of a county may reduce the expenditures in the operation of the offices of these officials
35 without any required corresponding reduction in the county’s state aid to subdivisions distribution. However, any reduction in these
36 officials’ budgets must be made in consultation with the affected official.

1 **113.4.** (AS-TREAS: Legislative Delegations) In the current fiscal year, a county government must fund its legislative delegation
2 budget pursuant to Section 3, Act No. 283 of 1975. If a county council does not meet that funding level, the amount of the shortfall
3 must be deducted from the responsible county's Aid to Subdivisions allocation and forwarded to the legislative delegation of the
4 county. Additionally, the responsible county's remaining Aid to Subdivisions allotment must be reduced by twenty-five percent of
5 the shortfall amount, which sum must be forwarded to the legislative delegation to be used for its administrative costs.

6 **113.5.** (AS-TREAS: LGF) For Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, the provisions of Section 6-27-30 and Section 6-27-50 of the 1976
7 Code are suspended.

8 **113.6.** (AS-TREAS: Transparency-Political Subdivision Appropriation of Funds) (A) A political subdivision receiving aid from
9 the Local Government Fund may not:

10 (1) appropriate money to any entity unless that appropriation appears as a separate and distinct line item in the political
11 subdivision's budget or in an amendment to the political subdivision's budget;

12 (2) except in cases of emergency or unforeseen circumstances, donate funds to a nonprofit organization unless the amounts
13 donated are appropriated on a separate and distinct line item in the political subdivision's budget or an amendment to the political
14 subdivision's budget that includes the names of the entities to which the donations are being made. In the case of an emergency or
15 unforeseen circumstances, a political subdivision may donate funds to a nonprofit organization if the amount and purpose of the
16 proposed donation and the nature of the emergency or unforeseen circumstances necessitating the donation are announced in open
17 session at a public meeting held by the governing body of the political subdivision and the funds are not delivered to the organization
18 for five days following the announced intent to make the donation; or

19 (3) accept any funds from nongovernmental and inter-governmental organizations as defined in Agenda 21, adopted by the
20 United Nations in 1992 at its Conference on Environment and Development, accredited and enlisted by the United Nations to assist
21 in the implementation of its policies relative to Agenda 21 around the world without posting the following on the political
22 subdivision's website for ten days:

23 (a) a full and detailed list of the funding program, including a designation that the funding program is associated with
24 Agenda 21,

25 (b) the amount of funds involved,

26 (c) every mandate or requirement or action that will result from the grant or funding program's implementation,

27 (d) any and all projected costs to the political subdivision, business, or individual associated with the grant or funding
28 program, and

29 (e) the stated goals and expected results of the grant or funding program.

30 (B) A political subdivision receiving aid from the Local Government Fund may not appropriate money to any entity without the
31 requirement that the entity provides at the end of the fiscal year a detailed description of the purposes for which the money was used.

32 **113.7.** (AS-TREAS: Political Subdivision Flexibility) For Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, a political subdivision receiving aid
33 from the Local Government Fund may reduce its support to any state mandated program or requirement, by up to a percentage equal
34 to the percentage reduction in the actual amount appropriated to the Local Government Fund as compared to the amount required to
35 be appropriated pursuant to Section 6-27-30. Excluded from said reductions are Administrative Law Judges and their offices, Court
36 of Appeals and their offices, Circuit and Family Courts and their offices, Magistrates and their offices, Masters-in-Equity and their

1 offices, Probate Courts and their offices, Public Defenders and their offices, Solicitors and their offices, and the Supreme Court and
2 their offices, and assessment for indigent medical care pursuant to Section 44-6-146 of the 1976 Code.

3 **113.8.** (AS-TREAS: Agricultural Use Exemption) A county shall have its portion of the Aid to Subdivisions, Local Government
4 Fund withheld if the county imposes any additional requirements for an agricultural use exemption for a landowner's timberland
5 beyond what is required by Section 12-43-230(a) and Section 12-43-232 of the 1976 Code.

7 SECTION 117 - X900 - GENERAL PROVISIONS

8

9 **117.1.** (GP: Revenues, Deposits Credited to General Fund) For the current fiscal year, except as hereinafter specifically provided,
10 all general state revenues derived from taxation, licenses, fees, or from any other source whatsoever, and all institutional and
11 departmental revenues or collections, including income from taxes, licenses, fees, the sale of commodities and services, and income
12 derived from any other departmental or institutional source of activity, must be remitted to the State Treasurer at least once each
13 week, when practical, and must be credited, unless otherwise directed by law, to the General Fund of the State. Each institution,
14 department or agency, in remitting such income to the State Treasurer, shall attach with each such remittance a report or statement,
15 showing in detail the sources itemized according to standard budget classification from which such income was derived, and shall,
16 at the same time, forward a copy of such report or statement to the Comptroller General and the Executive Budget Office. In order
17 to facilitate the immediate deposit of collections, refunds of such collections by state institutions where properly approved by the
18 authorities of same, may be made in accordance with directions from the State Comptroller General and State Treasurer. General
19 fund appropriations herein made for the support of the public school system of the State must be greater than or equal to the revenues
20 derived from the General Retail Sales Tax, the Soft Drinks Tax, and the state's portion of the Alcoholic Liquors Tax and Cable
21 Television Fees as forecasted in the general fund revenue estimate of the Board of Economic Advisors as accounted for in the
22 Statement of Revenues of this act. Appropriations in this act for the support of the public school system shall include the following:

- 23 Department of Education;
- 24 State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education;
- 25 Educational Television Commission;
- 26 Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School;
- 27 School for the Deaf and the Blind;
- 28 John de la Howe School;
- 29 Debt Service on Capital Improvement Bonds Applicable to Above Agencies;
- 30 Debt Service on School Bonds;
- 31 Other School Purposes.

32 Nothing contained herein shall be construed as diminishing the educational funding requirements of this section.

33 **117.2.** (GP: Appropriations From Funds) Subject to the terms and conditions of this act, the sums of money set forth in this part,
34 if so much is necessary, are appropriated from the General Fund of the State, the Education Improvement Act Fund, the Highways
35 and Public Transportation Fund, and other applicable funds, to meet the ordinary expenses of the state government for Fiscal Year
36 ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, and for other purposes specifically designated.

1 **117.3.** (GP: Fiscal Year Definitions) For purposes of the appropriations made by this part, “current fiscal year” means the fiscal
2 year beginning July 1, ~~2018~~ 2019, and ending June 30, ~~2019~~ 2020, and “prior fiscal year” means the fiscal year beginning July 1,
3 ~~2017~~ 2018, and ending June 30, ~~2018~~ 2019.

4 **117.4.** (GP: Descriptive Proviso Titles) Descriptive proviso titles listed in this act are for purposes of identification only and are
5 not to be considered part of the official text.

6 **117.5.** (GP: Judicial & Involuntary Commitment, Defense of Indigents) It is the responsibility of all agencies, departments and
7 institutions of state government, to provide at no cost and as a part of the regular services of the agency, department or institutions
8 such services as are necessary to carry out the provisions of Chapter 52, Title 44 (Involuntary Commitment), Article 7, Chapter 17,
9 Title 44 of the 1976 Code (Judicial Commitment), Chapter 3, Title 17 of the 1976 Code (Defense of Indigents), and Article 1, Chapter
10 3, Title 16 of the 1976 Code (Death Penalty), as amended, upon request of the Judicial Department and/or the appropriate court. To
11 this end, state agencies are directed to furnish to the Judicial Department a list of their employees who are competent to serve as
12 court examiners. The Judicial Department shall forward a copy of this list to the appropriate courts, and the courts shall utilize the
13 services of such state employees whenever feasible. State employees shall receive no additional compensation for performing such
14 services. For the purpose of interpreting this section, employees of the Medical University of South Carolina and individuals serving
15 an internship or residency as an academic requirement or employees who are not full-time state employees and who are not
16 performing duties as state employees are not considered state employees.

17 **117.6.** (GP: Case Service Billing Payments Prior Year) Agencies appropriated case services funds who routinely receive prior
18 year case service billings after the old fiscal year has been officially closed are authorized to pay these case service obligations with
19 current funds. This authorization does not apply to billings on hand that have been through a timely agency payment approval
20 process when the old fiscal year closes.

21 **117.7.** (GP: Fee Increases) (A) No state agency, department, board, committee, commission, or authority, may increase an
22 existing fee for performing any duty, responsibility, or function unless the fee for performing the particular duty, responsibility, or
23 function is authorized by statutory law and set by regulation except as provided in this paragraph.

24 (B) This paragraph does not apply to:

- 25 (1) state-supported governmental health care facilities;
- 26 (2) state-supported schools, colleges, and universities;
- 27 (3) educational, entertainment, recreational, cultural, and training programs;
- 28 (4) the State Board of Financial Institutions;
- 29 (5) sales by state agencies of goods or tangible products produced for or by these agencies;
- 30 (6) charges by state agencies for room and board provided on state-owned property;
- 31 (7) application fees for recreational activities sponsored by state agencies and conducted on a draw or lottery basis;
- 32 (8) court fees or fines levied in a judicial or adjudicatory proceeding;
- 33 (9) the South Carolina Public Service Authority or the South Carolina Ports Authority.

34 (C) This paragraph does not prohibit a state agency, department, board, committee, or commission from increasing fees for
35 services provided to other state agencies, departments, boards, committees, commissions, political subdivisions, or fees for health
36 care and laboratory services regardless of whether the fee is set by statute.

1 (D) Statutory law for purposes of this paragraph does not include regulations promulgated pursuant to the State Administrative
2 Procedures Act.

3 **117.8.** (GP: State Institutions - Revenues & Income) (A) The University of South Carolina, Clemson University, the Medical
4 University of South Carolina (including the Medical University Hospital), The Citadel, Winthrop University, South Carolina State
5 University, Francis Marion University, University of Charleston, Lander University, Coastal Carolina University, and the Wil Lou
6 Gray Opportunity School shall remit all revenues and income, collected at the respective institutions, to the State Treasurer according
7 to the terms of Section 117.1 of this act, but all such revenues or income so collected, except fees received as regular term tuition,
8 matriculation, and registration, shall be carried in a special continuing account by the State Treasurer, to the credit of the respective
9 institutions, and may be requisitioned by said institutions, in the manner prescribed in Section 11-3-185 of the 1976 Code, and
10 expended to fulfill the purpose for which such fees or income were levied, but no part of such income shall be used for permanent
11 improvements without the express written approval of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority and the Joint Legislative Capital
12 Bond Review Committee; and it is further required that no such fee or income shall be charged in excess of the amount that is
13 necessary to supply the service, or fulfill the purpose for which such fee or income was charged. Notwithstanding other provisions
14 of this act, funds at state institutions of higher learning derived wholly from athletic or other student contests, from the activities of
15 student organizations, and from the operations of canteens and bookstores, and from approved Private Practice plans at institutions
16 and affiliated agencies may be retained at the institution and expended by the respective institutions only in accord with policies
17 established by the institution's Board of Trustees. Such funds shall be audited annually by the State but the provisions of this act
18 concerning unclassified personnel compensation, travel, equipment purchases and other purchasing regulations shall not apply to the
19 use of these funds.

20 **117.9.** (GP: Transfers of Appropriations) Agencies and institutions shall be authorized to transfer appropriations within programs
21 and within the agency with notification to the Executive Budget Office and Comptroller General. No such transfer may exceed
22 twenty percent of the program budget. Upon request, details of such transfers may be provided to members of the General Assembly
23 on an agency by agency basis. Transfers of appropriations from personal service accounts to other operating accounts or from other
24 operating accounts to personal service accounts may be restricted to any established standard level set by the State Fiscal
25 Accountability Authority upon formal approval by a majority of the members of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority.

26 **117.10.** (GP: Federal Funds - DHEC, DSS, DHHS - Disallowances) Amounts appropriated to the Department of Health and
27 Environmental Control, Department of Social Services and Department of Health and Human Services may be expended to cover
28 program operations of prior fiscal years where adjustment of such prior years are necessary under federal regulations or audit
29 exceptions. All disallowances or notices of disallowances by any federal agency of any costs claimed by these agencies shall be
30 submitted to the State Auditor, the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee, within five days of receipt
31 of such actions.

32 **117.11.** (GP: Fixed Student Fees) During the current fiscal year, student fees at the state institutions of higher learning shall be
33 fixed by the respective Boards of Trustees as follows:

1 (1) Fees applicable to student housing, dining halls, student health service, parking facility, laundries and all other personal
2 subsistence expenses shall be sufficient to fully cover the total direct operating and capital expenses of providing such facilities and
3 services over their expected useful life except those operating or capital expenses related to the removal of asbestos.

4 (2) Student activity fees may be fixed at such rates as the respective Boards shall deem reasonable and necessary.

5 **117.12.** (GP: Tech Educ. Colleges Student Activity Fees) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this act, funds at technical
6 education colleges derived wholly from the activities of student organizations and from the operations of canteens and bookstores
7 may be retained by the college and expended only in accord with policies established by the respective college's area commission
8 and approved by the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education.

9 **117.13.** (GP: Discrimination Policy) It is the policy of the State of South Carolina to recruit, hire, train, and promote employees
10 without discrimination because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, religion or physical disability. This policy is to apply to all
11 levels and phases of personnel within state government, including but not limited to recruiting, hiring, compensation, benefits,
12 promotions, transfers, layoffs, recalls from layoffs, and educational, social, or recreational programs. It is the policy of the State to
13 take affirmative action to remove the disparate effects of past discrimination, if any, because of race, color, sex, national origin, age,
14 religion or physical disability.

15 Each state agency shall submit to the State Human Affairs Commission employment and filled vacancy data by race and sex by
16 October thirty-first, of each year.

17 In accordance with Section 1-13-110 of the 1976 Code, as amended, the Human Affairs Commission shall submit a report on the
18 status of state agencies' Affirmative Action Plans and Programs to the General Assembly by February first each year. This report
19 shall contain the total number of persons employed in each job group, by race and sex, at the end of the preceding reporting period,
20 a breakdown by race and sex of those hired or promoted from within the agency during the reporting period, and an indication of
21 whether affirmative action goals were achieved. For each job group referenced in the Human Affairs report, where the hiring of
22 personnel does not reflect the percentage goals established in the agency's affirmative action plan for the year in question, the state
23 agency shall submit a detailed explanation to the Human Affairs Commission by February fifteenth, explaining why goals were not
24 achieved.

25 The Human Affairs Commission shall review the explanations and notify the Department of Administration of any agency not in
26 satisfactory compliance with meeting its stated goals.

27 The Department of Administration shall notify any agency not in compliance that their request for additional appropriations for
28 the current appropriation cycle, may not be processed until such time as the Department of Administration, after consultation with
29 the Human Affairs Commission, is satisfied that the agency is making a good faith effort to comply with its affirmative action plan,
30 and that the compliance must be accomplished within a reasonable length of time to be determined by the mission and circumstances
31 of the agency. This requirement shall not affect additional appropriation requests for public assistance payments or aid to entities.
32 This section does not apply to those agencies that have been exempted from the reporting requirements of the Human Affairs
33 Commission.

34 **117.14.** (GP: FTE Management) In order to provide the necessary control over the number of employees, the Executive Budget
35 Office is hereby directed to maintain close supervision over the number of state employees, and to require specifically the following:

1 (1) That no state agency exceed the total authorized number of full-time equivalent positions and those funded from state
2 sources as provided in each section of this act except by majority vote of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority.

3 (2) That the Executive Budget Office shall maintain and make, as necessary, periodic adjustments thereto, an official record
4 of the total number of authorized full-time equivalent positions by agency for state and total funding sources.

5 (a) That within thirty days of the passage of the Appropriation Act or by August first, whichever comes later, each agency
6 of the State must have established on the Executive Budget Office records all positions authorized in the Act. Each agency may,
7 upon notification to the Executive Budget Office, change the funding source of state FTE positions established on the Executive
8 Budget Office records as necessary to expend federal and other sources of personal service funds to conserve or stay within the state
9 appropriated personal service funds. No agency shall change funding sources that will cause the agency to exceed the authorized
10 number of state or total full-time equivalent positions. Each agency may transfer FTEs between programs as needed to accomplish
11 the agency mission.

12 (b) That by September thirtieth, the office shall prepare a FTE analysis, by agency, which shows the number of authorized,
13 filled, and vacant positions by source of funds for the current and two previously completed fiscal years. The office shall provide a
14 copy of each agency's FTE analysis to the Senate Finance and House Ways and Means Committees.

15 (3) That full-time equivalent (FTE) positions shall be determined under the following guidelines:

16 (a) The annual work hours for each FTE shall be the agency's full-time standard annual work hours.

17 (b) The state FTE shall be derived by multiplying the state percentage of budgeted funds for each position by the FTE for
18 that position.

19 (c) All institutions of higher education shall use a value of 0.75 FTE for each position determined to be full-time faculty
20 with a duration of nine months.

21 The FTE method of accounting shall be utilized for all authorized positions.

22 (4) That the number of positions authorized in this act shall be reduced in the following circumstances:

23 (a) Upon request by an agency.

24 (b) When anticipated federal funds are not made available.

25 (c) When the Executive Budget Office, through study or analysis, becomes aware of any unjustifiable excess of positions
26 in any state agency.

27 (5) That no new permanent positions in state government shall be funded by appropriations in acts supplemental to this act but
28 temporary positions may be so funded.

29 (6) That the provisions of this section shall not apply to personnel exempt from the State Classification and Compensation
30 Plan under item I of Section 8-11-260 of the 1976 Code.

31 The Governor, in making his appropriation recommendations to the Ways and Means Committee, must provide that the level of
32 personal service appropriation recommended for each agency is at least ninety-seven percent of the funds required to meet one
33 hundred percent of the funds needed for the full-time equivalents positions recommended by the Governor (exclusive of new
34 positions).

35 **117.15.** (GP: Allowance for Residences & Compensation Restrictions) That salaries paid to officers and employees of the State,
36 including its several boards, commissions, and institutions shall be in full for all services rendered, and no perquisites of office or of

1 employment shall be allowed in addition thereto, but such perquisites, commodities, services or other benefits shall be charged for
2 at the prevailing local value and without the purpose or effect of increasing the compensation of said officer or employee. The charge
3 for these items may be payroll deducted at the discretion of the Comptroller General or the chief financial officer at each agency
4 maintaining its own payroll system. This shall not apply to the Governor's Mansion, nor to guards at any of the state's penal
5 institutions and nurses and attendants at the Department of Disabilities and Special Needs, and registered nurses providing clinical
6 care at the MUSC Medical Center, nor to the Superintendent and staff of John de la Howe School, nor to the cottage parents and staff
7 of Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School, nor to full-time or part-time staff who work after regular working hours in the SLED
8 Communications Center or Maintenance Area, nor to adult staff at the Governor's School for Science and Mathematics and the
9 Governor's School for Arts and Humanities who are required to stay on campus by the institution because of job requirements or
10 program participation. Any state institution of higher learning may provide complimentary membership privileges to employees
11 who work at their wellness centers. The presidents of those state institutions of higher learning authorized to provide on-campus
12 residential facilities for students may be permitted to occupy residences on the grounds of such institutions without charge.

13 Any state institution of higher learning may provide a housing allowance to the president in lieu of a residential facility, the amount
14 to be approved by the State Fiscal Accountability Authority.

15 That the following may be permitted to occupy residences owned by the respective departments without charge: the Farm Director,
16 Farm Managers, and Specialists employed at the Wateree River Correctional Institution; the South Carolina State Commission of
17 Forestry fire tower operators, forestry aides, and caretaker at central headquarters; the Department of Natural Resources' ~~Game~~
18 Wildlife Management Area Personnel, Fish Hatchery Personnel, and ~~Fort Johnson Superintendent~~ Heritage Trust Personnel; the
19 Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism field personnel in the State Parks Division; Director of Wil Lou Gray Opportunity
20 School; President of the School for the Deaf and the Blind; houseparents for the Commission for the Blind; South Carolina
21 Department of Health and Environmental Control personnel at the State Park Health Facility and Camp Burnt Gin; Residence Life
22 Coordinators at Lander University; Residence Life Directors, temporary and transition employees, student interns, and emergency
23 personnel at Winthrop University; Farm Superintendent at Winthrop University; Residence Hall Directors at the College of
24 Charleston; the Department of Disabilities and Special Needs' physicians and other professionals at Whitten Center, Clemson
25 University Off-Campus Agricultural Staff and Housing Area Coordinators; and TriCounty Technical College's Bridge to Clemson
26 Resident and Area Directors; and housing maintenance night supervisors, residence life directors, temporary and transition
27 employees, and emergency medical personnel occupying residences owned by the University of South Carolina. Except in the case
28 of elected officials, the fair market rental value of any residence furnished to a state employee shall be reported by the state agency
29 furnishing the residence to the Agency Head Salary Commission, and the Department of Administration by October first of each
30 fiscal year.

31 All salaries paid by departments and institutions shall be in accord with a uniform classification and compensation plan, approved
32 by the Department of Administration, applicable to all personnel of the State Government whose compensation is not specifically
33 fixed in this act. Such plan shall include all employees regardless of the source of funds from which payment for personal service is
34 drawn. The Department of Administration is authorized to approve temporary salary adjustments for classified and unclassified
35 employees who perform temporary duties which are limited by time and/or funds. When approved, a temporary salary adjustment
36 shall not be added to an employee's base salary and shall end when the duties are completed and/or the funds expire. Academic

1 personnel of the institutions of higher learning and other individual or group of positions that cannot practically be covered by the
2 plan may be excluded therefrom but their compensations as approved by the Department of Administration shall, nevertheless, be
3 subject to review by the State Fiscal Accountability Authority. Salary appropriations for employees fixed in this act shall be in full
4 for all services rendered, and no supplements from other sources shall be permitted or approved by the State Fiscal Accountability
5 Authority. With the exception of travel and subsistence, legislative study committees shall not compensate any person who is
6 otherwise employed as a full-time state employee. Salaries of the heads of all agencies of the State Government shall be specifically
7 fixed in this act and no salary shall be paid any agency head whose salary is not so fixed. As long as there is no impact on appropriated
8 funds, state agencies and institutions shall be allowed to spend public funds and/or other funds for designated employee award
9 programs which shall have written criteria approved by the agency governing board or commission. For purposes of this section,
10 monetary awards, if any, shall not be considered a part of an employee's base salary, a salary supplement, or a perquisite of
11 employment. The names of all employees receiving monetary awards and the amounts received shall be reported annually to the
12 Department of Administration.

13 In the case of lodging furnished by certain higher education institutions to employees, the prevailing local rate does not apply if
14 the institution meets the exceptions for inadequate rent described in the current Internal Revenue Code Section 119(d)(2). To meet
15 the exception, rental rates must equal the lesser of five percent of the appraised value of the qualified campus lodging, or the average
16 of the rentals paid by individuals (other than employees or students of the educational institution) during the calendar year for lodging
17 provided by the educational institution which is comparable to the qualified campus lodging provided to the employee, over the rent
18 paid by the employee for the qualified campus lodging during the calendar year. The appraised value shall be determined as of the
19 close of the calendar year in which the taxable year begins, or, in the case of a rental period not greater than one year, at any time
20 during the calendar year in which the period begins.

21 **117.16.** (GP: Universities & Colleges - Allowance for Presidents) Presidents of the University of South Carolina, Clemson
22 University, the Medical University of South Carolina, The Citadel, Winthrop University, South Carolina State University, Francis
23 Marion University, University of Charleston, Coastal Carolina University and Lander University must not be paid a fixed allowance
24 for personal expenses incurred in connection with the performance of their official duties. Reimbursements may be made to the
25 presidents from funds available to their respective institutions for any personal expenses incurred provided that all requests for
26 reimbursement are supported by properly documented vouchers processed through the normal accounting procedures of the
27 institutions.

28 **117.17.** (GP: Replacement of Personal Property) The Department of Juvenile Justice, Department of Corrections, Department
29 of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services, Department of Mental Health, Department of Disabilities and Special Needs, Continuum
30 of Care, Department of Social Services and School for the Deaf and the Blind may replace the personal property of an employee
31 which has been damaged or destroyed by a client while in custody of the agency. The replacement of personal property may be
32 made only if the loss has resulted from actions by the employee deemed to be appropriate and in the line of duty by the agency head
33 and if the damaged or destroyed item is found by the agency head to be reasonable in value, and necessary for the employee to carry
34 out the functions and duties of his employment. Replacement of damaged or destroyed items shall not exceed \$250 per item, per
35 incident. Each agency must have guidelines to insure the reasonableness of the replacement payments.

1 **117.18.** (GP: Business Expense Reimbursement) Agency heads and deputy commissioners or deputy directors designated by
2 agency heads may receive reimbursements for business expenses incurred while performing their official duties, provided that
3 receipts are presented when seeking reimbursement and justification is submitted to document the time, place, and purpose of the
4 expense as well as the names of the individuals involved. The Department of Administration shall promulgate regulations governing
5 these expenses.

6 **117.19.** (GP: Per Diem) The per diem allowance of all boards, commissions and committees shall be at the rate of \$35 per day.
7 No full-time officer or employee of the State shall draw any per diem allowance for service on such boards, commissions or
8 committees.

9 **117.20.** (GP: Travel - Subsistence Expenses & Mileage) Travel and subsistence expenses, whether paid from state appropriated,
10 federal, local or other funds, shall be allowed in accordance with the following provisions:

11 (A) Unless otherwise provided in paragraphs B through H of this section, all employees of the State of South Carolina or any
12 agency thereof including employees and members of the governing bodies of each technical college while traveling on the business
13 of the State shall, upon presentation of a paid receipt, be allowed reimbursement for actual expenses incurred for lodging, not to
14 exceed the current maximum lodging rates, excluding taxes, established by the U.S. General Services Administration. The lodging
15 reimbursement for employees of a school district must also conform to these rates when that employee's travel reimbursement is
16 paid by state funds that are transferred to the school district. Agencies may contract with lodging facilities to pay on behalf of an
17 employee. Failure to maintain proper control of direct payments for lodging may result in the revocation of the agency's authority
18 by the Comptroller General or the State Auditor. The employee shall also be reimbursed for the actual expenses incurred in the
19 obtaining of meals except that such costs shall not exceed ~~\$25~~ \$35 per day within the State of South Carolina. For travel outside of
20 South Carolina the maximum daily reimbursement for meals shall not exceed ~~\$32~~ \$50. Agencies may contract with food or dining
21 facilities to pay for meals on behalf of employees in accordance with rules and regulations established by the Office of Comptroller
22 General. It shall be the responsibility of the agency head to monitor the charges for lodging which might be claimed by his employees
23 in order to determine that such charges are following maximum lodging rates as established by the U.S. General Services
24 Administration. Any exceptions must have the written approval of the agency head, taking into consideration location, purpose of
25 travel or other extenuating circumstances. The provisions of this item shall not apply to Section 42-3-40 of the 1976 Code, and when
26 pertaining to institutions of higher learning, for travel paid with funds other than General Funds.

27 (B) That employees of the State, when traveling outside the United States, Canada, and Puerto Rico upon promotional business
28 for the State of South Carolina shall be entitled to actual expenses for both food and lodging.

29 (C) The Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Comptroller General, Attorney General, State Treasurer, Adjutant
30 General, Superintendent of Education and the Commissioner of Agriculture shall be reimbursed actual expenses for subsistence.

31 (D) Non-legislative members of committees appointed pursuant to Acts and Resolutions of the General Assembly whose
32 membership consists solely of members of the General Assembly or members of the General Assembly and other personnel who are
33 not employees of the State of South Carolina shall be allowed subsistence expenses of ~~\$35~~ \$42 per day while traveling on official
34 business, unless otherwise designated by law. Members of such committees may opt to receive actual expenses incurred for lodging
35 and actual expenses incurred in the obtaining of meals in lieu of the allowable subsistence expense.

1 (E) Members of the state boards, commissions, or committees whose duties are not full-time and who are paid on a per diem
2 basis, shall be allowed reimbursement for actual expenses incurred at the rates provided in paragraph A and I of this section while
3 away from their places of residence on official business of the State. One person accompanying a handicapped member of a state
4 board, commission, or committee on official business of the State shall be allowed the same reimbursement for actual expenses
5 incurred at the rates provided in paragraph A through I of this section.

6 (F) No subsistence reimbursement shall be allowed to a Justice of the Supreme Court or Judge of the Court of Appeals while
7 traveling in the county of his official residence. When traveling on official business of said court within fifty miles outside the county
8 of his official residence, a Supreme Court Justice and a Judge of the Court of Appeals shall be allowed subsistence expenses in the
9 amount of ~~\$35~~ \$42 per day plus such mileage allowance for travel as is provided for other employees of the State. When traveling
10 on official business of said court fifty or more miles outside the county of his official residence, each Justice and Judge of the Court
11 of Appeals shall be allowed subsistence expenses in the amount as provided in this act for members of the General Assembly plus
12 such mileage allowance for travel as is provided for other employees of the State. The Chief Justice, or such other person as the
13 Chief Justice designates, while attending the Conference of Chief Justices and one member of the Supreme Court while attending
14 the National Convention of Appellate Court Judges, and three Circuit Judges while attending the National Convention of State Trial
15 Judges shall be allowed actual subsistence and travel expenses.

16 Upon approval of the Chief Justice, Supreme Court Justices, Judges of the Court of Appeals, Circuit Judges, and Family Court
17 Judges shall be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred for all other official business requiring out-of-state expenses at the rate
18 provided in paragraph A of this section.

19 (G) No subsistence reimbursements are allowed to a Circuit Judge, a Family Court Judge, or an Administrative Law Judge while
20 holding court within the county in which he resides. While holding court or on other official business outside the county, within
21 fifty miles of his residence, a Circuit Court Judge, Family Court Judge, or an Administrative Law Judge is entitled to a subsistence
22 allowance in the amount of ~~\$35~~ \$42 per day plus such mileage allowance for travel as is provided for other employees of the State.
23 While holding court or on other official business at a location fifty miles or more from his residence, a Circuit Court, Family Court
24 or Administrative Law Judge is entitled to a subsistence allowance in the amount as provided in this act for members of the General
25 Assembly plus such mileage allowance for travel as is provided for other employees of the State.

26 (H) Any retired Justice, Circuit Court Judge or Family Court Judge or Master-in-Equity appointed by the Supreme Court to serve
27 as a Special Circuit Judge, Family Court Judge, Appeals Court Judge, or Acting Associate Justice shall serve without pay but shall
28 receive the same allowance for subsistence, expenses, and mileage as provided in Part I for Circuit Court Judges.

29 (I) No expense shall be allowed an employee either at his place of residence or at the official headquarters of the agency by
30 which he is employed except as provided in paragraph E, of this section. When an employee is assigned to work a particular territory
31 or district, and such territory or district and his official headquarters are in different localities or sections of the State, expenses may
32 be allowed for the necessary travel to his official headquarters. The members of the Workers' Compensation Commission may be
33 reimbursed at the regular mileage rate of one round trip each week from their respective homes to Columbia. No subsistence
34 reimbursement shall be allowed to a member of the Workers' Compensation Commission while traveling in the county of his official
35 residence. When traveling on official business of the commission outside the county of his official residence, a member of the
36 Workers' Compensation Commission shall be allowed subsistence expenses in the amount of ~~\$35~~ \$42 per day. When traveling on

1 official business of the commission fifty or more miles outside the county of his official residence, each member shall be allowed a
2 subsistence allowance in the amount as provided in this act for members of the General Assembly. When out-of-state, members of
3 the Workers' Compensation Commission and the members of the Appellate Panel of the Department of Employment and Workforce
4 may claim the established amount of per diem, as stated in the General Appropriation Act, or actual expenses as deemed reasonable
5 by the Comptroller General. The members of the Appellate Panel of the Department of Employment and Workforce may be
6 reimbursed at the regular mileage rate when the member is on official business fifty miles or more outside of Columbia. The members
7 of the Appellate Panel of the Department of Employment and Workforce shall be allowed subsistence allowance in the amount as
8 provided in this act for members of the General Assembly when the member is on official business fifty miles or more outside of
9 Columbia.

10 (J) When an employee of the State shall use his or her personal automobile in traveling on necessary official business, a charge
11 to equal the standard business mileage rate as established by the Internal Revenue Service will be allowed for the use of such
12 automobile and the employee shall bear the expense of supplies and upkeep thereof. The standard business mileage rate used in this
13 calculation shall be the current rate established by the Internal Revenue Service. Whenever state provided motor pool vehicles are
14 reasonably available and their use is practical and an employee of the State shall request for his own benefit to use his or her personal
15 vehicle in traveling on necessary official business, a charge of four cents per mile less than the standard business mileage rate as
16 established by the Internal Revenue Service will be allocated for the use of such vehicle and the employee shall bear the expense of
17 supplies and upkeep thereof. The standard business mileage rate used in this calculation shall be the current rate established by the
18 Internal Revenue Service. When such travel is by a state-owned automobile, the State shall bear the expense of supplies and upkeep
19 thereof but no mileage will be allowed. Agencies and employees are directed to use state fueling facilities to the maximum extent
20 possible, when such use is cost beneficial to the State. When using commercial fueling facilities, operators of State-owned vehicles
21 are directed to use self-service pumps. In traveling on the business of the State, employees are required to use the most economical
22 mode of transportation, due consideration being given to urgency, schedules and like factors.

23 Mileage between an employee's home and his/her place of employment is not subject to reimbursement. However, when an
24 employee leaves on a business trip directly from his/her home, and does not go by the employee's headquarters, the employee shall
25 be eligible for reimbursement for actual mileage beginning at his/her residence.

26 (K) That a state agency may advance travel and subsistence expense monies to employees of that agency for the financing of
27 ordinary and necessary travel required in the conducting of the business of the agency. The Office of Comptroller General is directed
28 to develop and publish rules and regulations pertaining to the advancing of travel expenses and no state agency shall make such
29 advances except under the rules and regulations as published. All advances for travel and subsistence monies shall be repaid to the
30 agency within thirty days after the end of the trip or by July fifteenth, whichever comes first.

31 (L) That the state institutions of higher learning are authorized to reimburse reasonable relocation expenses for new employees
32 when such reimbursements are considered by the agency head to be essential to successful recruitment of professionally competent
33 staff members.

34 (M) The Office of Comptroller General is authorized to promulgate and publish rules and regulations governing travel and
35 subsistence payments.

36 (N) No state funds may be used to purchase first class airline tickets.

1 **117.21.** (GP: Organizations Receiving State Appropriations Report) Each organization receiving a contribution in this act shall
2 render to the state agency making the contribution by November first of the fiscal year in which funds are received, an accounting
3 of how the state funds will be spent, goals to be accomplished, proposed measures to evaluate success in implementing and meeting
4 the goals, a copy of the adopted budget for the current year, and also a copy of the organization's most recent operating financial
5 statement. The funds appropriated in this act for contributions shall not be expended until the required financial statements are filed
6 with the appropriate state agency. No funds in this act shall be disbursed to organizations or purposes which practice discrimination
7 against persons by virtue of race, creed, color or national origin. The State Auditor shall review and audit, if necessary, the financial
8 structure and activities of each organization receiving contributions in this act and make a report to the General Assembly of such
9 review and/or audit, when requested to do so by the State Fiscal Accountability Authority. From the funds an organization receives
10 from a state agency, for accountability purposes, by June thirtieth organizations receiving contributions in this act shall submit a
11 report to the state agency making the contribution that includes an accounting of how the funds were spent and the outcome measures
12 used to determine the success of the stated goals. State agencies receiving such data from organizations shall forward the information
13 to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee.

14 **117.22.** (GP: State-Owned Aircraft - Flight Logs) Each agency having in its custody one or more aircraft shall maintain a
15 continuing log on all flights, which in order to promote accountability and transparency shall be open for public inspection and shall
16 also be posted online. Any and all aircraft owned or operated by agencies of the State Government shall be used only for official
17 business. The Division of Aeronautics and other agencies owning and operating aircraft may furnish transportation to the Governor,
18 Constitutional Officers, members of the General Assembly, members of state boards, commissions, and agencies and their invitees
19 for official business only; no member of the General Assembly, no member of a state board, commission, or committee, and no state
20 official shall use any state-owned or operated aircraft unless the member or official files within twenty-four hours after the completion
21 of the flight with the agency that provided the flight a sworn statement certifying and describing the official nature of his trip; and
22 no member of the General Assembly, no member of a state board, commission or committee, and no state official shall be furnished
23 air transportation by a state agency unless such agency prepares and maintains in its files a sworn statement from the highest ranking
24 official of the agency or its designee certifying that the member's or state official's trip was in conjunction with the official business
25 of the agency. Official business shall not include routine transportation to and from meetings of the General Assembly or committee
26 meetings for which mileage is authorized. Official business also does not include attending a press conference, bill signing, or
27 political function.

28 All logs shall be signed by the parties using the flight and the signatures shall be maintained as part of the permanent record of
29 any agency. All passengers shall be listed on the flight log by their legal name; passengers flying with an appropriate official of
30 SLED or the Department of Commerce whose confidentiality must, in the opinion of SLED or the department, be protected shall be
31 listed in writing on the flight log as "Confidential Passenger SLED or the Department of Commerce (strike one)" and the appropriate
32 official of SLED or the department shall certify to the agency operating the aircraft the necessity for such confidentiality. The
33 Division of Aeronautics shall post its flight logs on its website within one working day of completion of trips.

34 Violation of the above provisions of this section is prima facie evidence of a violation of Section 8-13-700(A) of the 1976 Code
35 and shall subject a violating member of the General Assembly to the ethics procedure of his appropriate house and shall subject a
36 violating member of a state board, commission or committee, or a state official to the applicable ethics procedure relating to them as

1 provided by law. The above provisions do not apply to state-owned or operated aircraft when used by the Medical University of
2 South Carolina, nor to aircraft of the athletic department or the educational foundations of any state-supported institution of higher
3 education, nor to law enforcement officers when flying on state-owned aircraft in pursuit of fugitives, missing persons, or felons or
4 for investigation of gang, drug, or other violent crimes.

5 Aircraft owned by agencies of state government shall not be leased to individuals for their personal use.

6 **117.23.** (GP: Carry Forward) Each agency is authorized to carry forward unspent general fund appropriations from the prior
7 fiscal year into the current fiscal year, up to a maximum of ten percent of its original general fund appropriations less any
8 appropriation reductions for the current fiscal year. Agencies shall not withhold services in order to carry forward general funds.

9 This provision shall be suspended if necessary to avoid a fiscal year-end general fund deficit. For purposes of this proviso, the
10 amount of the general fund deficit shall be determined after first applying the Capital Reserve Fund provisions in Section
11 11-11-320(D) of the 1976 Code, and before any transfers from the General Reserve. The amount of general funds needed to avoid
12 a year-end deficit shall be reduced proportionately from each agency's carry forward amount.

13 Agencies which have separate general fund carry forward authority must exclude the amount carried forward by such separate
14 authority from their base for purposes of calculating the ten percent carry forward authorized herein. Any funds that are carried
15 forward as a result of this provision are not considered part of the base of appropriations for any succeeding years.

16 **117.24.** (GP: TEFRA-Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the State Medicaid
17 Plan be amended to provide benefits for disabled children as allowed by the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act (TEFRA)
18 option. State agencies, including but not limited to, the Department of Social Services - the Continuum of Care, the Department of
19 Health and Environmental Control, the Department of Mental Health, the Department of Disabilities and Special Needs, and the
20 Department of Health and Human Services shall collectively review and identify existing state appropriations within their respective
21 budgets that can be used as state match to serve these children. Such funds shall be used effective January 1, 1995 to implement
22 TEFRA option benefits. Agencies providing services under the provisions of this paragraph must not spend less in the current fiscal
23 year than expended in the previous fiscal year.

24 **117.25.** (GP: Prison Industries) All agencies funded in this act, when procuring goods and services, shall first consider
25 contracting for services or purchasing goods and services through the Department of Corrections' Prison Industries Program. The
26 Department of Corrections shall furnish, upon request, to all agencies a catalogue of goods and services provided by Prison Industries.
27 The department is hereby directed to develop and market a catalogue of Prison Industries products for nationwide circulation.

28 **117.26.** (GP: Travel Report) Annually on November first, the Comptroller General shall issue a report on travel expenditures
29 for the prior fiscal year which shall be distributed to the Senate Finance Committee, the House Ways and Means Committee, and the
30 Statehouse Press Room. The Comptroller General may use up to \$500 of general fund appropriations for the purpose of providing
31 copies to the media or the public upon request. The report must contain a listing for every agency receiving an appropriation in the
32 annual General Appropriations Act. The listing must show at a minimum the top ten percent of employees for whom travel expenses
33 and registration fees were paid within each agency, not to exceed twenty-five employees per agency. Agencies should include
34 position titles for each of the top twenty-five travelers for each agency. Expenditures must include state, federal and other sources
35 of funds. Expenditures for in-state and out-of-state registration fees (fees to attend conferences, teleconferences, workshops, or
36 seminars for training on a per person basis) must be shown as a separate subtotal within the grand total for the individual employees

1 and the agency as a whole. The list for each agency must be in rank order with the largest expenditure first and the name of the
2 employee must be shown with each amount. Agencies should include a brief summary of the type of travel the agency incurs. The
3 Comptroller General may provide additional information as deemed appropriate. The Comptroller General shall provide no
4 exceptions to this report in that the information contained is not considered confidential or restricted for economic development
5 purposes. However, further disclosure of detailed information shall be restricted as provided for by law.

6 **117.27.** (GP: School Technology Initiative) From the funds appropriated/authorized for the K-12 technology initiative, the
7 Department of Education, in consultation with the Department of Administration, the State Library, the Educational Television
8 Commission, and a representative from the Education Oversight Committee, shall administer the K-12 technology initiative funds.
9 These funds are intended to provide technology, encourage effective use of technology in K-12 public schools throughout the state,
10 conduct cost/benefit analyses of the various technologies, and should, to the maximum extent possible, involve public-private sector
11 collaborative efforts. Funds may also be used to establish pilot projects for new technologies with selected school districts as part of
12 the evaluation process. K-12 technology initiative funds shall be retained and carried forward to be used for the same purpose.

13 **117.28.** (GP: State-Operated Day Care Facilities Fees) Any state agency receiving funding in this act and any higher education
14 institution, including four-year institutions, two-year institutions, and technical colleges, that operates an early childhood
15 development center or day care facility shall charge, at a minimum, fees that are comparable to those charged by private day care
16 facilities in the local community. The institution or agency shall not restrict enrollment in the center solely to the children of faculty,
17 staff, and students of the institution; nor shall fees be set at a lower level for faculty, staff, or students of the institution or agency.

18 **117.29.** (GP: Base Budget Analysis) Agencies' annual accountability reports for the prior fiscal year, as required in Section
19 1-1-810, must be accessible to the Governor, Senate Finance Committee, House Ways and Means Committee, and to the public on
20 or before September fifteenth, for the purpose of a zero-base budget analysis and in order to ensure that the Agency Head Salary
21 Commission has the accountability reports for use in a timely manner. Accountability Report guidelines shall require agencies to
22 identify key program area descriptions and expenditures and link these to key financial and performance results measures. The
23 Executive Budget Office is directed to develop a process for training agency leaders on the annual agency accountability report and
24 its use in financial, organizational, and accountability improvement. Until performance-based funding is fully implemented and
25 reported annually, the state supported colleges, universities and technical schools shall report in accordance with Section 59-101-350.

26 **117.30.** (GP: Collection on Dishonored Payments) In lieu of any other provision of law, any state agency may collect a service
27 charge as provided in Section 34-11-70 to cover the costs associated with the processing and collection of dishonored instruments or
28 electronic payments where any amount is not paid by the drawee due to insufficient funds on deposit with the bank or the person
29 upon which it was drawn when presented, or the instrument has an incorrect or insufficient signature on it. Such funds shall be
30 retained and expended by the agency in accordance with this purpose and any unused amount shall carry forward to the following
31 fiscal year.

32 **117.31.** (GP: State DNA Database) Funds collected by the South Carolina Department of Corrections, the Department of
33 Probation, Parole and Pardon, and Department of Juvenile Justice to process DNA samples must be remitted to the State Law
34 Enforcement Division to offset the expenses incurred to operate the State DNA Database program. SLED may retain, expend, and
35 carry forward these funds. Any carry forward funds resulting from the DNA Database program must be used solely to operate the
36 DNA Database program.

1 **117.32.** (GP: Voluntary Separation Incentive Program) State agencies may implement, in consultation with the Department of
2 Administration, a program to realign resources to include provisions for a separation incentive payment for employees which may
3 include the employer portion of health and dental benefits not to exceed one year. Employees participating in such program shall be
4 considered to have voluntarily quit their employment without good cause and be subject to the provisions of Section 41-35-120(1)
5 of the South Carolina Employment Security Law. Any program developed under this provision will involve voluntary participation
6 from employees and will be funded within existing appropriations. The program must be approved by the agency head and the
7 Director of the Human Resources Division based on ability to demonstrate recurring cost savings for realignment and/or permanent
8 downsizing. State agencies shall report the prior year's results to the Department of Administration by August fifteenth, of the
9 current fiscal year. The Department of Administration, upon request, shall report to the Senate Finance Committee and the House
10 Ways and Means Committee on these results.

11 **117.33.** (GP: Debt Collection Reports) Each state agency shall provide to the Chairmen of the Senate Finance and House of
12 Representatives Ways and Means Committees and the Inspector General a report detailing the amount of its outstanding debt and all
13 methods it has used to collect that debt. This report is due by the last day of February for the previous calendar year. For purposes
14 of this provision, outstanding debt means a sum remaining due and owed to a state agency by a nongovernmental entity for more
15 than sixty calendar days.

16 **117.34.** (GP: State-Funded Libraries - Web Filters) (A) A library receiving state funds, directly, indirectly, by grant, or
17 otherwise, other than a library at an institution of higher learning, that has computers available for use by the public or students, or
18 both, must equip these computers with software incorporating web-filtering technology designed to eliminate or reduce the ability
19 of the computer to access sites displaying pornographic pictures or text. However, up to ten percent, and at least one, of the library's
20 computers must be unfiltered. Each library's governing officials shall determine the physical location of any unfiltered computer(s).
21 The library also must have a written policy providing sanctions against a person who instructs or demonstrates to another person
22 how to bypass this web-filtering technology.

23 (B) State funds intended for a library not in compliance with subsection (A) must be reduced by fifty percent. Funds resulting
24 from this reduction must be distributed among other libraries that are in compliance with subsection (A).

25 **117.35.** (GP: Tobacco Settlement Funds Carry Forward) State agencies are hereby authorized to retain and carry forward any
26 unexpended Tobacco Settlement Agreement funds from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and to expend such funds for
27 the same purpose.

28 **117.36.** (GP: Use Tax Exemption) For the current fiscal year there is exempt from the use tax imposed pursuant to Chapter 36,
29 Title 12 of the 1976 Code the sales price of tangible personal property purchased for use in private primary and secondary schools,
30 including kindergartens and early childhood education programs, which are exempt from income taxes pursuant to Section 501(c)(3)
31 of the Internal Revenue Code. For the purposes of this item, the Internal Revenue Code means Internal Revenue Code as described
32 in Section 12-6-40 of the 1976 Code. This exemption applies for sales occurring after 1995. No refund is due any taxpayer of use
33 tax paid on sales exempted by this paragraph.

34 **117.37.** (GP: Personal Property Tax Relief Fund) If the Personal Property Tax Exemption Sales Tax is imposed in a county and
35 a sales tax rate of two percent of gross proceeds of sales is insufficient to offset the property tax not collected, sufficient amounts

1 must be credited to the Trust Fund for Tax Relief established pursuant to Section 11-11-150 of the 1976 Code to provide the
2 reimbursement to offset such a shortfall in the manner provided in Section 4-10-540(A) of the 1976 Code.

3 **117.38.** (GP: COG Annual Report) Each Council of Government shall submit a report to the Senate Finance Committee and the
4 House Ways and Means Committee by December first each year describing how the funds which they received from the State in the
5 prior fiscal year were expended.

6 **117.39.** (GP: Department of Administration, OEPP, Veterans Affairs) Of the funds appropriated for the Department of
7 Administration, Office of Executive Policy and Programs, Division of Veterans Affairs, the Director of the Division shall appoint an
8 additional claims representative within the Division of Veterans Affairs, who, in addition to being charged with the duty of assisting
9 all ex-servicemen, regardless of the wars in which their service may have been rendered, in filing, presenting, and prosecuting to
10 final determination all claims which they have for money compensation, hospitalization, training, and insurance benefits under the
11 terms of federal legislation, shall also specialize in the specific needs and diseases associated with veterans of the Vietnam era. The
12 person appointed as a claims representative under this section must be versed in federal legislation relating to these matters and the
13 rules, regulations, and practice of the Veterans Administration as created by Congress and his appointment must be approved by the
14 Governor.

15 Subject to the direction of the director, and in addition to other duties prescribed in this section, the claims representative appointed
16 pursuant to this section may represent the Division of Veterans Affairs on the South Carolina Agent Orange Advisory Council and
17 on the Hepatitis C Coalition established by the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control, assist the Division
18 of Veterans Affairs in carrying out its duties in connection with the Agent Orange Information and Assistance program, represent
19 the director in connection with functions relating to Vietnam veterans, and perform other duties as may be assigned by the director.

20 **117.40.** (GP: South Carolina Recycling Initiative) To protect the public health and safety, protect and preserve the environment
21 of this State, and to recover resources which have the potential for usefulness in the most environmentally safe, economically feasible
22 and cost effective manner, state agencies shall purchase recycled steel unless the item cannot be acquired competitively at a
23 reasonable price.

24 **117.41.** (GP: Life and Palmetto Fellows Scholarships Waiver Exemption) Any provision in permanent law or in Part IB,
25 Section 117 of this act, except that which is specified for LIFE and Palmetto Fellows Scholarships, that would require general fund
26 appropriations other than what is specified in Part IA of this act is waived for the current fiscal year.

27 **117.42.** (GP: Sole Source Procurements) The State Fiscal Accountability Authority shall evaluate and determine whether the
28 written determinations, explanations, and basis for sole source procurements, pursuant to South Carolina Code Section 11-35-1560,
29 and emergency procurements, pursuant to South Carolina Code Section 11-35-1570, are legitimate and valid reasons for awarding
30 noncompetitive contracts.

31 **117.43.** (GP: DMV Data) The Department of Motor Vehicles shall provide access, in compliance with all state and federal
32 privacy protection statutes, to the following data and reports without charge to the South Carolina Department of Transportation:

- 33 (1) all collision data and collision reports;
- 34 (2) registration information used for toll enforcement; and
- 35 (3) driver records of employees or prospective employees.

1 **117.44.** (GP: Parking Fees) State agencies shall not impose additional parking fees or increases in current fees for state
2 employees during the current fiscal year. This provision does not apply to any college or university.

3 **117.45.** (GP: Facility Rental Fee) The Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities, Governor's School for Science and
4 Mathematics, Wil Lou Gray Opportunity School, and John de la Howe School are authorized to charge, collect, expend and carry
5 forward fees charged for facility and equipment rental and registration.

6 **117.46.** (GP: Insurance Claims) Any insurance reimbursement to an agency may be used to offset expenses related to the claim.
7 These funds may be retained, expended, and carried forward.

8 **117.47.** (GP: Organizational Charts) All agencies, departments and institutions of state government shall furnish to the Human
9 Resources Division (1) a current personnel organizational chart annually no later than September first of the current fiscal year, or
10 upon the request of the division and (2) notification of any change to the agency's organizational structure which impacts an
11 employee's grievance rights within thirty days of such change. The organizational chart shall be in a form prescribed by the Human
12 Resources Division showing all authorized positions, class title, class code, position number and indications as to whether such
13 positions are filled or vacant. In addition, the organizational chart shall clearly identify those employees who are exempt from the
14 State Employee Grievance Procedure Act.

15 **117.48.** (GP: Agencies Affected by Restructuring) Upon restructuring of state agencies by the General Assembly the Department
16 of Administration is directed to work with affected State agencies in order to phase-in operations of restructured organizations during
17 the current fiscal year. Restructured organizations should be operating entirely under the revised structure no later than December
18 thirty-first, of the current fiscal year, unless otherwise directed by law. The department is further directed to work with the affected
19 agencies in order to identify and facilitate the transfer of any portion of their operations, including transfer of funds during the current
20 fiscal year, which is affected by the restructured organization adopted by the General Assembly, but which has not already been
21 accomplished herein. Until sufficient changes can be made to the State's accounting system and the appointment of appropriate
22 agency heads, the Comptroller General and the State Treasurer shall allow those agencies affected by restructuring to continue
23 processing documents within the account structure existing on June thirtieth, of the prior fiscal year. Restructured agencies shall
24 make all the necessary accounting adjustments to complete the transition to the new account structure as soon as possible, but no
25 later than December thirty-first, of the current fiscal year, unless otherwise directed by law. The Executive Budget Office is directed
26 to prepare the subsequent detail budget to conform Part IA and corresponding provisos in this act to any restructuring changes that
27 are ratified.

28 **117.49.** (GP: Agency Administrative Support Collaboration) It is the intent of the General Assembly that state agencies continue
29 to actively pursue cost savings measures through collaborative efforts and where feasible may combine administrative support
30 functions with other agencies in order to maximize efficiency and effectiveness.

31 **117.50.** (GP: Assessment Audit / Crime Victim Funds) If the State Auditor finds that any county treasurer, municipal treasurer,
32 county clerk of court, magistrate, or municipal court has not properly allocated revenue generated from court fines, fines, and
33 assessments to the crime victim funds or has not properly expended crime victim funds, pursuant to Sections 14-1-206(B) and (D),
34 14-1-207(B) and (D), 14-1-208(B) and (D), and 14-1-211(B) of the 1976 Code, the State Auditor shall notify the State Department
35 of Crime Victim Compensation. The State Department of Crime Victim Compensation is authorized to conduct an audit which shall
36 include both a programmatic review and financial audit of any entity or nonprofit organization receiving victim assistance funding

1 based on the referrals from the State Auditor or complaints of a specific nature received by the State Department of Crime Victim
2 Compensation to ensure that crime victim funds are expended in accordance with the law. Guidelines for the expenditure of these
3 funds shall be developed by the Victim Services Coordinating Council. The Victim Services Coordinating Council shall develop
4 these guidelines to ensure any expenditure which meets the parameters of Article 15, Chapter 3, Title 16 is an allowable expenditure.
5 Any local entity or nonprofit organization that receives funding from revenue generated from crime victim funds is required to submit
6 their budget for the expenditure of these funds to the State Department of Crime Victim Compensation within thirty days of the
7 budget's approval by the governing body of the entity or nonprofit organization. Failure to comply with this provision shall cause
8 the State Department of Crime Victim Compensation to initiate a programmatic review and a financial audit of the entity's or
9 nonprofit organization's expenditures of victim assistance funds. Additionally, the Department of Crime Victim Compensation will
10 place the name of the noncompliant entity or nonprofit organization on their website where it shall remain until such time as they are
11 in compliance with the terms of this proviso. Any entity or nonprofit organization receiving victim assistance funding must cooperate
12 and provide expenditure/program data requested by the State Department of Crime Victim Compensation. If the State Department
13 of Crime Victim Compensation finds an error, the entity or nonprofit organization has ninety days to rectify the error. An error
14 constitutes an entity or nonprofit organization spending victim assistance funding on unauthorized items as determined by the State
15 Department of Crime Victim Compensation. If the entity or nonprofit organization fails to cooperate with the programmatic review
16 and financial audit or to rectify the error within ninety days, the State Department of Crime Victim Compensation shall assess and
17 collect a penalty in the amount of the unauthorized expenditure plus \$1,500 against the entity or nonprofit organization for improper
18 expenditures. This penalty plus \$1,500 must be paid within thirty days of the notification by the State Department of Crime
19 Victim Compensation to the entity or nonprofit organization that they are in noncompliance with the provisions of this proviso.
20 All penalties received by the State Department of Crime Victim Compensation shall be credited to the General Fund of the State. If
21 the penalty is not received by the State Department of Crime Victim Compensation within thirty days of the notification, the political
22 subdivision will deduct the amount of the penalty from the entity or nonprofit organization's subsequent fiscal year appropriation.

23 **117.51.** (GP: H.L. Hunley Museum Location) The General Assembly approves the City of North Charleston as the permanent
24 site of the H.L. Hunley Museum. This approval is contingent upon the negotiation and execution of necessary contracts between the
25 State of South Carolina and the City of North Charleston. The Hunley Commission is directed to expend funds from its account to
26 negotiate and execute contracts on behalf of the State of South Carolina.

27 **117.52.** (GP: Secure Juvenile Confinement) The Attorney General shall review the interpretation of the current policies of the
28 Department of Public Safety and the Department of Corrections regarding secure juvenile confinement that the departments indicate
29 may jeopardize federal grant funds. The departments may not implement any changes to the current policies regarding secure juvenile
30 confinement until the Attorney General considers the departments' interpretation of the federal Juvenile Justice and Delinquency
31 Prevention Act in regard to the secure holding of juveniles for more than six hours in adult detention facilities that also serve as
32 forty-eight-hour juvenile holdover facilities. The Attorney General will determine if the departments' interpretation is fair and
33 equitable and how the local governments and the Department of Juvenile Justice would be impacted, to include any financial
34 considerations.

35 **117.53.** (GP: ISCEDC Funding Transfer) The departments of Mental Health, Disabilities and Special Needs, and Juvenile Justice
36 are directed to transfer a total of \$1,199,456 in funds to the Department of Social Services for the support of the Interagency System

1 for Caring for Emotionally Disturbed Children. Funding transfers shall be in the following amounts: Department of Mental
2 Health - \$595,000, Department of Disabilities and Special Needs - \$379,456, and Department of Juvenile Justice - \$225,000. The
3 transfer of funds shall be accomplished by September thirtieth of the current fiscal year.

4 **117.54.** (GP: Employee Bonuses) State agencies and institutions are allowed to spend state, federal, and other sources of revenue
5 to provide selected employees lump sum bonuses, not to exceed three thousand dollars per year, based on objective guidelines
6 established by the Department of Administration. Payment of these bonuses is not a part of the employee's base salary and is not
7 earnable compensation for purposes of employee and employer contributions to respective retirement systems. Employees earning
8 \$100,000 or more shall not be eligible to receive bonuses under this provision. The employing agency must report this information
9 on or before August thirty-first of each year and must include the total amount and source of the bonus received by the employee
10 during the preceding fiscal year (July first through June thirtieth). The Human Resources Division of the Department of
11 Administration shall formulate policies and procedures to ensure compliance with the reporting provisions of this proviso. Copies
12 of the reports shall be made available to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and
13 Means Committee, upon request.

14 **117.55.** (GP: FEMA Flexibility) Any appropriation designated as the state share for a federally declared disaster may be carried
15 forward and used for the same purpose by the Emergency Management Division of the Adjutant General's Office in the event of
16 additional federally declared disasters. Unallocated funds from established state accounts may be used as the state share in any
17 federally declared disaster. These funds may also be used during a Governor's state of emergency to augment existing state
18 appropriations of the South Carolina Emergency Management Division (SCEMD). When these funds are used during a Governor's
19 state of emergency, the allocation of those funds following the event will be determined by the Governor based on the
20 recommendation of the Adjutant General and the Director of the South Carolina Emergency Management Division.

21 In the event there is a federally declared disaster and state match funds are unavailable, the State Fiscal Accountability Authority
22 may borrow from any internal account or accounts necessary to maximize federal matching funds through the Emergency
23 Management Division. Any such borrowing must be reported to the General Assembly within five days. Funds borrowed from
24 accounts shall be replenished by the General Assembly as soon as practicable.

25 **117.56.** (GP: Respiratory Syncytial Virus Prescription Sales and Use Tax Exemption) The effective date of the exemption from
26 sales and use tax of prescription medicines used to prevent respiratory syncytial virus shall be January 1, 1999. No refund of sales
27 and use taxes may be claimed as a result of this provision.

28 **117.78.** (GP: Year-End Financial Statements - Penalties) Agencies, institutions, and other reporting entities required to submit
29 annual audited financial statements for inclusion in the State's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report must submit final audited
30 financial statements to the Comptroller General not later than October first for those with fiscal year-end June thirtieth. The South
31 Carolina Retirement Systems, Insurance Benefits, and Other Post-Employment Benefits Trust Funds administered by the South
32 Carolina Public Employee Benefit Authority must submit their final audited financial statements no later than October fifteenth. For
33 institutions and reporting entities with fiscal year-ends other than June thirtieth, final audited financial statements must be submitted
34 to the Comptroller General within 120 days of that fiscal year-end. The Comptroller General shall provide a written report of each
35 agency, institution, or other reporting entity not in compliance with this provision to the State Fiscal Accountability Authority by
36 November thirtieth.

1 **117.58.** (GP: Purchase Card Incentive Rebates) In addition to the Purchase Card Rebate deposited in the general fund, any
2 incentive rebate premium received by an agency from the Purchase Card Program may be retained and used by the agency to support
3 its operations.

4 **117.59.** (GP: Sex Offender Monitoring and Supervision) The funds appropriated to the Department of Probation, Parole and
5 Pardon Services in Part IA, Section 66, Program II.A.2. for the Sex Offender Monitoring Program and to the Department of Juvenile
6 Justice in Part IA, Section 67, Program III.A. Special Item: Sex Offender Monitoring are to be used and expended only for GPS
7 monitoring programs of the departments. In cases of limited funds, monitoring of “Jessie’s Law” offenders shall take precedence
8 over all other GPS programs of the departments. Funds appropriated for this program may not be used for any other purpose or
9 transferred to any other program. Unexpended funds appropriated for Sex Offender Monitoring may be carried forward and used
10 for the same purpose. The departments are directed to submit a report to the General Assembly by January fifteenth each year
11 accounting for the expenditure of the funds including any carry-forward funding; the total costs and per-day costs for equipment,
12 supervision, and monitoring; the total number of staff assigned to the activity and the average agent caseloads; the amount of funds
13 collected from sex offenders for both intensive supervision and electronic monitoring; and the anticipated fiscal needs for the
14 upcoming fiscal year. The report shall also include, but not be limited to, data regarding the number of offenders sentenced to
15 electronic monitoring, including the number sentenced for life; the number of alert notifications received, investigated, and
16 prosecuted; and the number of offenders returned to prison as a result of electronic monitoring violations.

17 **117.60.** (GP: Viscosupplementation Therapies Sales and Use Tax Exemption) For the current fiscal year only, sales and use
18 taxes on viscosupplementation therapies shall be suspended. No refund or forgiveness of tax may be claimed as a result of this
19 provision.

20 **117.61.** (GP: CID & PCC Agency Head Salaries) All hiring salaries and salary increases for the agency heads of the Commission
21 on Indigent Defense and the Prosecution Coordination Commission shall be subject to all provisions related to agency heads covered
22 by the Agency Head Salary Commission.

23 **117.62.** (GP: Prosecutors and Defenders Public Service Incentive Program) The Office of Attorney General, the ~~Prosecution~~
24 ~~Coordination Commission~~ Commission on Prosecution Coordination, and the Commission on Indigent Defense, ~~in consultation with~~
25 ~~the South Carolina Student Loan Corporation and the Commission on Higher Education~~, shall develop and implement a Prosecutors
26 and Defenders Public Service Incentive Program for attorneys employed by the Office of Attorney General, the ~~Prosecution~~
27 ~~Coordination Commission~~ Commission on Prosecution Coordination, the Commission on Indigent Defense, a Circuit Solicitor’s
28 Office or a ~~county~~ Circuit Public Defender’s Office.

29 After more than three years of continuous service as a full-time attorney with any of these entities, qualifying attorneys may be
30 reimbursed up to \$1,000 for payments made in the prior calendar year on outstanding law school loans. Reimbursements for law
31 school loan payments may be increased by up to \$1,000 for each additional year of continuous service; however, such reimbursements
32 shall not exceed \$5,000 in any year. The amount of law school loan payment reimbursement in any calendar year shall not exceed
33 the amount of principal and interest paid on the loan in the prior calendar year. Reimbursements under the program may continue
34 until all outstanding law school loans are satisfied; however, such reimbursements shall not exceed \$40,000 per qualifying attorney.
35 Reimbursements shall be adjusted if necessary so as not to exceed appropriations for the program.

1 The Prosecutors and Defenders Public Service Incentive Program must be administered by the ~~South Carolina Student Loan~~
2 ~~Corporation~~ Commission on Prosecution Coordination, which shall pay for the cost of administration within the funds appropriated.

3 The Office of Attorney General, the ~~Prosecution Coordination Commission~~ Commission on Prosecution Coordination, and the
4 Commission on Indigent Defense shall each compile a report that includes, but is not limited to, the number of applicants and the
5 impact of the program on attracting and retaining attorneys. The ~~Student Loan Corporation~~ Commission on Prosecution
6 Coordination shall also compile a report that includes, but is not limited to, the cost of administering the program as well as the
7 amount of reimbursements per agency or entity. Such reports shall be submitted to the Senate Finance Committee and the House
8 Ways and Means Committee by ~~September~~ April first ~~each fiscal year~~.

9 Unexpended program funds from the prior fiscal year may be carried forward into the current fiscal year to be used for the same
10 purpose.

11 **117.63.** (GP: Attorney Dues) Agencies and offices of the State of South Carolina that employ attorneys are authorized, if they
12 so decide, to use other appropriated funds, including General Fund carry forward funds, to pay the costs of mandatory dues owed to
13 the South Carolina Bar Association.

14 **117.64.** (GP: Critical Employee Recruitment and Retention) State agencies are allowed to spend state, federal, and other sources
15 of revenue to provide lump sum bonuses to aid in recruiting and retaining workers in critical needs jobs which provide services that
16 directly impact the health, safety, and welfare of the public. The employee bonus amount shall be approved by the State Human
17 Resources Director based on State Human Resources guidelines, and shall not exceed \$10,000 per year. Payment of these bonuses
18 is not a part of the employee's base salary and is not earnable compensation for purposes of employee and employer contributions
19 to respective retirement systems. These bonuses shall, however, be considered earnings for determining if an employee who has
20 returned to work after retirement is subject to the earning limitation imposed in either Section 9-1-1790(A)(1) or Section 9-11-
21 (4)(a)(i).

22 These agencies may also provide paid educational leave for any employee in a FTE position deemed critical by the Department of
23 Administration to attend class while enrolled in degree programs that are related to the agency's mission. All such leave is at the
24 agency head's discretion.

25 These agencies may enter into an agreement with individuals employed in critical needs positions to repay them for their
26 outstanding student loans associated with completion of a relevant degree. Agencies may pay these employees up to twenty percent
27 or \$7,500, whichever is less, of their outstanding student loan each year over a five-year period. Payments will be made directly to
28 the employee at the end of each year of employment. The agency will be responsible for verifying the principal balance of the
29 employee's student loan prior to issuing payments.

30 Agencies are also authorized to allow tuition reimbursement from a maximum of ten credit hours per semester; allow probationary
31 employees to participate in tuition programs; and provide tuition prepayment instead of tuition reimbursement for employees willing
32 to pursue a degree in a healthcare program. An agency may pay up to fifty percent of an employee's tuition through tuition
33 prepayment. The remaining tuition could be reimbursed to the employee after successful completion of the class.

34 The Department of Administration shall approve of the designation of critical needs positions applicable to this provision using
35 guidelines that include, but are not limited to: 1) the difficulty recruiting for the positions as reflected by data such as the vacancy
36 rate maintained, the average time to fill, the lack of sufficient qualified applicants, and other objective factors; 2) the difficulty

1 retaining employees in the positions as shown by turnover data; 3) justification by the state agency that the position is critical to the
2 core mission of the agency and directly impacts the health, safety and welfare of the public; and 4) assurances from the state agency
3 that there are sufficient existing funds available to pay for items under this provision.

4 Healthcare employees in approved critical needs positions working on a practicum or required clinical experience towards
5 completion of a healthcare degree may be allowed to complete these requirements at their state agency or another state agency at the
6 discretion of the agency head. This field placement at another state agency may be considered work time for participating employees.

7 State agencies must report to the Department of Administration by August 31st of each year any expenditure under this provision.
8 The Department of Administration shall compile a report of the responses and submit them to the Chairman of the Senate Finance
9 Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee by October 1st of each year.

10 **117.65.** (GP: Governor's Budget Certification) The annual Executive Budget proposed by the Governor must be certified by the
11 Director of the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office or his designee in the same manner as the House Ways and Means and Senate
12 Finance Committee versions of the budget bill are certified.

13 **117.66.** (GP: Sexually Violent Predator Program) ~~After the Department of Mental Health obtains all necessary project approvals,~~
14 ~~the Department of Corrections may utilize inmate labor to perform any portion of the construction of an addition to the Edisto Unit~~
15 ~~at the Broad River Correctional Institution, which houses the Department of Mental Health's Sexually Violent Predator Treatment~~
16 ~~Program, such addition to be used for additional treatment space and staff offices. For purposes of this project, the Department of~~
17 ~~Corrections may exceed the \$350,000 limit on projects for which it may use inmate labor.~~

18 **117.67.** (GP: Voluntary Furlough) Agency heads may institute a voluntary employee furlough program of not more than ninety
19 days per fiscal year. During this voluntary furlough, the state employees shall be entitled to participate in the same state benefits as
20 otherwise available to them except for receiving their salaries. As to those benefits which require employer and employee
21 contributions, the state agencies, institutions and departments will be responsible for making both employer and employee
22 contributions if coverage would otherwise be interrupted; and as to those benefits which require only employee contributions, the
23 employee remains solely responsible for making those contributions. In the event an agency's reduction is due solely to the General
24 Assembly transferring or deleting a program, this provision does not apply.

25 **117.68.** (GP: Governor's Security Detail) The State Law Enforcement Division, the Department of Public Safety, and the
26 Department of Natural Resources shall provide a security detail to the Governor in a manner agreed to by the State Law Enforcement
27 Division, the Department of Public Safety, the Department of Natural Resources, and the Office of Governor. Reimbursement to the
28 State Law Enforcement Division, the Department of Public Safety, and the Department of Natural Resources to offset the cost of the
29 security detail for the Governor shall be made in an amount agreed to by the State Law Enforcement Division, the Department of
30 Public Safety, the Department of Natural Resources, and the Office of Governor from funds appropriated to the Office of Governor
31 for this purpose. Law enforcement officers assigned to security detail for the Governor shall only perform services related to security
32 and shall not provide any unrelated service during the assignment.

33 **117.69.** (GP: Reduction in Force Antidiscrimination) In the event of a reduction in force implemented by a state agency or
34 institution, the state agency or institution must comply with Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 or any other applicable federal
35 or state antidiscrimination laws.

1 **117.70.** (GP: Reduction in Force/Agency Head Furlough) In the event a reduction in force is implemented by a state agency or
2 institution of higher learning, the agency head shall be required to take five days furlough in the current fiscal year. If more than one
3 reduction in force plan is implemented in a fiscal year, the mandatory agency head furlough is only required for the initial plan. The
4 agency head will retain all responsibilities and authority during the furlough. All monies saved from this furlough may be retained
5 by that agency and expended at the discretion of the agency head. During this furlough, the agency head shall be entitled to participate
6 in the same state benefits as otherwise available to them except for receiving their salaries. As to those benefits which require
7 employer and employee contributions, the state agency will be responsible for making both employer and employee contributions if
8 coverage would otherwise be interrupted; and as to those benefits which require only employee contributions, the agency head
9 remains solely responsible for making those contributions.

10 Placement of an agency head on furlough under this provision does not constitute a grievance or appeal under the State Employee
11 Grievance Procedure Act. In the event the reduction for the state agency or institution of higher learning is due solely to the General
12 Assembly transferring or deleting a program, this provision does not apply. Agencies may allocate the agency head's reduction in
13 pay over the balance of the fiscal year for payroll purposes regardless of the pay period within which the furlough occurs. The
14 Department of Administration shall promulgate guidelines and policies, as necessary, to implement the provisions of this proviso.
15 State agencies shall report information regarding furloughs to the Department of Administration.

16 For purposes of this provision, agency head includes the president of a technical college as defined by Section 59-103-5 of the
17 1976 Code.

18 The agency head of the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education shall not be required to take this mandatory
19 furlough based solely on the implementation of a reduction in force plan by a technical college.

20 An agency head shall not be required to take this mandatory furlough based solely on reductions in force implemented as a result
21 of federal budget cuts or reorganization to accomplish organizational efficiencies.

22 **117.71.** (GP: Printed Report Requirements) (A) For Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, state supported institutions of higher learning
23 shall not be required to submit printed reports mandated by Sections 2-47-40, 2-47-50, and 59-103-110 of the 1976 Code, and shall
24 instead only submit the documents electronically.

25 Submission of the plans or reports required by Sections 59-101-350, 59-103-30, 59-103-45(4), and 59-103-160(D) shall be waived
26 for the current fiscal year, except institutions of higher learning must continue to report student pass rates on professional
27 examinations, and data elements otherwise required for the Commission on Higher Education Management Information System.
28 The commission, in consultation with institutions, shall take further action to reduce data reporting burdens as possible.

29 (B) For Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, the Department of Agriculture shall not be required to submit printed reports mandated by
30 Section 46-49-10 of the 1976 Code. The department shall provide these reports electronically and shall use any monetary savings
31 for K5-12 agricultural education programs.

32 (C) For Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, the Department of Health and Human Services shall not be required to provide printed
33 copies of the Medicaid Annual Report required pursuant to Section 44-6-80 of the 1976 Code and shall instead only submit the
34 documents electronically.

35 (D) For Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20, the Department of Transportation shall not be required to submit printed reports or
36 publications mandated by Sections 1-11-58, 2-47-55, and 58-17-1450 of the 1976 Code.

1 The Department of Transportation may combine their Annual Report and Mass Transit Report into their Annual Accountability
2 Report.

3 **117.72.** (GP: IMD Operations) The Department of Health and Human Services shall produce an annual report on
4 Medicaid-funded out-of-home placements and associated expenditures which shall be provided to the Chairman of the Senate
5 Finance Committee, Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and the Governor no later than November first each year.

6 **117.73.** (GP: Fines and Fees Report) In order to promote accountability and transparency, each state agency must provide and
7 release to the public via the agency's website, a report of all aggregate amounts of fines and fees that were charged and collected by
8 that state agency in the prior fiscal year. The report shall include, but not be limited to: (1) the code section, regulation, or proviso
9 that authorized the fines and fees to be charged, collected, or received; (2) the amount of the fine or fee; (3) the amount received by
10 source; (4) the purpose for which the funds were expended by the agency; (5) the amount of funds transferred to the general fund, if
11 applicable, and the authority by which the transfer took place; and (6) the amount of funds transferred to another entity, if applicable,
12 and the authority by which the transfer took place, as well as the name of the entity to which the funds were transferred. The report
13 must be posted online by September first. Additionally, the report must be delivered to the Chairman of the Senate Finance
14 Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee by September first. Funds appropriated to and/or authorized
15 for use by each state agency shall be used to accomplish this directive.

16 **117.74.** (GP: Mandatory Furlough) In a fiscal year in which the general funds appropriated for a state agency are less than the
17 general funds appropriated for that agency in the prior fiscal year, or whenever the General Assembly or the Executive Budget Office
18 implements a midyear across-the-board budget reduction, and agency heads institute a mandatory employee furlough program, in
19 determining which employees must participate in the program, agency heads should give consideration to furloughs for contract
20 employees, post-TERI employees, and TERI employees before other employees. During this mandatory furlough, the state
21 employees shall be entitled to participate in the same state benefits as otherwise available to them except for receiving their salaries.
22 As to those benefits which require employer and employee contributions, the state agencies, institutions, and departments will be
23 responsible for making both employer and employee contributions if coverage would otherwise be interrupted; and as to those
24 benefits which require only employee contributions, the employee remains solely responsible for making those contributions. In the
25 event an agency's reduction is due solely to the General Assembly transferring or deleting a program, this provision does not apply.

26 **117.75.** (GP: Reduction In Force) In a fiscal year in which the general funds appropriated for a state agency are less than the
27 general funds appropriated for that agency in the prior fiscal year, or whenever the General Assembly or the Executive Budget Office
28 implements a midyear across-the-board budget reduction, and agency heads must make reductions in force, agency heads should
29 give consideration to reductions of contract employees, post-TERI employees, and TERI employees before other employees. In the
30 event an agency's reduction is due solely to the General Assembly transferring or deleting a program, this provision does not apply.

31 **117.76.** (GP: Cost Savings When Filling Vacancies Created by Retirements) During the current fiscal year, whenever classified
32 FTEs become vacant because of employee retirements, it is the intent of the General Assembly that state agencies should realize
33 personnel costs savings of at least twenty-five percent in the aggregate when managing these vacant positions. Prior to filling a
34 classified FTE which has become vacant because of a retirement, an agency must review and determine the appropriate salary for
35 the position as well as determine whether the agency can manage without filling the position or by delay in filling the position. Prior

1 to filling the vacant FTE, agencies must follow all laws and regulations concerning posting and competitive solicitation and
2 consideration of applicants. No agency shall enter into any agreement with any employee that violates the terms of this proviso.

3 **117.77.** (GP: Information Technology for Health Care) From the funds appropriated and awarded to the South Carolina
4 Department of Health and Human Services for the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act of 2009,
5 the department shall advance the use of health information technology and health information exchange to improve quality and
6 efficiency of health care and to decrease the costs of health care. In order to facilitate the qualification of Medicare and/or Medicaid
7 eligible providers and hospitals for incentive payments for meaningful health information technology (HIT) use, a health care
8 organization participating in the South Carolina Health Information Exchange (SCHIE) or a Regional Health Information
9 Organization (RHIO) or a hospital system health information exchange (HIE) that participates in SCHIE may release patient records
10 and medical information, including the results of any laboratory or other tests ordered or requested by an authorized health care
11 provider within the scope of his or her license or practice act, to another health information organization that requests the information
12 via a HIE for treatment purposes with or without express written consent or authorization from the patient. A health information
13 organization that receives or views this information from a patient's electronic health record or incorporates this information into the
14 health information organization's electronic medical record for the patient in providing treatment is considered an authorized person
15 for purposes of 42 C.F.R. 493.2 and the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments.

16 **117.78.** (GP: Broadband Spectrum Lease) The General Assembly must approve any exercise of the Middle Band Segment
17 Channel recapture provisions contained in the Educational Broadband Service Spectrum Lease Agreements if the exercise of the
18 recapture provisions would result in a decrease in payments received by the State. The Educational Television Commission assumes
19 management and administration of the lease and receives lease payments directly. The Educational Television Commission shall
20 retain and expend funds received pursuant to the lease for agency operations. The commission shall be authorized to carry forward
21 unexpended funds from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year. In the event of a default by the current lease holder, the
22 Educational Television Commission is authorized to use contingent funds up until such time as a new lease can be negotiated by the
23 State and the Educational Television Commission.

24 **117.79.** (GP: Reduction in Compensation) For the current fiscal year, no state agency or political subdivision of this state may
25 decrease the compensation of an employee, including dismissal, suspension, or demotion, solely because the employee gave sworn
26 testimony regarding alleged wrongdoing to a standing committee, subcommittee of a standing committee, or study committee of the
27 Senate or the House of Representatives. This proviso shall apply regardless of when the alleged wrongdoing occurred.

28 **117.80.** (GP: Deficit Monitoring) It is the responsibility of each state agency, department, and institution to operate within the
29 limits of its authorized appropriations. All agencies, departments, and institutions are to budget, allocate and manage its authorized
30 appropriations in a way to avoid an operating deficit for the fiscal year.

31 If at the end of each quarterly deficit monitoring review by the Executive Budget Office, it is determined by either the Executive
32 Budget Office or a state agency, department, or institution that the likelihood of a deficit for the current fiscal year exists, the state
33 agency shall notify the General Assembly within fifteen days of this determination and shall further request the Executive Budget
34 Office to work with it to develop a plan to avoid the deficit. Within fifteen days of the deficit avoidance plan being completed, the
35 Executive Budget Office shall either request the General Assembly to recognize the deficit if it determines the deficit avoidance plan

1 will not be sufficient to avoid a deficit or notify the General Assembly of how the deficit will be avoided based on the deficit
2 avoidance plan if the Executive Budget Office determines the plan will be sufficient to avoid a deficit.

3 Upon notification from the Executive Budget Office that an agency will run a deficit and requesting that it be recognized, the
4 General Assembly, by joint resolution, may make a finding that the cause of, or likelihood of, a deficit is unavoidable due to factors
5 which are outside the control of the state agency, department, or institution, and recognize the deficit. Any legislation to recognize
6 a deficit must be in a separate joint resolution enacted for the sole purpose of recognizing the deficit of a particular state agency,
7 department, or institution. A deficit may only be recognized by an affirmative vote of each branch of the General Assembly.

8 If the General Assembly recognizes the deficit, then the actual deficit at the close of the fiscal year must be reduced as necessary
9 from surplus revenues or surplus funds available at the close of the fiscal year in which the deficit occurs and from funds available
10 in the General Reserve Fund and the Capital Reserve Fund, as required by the Constitution of this State.

11 Once a deficit has been recognized by the General Assembly, the state agency, department, or institution shall limit travel and
12 conference attendance to that which is deemed essential by the director of the agency, department, or institution. In addition, the
13 General Assembly, when recognizing a deficit may direct that any pay increases and purchases of equipment and vehicles must be
14 approved by the Executive Budget Office.

15 **117.81.** (GP: Commuting Costs) State government employees who use a permanently assigned agency or state-owned vehicle
16 to commute from their permanently assigned work location to and from the employee's home must reimburse the agency in which
17 they are employed for commuting use in accordance with IRS regulations based on guidance from the Office of Comptroller General
18 which must use the Cents per mile Rule, unless they are exempted from such reimbursement by applicable IRS regulations. These
19 permanently assigned vehicles must be clearly marked as a state or agency vehicle through the use of permanent state-government
20 license plates and either state or agency seal decals unless the vehicle is used primarily in undercover operations. This requirement
21 does not apply to a vehicle used by an employee for the purpose of a special travel assignment, for active certified law enforcement
22 officers authorized to carry firearms, execute warrants, and make arrests, for Constitutional Officers, or for Department of
23 Transportation employees on call for emergency maintenance.

24 **117.82.** (GP: Bank Account Transparency and Accountability) Each state agency, except state institutions of higher learning,
25 which has composite reservoir bank accounts or any other accounts containing public funds which are not included in the Comptroller
26 General's South Carolina Enterprise Information System shall prepare a report for each account disclosing every transaction of the
27 account in the prior fiscal year. The report shall be submitted to the State Fiscal Accountability Authority by October first of each
28 fiscal year. The report shall include the name(s) and title(s) of each person authorized to sign checks or make withdrawals from each
29 account, the name and title of each person responsible for reconciling each account, the beginning and year-end balance of funds in
30 each account, and data related to both deposits and expenditures of each account. The report shall include, but not be limited to, the
31 date, amount, and source of each deposit transaction and the date, name of the payee, the transaction amount, and a description of
32 the goods or services purchased for each expenditure transaction. To facilitate review, the State Fiscal Accountability Authority
33 shall prescribe a common format for the report which agencies must use. In order to promote accountability and transparency, a link
34 to the report shall be posted on the Comptroller General's website as well as the agency's homepage.

35 When the State Auditor conducts or contracts for an audit of a state agency, accounts of the agency subject to this proviso must be
36 included as part of the review.

1 If an agency determines that the release of the information required in this provision would be detrimental to the state or the
2 agency, the agency may petition the State Fiscal Accountability Authority to grant the agency an exemption from the reporting
3 requirements for the detrimental portion. The meeting to determine whether an exemption should be granted shall be closed.
4 However, the exemption may only be granted upon a majority vote of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority in a public meeting.

5 **117.83.** (GP: Websites) All agencies, departments, and institutions of state government shall be responsible for providing on its
6 Internet website a link to the Internet website of any agency, other than the individual agency, department, or institution, that posts
7 on its Internet website that agency, department, or institution's monthly state procurement card statements or monthly reports
8 containing all or substantially all the same information contained in the monthly state procurement card statements. The link must
9 be to the specific webpage or section on the website of the agency where the state procurement card information for the state agency,
10 department, or institution can be found. The information posted may not contain the state procurement card number. Any
11 information that is expressly prohibited from public disclosure by federal or state law or regulation must be redacted from any posting
12 required by this section.

13 **117.84.** (GP: Regulations) For the current fiscal year, if a state agency proposes a regulation that levies or increases a fee, fine,
14 or that otherwise generates revenues, the title to the Joint Resolution which proposes the regulation must indicate that a fee, fine, or
15 revenue source is being proposed.

16 **117.85.** (GP: Joint Children's Committee) For the current fiscal year, the Department of Revenue is directed to reduce the rate
17 of interest paid on eligible refunds by one percentage point. Of the revenue resulting from this reduction, \$300,000 shall be
18 transferred to the Senate for the Joint Citizens and Legislative Committee on Children to provide the report, research, and other
19 operating expenses as directed in Section 63-1-50 of the 1976 Code. Funds transferred to the University of South Carolina for the
20 Joint Citizens and Legislative Committee on Children shall be maintained in a separate and distinct account. A detailed report of all
21 expenditures shall be made to the Executive Budget Office within thirty days of the close each fiscal quarter, and the Executive
22 Budget Office shall distribute this information to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House
23 Ways and Means Committee. The remaining revenue resulting from this reduction shall be transferred to the Department of Juvenile
24 Justice to be used for mentoring or alternatives to incarceration programs. Unexpended funds authorized by this provision may be
25 retained and carried forward by the Senate or the Department of Juvenile Justice, respectively, and used for the same purposes. The
26 rate of reduction authorized in this provision shall be in addition to the reduction authorized in Proviso ~~93.5~~ 41.2.

27 **117.86.** (GP: Civil Conspiracy Defense Costs) For the current fiscal year, for any claim that has not reached a judgment, if a
28 state or local government employee or former state or local government employee ("government employee") is personally sued for
29 civil conspiracy based in part upon a personnel or employment action or decision regarding an employee, the court must, prior to
30 trial, make a final determination whether the action or decision giving rise to the suit was made by the government employee within
31 the scope of their official duty. If the court finds that the government employee was acting outside the scope of the employee's
32 official duties, the government shall not thereafter expend any funds to pay or defend the claim. If the court finds the government
33 employee was acting within the scope of their official duties, the employee is immune from suit, liability, and damages with respect
34 to the civil conspiracy claim. The government may only expend funds to defend the claim if the determination is that the employee
35 was acting within the scope of their official duties. Nothing in this proviso prevents an insurance provider from defending and
36 paying, respectively, any claims that the provider has contractually agreed to defend and pay.

1 **117.87.** (GP: Recovery Audits) The State Fiscal Accountability Authority shall contract with one or more firms to conduct
2 recovery audits of payments made by all state agencies to vendors for goods and services. The audits must be designed to detect,
3 document, and recover overpayments and erroneous payments to the vendors and to recommend improved financial and operational
4 practices and procedures. A state agency shall pay, from recovered monies received, the recovery audit firm responsible for obtaining
5 for the agency a reimbursement or payment from a vendor a negotiated fee not to exceed twenty percent of the funds recovered by
6 that firm.

7 Unless otherwise restricted by law, funds recovered, less the cost of recovery, shall be remitted to a special fund subject to
8 appropriation by the General Assembly. Agencies may recover costs that are documented to be directly related to implementation
9 of this provision.

10 Recovery audits apply only to payments made more than one hundred eighty days prior to the date the audit is initiated and shall
11 cover at least three complete fiscal years.

12 All information provided under a contract must be treated as confidential by the recovery audit firm. A violation of this provision
13 shall result in the forfeiture by the firm of all compensation under the contract and to the same sanctions and penalties that would
14 apply to that disclosure.

15 Each state agency shall participate in this recovery audit program and shall cooperate and provide the recovery audit firm with all
16 information necessary for the audit in a timely manner. All vendors that provide goods or services to a state agency shall cooperate
17 with the recovery audit firm in its audit.

18 A state agency shall expend or return to the federal government any federal money that is recovered through a recovery audit
19 conducted under this provision. Payments to the recovery audit firm from the federal share of recovered funds shall be solely from
20 the federal portion as allowed by the federal agency.

21 In addition to performing the recovery audits, the recovery audit firm may conduct an analysis of contracts and pricing structures,
22 as determined and directed by the Executive Director of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority or her or his designee, to identify
23 and recommend future cost-savings and improved state agency financial operations going forward. A state agency shall pay the
24 recovery audit firm responsible for obtaining the agency actual cost-savings a fee as authorized by the contract with the recovery
25 audit firm.

26 The recovery audit firm shall provide reports to the State Fiscal Accountability Authority detailing its findings, the causes for the
27 overpayments and erroneous payments, future cost-savings opportunities and its recommendations for strengthening state operations
28 and/or state contracts to prevent improper payments in the future.

29 For purposes of this proviso, the term “vendor” or “vendors” includes, but is not limited to, sellers, suppliers, service providers,
30 other providers, contractors and third party administrators; the term “overpayments and erroneous payments” includes, but is not
31 limited to, overpayments, duplicate payments, erroneous payments, and rebates, discounts and credits not received; and the term
32 “state agency” or “state agencies” includes all state agencies, boards, commissions, institutions and institutions of higher education.

33 The State Fiscal Accountability Authority shall provide copies, including electronic form copies, of final reports received from a
34 firm under contract to: the Governor; the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee; the Chairman of the House Ways and Means
35 Committee; and the state auditor’s office. Not later than January first of each year, the board shall issue a report to the General
36 Assembly summarizing the contents of all reports received under this provision during the prior fiscal year.

1 **117.88.** (GP: Funds Transfer to ETV) In the current fiscal year funds appropriated in Part IA to the Department of Administration
2 Section 93 for Legislative and Public Affairs Coverage and Emergency Communications Backbone and to the Law Enforcement
3 Training Council in Section 64 for State and Local Training of Law Enforcement, City and County municipal training services must
4 be transferred to the Educational Television Commission (ETV) during July of the current fiscal year for the continuation of services
5 as provided in the prior fiscal year.

6 **117.89.** (GP: Means Test) All agencies providing Healthcare Services are directed to identify standards and criteria for means
7 testing on all programs provided, where allowed by Federal guidelines. Once a consistent criteria has been established within an
8 agency, they shall implement their respective plans. Each agency shall report all criteria and fiscal data to the Chairman of the Senate
9 Finance Committee and to the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee no later than January first.

10 **117.90.** (GP: Agency Reduction Management) The General Assembly encourages state agencies, in the event agencies are
11 assessed a base reduction, to endeavor to realize savings through: (1) payroll management, including, but not limited to, furloughs,
12 reductions in employee compensation, and instituting a hiring freeze; (2) eliminate administrative overhead cost that does not directly
13 impact the agency's mission; and as a final option (3) reductions to programmatic funding.

14 **117.91.** (GP: WIA Service Advertising) For Fiscal Year 2018-19, the Workforce Investment Boards may promote outreach for
15 their services via billboard, bus placard, newspapers, or radio in all workforce investment areas. This outreach may not be limited
16 to e-mail, online, or other internet-based outreach, publicity, or other promotions. Workforce investment boards must adhere to all
17 state procurement policies and procedures when utilizing outreach for the services provided by the Workforce Investment Act.

18 **117.92.** (GP: WIA Training Marketability Evaluation) (A) For Fiscal Year 2018-19, the Department of Employment and
19 Workforce shall submit a report that demonstrates how funds were expended in the prior fiscal year to provide marketable work
20 skills training. The report shall include, but not be limited to the total number of local training recipients, a description of the training
21 area in which each recipient participated, and the number and percentage of participants in each training area that, upon completion
22 of training, have become employed in the field in which they were trained. The report shall be submitted to the Chairman of the
23 Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the Senate Labor, Commerce and Industry Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways
24 and Means Committee, and the Chairman of the House Labor, Commerce and Industry Committee on or before November sixteenth.

25 (B) Also, the report must specifically describe any restructuring or realignment of agency functions, and any changes in staffing
26 levels or service. The report must detail information on employees terminated, hired, re-hired, reassigned, or reclassified by program
27 area and location. Further, the report must describe efforts made by the agency to reassign or retrain employees who were terminated
28 for positions for which the department hired new employees.

29 **117.93.** (GP: Victims Assistance Transfer) The Department of Corrections shall transfer \$20,500 each month to the Office of
30 Attorney General for distribution through the State Victims Assistance Program.

31 **117.94.** (GP: DOC & PPP Potential Consolidation Plan) From the funds appropriated to the Department of Corrections and the
32 Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services, the directors of the departments may collaborate and develop a plan to
33 consolidate the functions of the departments.

34 **117.95.** (GP: USC Greenville Medical School) It is the intent of the General Assembly that during the current fiscal year, no
35 general funds shall be appropriated for the new medical school at the University of South Carolina in Greenville. In addition, no
36 state funds may be transferred from state earmarked or restricted funds held by the University of South Carolina to the medical school

1 except for grants, contributions, contractual payments, and tuition and required fees for students attending the new medical school at
2 the University of South Carolina in Greenville that are specifically designated for the medical school at the University of South
3 Carolina in Greenville.

4 **117.96.** (GP: BabyNet Quarterly Reports) The School for the Deaf and Blind, the Department of Disabilities and Special Needs,
5 the Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of Mental Health and the Department of Social Services shall each
6 provide on a common template, a quarterly report to the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee and the Chairman of
7 Senate Finance outlining all programs provided by them for BabyNet; all federal funds received and expended on BabyNet and all
8 state funds expended on BabyNet. Each entity and agency shall report on its share of the state's ongoing maintenance of effort as
9 defined by the US Department of Education under IDEA Part C.

10 **117.97.** (GP: Single Audit Schedule of Federal Expenditures) To ensure timely completion of the of the Statewide Single Audit,
11 state agencies which do not receive a separate audit of federal expenditures, must submit to the Office of the State Auditor a schedule
12 of federal program expenditures in a format prescribed by the Office of the State Auditor, no later than August fifteenth of each year.

13 **117.98.** (GP: Prohibits Local Government Fund Public Funded Lobbyists) All local governmental entities including, but not
14 limited to, counties, municipalities, and associations are prohibited from using taxpayer funds received from the Local Government
15 Fund to compensate employees for lobbying activities engaged in on behalf of such governmental entity.

16 **117.99.** (GP: School Construction Development Impact Fee Assessment Prohibition) Governmental entities are prohibited from
17 assessing South Carolina Development Impact Fees on the construction of new elementary, middle, or secondary schools. If a
18 governmental entity violates this prohibition it shall have its Aid to Subdivisions Allocation reduced by the amount of the impact
19 fee.

20 **117.100.** (GP: Prohibit Use of State Aircraft for Athletic Recruitment) Institutions of higher learning may use the state aircraft
21 operated by the Division of Aeronautics for the purpose of athletic recruiting, provided that they reimburse the Division of
22 Aeronautics for all flight hours on an at cost basis, using non-general funds.

23 To ensure availability of the aircraft for purposes of economic development, the Department of Commerce shall have first right of
24 refusal in the event of scheduling conflicts with athletic recruiting flights.

25 **117.101.** (GP: Recreational Activities) Two counties that receive an allocation from the Local Government Fund may enter into
26 a Memorandum of Understanding in order to provide recreational activities and projects that benefit the citizens of both counties.

27 **117.102.** (GP: Technology and Remediation) The funds appropriated to the Department of Administration for the Division of
28 Information Security shall be used to develop and implement a statewide information security program. A portion of the nonrecurring
29 funds may be used for enterprise technology and remediation, and distributed to state agencies to address the State's most serious
30 information security vulnerabilities as determined by the Division of Information Security and the Division of Technology
31 Operations. Funds appropriated for Enterprise Technology and Remediation shall be excluded from the Department of
32 Administration's base budget calculation of any across-the-board agency base reduction mandated by the Executive Budget Office
33 or the General Assembly. Unexpended Enterprise Technology and Remediation funds may be carried forward from the prior fiscal
34 year and used for the same purpose.

35 **117.103.** (GP: Data Breach Notification) (A) An agency of this State owning or licensing computerized data or other data that
36 includes personal identifying information shall disclose any breach of the security of the system following discovery or notification

1 of the breach in the security of the data to any resident of this State whose personal identifying information was, or is reasonably
2 believed to have been, acquired by an unauthorized person. In determining whether information has been acquired, or is reasonably
3 believed to have been acquired, by an unauthorized person or a person without valid authorization, the agency may consider the
4 following factors, among others:

5 (1) indications that the information is in the physical possession and control of an unauthorized person, such as a lost or
6 stolen computer or other device containing information;

7 (2) indications that the information has been viewed, downloaded, or copied; or

8 (3) indications that the information was used by an unauthorized person, such as fraudulent accounts opened or instances
9 of reported identity theft.

10 (B) An agency maintaining computerized data or other data that includes personal identifying information that the agency does
11 not own shall notify the owner or licensee of the information of a breach of the security of the data immediately following discovery,
12 if the personal identifying information was, or is reasonably believed to have been, acquired by an unauthorized person.

13 (C) The disclosure requirements of subsections (A) and (B) must be made in the most expedient time possible and without
14 unreasonable delay; however, the notification required by this section may be delayed if a law enforcement agency determines that
15 the notification impedes a criminal investigation and must be made after the law enforcement agency determines that it no longer
16 compromises the investigation. A delay in notification shall not exceed seventy-two hours after discovery, unless the agency requests
17 and the attorney general grants, in writing, additional delays of up to seventy-two hours each upon a determination that such
18 notification impedes a criminal investigation.

19 (D) For purposes of this section:

20 (1) "Agency" means any agency, department, board, commission, committee, or institution of higher learning of the State
21 or a political subdivision of it.

22 (2) "Breach of the security of the system" means unauthorized access to and acquisition of computerized data that was
23 not rendered unusable through encryption, redaction, or other methods that compromise the security, confidentiality, or integrity of
24 personal identifying information maintained by the agency, when illegal use of the information has occurred or is reasonably likely
25 to occur or use of the information creates a material risk of harm to the consumer. Good faith acquisition of personal identifying
26 information by an employee or agent of the agency for the purposes of the agency is not a breach of the security of the system if the
27 personal identifying information is not used or subject to further unauthorized disclosure.

28 (3) "Consumer reporting agency" means any person which, for monetary fees, dues, or on a cooperative nonprofit basis,
29 regularly engages in whole or in part in the practice of assembling or evaluating consumer credit information or other information
30 on consumers for the purpose of furnishing consumer reports to third parties, and which uses any means or facility of interstate
31 commerce for the purpose of preparing or furnishing consumer reports. A list of consumer reporting agencies shall be compiled by
32 the Department of Consumer Affairs and furnished upon request to the agency required to make a notification under this section.

33 (4) "Personal identifying information" means the first name or first initial and last name in combination with and linked
34 to any one or more of the following data elements that relate to a resident of this State, when the data elements are neither encrypted
35 nor redacted or when the data elements are encrypted with an encryption key and the encryption key that has also been acquired:

36 (a) social security number;

- 1 (b) driver's license number or state identification card number issued instead of a driver's license;
2 (c) financial account number, or credit card or debit card number in combination with any required security code,
3 access code, or password that would permit access to a resident's financial account; or
4 (d) other numbers or information which may be used to access a person's financial accounts or numbers or
5 information issued by a governmental or regulatory entity that uniquely will identify an individual.

6 The term does not include information that is lawfully obtained from publicly available information, or from federal, state, or local
7 government records lawfully made available to the general public.

8 (E) The notice required by this section may be provided by:

- 9 (1) written notice;
10 (2) electronic notice, if the agency's primary method of communication with the individual is by electronic means, the
11 person to whom notice is required has expressly consented to receiving said notice in electronic form, or is consistent with the
12 provisions regarding electronic records and signatures set forth in Section 7001 of Title 15 USC and Chapter 6, Title 26 of the 1976
13 Code;
14 (3) telephonic notice; or
15 (4) substitute notice, if the agency demonstrates that the cost of providing notice exceeds two hundred fifty thousand
16 dollars or that the affected class of subject persons to be notified exceeds five hundred thousand or the agency has insufficient contact
17 information. Substitute notice consists of:
18 (a) e-mail notice when the agency has an e-mail address for the subject persons;
19 (b) conspicuous posting of the notice on the agency's website page, if the agency maintains one; or
20 (c) notification to major statewide media.

21 Regardless of the method by which notice is provided, such notice shall include contact information for the agency making the
22 notification and a description of the categories of information that were, or are reasonably believed to have been, acquired by a person
23 without valid authorization, including specification of which of the elements of personal information and private information were,
24 or are reasonably believed to have been, so acquired.

25 (F) A resident of this State who is injured by a violation of this section, in addition to and cumulative of all other rights and
26 remedies available at law, may:

- 27 (1) institute a civil action to recover damages;
28 (2) seek an injunction to enforce compliance; and
29 (3) recover attorney's fees and court costs, if successful.

30 (G) An agency that knowingly and willfully violates this section is subject to an administrative fine up to one thousand dollars
31 for each resident whose information was accessible by reason of the breach, the amount to be decided by the Department of Consumer
32 Affairs.

33 (H) If the agency provides notice to more than one thousand persons at one time pursuant to this section, the agency shall notify,
34 without unreasonable delay, the Consumer Protection Division of the Department of Consumer Affairs and all consumer reporting
35 agencies that compile and maintain files on a nationwide basis, as defined in 15 USC Section 1681a(p), of the timing, distribution,
36 and content of the notice.

1 **117.104.** (GP: State Ports Authority Property) If the State Ports Authority has not completed the sale of its real property on Daniel
2 Island, except for the dredge disposal cells that are needed in connection with the construction of the North Charleston terminal on
3 the Charleston Naval Complex and for harbor deepening and for channel and berth maintenance, by June 30, ~~2019~~ 2020, the authority
4 must transfer the property to the Department of Administration. The authority shall sell the real property under terms and conditions
5 it considers most advantageous to the authority and the State of South Carolina.

6 **117.105** (GP: Remittance of Court Fee and Fine Money) County and city treasurers are required to remit to the State Treasurer
7 set percentages of revenues generated by assessments imposed by 14-1-206(A), 14-1-207(A), 14-1-208(A). This remittance is
8 required on a monthly basis by the 15th day of each month.

9 Should a county and/or city treasurer fail to make the required remittance, the SC Criminal Justice Academy shall cease providing
10 services to all law enforcement officers of all law enforcement agencies encompassed within the political subdivision if they have
11 failed to make remittance for two consecutive months in a fiscal year. The finance director shall certify by July first, under oath, that
12 the county and/or city has remitted all funds or the SC Criminal Justice Academy shall withhold services until such time as remittance
13 is made.

14 **117.106.** (GP: Detailed Expenditure/Revenue Reports PCC/CID) The Prosecution Coordination Commission and the Commission
15 on Indigent Defense shall provide detailed expenditure reports and associated revenue streams for each individual circuit, revenue
16 streams shall include, but not be limited to, state funds, local funds, Federal funds, and also nongovernmental sources of funds, by
17 no later than September first, on the prior fiscal year, to the appropriate commission. The commissions shall then provide the
18 Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee and Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee with a combined report by
19 September fifteenth of the current fiscal year.

20 **117.107.** (GP: South Carolina Welcome Centers) The Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism and the Department of
21 Transportation shall maintain a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that provides that the Department of Parks, Recreation and
22 Tourism shall control operations of all South Carolina Welcome Centers. The MOU shall include replacement, renovation and
23 maintenance of the facilities, daily operations, and grounds maintenance and upkeep and shall clearly define responsibility for
24 additional portions of Welcome Centers to include paving and sidewalks. The Department of Transportation shall transfer to the
25 Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism the amount of \$3,563,560 less any state funds appropriated by the General Assembly
26 for the same purpose. The Department of Parks, Recreation and Tourism assumes responsibility for this amount and the timing of
27 the transfer of these funds shall be defined as part of the MOU. The funds transferred to the Department of Parks, Recreation and
28 Tourism shall be placed in a separate and distinct fund and these funds shall be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the
29 current fiscal year and be expended for the same purposes.

30 **117.108.** (GP: Continuation of Teen Pregnancy Prevention Project Accountability) Qualifying organizations applying for General
31 Funds provided as a special item in this act and titled Continuation of Teen Pregnancy Prevention must include in its application a
32 proposed annual budget and agreement to provide quarterly reports to the grantor state agency detailing the expenditure of funds and
33 the project's accomplishments which shall include:

34 (1) Financial:

35 (a) Personnel costs, including employer contributions, by position for each of the following areas: administration,
36 training, and education, as well as for other positions as identified;

- 1 (b) Operational costs identified in the application;
2 (c) One-time costs over \$500 for such items as supplies;
3 Administration costs may not exceed ten percent of the total project budget. For purposes of this provision, “Administration”
4 is defined as expenses other than educational.
5 (2) Description of program and curriculum to be used;
6 (3) Description of training;
7 (4) Schedule and brief description of project activities for each quarter;
8 (5) Participation reports on the following:
9 (a) Number of persons who participated;
10 (b) Total number of hours provided;
11 (c) Number of train the trainer events;
12 (d) Other data regarding the activities of the project;
13 (6) Description of the project evaluation to be used;
14 (7) Copy of latest completed independent financial audit and agency’s response to any audit exceptions;
15 (8) Qualifications of project personnel;
16 (9) Best Practices to be used; and
17 (10) Evidence Based Curriculum.

18 An organization awarded a grant must provide these quarterly reports to the grantor state agency within fifteen days of the end of
19 each quarter. Grantees failing to submit reports with thirty days of the end of each quarter shall have their grant terminated.

20 Unexpended funds for Continuation of Teen Pregnancy Prevention projects under the Department of Social Services or under the
21 Department of Health and Environmental Control shall be carried forward for the purpose of fulfilling the department’s contractual
22 agreement.

23 **117.109.** (GP: Charleston & Dorchester County Sound Barriers) From the funds authorized to the Department of Transportation,
24 the department shall take the appropriate measures to allow the counties of Charleston and Dorchester to construct sound barriers in
25 the department’s easements along Interstate 26 within the borders of Charleston County and along Dorchester Road within Dorchester
26 County, provided, no funds appropriated or authorized in Part IA to the Department of Transportation, any other section of this act,
27 any Federal Funds, unless otherwise agreed to by the local Metropolitan Planning Organization or Council or Governments for use
28 of a portion of their annual federal allocation, or any Other Funds, shall be used in the construction of the sound barriers, and only
29 local dollars shall be used in the construction of sound barriers. The sound barriers must meet the state and federal noise abatement
30 guidelines and must be constructed to meet any and all state and federal regulations. Consistent with the requirements of Section
31 57-25-190 (E) of the 1976 Code, or regulations adopted pursuant thereto, including construction by a local government in a state
32 right of way, the owner of a legally erected and maintained billboard shall have the option to relocate such billboard sign to another
33 location as close as practicable to the sign being relocated or adjust the height or angle of the billboard sign to a height or angle that
34 restores the visibility of the billboard sign to the same or comparable visibility as before construction of a sound barrier. Costs for
35 re-location or alteration of a billboard due to sound barrier installation by a local government in a state right of way shall be paid by

1 the local government. The provisions of Section 39-14-10 et seq. of the 1976 Code will apply regarding any compensation to be
2 paid by local governments for billboard signs which cannot be relocated or altered.

3 **117.110.** (GP: Information Technology and Information Security Plans) (A) By August first of the current fiscal year, all state
4 agencies must submit an information technology plan and an information security plan to the Department of Administration. State
5 agencies must submit updates to their plans if there are changes following initial submission. Changes that would necessitate an
6 updated plan include, but are not limited to, changes in response to technological advancements, changes in legislation, regulation
7 or compliance requirements, newly identified funding sources, or new issues relating to information technology management or
8 business requirements.

9 The information technology plans required by this section shall be in the form and level of detail required by the department
10 and shall include at least: (1) the information technology objectives of the state agency; (2) an inventory of the state agency's
11 information technology; (3) any performance measures used by the state agency for implementing its information technology
12 objectives; (4) how the state agency's development of information technology coordinates with other governmental entities; (5) the
13 state agency's budget plans for information technology for the coming fiscal year which must include: (a) all fixed, recurring
14 information technology costs, regardless of funding sources; (b) new information technology expenditures for services, hardware
15 upgrades/replacements and software purchases, regardless of funding sources; (c) new information technology projects, regardless
16 of funding sources; and (d) FTE counts, temporary personnel counts, and salary information and position descriptions for all
17 information technology personnel, regardless of funding sources; and (6) the state agency's need for appropriations for information
18 technology.

19 The information security plans required by this section shall be in the form and level of detail required by the division and shall
20 include at least: (1) the information security objectives of the state agency; (2) an inventory of the state agency's information security
21 technology; (3) a profile of the state agency's compliance with security policies established by the division; (4) a profile of the state
22 agency's sensitive data and a description of applicable state and federal privacy requirements; (5) a profile of risk management and
23 other measures taken by the state agency to protect its data from unauthorized access and disclosure; (6) the state agency's budget
24 plans for information security for the coming fiscal year which must include: (a) all fixed, recurring information security technology
25 costs, regardless of funding sources; (b) new information security expenditures for services hardware upgrades/replacements and
26 software purchases, regardless of funding sources; (c) new information security projects, regardless of funding sources; and (d) FTE
27 counts, temporary personnel counts, and salary information and position descriptions for all information security personnel,
28 regardless of funding sources; and (7) the state agency's need for appropriations for information security.

29 (B) The director of the Department of Administration should seek advice from private and public sector resources on the efficient
30 use of information technology and best practices.

31 (C) The Judicial Department, Legislative Department, public institutions of higher learning, technical colleges, political
32 subdivisions and quasi-governmental bodies are specifically exempt from the requirements as provided in this proviso.

33 **117.111.** (GP: SCOIS Transfer) For the current fiscal year, the South Carolina Occupational Information System, its authority
34 and responsibilities, to include the collections of user fees that must be used to operate the program, shall continue to be transferred
35 from the Department of Employment and Workforce to the Department of Education.

1 **117.112.** (GP: Employee Compensation) The amounts appropriated to F300-Statewide Employee Benefits for Employee Pay
2 Increases must be allocated by the Department of Administration, Executive Budget Office to the various state agencies to provide
3 for employee pay increases in accordance with the following plan:

4 (1) With respect to classified and non-judge judicial classified employees, effective on the first pay date that occurs on or after
5 July first of the current fiscal year, the compensation of all classified employees shall be increased by ~~zero~~ two percent, *except that*
6 *employees of institutions of higher education and technical colleges that earn a base salary of \$100,000 or more shall not be eligible*
7 *to receive the increase in compensation.*

8 (2) With respect to unclassified and non-judge judicial unclassified employees or unclassified executive compensation system
9 employees not elsewhere covered in this act, effective on the first pay date that occurs on or after July first of the current fiscal year
10 the compensation of all unclassified employees shall be increased by ~~zero~~ two percent, *except that employees of institutions of higher*
11 *education and technical colleges that earn a base salary of \$100,000 or more shall not be eligible to receive the increase in*
12 *compensation.* Any employee subject to the provisions of this paragraph shall not be eligible for compensation increases provided
13 in paragraphs 1, 3, 4, 5, or 6.

14 (3) Effective on the first pay date that occurs on or after July first of the current fiscal year, agency heads not covered by the
15 Agency Head Salary Commission, shall receive an annualized base pay increase of ~~zero~~ two percent.

16 (4) With respect to local health care providers compensation increases shall be ~~zero~~ two percent effective on the first pay date
17 that occurs on or after July first of the current fiscal year. With respect to Area Agencies on Aging funded by the ~~Lieutenant~~
18 ~~Governor's Office~~ *Department* on Aging, compensation shall be increased by ~~zero~~ two percent effective on the first pay date that
19 occurs on or after July first of the current fiscal year. With respect to local councils on aging or local providers of services funded
20 by the ~~Lieutenant Governor's Office~~ *Department* on Aging through Area Agencies on Aging, no pay increases will be allowed.
21 School Bus Driver salary and fringe funding to school districts shall be increased by ~~zero~~ two percent.

22 (5) Effective on the first pay date that occurs on or after July first of the current fiscal year, the Chief Justice and other judicial
23 officers shall receive an annualized base pay increase of ~~zero~~ two percent.

24 (6) Effective on the first pay date that occurs on or after July first of the current fiscal year, county auditors and county
25 treasurers shall receive an annualized base pay increase of ~~zero~~ two percent.

26 (7) For Fiscal Year ~~2016-17~~ 2019-20, the Executive Budget Office is directed to review Executive Branch agencies to
27 determine whether their budgets warrant an other fund authorization increase due to the ~~zero~~ two percent compensation increase for
28 all full-time employees. If so warranted, the Executive Budget Office shall work with the Office of the Comptroller General to
29 increase such authorization for the affected agencies.

30 The Department of Administration shall allocate associated compensation increases for retirement employer contributions based
31 on the retirement rate of the retirement system in which individual employees participate.

32 The Executive Director of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority is authorized to use excess appropriations for the current fiscal
33 year designated for statewide employer contributions for other statewide purposes. At the discretion of the Executive Director of the
34 State Fiscal Accountability Authority, such action may be considered a permanent transfer into the receiving agency's base budget.

35 Funds appropriated in Part IA, F300, Section 106, Statewide Employee Benefits may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year
36 into the current fiscal year.

1 **117.113.** (GP: Child Fatality Review) The agencies specified shall implement the following recommendations contained in the
2 Legislative Audit Council's October 2014 report "A Review of Child Welfare Services at the Department of Social Services":

3 (1) Annually, the Department of Social Services and the State Child Fatality Advisory Committee shall jointly report statistics
4 on child deaths from maltreatment and the number of those with prior Department of Social Services involvement;

5 (2) The Department of Social Services and the State Child Fatality Advisory Committee shall use their child fatality review
6 findings to make recommendations to revise Department of Social Services policy or practice where appropriate;

7 (3) The Department of Social Services shall ensure that it includes child fatality statistics from all relevant sources when
8 reporting to the National Child Abuse and Neglect Data System. These sources shall include, but not be limited to, law enforcement
9 agencies and the Department of Health and Environmental Control;

10 (4) The State Law Enforcement Division and the Department of Health and Environmental Control shall establish a system
11 for cross checking child fatalities in the state to ensure that all fatalities are being properly reported to the State Law Enforcement
12 Division;

13 (5) The State Law Enforcement Division and the State Child Fatality Advisory Committee shall review the training provided
14 to coroners on the reporting of child fatalities to ensure that information is provided on which fatalities are to be reported and what
15 procedure is to be followed for reporting the fatalities;

16 (6) The Department of Public Safety shall report statistics on all child fatalities to the State Child Fatality Advisory Committee;
17 and

18 (7) The State Child Fatality Advisory Committee shall evaluate the feasibility of adopting the Child Death Review Case
19 Reporting System developed by the National Center for the Review and Prevention of Child Deaths and shall submit a report on their
20 findings to the General Assembly by December 1, 2016.

21 Pursuant to Section 63-11-1930 (E) of the 1976 Code, the director of each agency specified in this provision shall ensure that
22 sufficient staff and administrative support is provided to the State Child Fatality Advisory Committee to accomplish the requirements
23 of this provision.

24 **117.114.** (GP: Refugee Resettlement Program) No state funds shall be expended to assist in the United States Refugee
25 Resettlement Program unless the county council of the county where the resettlement is to occur approves the relocation.

26 **117.115.** RESERVED

27 **117.116.** (GP: Family Planning Funds) (A) Notwithstanding any other law, federal family planning funds and state family
28 planning funds shall be awarded to eligible individuals, organizations, or entities applying to be family planning contractors in the
29 following order of descending priority:

30 (1) public entities that provide family planning services, including state, county, and local community health clinics and
31 federally qualified health centers;

32 (2) nonpublic entities that provide comprehensive primary and preventive health services, as described in 42 U.S.C.
33 254b(b)(1)(A), in addition to family planning services; and

34 (3) nonpublic entities that provide family planning services but do not provide comprehensive primary and preventive
35 health services.

1 (B) Family planning funds must be distributed in compliance with federal law to ensure distribution in a manner that does not
2 severely limit or eliminate access to family planning services in any region of the State.

3 (C) Any department, agency, board, commission, office, or other instrumentality of the State that distributes family planning
4 funds shall submit an annual report to the General Assembly listing any family planning contractors that fall under item (A)(3), and
5 the amount of federal or state family planning funds they received. The report shall provide a detailed explanation of how it was
6 determined that there were an insufficient number of eligible individuals, organizations, or entities in items (A)(1) and (A)(2) to
7 prevent a significant reduction in family planning services in each region of the State where (A)(3) contractors are located.

8 **117.117.** (GP: Statewide Strategic Information Technology Plan Implementation) To ensure the uniform implementation of the
9 Statewide Strategic Information Technology Plan developed pursuant to the Restructuring Act of 2014 and designed to improve the
10 State's ability to provide reliable, secure, cost-efficient, and innovative information technology services and infrastructure, state
11 agencies are directed as follows:

12 (1) Agencies shall use the shared services from the Department of Administration, Division of Technology Operations as those
13 services become available and in a sequence to be determined by the division. Agencies shall coordinate with the division to
14 accomplish a strategic transition to the shared services environment. Shared services include, but are not limited to, mainframe
15 services, application hosting, servers, storage, network services, desktop services, and disaster recovery services. The State Chief
16 Information Officer may grant an exception, to be revisited on a periodic basis, if the division determines that it cannot immediately
17 satisfy the technical or security capabilities required to support the agency in question;

18 (2) With regard to information technology governance, standards, and enterprise architecture, agencies shall comply with the
19 rules, standards, plans, policies, and directives of the Division of Technology Operations;

20 (3) With regard to information technology governance, standards, and enterprise architecture, agencies shall participate and
21 comply with decisions determined by the information technology governance advisory groups.

22 (4) With regard to the annual Appropriations Act budget submission, agencies shall submit all information technology budget
23 requests to the Executive Budget Office and the Division of Technology Operations. The Executive Budget Office and the Division
24 of Technology Operations shall jointly review the budget requests and recommend for funding consideration only those proposals
25 that fit into the overall Statewide Strategic Information Technology Plan.

26 (5) With the consultation and approval of the Division of Technology Operations, agencies must create an information
27 technology plan for purchases that exceed \$50,000 to ensure compliance with the Statewide Strategic Information Technology Plan
28 and the standards defined by the division.

29 (6) Agencies shall develop a three-year strategic plan for information technology, updated annually, for the Division of
30 Technology Operations, that shall be approved by the Chief Information Officer, that sets forth: (a) operational and project priorities;
31 (b) budget summaries; (c) planned projects and procurements; (d) staffing plans; (e) security initiatives; and (f) risks, issues, and
32 concerns with the agency's information technology.

33 (7) Agencies shall enter information technology costs into the South Carolina Enterprise Information System (SCEIS) as
34 directed by the Division of Technology Operations and SCEIS.

35 The Department of Administration shall provide a report to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of
36 the House Ways and Means Committee regarding agency compliance no later than December thirty-first of each calendar year.

1 The Legislative Branch, the Judicial Branch, public institutions of higher learning, technical colleges, political subdivisions and
2 quasi-governmental bodies are specifically exempt from the requirements as provided in this provision.

3 **117.118.** (GP: Sentencing Reform Oversight Committee Reauthorization) There is established for the current fiscal year the South
4 Carolina Sentencing Reform Oversight Committee. The oversight committee shall be composed of eleven members, two of whom
5 shall be members of the Senate, both appointed by the Chair of the Senate Judiciary Committee and one being the Chair of the Senate
6 Judiciary Committee or his designee; two of whom shall be members of the Senate, one appointed by the President Pro Tempore of
7 the Senate and one appointed by the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee; two of whom shall be members of the House of
8 Representatives, both appointed by the Chair of the House Judiciary Committee and one being the Chair of the House Judiciary
9 Committee or his designee; two of whom shall be members of the House of Representatives, one appointed by the Speaker of the
10 House and one appointed by the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee; one of whom shall be appointed by the Chair
11 of the Senate Judiciary Committee from the general public at large; one of whom shall be appointed by the Chair of the House
12 Judiciary Committee from the general public at large; and one of whom shall be appointed by the Governor. Provided, however,
13 that in making appointments to the oversight committee, race, gender, and other demographic factors should be considered to assure
14 nondiscrimination, inclusion, and representation to the greatest extent of all segments of the population of the State. The members
15 of the general public appointed by the chairs of the House and Senate Judiciary Committees must be representative of all citizens of
16 this State and must not be members of the General Assembly.

17 The oversight committee must meet as soon as practicable after appointment and organize itself by electing one of its members as
18 chair and such other officers as the oversight committee may consider necessary. Thereafter, the oversight committee must meet at
19 the call of the chair or by a majority of the members. A quorum consists of seven members.

20 The oversight committee shall have the following powers and duties:

21 (1) to review the implementation of the recommendations made in the Sentencing Reform Commission report of February
22 2010, including, but not limited to:

23 (a) the plan required from the Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services on the parole board training and other
24 goals identified in Section 24-21-10;

25 (b) the report from the Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services on its goals and the development of
26 assessment tools consistent with evidence-based practices;

27 (c) the report from the Office of Pretrial Intervention Coordinator in the Commission on Prosecution Coordination on
28 diversion programs required by the provisions of Article 11, Chapter 22, Title 17; and

29 (d) the report from the Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services on:

30 (i) the number and percentage of individuals placed on administrative sanctions and the number and percentage of
31 individuals who have earned compliance credits; and

32 (ii) the number and percentage of probationers and parolees whose supervision has been revoked for violations of
33 conditions or for convictions of new offenses;

34 (2) to request data similar to the information contained in the report required by Section 17-22-1120 from private organizations
35 for which programs are operated through a court and that divert individuals from prosecution, incarceration, or confinement, such as

1 diversion from incarceration for failure to pay child support, and for which programs are sanctioned by, coordinated with, or funded
2 by federal, state, or local governmental agencies;

3 (3) (a) to calculate:

4 (i) any state expenditures that have been avoided by reductions in the revocation rate as calculated by the Department
5 of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services and reported under Sections 24-21-450 and 24-21-680; and

6 (ii) any state expenditures that have been avoided by reductions in the new felony offense conviction rate as
7 calculated by the Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services and reported under Sections 24-21-450 and 24-21-680;

8 (b) to develop rules and regulations for calculating the savings in item (3)(a), which shall account at a minimum for the
9 variable costs averted, such as food and medical expenses, and also to consider fixed expenditures that are avoided if larger numbers
10 of potential inmates are avoided;

11 (c) on or before December first, to report the calculations made pursuant to item (3)(a) to the President of the Senate, the
12 Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Chief Justice of the South Carolina Supreme Court, and the Governor. The report also
13 shall recommend whether or not to appropriate up to thirty-five percent of any state expenditures that are avoided as calculated in
14 item (3)(a) to the Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services. With respect to the recommended appropriations in this item
15 (c), none of the calculated savings shall be recommended for appropriation for that fiscal year if there is an increase in the percentage
16 of individuals supervised by the Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services who are convicted of a new felony offense as
17 calculated in subitem (3)(a)(ii);

18 (d) any funds appropriated during this fiscal year pursuant to the recommendations in item (c) shall be used to supplement,
19 not replace, any other state appropriations to the Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services;

20 (e) funds received through appropriations pursuant to this item shall be used by the Department of Probation, Parole and
21 Pardon Services for the following purposes:

22 (i) implementation of evidence-based practices;

23 (ii) increasing the availability of risk reduction programs and interventions, including substance abuse treatment
24 programs, for supervised individuals; or

25 (iii) grants to nonprofit victim services organizations to partner with the Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon
26 Services and courts to assist victims and increase the amount of restitution collected from offenders;

27 (4) to submit to the General Assembly, on an annual basis, the oversight committee's evaluation of the implementation of the
28 recommendations of the Sentencing Reform Commission report of February 2010;

29 (5) to make reports and recommendations to the General Assembly on matters relating to the powers and duties set forth in
30 this section, including recommendations on transfers of funding based on the success or failure of implementation of the
31 recommendations; and

32 (6) to undertake such additional studies or evaluations as the oversight committee considers necessary to provide sentencing
33 reform information and analysis.

34 The oversight committee members are entitled to such mileage, subsistence, and per diem as authorized by law for members of
35 boards, committees, and commissions while in the performance of the duties for which appointed. These expenses shall be paid

1 from the general fund of the State on warrants duly signed by the chair of the oversight committee and payable by the authorities
2 from which a member is appointed.

3 The oversight committee is encouraged to apply for and may expend grants, gifts, or federal funds it receives from other sources
4 to carry out its duties and responsibilities.

5 The oversight committee must use clerical and professional employees of the General Assembly for its staff, who must be made
6 available to the oversight committee.

7 The oversight committee may employ or retain other professional staff, upon the determination of the necessity for other staff by
8 the oversight committee.

9 The oversight committee may employ consultants to assist in the evaluations and, when necessary, the implementation of the
10 recommendations of the Sentencing Reform Commission report of February 2010.

11 **117.119.** (GP: State Employee Leave Donation) In the event of a medical emergency, a state employee may make a written
12 request to the employing agency that a specified number of hours of his accrued annual and/or sick leave be transferred from his
13 annual and/or sick leave account to a specific leave recipient rather than to a leave pool account, subject to the approval of the agency
14 director. An employee with less than fifteen days in his sick leave account may not transfer any sick leave to the recipient, and an
15 employee with more than fifteen days in his sick leave account may transfer sick leave to the recipient if he retains a minimum of
16 fifteen days in his own sick leave account. Once leave of an employee has been transferred to the recipient, it may not be restored
17 or returned to the leave donor. For purposes of this provision, a medical emergency is defined under IRS Revenue Ruling 90-29 as
18 a medical condition of the employee or a family member that will require the prolonged absence of the employee from duty and will
19 result in a substantial loss of income to the employee because the employee will have exhausted all paid leave available apart from
20 the leave-sharing plan.

21 **117.120.** (GP: State Engineer) The State Engineer is an office located within the State Fiscal Accountability Authority, all
22 references to the contrary notwithstanding.

23 **117.121.** (GP: Retail Facilities Revitalization Act Repeal Suspension) The repeal of Chapter 34 of Title 6 of the 1976 Code as
24 specified in Act 285 of 2006 as to sites for which written notification of election of mode of credit has been provided to the
25 Department of Revenue prior to July 1, 2016 and for which a building permit has been issued prior to July 1, 2016, is suspended for
26 Fiscal Year 2018-19.

27 **117.122.** RESERVED

28 **117.123.** RESERVED

29 **117.124.** (GP: Funds Exempt from Budget Reduction Calculations) The funds designated in F310, Section 107, Capital Reserve
30 Fund, funds designated in V040, Section 112, Debt service, funds designated in X220, Section 113, Aid to Subdivisions - State
31 Treasurer for the Local Government Fund, and funds designated in X500, Section 115, Tax Relief Trust Fund shall be excluded from
32 the calculation of any across-the-board base reduction mandated by the Department of Administration, Executive Budget Office or
33 the General Assembly and shall not be subject to any such reduction.

34 **117.125.** (GP: BabyNet) From funds available in the current fiscal year for budgetary analysis and oversight, the Executive
35 Budget Office shall conduct an inventory of all BabyNet-related spending, which shall be submitted to the Governor, the Chairman
36 of the Senate Finance Committee, and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee no later than July 15, ~~2018~~ 2019.

1 All affected agencies shall support the Executive Budget Office in this effort by providing information upon request, so that the first
2 recommendation of the Legislative Audit Council's 2011 report on BabyNet may be implemented.

3 **117.126.** (GP: South Carolina Telemedicine Network) From the funds appropriated to the Medical University of South Carolina
4 for the MUSC Hospital Authority for Telemedicine and the funds appropriated and authorized for the Department of Health and
5 Human Services, the agencies must continue the development of the South Carolina Statewide Telemedicine Network. The South
6 Carolina Telehealth Alliance shall submit a proposal to the MUSC Hospital Authority and the Department of Health and Human
7 Services to determine which hospitals, clinics, schools or other entities are best suited for Telemedicine partnerships.

8 (A) The Department of Health and Human Services shall develop or continue a program to leverage the use of teaching hospitals
9 to provide rural physician coverage by expanding the use of Telemedicine, to include new applications such as School Based
10 Telehealth, and Tele-ICU. The department shall also amend its policy related to reimbursement for telemedicine to add Act 301
11 Behavioral Health Centers as a referring site for covered telemedicine services.

12 (B) During the current fiscal year the Department of Health and Human Services shall contract with the MUSC Hospital Authority
13 in the amount of \$5,000,000 to lead the development and operation of a statewide, open access South Carolina Telemedicine
14 Network. The MUSC Hospital Authority shall contract with each Regional Support Hub to ensure funding and support of strategic
15 plans submitted by the Regional Support Hubs and approved by both the MUSC Hospital Authority and the Department of Health
16 and Human Services. Institutions and other entities participating in the network must be afforded the opportunity to meaningfully
17 participate in the development of any annual refining to the initiative's strategic plan. Working with the department, the MUSC
18 Hospital Authority shall collaborate with Palmetto Care Connections to pursue this goal. No less than \$1,000,000 of these funds
19 shall be allocated toward support of Palmetto Care Connections and other hospitals in South Carolina. The MUSC Hospital Authority
20 must provide the department with quarterly reports regarding the funds allocation and progress of telemedicine transformation efforts
21 and networks. These reports must include an itemization of the ultimate recipients of these funds, whether vendors, grantees, specific
22 participating institutions, or the Medical University of South Carolina, and must distinguish between funds allocation to the university
23 as a participating institution as opposed to those retained and used by the university in its capacity as the administering entity for the
24 network.

25 (C) ~~The MUSC Hospital Authority shall publish a summary report to the Governor and the General Assembly indicating the~~
26 ~~overall progress of the state's telemedicine transformation by April 1, 2019. The Department of Health and Human Services and the~~
27 ~~Public Employee Benefit Authority shall each review federal additions to telehealth coverage established under the Bipartisan~~
28 ~~Budget Act of 2018, the SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act, and other recent federal legislation and/or regulation. No~~
29 ~~later than October 1, 2019, each agency shall submit a report to the Governor, the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and~~
30 ~~the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee on how they intend to broaden their service-based coverage to align with~~
31 ~~these federal changes and to improve the sustainability of telehealth services.~~

32 **117.127.** (GP: Distribution Facility) The State Ports Authority shall be considered a distribution facility for the purpose of sales
33 tax exemptions associated with the purchase of equipment and construction materials.

34 **117.128.** (GP: Catastrophic Weather Event) (A) Any improvements made to real property or personal property used as a
35 residence, such as a mobile home or manufactured housing unit, damaged during the catastrophic weather event in October 2015 or
36 , Hurricane Matthew of 2016, or Hurricane Florence of 2018, after the event and before June 30, ~~2019~~ 2020, is not considered an

1 improvement and does not require a re-appraisal. This provision only applies if as a result of the catastrophic weather event, the
2 improvements made to the property were funded by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development Block
3 Grant - Disaster Recovery program. This provision also applies if, at the discretion of the county and using qualifications determined
4 by the county, the improvements were made with the assistance of a volunteer organization active in disaster, or a similar volunteer
5 organization.

6 (B) During the current fiscal year, the property tax value of an eligible property shall remain the same unless an assessable transfer
7 of interest occurs. No refund is allowed on account of values adjusted as provided in this provision.

8 **117.129.** (GP: Study Committee on Electronic Recording of Custodial Interrogations) From the funds appropriated to and/or
9 authorized for the Judicial Department, Court Administration Program, the department shall establish a study committee to study
10 statewide implementation of electronic recording of custodial interrogations in their entirety. The committee shall review current
11 written policies, practices and equipment in place at state and local law enforcement agencies for electronically recording custodial
12 interrogations; guidelines for a state model policy on electronically recording custodial interrogations in their entirety, including
13 definition of the term custodial interrogations, the crime categories for which custodial interrogations shall be recorded, exigent
14 circumstances that would exempt an officer from recording an interrogation in its entirety; recommendations for how law
15 enforcement agencies can obtain or access audiovisual or audio-only equipment to record custodial interrogations, anticipating the
16 differences in resources available to large and small agencies; and remedies that the court may consider if a custodial interrogation
17 is not recorded.

18 The study committee shall be comprised of the following:

- 19 (1) Two members of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate;
- 20 (2) Two members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- 21 (3) A representative appointed by the Attorney General;
- 22 (4) Chief of the State Law Enforcement Division;
- 23 (5) A representative of the South Carolina Sheriffs' Association;
- 24 (6) A representative from the South Carolina Commission on Prosecution Coordination;
- 25 (7) A representative of the South Carolina Association for Justice;
- 26 (8) A representative of the South Carolina Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers, and
- 27 (9) A representative of the Commission on Indigent Defense.

28 Staff support shall be provided by Court Administration. The committee shall submit a written report of its findings and
29 recommendations to the House of Representatives, the Senate and the Governor's Office no later than March 1, 2018.

30 **117.130.** (GP: Prohibited Funding for Aborted Fetus Research) Notwithstanding any other provision of this act, general funds
31 appropriated in this act may not be used to purchase fetal tissue obtained from an abortion to perform scientific or laboratory research
32 or other kinds of investigation conducted on fetal tissue.

33 **117.131.** (GP: SCRS & PORS Trust Fund) Unless otherwise provided in Paragraphs A through D of this provision, the funds
34 appropriated to the Public Employee Benefit Authority (PEBA) for the South Carolina Retirement System Trust Fund and the Police
35 Officers' Retirement System Trust Fund in Part IA, Section 108 of this act shall be credited toward the contributions due from
36 participating employers in SCRS and PORS for Fiscal Year ~~2018-19~~ 2019-20. Each employer's credit shall be determined at the

1 same rate as calculated by PEBA for the pension funding allocation credit for Fiscal Year 2017-18. A participating employer shall
2 not receive a credit that exceeds the employer contributions due from the employer.

3 (A) From the funds available for allocation pursuant to this provision, no credits shall be issued for covered employees of special
4 purpose districts, joint authorities, or non-profit corporations; however, this provision does not apply to the South Carolina State
5 Ports Authority and the South Carolina Public Service Authority.

6 (B) From the funds available for allocation pursuant to this provision, no credits shall be issued for covered employees of
7 hospitals; however this provision does not apply to the Medical University Hospital Authority.

8 (C) From the funds available for allocation pursuant to this provision, no credits shall be issued for covered employees of
9 participating associations or service organizations as defined in Section 9-1-10(11)(e) of the 1976 Code.

10 (D) From the funds available for allocation pursuant to this provision, no credits shall be issued for state employees who are
11 funded with federal funds. The Public Employee Benefits Authority shall collaborate with the Department of Administration,
12 Executive Budget Office and the Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office to determine the amount of credit exclusion for federally-funded
13 employees of state agencies.

14 **117.132.** (GP: Retirement System Assets and Custodial Banking Relationship Transfer) In order to facilitate the transfer of
15 custodianship of the assets of the Retirement System to the Public Employee Benefit Authority and governance of the custodial
16 banking relationship to the Retirement System Investment Commission, all portions of contracts, agreements, and exemptions from
17 the Consolidated Procurement Code providing for and relating to custodial banking, general banking, accounting, or any other
18 ancillary services are transferred to, and devolved upon, the Public Employee Benefit Authority and the Retirement System
19 Investment Commission in accordance with the authority transferred to the respective agency.

20 **117.133.** (GP: Opioid Abuse Prevention and Treatment Plan) From the funds appropriated and authorized to the Department of
21 Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services and the Department of Health and Human Services in the current fiscal year, the agencies
22 shall establish a coalition of state agencies, providers and other related entities to combat the opioid epidemic in a collaborative
23 manner and ensure that appropriate services and treatments are made available statewide. This initiative should include efforts to
24 coordinate funding for the provision of treatment with an assessment of current programs and funding levels, to enhance available
25 prevention, treatment and recovery services; expand provider capacity; and enable workforce development for substance use disorder
26 services. General Funds appropriated to any state agency for Opioid Abuse Prevention and Treatment may be carried forward and
27 expended for the same purpose.

28 (A) The Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services, the State Law Enforcement Division, and the Department of
29 Health and Human Services shall establish an advisory board with representation from both agencies, to provide both oversight and
30 administrative direction to the coalition. The advisory board may also include representation from the Department of Health and
31 Environmental Control, the Department of Mental Health, the Medical University of South Carolina, the University of South
32 Carolina's School of Medicine, the Department of Labor Licensing and Regulation, the Department of Corrections, state and local
33 law enforcement agencies, the judicial branch, the South Carolina Hospital Association, the South Carolina Medical Association, the
34 South Carolina Primary Health Care Association, Behavioral Health Centers and other related entities. The advisory board must
35 consider recommendations made in the 2018 report by the South Carolina House of Representatives Opioid Abuse Prevention Study

1 Committee, as well as any recommendations made by the South Carolina Behavioral Health Coalition related to substance use
2 disorders and create a plan to ensure implementation of appropriate recommendations.

3 (B) The Department of Health and Human Services may leverage any and all available federal funds to implement enhanced
4 treatment services and resources for this coalition. ~~The department may also develop a waiver application through the Centers for~~
5 ~~Medicaid and Medicare Services that could provide coverage for populations that have a substance use disorder diagnosis. Until a~~
6 ~~waiver is approved to expand access to substance use treatment in Institutions of Mental Disease (IMD), the department shall ensure~~
7 ~~that IMDs are considered an "in lieu of" service in its managed care contracts, when medically appropriate. The department must~~
8 ~~also work with Medicaid Managed Care Organizations to ensure policies governing the clinical review, utilization management, and~~
9 ~~determinations of medical necessity for Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) for opioid use disorder are consistent with American~~
10 ~~Society for Addiction Medicine (ASAM) criteria.~~

11 (C) In consultation with the Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services and the Medical University of South
12 Carolina Hospital Authority, the Department of Health and Human Services shall review and evaluate outcomes data from the 2018
13 ~~pilot~~ program for MAT services for prescription opioid dependency and addiction established by Act 97 of 2017 *and expanded by*
14 *Act 264 of 2018*. Based on the success rate and ability to ~~replicate this pilot~~ *continue expansion of this model*, the department may
15 provide funding not to exceed \$2,500,000 to continue and expand the program to additional providers that are necessary to ensure
16 greater impact in geographical areas of critical need. All medications proven to be effective in treating opioid addiction shall be
17 considered as viable options on a case by case basis to ensure the greatest level of success for individuals in the program.

18 *(D) In consultation with the Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services, the Department of Health and Human*
19 *Services shall identify at least one county with a disproportionately high number and incidence of opioid-related overdoses and*
20 *deaths to provide up to \$500,000 to develop a local continuum of substance and behavioral health service coordination within the*
21 *target county and across the region.*

22 ~~(D E)~~ *E* The Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services and the Department of Health and Human Services shall
23 assist the Department of Health and Environmental Control with any funding required to implement necessary programmatic
24 enhancements to the Prescription Monitoring Program. The departments must consider changes to strengthen risk assessments and

7 isolates, and purified compounds, including, but not limited to, THC, CBD, CBO, cannabiniol, and cannabigerol for use in research
8 and clinical trials to develop potential therapeutic agents for epilepsy, Dravet's Syndrome, chronic pain, cancer, reduction of nausea,

19 the accuracy of information provided by counties and municipal governments within the ICR. Every agency of this State, and
20 political subdivisions thereof, shall provide documentation that SLED considers necessary for the publication of the ICR. The ICR
21 shall contain a list of county and municipal governments that SLED has certified to be compliant with Sections 17-13-170(E) and

27 **117.145.** (GP: School Resource Officer Critical Needs) Any Class 1 law enforcement officer who retired under the Police Officers
28 Retirement System on or before December 31, 2017, may return to employment with a public school district as a critical needs
29 School Resource Officer without affecting the monthly retirement allowance that they are receiving from the Police Officers
30 Retirement System. The Law Enforcement Training Council must develop guidelines and curriculum for these officers to be
31 recertified and must not require recertification through basic training for those that have been inactive for a year or more.

32 **117.146.** (GP: Workforce Pathways Grant Fund) Of the funds appropriated to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive
33 Education (SBTCE) for the Workforce Pathways Program, there is created a Pathways Grant Fund, which shall be administered by
34 the SBTCE.

35 (A) The purpose of the fund is to award grants to eligible technical colleges in order to provide and support the infrastructure
36 necessary to offer Pathways programs. Grants awarded to technical colleges must be used only for Pathways-specific expenses, to

1 include program administration, career and technical equipment, facilities, instructional materials, transportation, and tuition grants.
2 The SBTCE or board-appointed committee, in consultation with the Department of Education, shall develop and maintain eligibility

4 (B) Funds available through these competitive grants are awarded to technical colleges that demonstrate the strongest ability to
5 meet grant criteria. Funds may not be awarded to all colleges in a given year.

6 (C) Funds must be used to establish new pathways or enhance existing pathways that confer the necessary skills and training to
7 prepare students for careers in high-demand fields. Funds shall only support career and technical education programs and courses in
8 industry sectors with critical workforce needs.

9 (D) To qualify for Pathways grant funding as established pursuant to this provision, the technical college and school or school
10 district must enter into Memorandums of Understanding that meet the grant requirements.

11 (E) The SBTCE or board-appointed committee, in consultation with the Department of Education, is responsible for determining
12 if a pathway meets the established criteria and may promulgate regulations further enumerating the specifics of these criteria and the
13 evaluation process.

14 (F) The SBTCE shall prepare an annual report on the Pathways program and grant awards by September first of each year. The
15 report must be submitted to the Coordinating Council for Workforce Development for inclusion in its annual report to the Governor,
16 the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee. The report must
17 include, at minimum, an update of progress toward full statewide implementation of the Pathways program, and upon
18 implementation, an analysis of program accountability measures and key performance indicators.

21 for Workforce Development and their business and industry partners.

24 (a) secondary and postsecondary education elements;

25 (b) coherent and rigorous content aligned with challenging academic standards and relevant career and technical
26 content in a coordinated, non-duplicative progression of courses that align secondary education with postsecondary education to
27 adequately prepare students to succeed in postsecondary education;

28 (c) opportunity for secondary education students to participate in dual or concurrent enrollment programs or other
29 ways to acquire postsecondary education credits at no cost to the student; and

30 (d) student attainment of an industry-recognized credential, or a postsecondary certificate, diploma, or associate
31 degree, with multiple entrance and exit points.

32 117.147. (GP: Transfer Student Credits) The State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education, in consultation with the
33 Commission on Higher Education and the public institutions of higher learning, shall develop policies by October 31, 2019 to
34 guarantee students who have earned an Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree from a public two-year institution of higher
35 learning receive a minimum of sixty transfer credit hours at a public four-year college or university and shall be given a junior status

1 at the college or university. Course prerequisites and minimum credit requirements for awarding degrees shall still apply.

3 **117.148. (GP: Adult Education Transfer Report)** Of the funds authorized and appropriated in this act, the State Board for
4 Technical and Comprehensive Education and the State Board of Education shall provide a report to the General Assembly before
5 February 1, 2020, specifically delineating the following:

6 (1) how to best transfer adult basic education and adult secondary education from the State Board of Education to the State
7 Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education. The report must include, but is not limited to, the following:

8 (a) all sources of funding that are currently appropriated to adult education programs;

9 (b) the administrative structure of adult education including how the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive
10 Education will facilitate the collaboration of core partners and service providers under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity
11 Act (WIOA) at the state level and within regional service areas;

12 (c) results of student assessments, including passage rates for high school equivalency examinations;

13 (d) a listing of personnel involved both directly and indirectly in adult education; and

14 (e) a timeline for the complete transfer of the programs to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education;

15 and

16 (2) how to best use Career and Technology Centers owned and operated by local school districts and technical college
17 facilities in order to provide improved and updated career and technical education. The report must include, but is not limited to,
18 the following:

19 (a) how to offer increased access to career and technology education to all high school students with emphasis on students
20 in rural areas who live more than ten miles from a facility that they may currently attend;

21 (b) steps necessary to create memoranda of understanding between technical colleges and local school district to allow
22 high school students greater access to technical colleges;

23 (c) transportation and liability issues regarding high school students attending technical colleges for career and
24 technology education;

25 (d) the feasibility of creating regional career and technology centers;

26 (e) all sources of funding currently appropriated for high school career and technical education; and

27 (f) listing of personnel involved both directly and indirectly in high school career and technical education.

28 **117.149. (GP: Georgetown County Boat Ramps)** The Department of Transportation shall transfer the remaining funds
29 appropriated for the Sandy Island Boat Ramp in Proviso 118.17 (B), item 43(f), Act 101 of 2013 to the Department of Natural
30 Resources. The Department of Natural Resources shall credit the transfer to the Water Recreation Resource fund for use in
31 Georgetown County and the transfer amount is not to be considered part of the annual allocation formula for Water Recreation
32 Resource funds.

33 **117.150. (GP: Lake Marion Navigation Enhancement Feasibility Study)** The Department of Natural Resources is directed to
34 work with the Public Service Authority to study the feasibility of enhancing navigation in portions of Lake Marion that are between
35 the Santee Dam and the Interstate 95 Bridge. The department's efforts shall include pursuing a comprehensive plan through the
36 Army Corps of Engineers' Planning Assistance to States Program and shall include working with the Public Service Authority to

1 conduct a public process to engage stakeholder interests relative to this concept. The authority shall collect information from
 2 prospective contractors to determine whether a cost-neutral market exists for vertical timber that is below the surface of the water
 3 and, if collected, would be at a reasonable, navigable depth above the lake bed.

4 **117.151. (GP: Legal Funding Transactions)** With the funds appropriated and authorized to the Department of Consumer Affairs
 5 for the current fiscal year, the department shall suspend and cease any investigations, enforcement procedures, or actions as a result
 6 of the Administrative Interpretation 3.104,106-1403 issued by the department and dated November 14, 2014. The department shall
 7 not make any such administrative determinations for legal funding transactions without the clear expression of intent from the
 8 General Assembly regarding the applicability of this administrative interpretation.

9 **117.152. (GP: CDBG-DR Flexibility)** The Department of Commerce is directed to transfer any funds remaining from the
 10 appropriation it received through Act 97 of 2017 for 2015 - Non-CDBG - Disaster Recovery to the Department of Administration
 11 which shall utilize these funds for any disaster recovery program.

12 **117.153. (GP: Secure Area Duty Officers Program)** The Office of Adjutant General, the State Law Enforcement Division, and
 13 other law enforcement authorities are authorized to conduct security-related activities as prescribed by the Governor in Executive
 14 Order 2015-18, as well as any subsequent Executive Order or verbal or written directive from the Governor. Activities carried out
 15 under this program shall be considered state or federal training for purposes of Section 15-78-60(19) of the 1976 Code and the
 16 agency and its personnel shall be exempt from liability as described therein. State agencies involved in the Secure Area Duty Officers
 17 Program (SADOP) may expend state and federal funds in support of the program.

18 **117.154. (GP: DSS Study Committee)** A committee shall be established to study the Department of Social Services structural
 19 organization and core mission. The study shall include, but not be limited to: determining whether specific areas of operation should
 20 more appropriately be housed at a different agency to more efficiently and effectively manage those services; to determine whether
 21 the department is performing services outside the scope of their mission; and to determine whether the department is not performing
 22 services within the scope of their mission.

23 The study committee shall be comprised of the following:

- 24 (1) Two members of the Senate appointed by the President of the Senate;
- 25 (2) Two members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- 26 (3) Two members appointed by the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee;
- 27 (4) Two members appointed by the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee; and
- 28 (5) One member appointed by the Governor

29 Support shall be provided by the staffs of the Senate Finance Committee and the House Ways and Means Committee. Findings
 30 and recommendations shall be submitted to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, the Chairman of the House Ways and
 31 Means Committee, and the Governor by January 14, 2020.

32 **117.155. (GP: Higher Education Tuition Mitigation)** The following recurring funds have been appropriated in Part IA to
 33 institutions of higher education to mitigate tuition and mandatory fee increases:

15 *In order to retain the above appropriations, each institution of higher education listed above must certify to the Commission on*

 17 *9-1-1085 and 9-11-225 of the 1976 Code and any state health plan increase, there is no in-state tuition or mandatory fee increase*
 18 *for the 2019-2020 academic year.*

19 *The Commission on Higher Education shall develop the process by which institutions provide the certification. Any institution*
 20 *unable to provide such certification to the commission shall remit their respective above recurring allocation to the General Fund*
 21 *by September 1, 2019.*

22 *By October 1, 2019, the Commission on Higher Education shall report to the House Ways and Means Committee, the Senate*
 23 *Finance Committee, and the Executive Budget Office the institutions that failed to certify that the in-state tuition increase met the*
 24 *guidelines outlined in this provision. The Executive Budget Office is directed to reduce the recurring appropriation of any institution*
 25 *found to be non-compliant with the certification.*

26 **117.156.** *(GP: Denmark Tech Study Committee and Transfer) Effective July 1, 2019, Section 59-53-600 through Section 59-53-*
 27 *640 of the 1976 Code shall be suspended and Denmark Technical College shall no longer operate as a technical college within the*
 28 *South Carolina Technical College System. All physical assets on the main campus of Denmark Technical College shall be transferred*
 29 *to the Department of Education. The State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education is directed to transfer the \$1,400,000*
 30 *appropriated in Act No. 93 of 2015, Section 1, Item (25) to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education for the*
 31 *Denmark Technical College - Building #200 and #300 Renovations, the \$950,000 appropriated in Act No. 284 of 2016, by proviso*
 32 *118.16, Item (B)(23)(h) to the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education for the Denmark Technical College -*
 33 *Barnwell Workforce Center, and the \$550,000 appropriated in Act No. 285 of 2016, Section 1, Item (23) to the State Board for*
 34 *Technical and Comprehensive Education for the Denmark Technical College - Barnwell Workforce Center to the Department of*
 35 *Education.*

1 Students enrolled at Denmark Technical College for the 2018-2019 academic year shall be allowed to transfer and enroll in any
2 technical college in the system for the 2019-2020 academic year regardless of where the student resides. Residents of the affected
3 counties and enrolling in a technical college for the first time in the 2019-20 academic year shall be served as follows: residents of
4 Bamberg County shall be served by Orangeburg Calhoun Technical College; residents of Allendale County shall be served by the
5 Technical College of the Lowcountry; and residents of Barnwell county shall be served by Aiken Technical College.

6 A study committee shall be established to develop a plan to determine the feasibility of transforming Denmark Technical College
7 from a technical college to its original mission of an area trade school. The study shall include, but not be limited to, a starting date
8 for the transition and selection of a name for the reconstituted school.

9 The study committee shall be comprised of the following:

10 (1) A member appointed by the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee;

11 (2) A member appointed by the Chairman of the House Education and Public Works Committee;

12 (3) A member appointed by the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee;

13 (4) A member appointed by the Chairman of the Senate Education Committee;

14 (5) The Executive Director of the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education or his designee;

15 (6) The Superintendent of Education or her designee;

16 (7) The Chairman of the Bamberg County Council or his designee;

17 (8) The Mayor of the City of Denmark or his designee; and

18 (9) The President of the Denmark Technical College National Alumni Association.

19 The study committee shall submit a written report of its findings and recommendations to the Senate Finance Committee, the
20 House Ways and Means Committee, the Department of Education and the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education
21 by October 1, 2019.

22 Based on the study committee's findings, the Department of Education is authorized to use their appropriated funds and funds
23 transferred from the State Board for Technical and Comprehensive Education to implement the plan for a comprehensive Denmark
24 facility to serve the residents of Bamberg, Barnwell and Allendale counties on the current site of Denmark Technical College.

25 **117.157.** (GP: Magistrates Compensation) Notwithstanding Proviso 117.112 (Employee Compensation), in the current fiscal
26 year, the salary for each magistrate must be calculated using the same schedule and same circuit judge salary, at a minimum, as
27 was in effect in Fiscal Year 2018-19.

28 **117.158.** (GP: Voting System Funds Transfer) The State Election Commission is directed to transfer any funds which have been
29 appropriated to the commission for the purchase of a new statewide voting system or for the refurbishment of the current statewide
30 voting system to the Department of Administration. The Department of Administration shall hold these funds and any other funds
31 appropriated to the department for the same purpose in a separate account. This transfer requirement shall not apply to any federal
32 funds granted to the State Election Commission. Any funds available to the State Election Commission or the Department of
33 Administration shall be used in Fiscal Year 2019-20 to purchase a new statewide voting system.

34 **117.159.** (GP: New Savannah Bluff Lock and Dam) The Department of Health and Environmental Control is prohibited from
35 using any appropriated funds to process and approve any license, permit, authorization, or certification related to the New Savannah
36 Bluff Lock and Dam inconsistent with the State's policy and the General Assembly's intent of maintaining the existing water quality

1 and navigability conditions of that portion of the Savannah River in and around the New Savannah Bluff Lock and Dam. Consistency
2 may occur by including conditions on any proposed project for the maintenance of the New Savannah Bluff Lock and Dam pool at
3 elevation 114.5 NAVD88 for the preservation of adequate and sufficient water quality, navigation, water supply, and recreational
4 activities.

5 **117.160.** (GP: Food Preparation and Service) In the current fiscal year and from the funds appropriated or authorized to the
6 Department of Revenue, the department shall consider an establishment as a business that is bona fide engaged primarily and
7 substantially in the preparation and serving of meals if the establishment meets all criteria required by law and generates at least
8 15% of its revenue from the sale of food.

12 **118.1.** (SR: Year End Cutoff) Unless specifically authorized herein, the appropriations provided in Part IA of this act as ordinary
13 expenses of the State Government shall lapse on July 31, ~~2019~~ 2020. State agencies are required to submit all current fiscal year
14 input documents and all electronic workflow for accounts payable transactions to the Office of Comptroller General by July ~~12, 2019~~
15 14, 2020. Appropriations for Permanent Improvements, now outstanding or hereafter provided, shall lapse at the end of the second
16 fiscal year in which such appropriations were provided, unless definite commitments shall have been made, with the approval of the
17 State Fiscal Accountability Authority and Joint Bond Review Committee, toward the accomplishment of the purposes for which the
18 appropriations were provided. Appropriations for other specific purposes aside from ordinary operating expenses, now outstanding
19 or hereafter provided, shall lapse at the end of the second fiscal year in which such appropriations were provided, unless definite
20 commitments shall have been made, with the approval of the State Fiscal Accountability Authority, toward the accomplishment of
21 the purposes for which the appropriations were provided.

22 **118.2.** (SR: Titling of Real Property) It is the intent of the General Assembly to establish a comprehensive central property and
23 office facility management process to plan for the needs of state government agencies and to achieve maximum efficiency and
24 economy in the use of state owned or state leased real properties. The Department of Administration is directed to identify all state
25 owned properties whether titled in the name of the state or an agency or department, and all agencies and departments of state
26 government are upon request to provide the department all documents related to the title and acquisition of the real properties that
27 are occupied or used by the agency or titled in the name of the agency. Except for any properties where the department determines
28 title should not be in the name of the State because the properties are subject to reverter clauses or other restraints on the property,
29 or where the department determines the state would be best served by not receiving title, and with the exception of properties,
30 highways and roadways owned by the Department of Transportation, title of any property held by or acquired by a state agency or
31 department shall be titled in the name of the state under the control of the Department of Administration. Titling in the name of the
32 state shall not affect the operation or use of real property by an agency.

33 This provision applies to all state agencies and departments except: institutions of higher learning; the Public Service Authority;
34 the Ports Authority; the South Carolina Division of Public Railways; the MUSC Hospital Authority; the Myrtle Beach Air Force
35 Redevelopment Authority; the Department of Transportation; the Midlands Technical College Enterprise Campus Authority, the

1 Trident Technical College Enterprise Campus Authority; the Area Commission of Tri-County Technical College; and the Charleston
2 Naval Complex Redevelopment Authority.

3 With respect to any past or future acquisition of real property, the application of this provision and prior comparable titling
4 provisions to the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources and real property under its ownership or control is subject to the
5 exemption adopted by the South Carolina Budget and Control Board on March 21, 2006.

6 This provision is comprehensive and supersedes any conflicting provisions concerning title and acquisition and disposition of state
7 owned real property whether in permanent law, temporary law or by provision elsewhere in this act.

8 The Department of Administration is directed to provide to the Department of Education, funds equal to the amount realized from
9 the sale of the Greenville Halton Road Bus Shop property for school bus maintenance shop relocations, construction, and shop
10 equipment.

11 **118.3.** (SR: Contingency Reserve Fund) (A) There is created in the State Treasury a fund separate and distinct from the general
12 fund of the State, the Capital Reserve Fund, and all other funds entitled the Contingency Reserve Fund. All general fund revenues
13 accumulated in a fiscal year in excess of general appropriations and supplemental appropriations must be credited to this fund.
14 Revenues credited to this fund in a fiscal year may be appropriated by the General Assembly. Upon determination by the Comptroller
15 General as to the amount to be deposited in the Contingency Reserve Fund, the Comptroller General shall notify the Board of
16 Economic Advisors and the board shall recognize that amount as surplus funds. Revenues in this fund may be appropriated only for
17 the purposes provided in subsection (B).

18 (B) (1) If the balance in the general reserve fund established pursuant to Section 36, Article III of the Constitution of this State
19 and Section 11-11-310 of the 1976 Code is less than the required balance, there must be appropriated to it all amounts in the
20 Contingency Reserve Fund up to the total necessary to replenish the general reserve fund. This amount does not replace or supplant
21 the minimum replenishment amount otherwise required to be made to the general reserve fund.

22 (2) After the appropriation of amounts required pursuant to item (1) of this subsection, any remaining balance may be
23 appropriated by the General Assembly as it deems appropriate.

24 **118.4.** (SR: Increased Enforced Collections Carry Forward) Unexpended funds appropriated pursuant to Proviso 90.16 in Part IB
25 of Act 291 of 2010 may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and shall be expended for the same
26 purposes.

27 **118.5.** (SR: Health Care Maintenance of Effort Funding) The revenue collected from the fifty cent cigarette surcharge and
28 deposited into the South Carolina Medicaid Reserve Fund established by Act 170 of 2010 and any other funds deposited into the
29 fund shall be deemed appropriated for use by the Department of Health and Human Services for the Medicaid program. Unexpended
30 funds appropriated pursuant to this provision may be carried forward to succeeding fiscal years and expended for the same purposes.

31 **118.6.** (SR: Prohibits Public Funded Lobbyists) All state agencies and institutions are prohibited from using general fund
32 appropriations to compensate employees who engage in lobbying on behalf of the state agency or institution. The State Ethics
33 Commission shall require state agencies and institutions that report lobbying activities to the commission to certify that the lobbying
34 activities were not funded by general fund appropriations.

35 All state agencies and institutions are prohibited from entering into contracts using general fund appropriations to provide lobbying
36 services to the agency or institution.

1 **118.7.** (SR: Admissions Tax) For the current fiscal year, up to one hundred fourteen thousand dollars in admissions tax revenue
2 collected annually from all events held at a NASCAR sanctioned motor speedway or racetrack that hosts at least one race each year
3 featuring the preeminent NASCAR cup series must be rebated to the motorsports entertainment complex facility in the current fiscal
4 year to keep a NASCAR race at the motorsports entertainment complex facility. In addition, any sports facility that hosts at least
5 one preeminent Women's Tennis Association-sanctioned tournament or any sports facility that operates as the home venue for a
6 professional soccer team that participates in the United Soccer Leagues, second division or higher, must be rebated to the facility
7 half of its admissions tax revenue for the fiscal year and used by that facility for marketing the events held at the facility.

8 **118.8.** (SR: Agency Deficit Notice) The Comptroller General or the Executive Budget Office shall (1) provide written notice to
9 each member of the General Assembly when it makes a report concerning an agency, department, or institution that is expending
10 authorized appropriations at a rate which predicts or projects a general fund deficit for the agency, department, or institution, and (2)
11 make monthly progress reports concerning an agency's, department's, or institution's plan to reduce or eliminate the deficit.

12 **118.9.** (SR: Tax Relief Reserve Fund) (A) There is created the Tax Relief Reserve Fund, which shall be separate and distinct
13 from the General Fund. Interest accrued by the fund must remain in the fund. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, on
14 December 31, ~~2018~~ 2019, the State Treasurer shall transfer funds identified in this act from the General Fund to the Tax Relief
15 Reserve Fund. These funds may only be used to provide tax relief to businesses and individuals as provided by law. Funds within
16 the Tax Relief Reserve Fund shall be retained and carried forward to be used for the same purpose.

17 **118.10.** (SR: Tax Deduction for Consumer Protection Services) (A) In addition to the deductions allowed in Section 12-6-1140
18 of the 1976 Code, there is allowed a deduction in computing South Carolina taxable income of an individual the actual costs, but not
19 exceeding three hundred dollars for an individual taxpayer, and not exceeding one thousand dollars for a joint return or a return
20 claiming dependents, incurred by a taxpayer in the taxable year to purchase a monthly or annual contract or subscription for identity
21 theft protection and identity theft resolution services. The deduction allowed by this item may not be claimed by an individual if the
22 individual deducted the same actual costs as a business expense or if the taxpayer is enrolled in the identity theft protection and
23 identity theft resolution services offered free of charge by the State of South Carolina. For purposes of this item, 'identity theft
24 protection' means products and services designed to prevent an incident of identify fraud or identity theft or other protect the private
25 of a person' personal identifying information, as defined in Section 16-13-510(D), by precluding a third party from gaining
26 unauthorized acquisition of another's personal identifying information to obtain financial resources or other products, benefits or
27 services; and identity theft resolution services means products and services designed to assist persons whose personal identifying
28 information, as defined by Section 16-13-510(D), was obtained by a third party, whereby minimizing the effects of the identity fraud
29 or identity theft incident and restoring the person's identity to pre-theft status.

30 (B) The deduction provided in (A) is only allowed for taxpayers that filed a return with the Department of Revenue for any taxable
31 year after 1997 and before 2013, whether by paper or electronic transmission, or any person whose personally identifiable information
32 was contained on the return of another eligible person, including minor dependents.

33 (C) By March fifteenth of each year, the department shall issue a report to the Governor and the General Assembly detailing the
34 number of taxpayers claiming the deduction allowed by this item in the most recent tax year for which there is an accurate figure,
35 and the total monetary value of the deductions claimed pursuant to this item in that same year.

1 (D) The department shall prescribe the necessary forms to claim the deduction allowed by this section. The department may
2 require the taxpayer to provide proof of the actual costs and the taxpayer's eligibility.

3 **118.11.** (SR: Tobacco Settlement) (A) To the extent funds are available from payments received on behalf of the State by the
4 Tobacco Settlement Revenue Management Authority from the Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement ("MSA") in the current fiscal
5 year, the State Treasurer is authorized and directed, after transferring funds sufficient to cover the operating expenses of the Authority,
6 to transfer the remaining funds as follows:

7 (1) \$1,253,000 to the Attorney General's Office for Diligent Enforcement and Arbitration Litigation; \$450,000 to the State
8 Law Enforcement Division for Diligent Enforcement; and \$325,000 to the Department of Revenue for Diligent Enforcement, all to
9 enforce Chapter 47 of Title 11, the Tobacco Escrow Fund Act; and

10 (2) The Attorney General's Office shall maintain a balance of \$1,253,000 in a fund for future tobacco arbitration. Attorney
11 General funds in excess of \$1,253,000 may be utilized for information technology expenses and building infrastructure upgrades.
12 These funds may be carried forward from the prior fiscal year into the current fiscal year and utilized for the same purpose; and

13 ~~(2 3)~~ The remaining balance shall be transferred to a restricted account authorized solely for use by the Department of Health
14 and Human Services for the Medicaid program. Earnings on this fund must be credited to the fund and balances may be carried
15 forward from the prior fiscal year for the same purpose.

16 (B) The requirements of Section 11-11-170 of the 1976 Code shall be suspended for the current fiscal year.

17 **118.12.** (SR: One Dollar Appropriations) Funds appropriated in the amount of one dollar by this act shall not be disbursed. The
18 Comptroller General shall adjust the affected agency's chart of accounts accordingly, if necessary.

19 **118.13.** (SR: Nonrecurring Revenue) ~~(A) The source of revenue appropriated in subsection (B) is nonrecurring revenue~~
20 ~~generated from the following sources:~~

21 ~~(1) \$16,567,887 from Fiscal Year 2017-18 Debt Service Lapse;~~
