STATEMENT OF ESTIMATED FISCAL IMPACT

Fiscal Impact Summary

This bill establishes the Military Skills to Civilian Licensure Act. This bill requires licensing boards to accept documented military education, training, and experience as credit towards licensure when substantially equivalent to existing requirements. This bill also requires a written explanation within thirty days if a licensure is denied. Further, this bill requires applications from veterans and military spouses to be processed within twenty business days, with temporary licensure issued, when competency is established but examination results are pending.

The Department of Public Health (DPH) oversees licensure, certification, permitting, and regulation of certain professionals such as midwives, emergency medical technicians, and hearing aid specialists. DPH indicates that if the bill applies to these professionals, the agency can manage any additional responsibilities due to the bill with existing staff and within existing appropriations. Therefore, the bill is not expected to have an expenditure impact on DPH.

The fiscal impact of this bill on the Department of Labor, Licensing, and Regulation (LLR) is pending, as the agency is continuing to analyze the impact of the bill.

Explanation of Fiscal Impact

Introduced on January 13, 2026

State Expenditure

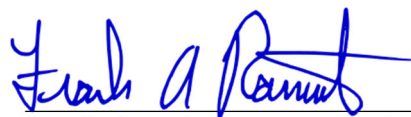
