Fiscal Impact Summary

This bill states that patient beds may be used in hallways, corridors, and other means of egress during a justified emergency as defined by this bill. Additionally, hospitals must develop written protocols for justified emergency conditions and require all employees responsible for the care or treatment of patients to familiarize themselves with these protocols. Further, within seven calendar days of the start of the justified emergency, the hospital must document on a form developed by the Department of Public Health (DPH) that all other appropriate treatment space was exhausted and that the health and safety of patients were jeopardized without the use of beds in these areas.

This bill will have no expenditure impact on DPH, the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA), and the Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities (DBHDD). DPH anticipates that any additional responsibilities created by this bill can be managed within existing staff and appropriations. DVA and DBHDD indicate that this bill will have no expenditure impact on the agencies since the inpatient facilities overseen by these agencies do not utilize patient beds in hallways.

The Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC) anticipates that this bill will have no fiscal impact on the agency since the facilities overseen by MUSC do not utilize patient beds in hallways. However, MUSC has expressed concern that the language in this bill may conflict with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) 101 Life Safety Code and Joint Commission standards. Allowing patient care activities or bed placement in egress pathways under conditions that do not meet the federal definition of an emergency could place the organization out of compliance with Life Safety Code requirements. This creates operational, safety, and accreditation risk that could lead to enforcement actions by state or federal authorities.

The Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office (RFA) contacted all forty-six counties regarding this legislation and received responses from the counties of Charleston and Lancaster. These counties indicate that the bill will have no expenditure impact.

State Expenditure

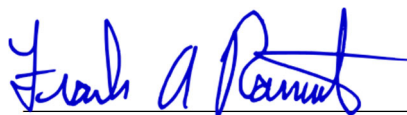
