Fiscal Impact Summary

This bill, as amended, provides that it is unlawful for website operators to make a pornographic website or website that provides materials that are harmful to minors available to persons under the age of eighteen and requires operators to employ reasonable age verification methods. Entities may be held liable for nominal damages, actual damages, court costs, and reasonable attorney fees, as well as punitive damages in qualifying cases.

Judicial reports that implementation of the bill may result in an increase in general sessions court caseloads, which can be managed using existing staff and appropriations. Therefore, the bill will result in no expenditure impact for Judicial. Also, the Office of the Attorney General and State Law Enforcement Division (SLED) anticipate being able to manage the responsibilities resulting from the bill with existing staff and within existing appropriations.

As this bill creates new offenses, this may result in an increase of General Fund, Other Funds and local fine revenue. However, as the number of such offenses and the resulting fines and fees that might occur in a given year is unknown, the revenue impact is undetermined.

Explanation of Fiscal Impact

Amended by House Judiciary on January 23, 2024 State Expenditure

This bill, as amended, provides that it is unlawful for an operator to make a pornographic website available to persons under the age of eighteen when the entity fails to perform reasonable age verification methods to verify the age of an individual attempting to access the material. A commercial entity that knowingly and intentionally publishes or distributes obscene material, or material that depicts, describes, or promotes child pornography or child sexual exploitation on the Internet may be held liable for nominal damages, actual damages, court costs, and reasonable attorney fees, as well as punitive damages in qualifying cases. The bill also requires commercial entity that fails to perform age verification whereby a minor accesses such material shall be held liable to the minor for nominal damages, actual damages, actual damages, as well as punitive damages. In addition, the bill prohibits a commercial entity that uses

a reasonable age verification method from retaining identifying information of an individual once access to the material has been granted. A commercial entity found to have knowingly retained identifying information of an individual granted access shall be liable to the individual for damages, including court costs and reasonable attorney fees. The bill specifies that the Attorney General may seek injunctive and other equitable relief against a commercial entity that fails to comply with the provisions.

Judicial reports that implementation of the bill may result in an increase in general sessions court caseloads, which can be managed using existing staff and appropriations. Therefore, the bill will result in no expenditure impact for Judicial. Also, the Office of the Attorney General and SLED anticipate being able to manage the responsibilities resulting from the bill with existing staff and within existing appropriations.
